DREDGE LAUNCHING BRINGS RIVER PROJECT TO NEW PHASE

SAYS IRRIGATION SYSTEM WILL BE A MONUMENT TO CITY'S FAITH AND INITIATIVE

The launching of the dredge boat, "T. E. Noble," next Tuesday is understood, will complete the ceremonial in connection with the construction of this immense irrigation project being built in northeast Baylor county by the Wichita south improvement water district No. 1.

It is but fitting and proper, and with due deference to his associates, that this occasion should be an especial honor to T. E. Noble, vice-president of the district, who has worked with patience and persistence over a long period of years in helping to bring this enterprise to successful completion.

This undertaking has no precedent; it is the fruit of the vision of men who dream and act and have practical confidence sufficient to enlist the aid of those with whom they are associated.

While completion is yet in the future, the countless questions contingent with the promotion of such enterprises have been successfully pioneered and now the perfectly equipped highway to success is being developed from a largely agricultural to a largely industrial nation.

The latest census reports tell us that our cities are increasing in population seven and a half times as fast as our rural districts. During the last ten years rural growth was only one-third as great as it was in the previous decade. On the other hand, the cities practically maintained their previous rate of growth. Though the agricultural increase has occurred in cities of more than 10,000 in population, it is also a fact that the country hamlets and towns showed a greater percentage increase than the purely rural districts.

It goes without saying that one of the greatest needs of the coming years will be for more food production. The greater part of our arable lands that can be profitably farmed is now planted and seeded. The eastern and southern states produce only a small surplus of food to supply water, where available, to the arid regions of the fertile western states. In fact, the arid regions in these localities, cutting this also farms from their present section or more to 25, 50 and 80 acre tracts. These tracts are being subdivided and in many instances in this section two crops could be grown on the ground with the result of increased production of the average quarter section farm under the system now prevailing.

Arthur P. Davis, director of the irrigation service, is authority for the statement that the government irrigation work has increased land value from ten dollars an acre before irrigation to \$200 an acre under present irrigation.

The anciently known irrigation projects of ancient Egypt and India, were more modern in this respect than the lands in America today. The science of irrigation, harvesting and marketing, and have left undeveloped the natural resources to insure the growth of our crops.

More Aid Needed.

The United States has staked practically alone among the important irrigation countries in having no federal law of the reclamation to the unpaid efforts of private capital to the benefit of the general public. In one respect it has been successful. It has resulted in an immense amount of money being spent between \$125,000,000 and \$150,000,000. In another respect it has been unsuccessful. Lands with water rights have been sold in excess of the available water supply. The amount of water where almost double the amount of the capacity of projects have been attempted. There is no criticism made for those who have done these enterprises. With any more than the maximum amount of acreage sold the systems could never have been built. Without exception they were pioneered in the thinly settled west.

Steps are now being taken which it is thought will bring about a large measure of federal supervision, already this year the government has appropriated \$125,000,000 for projects which are now under construction. Hope for the west is seen in these measures.

Naturally, sparsely settled regions have a corresponding low taxable valuation, and regardless of the immeasurable benefits derived from their completion, make it unfeasible from a water tax standpoint. Had it not been for the fact that the city of Wichita Falls is incorporated into the Big Wichita river district this great enterprise could never have been financed. All localities are not so favored with such a city of wealth and thrift.

State Laws Ambiguous.

State aid in most of the states is inadequate. Thus far practically all laws governing the control of rivers need in irrigation and the distribution of water have been enacted by the several states. Many of the state laws are ambiguous, and the laws of the different states of the

ONLY 7 ARTIFICIAL LAKES IN COUNTRY WILL EXCEED DIVERSION RESERVOIR IN SIZE

The new Wichita Falls diversion reservoir now being constructed in Baylor county will be eighth in size in the United States so far, as volume of water concerned, a survey by John A. Donald, assistant city engineer, who has checked up on all the larger projects of the country and who has found that the water capacity of Lake Mead will be more than four times greater than the combined volume of Lake Worth, Lake Wichita and the diversion lake of the new project.

FIREMAN HELD ON \$500 BOND AFTER FOREMAN'S DEATH

Sverret Gester, member of the Sherburne fire department, was held Monday under bond of \$500 following the death of A. J. Williams, who succumbed to injuries suffered last Friday when he was struck by the fire department automobile.

The department was answering a fire call to the business district when the accident occurred. Williams was pushed to the Sherburne hospital where his injuries were reduced. Little hope was expressed for his recovery immediately after the accident.

Williams was 35 years of age and was employed as an assistant foreman on the Levey team. Surviving him leaves a wife and five children: his parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Williams of Alva, Okla., and his grandmother, Mrs. D. A. Bradley of Henrietta.

Funeral services were to be held Monday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock from the Dunn Undertaking parlors.

COMMISSIONERS NOT TO OPEN ROAD AS PETITIONERS ASK

Upon receipt of a general report from J. M. Labell, county engineer, the commissioners' court Monday morning decided not to open up the road to the East Creek school house as requested by a petition presented two weeks ago.

