ELEVEN UNIONS TO TAKE PART IN CONFERENCE

Maintenance of Way Organization Has Already Distributed Ballots.

CHICAGO, June 3.—A rail strike threatened the nation today as railroad unions awaited the impending report by the railroad labor board on the wages of additional classes of employees other than train-service men.

M. Jewell, head of the railway employees department of the American federation of labor, declared that the wage reductions would probably result in a strike following next Tuesday's conference of railroad union chiefs at Cincinnati.

Widely circulated reports have indicated that a decision in the wage reduction sought by the carriers for 500,000 shovemen would be forthcoming today or early next week.

Wage questions involving the big four brotherhoods are being discussed in the board's announcement which averted last fall's threatened strike.

He had been connected at times with newspapers at Dallas, Houston, San Antonio and other cities, and last December gave up active management of the San Antonio Texas Republic, which he had owned for 15 years.

FURTHER TROUBLE HAD NOT MATERIALIZED DURING SATURDAY.

FEELING HIGH SINCE THE RECENT LYCHINGS

Sheriff Advises That He and His Deputies Have the Situation Under Control.

KIRVIN, TEXAS, June 3.—Quiet continued in Freestone county after daylight this morning, following a night of excitement due to reports of fears of race riots. An airplane was flying over the streets of communities watching for potential trouble.

According to reports here the bodies of Leroy and Allie Gibson, Negroes killed yesterday, were buried here today. Late yesterday they were reported lying where killed, but this morning were said to have been buried in a private cemetery.

Officers continued to devote efforts to prevent crowds from congregating. They seek particularly to keep the whites from the negro settlements and negroes from the white communities. While everything is quiet on the surface there is an undercurrent of tense feeling.

KIRVIN, TEXAS, June 3.—Racial trouble of a serious nature reported last night as being feared near here, was averted today. Sheriff and his deputies were on duty in Kirvin.

Perdue Hurls Mates To Close Victory Over Shreveport in Opener

Those who journeyed to Athletic park Friday afternoon are convinced of the fact that the Spudders displayed all the essentials of a pennant winning aggregation in their opening set to with the rejuvenated Gassers which they opposed to, thereby bringing their total of consecutive wins up to five. They had pitched, fielded, hitting in the "pinches" in everything. These things are a snap to a team that had their full Friday. The contest lasted only an hour and 40 minutes—one of the fastest staged at Salm's ball yard this year.

My advice to every pitcher who hopes to make the big show is the old bit of logic, "always wear a smile and work hardest when the odds against you are greatest." Control, as we term it, is of two kinds, physical and mental. Physical control is in the actual delivery of the ball. Mental control is prior to the delivery of the ball, the perfect working of the mind so as to assure an easiness of action. Mental control also appeals to confidence.

Confidence in yourself makes your team radiate with it. In turn the psychology of it weakens your opponent. Never confuse confidence with swell-headedness. They are total strangers. Tomorrow catching is discussed. It is one of the most difficult positions on the ball field. Catchers rarely get the credit due them.

HOW TO PLAY BALL

Waite Hoyt, Hero of 1921 World Series, Tells in This Story How to Pitch



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My first bit of advice to a player is to pick out the position he likes best. Then devote all your time, brain power and energy in perfecting your play. Temperament is a most important factor in a pitcher's success. The pitcher should never release the ball until his arm is at full length and slightly below the shoulder level.

HOW TO GET KILLED.

Whenever you use a ladder, remember that it is the most dangerous device in existence. Ladders continue to cause more accidents than anything else. This is shown by insurance experts' latest check-up of fatal and non-fatal casualties.

Every minute of the day and night, 23 Americans are seriously injured by accidents. In the last four years, total accidents killed or injured more Americans than the total killed on both sides in the world war.

Human deaths by accidents in the United States average around 60,000 a year, or 165 a day, according to the census. You are, of course, "afraid of getting injured." And of what, you most afraid? Autos, probably.

Yet, for each 67 people killed by autos, 65 are burned to death, 86 die in railroad accidents, 54 are drowned, 36 die in mines, 34 are asphyxiated by gas, 31 are killed around machinery, 23 by street cars, 23 by bicycles and horse-drawn vehicles.

Read these figures a second time, record them indelibly in your brain, and you'll know what to be careful of unless you want to meet the undertaker. Nearly all accidents are the result of carelessness—taking chances in the face of danger.