The petition asking for the opening of the road beginning at the north-east corner of section A of Tarrant county school lands, thence west along the north line of the said section, thence north to corner with the East Creek school house road.

The engineer reported that in opening the road it would require two large bridges and four small ones in addition to which extensive grading. He placed the estimate of cost at \$4,800. Mr. Labell said in his report that there is a road one mile at the present time this precinct has 39 miles more road than any other precinct.

He recommended that the opening of the road be postponed until the financial condition of the county's treasury was better. The court accepted his report and voted not to grant the request of land owners who had expressed their willingness to donate land for the road.

BONDSMAN INSISTS THAT LABOR LEADERS GIVE UP CONTROL OF COUNCIL

CHICAGO, May 29.—Thomas Carey, millionaire brick manufacturer, who obtained the release of Fred Mader, head of the building trades council, says "Big Tim" Murphy, following their indictment in connection with Chicago's bomb war and the slaying of two policemen, issued today that the two labor leaders

comply immediately with their agreement to relinquish control of the council.

Mr. Carey signed the bonds of Mader and Murphy on the sole condition that they would step out as leaders in the building trades union. Union officials expressed a desire to place the whole situation before the building trades department of the American Federation of Labor at Cincinnati June 2.

"Big Tim" Murphy, one of the "big three" leaders, was still in the county jail, where he was taken nearly three weeks ago following the raid on the offices of the building trades council. Efforts to obtain Shea's release by a writ of habeas corpus, will be continued, it was said.

NEXT ARMED MARCH CASE TO BE PLACED ON TRIAL JUNE 12

CHARLES TOWN, W. VA., May 28.—The prosecution today used a tentative agreement to postpone the Logan county armed march case until late in the summer and asked Judge J. E. Wright, charged with murder, be placed on trial June 12.

Prosecution counsel, however, before the court opened, asking judge to continue trial of the armed march cases as soon as witnesses could be gathered; that, however, would not be a week or two days, they said.

Either Frank Kenny or Fred Mooney will be tried on treason charges immediately after the trial of the march cases if they are not disposed of, it was announced.

The trial June 12 was agreed to by Judge J. M. Woods and defense counsel.

EXTERMINATOR SHIPPED TO BELMONT PARK, N. Y.

LOUISVILLE, KY., May 28.—Having entered the equine hall of fame regarded for horses that have won \$100,000 or more on the track, Willie Sherpa Kilmer's gelding Exterminator was shipped from here yesterday for Belmont Park, N. Y.

It was his victory Saturday at Churchill Downs in the Kentucky handicap, which had an added value of \$100,000 that brought the winning horse to the attention of the Kilmer owner and Samuel D. Riddle, man of war, which won \$151,444. He is the only American horse that ever has paid the \$100,000 mark.

CHILDREN SHIPPED MUCH LIVESTOCK

CHILDRESS, May 28.—Since January 1, this year, a lot of swine have been shipped from this station, requiring 100 cars, most of the animals went to packers in California, but a few cars went to Fort Worth. Most of the hogs shipped to California weighed around 100 pounds. The heavy hogs cannot survive the trip through the deserts enroute to California, it is said.

Since January 1 childless has shipped 3,485 head of cattle, requiring about 180 cars. Eight thousand hams were also shipped during the period. In the same period 18,577 bales of cotton were loaded out from adjacent farms, while the cotton compress has shipped more than \$2,000 bales.

PLEASURE BOAT SWAN REACHES PORT SAFELY

PENNA. COAST, Fla., May 28.—The pleasure boat Swan, with about 20 persons aboard, missing throughout the night, reached her anchorage today with all hands safe. The vessel ran into a gulf storm late yesterday, but tied up on the other side of the bay until it was safe to proceed back to Pensacola.

The Swan left Camp Saufley, a beach resort, at 5:30 p. m. yesterday, but encountered a gale and heavy seas in Santa Rosa sound. Attempts to return to Saufley were unsuccessful, and the little 79-foot motor propelled vessel could do little more than hold her own. Anchor was dropped about six miles from here during the night and several fruitless attempts were made to come to port during lulls in the gale. Another try shortly after daylight was successful and the vessel docked at 5:30 a. m. 13 hours after it left Saufley.

STORES TO VOTE ON HALF HOLIDAY EACH WEEK THIS SUMMER

RECTORS OF RETAIL MERCHANTS MAKE RECOMMENDATION.

PLAN IS IN EFFECT IN MANY OTHER CITIES

Merchants to Ballot on Matter and Also on Day on Which to Close.

At a meeting Monday morning of the Retail Merchants Association, it was voted, 3 to 1, to recommend to the merchants that weekly half holidays be taken during the summer months.

Letters will be sent to all merchants explaining the proposition and asking them to vote on whether they approve the idea, and what day of the week they favor. It is expected that Wednesday or Thursday will be the day designated.

Considerable opposition to the plan developed at the meeting Monday and it is not certain that it will be adopted. Advocates of the holiday point out that it has been in practice in many larger cities and that it causes little loss of business after the public has become accustomed to it.

Decision on the question will be determined by the result of the mail ballot to be taken this week.