Obviously, then, nearly all accidents could be prevented. The prevention of accidents, according to safety engineers, is about half safety devices and half personal caution.

To help in this movement and protect your own life and body, you merely have to observe two simple cautions: First, keep your eyes open. Second, be cautious, take no chances.

That movement has worked wonders. For one thing, it has reduced railroad deaths to a third of what they were in 1907. The trouble with the Safety First Movement always has been that it is spasmodic. Between celebrations, the public gets lulled into carelessness, then accidents burst forth again on a big scale and another Safety Movement is started.

To keep the Safety First fires burning constantly, several hundred prominent citizens have just formed a national Society for Prevention of Accidents.

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WICKI AND SIX YEARS VERDICT IN ASSAULT CASE

MIKE TUCKER SENTENCED TO STATE PENITENTIARY FOLLOWING TRIAL OF CASE.

JURY REPORTS AT 10 P. M. FRIDAY NIGHT

Defense Counsel Motioned For Court Will File Motion For New Trial.

After standing 10 for conviction and two for acquittal on the first ballot and following four-hour deliberation the jury in the Mike Tucker case found him guilty of the offense as charged in the indictment and assessed his punishment at six years confinement in the state penitentiary.

The verdict of the jury was received at 10 o'clock Friday night, the case having gone to the jury at a few minutes after 6 o'clock.

Immediately after the verdict was received, attorneys Charles L. Francis and John Davenport, appointed by the court to represent the defendant in his trial, consulted and decided to file a motion for a new trial and to ask the court to take the case to the appeal court.

Judge Martin, after the verdict, took the opportunity to commend the jury for its attentiveness during the trial and for its services in the administration of justice. The court also thanked the defense counsel for their services.

Tucker received the verdict calmly. A hacking cough that the jury had heard many times during the trial of the case was the only sound in the first few seconds of silence that followed the reading of the verdict.

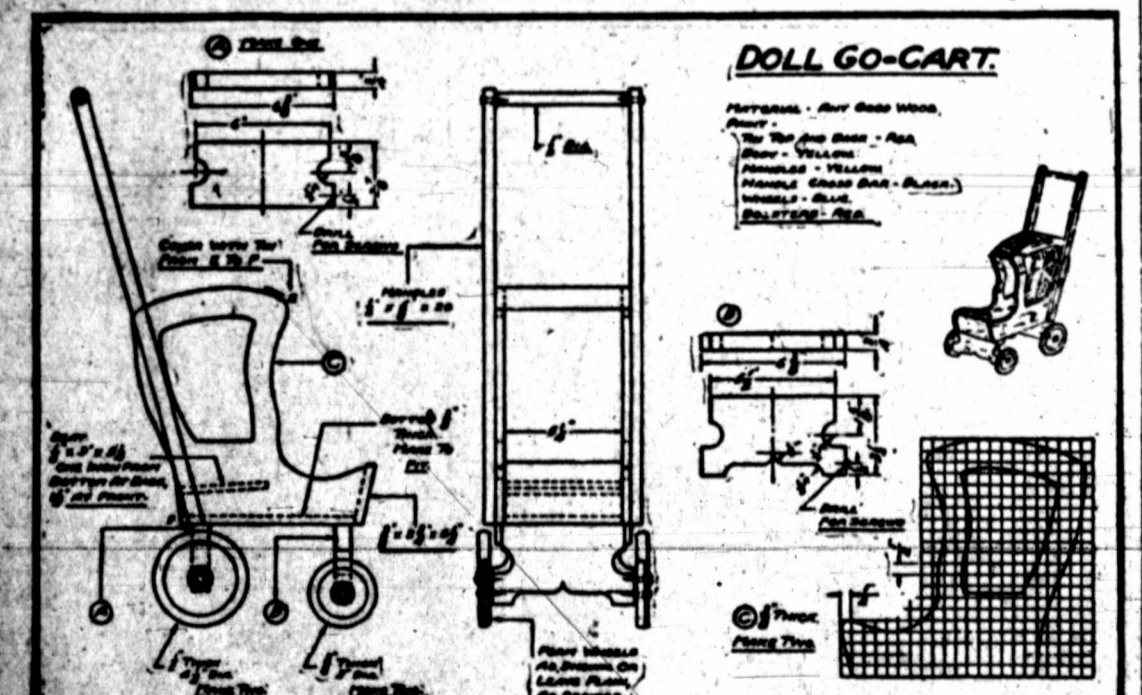

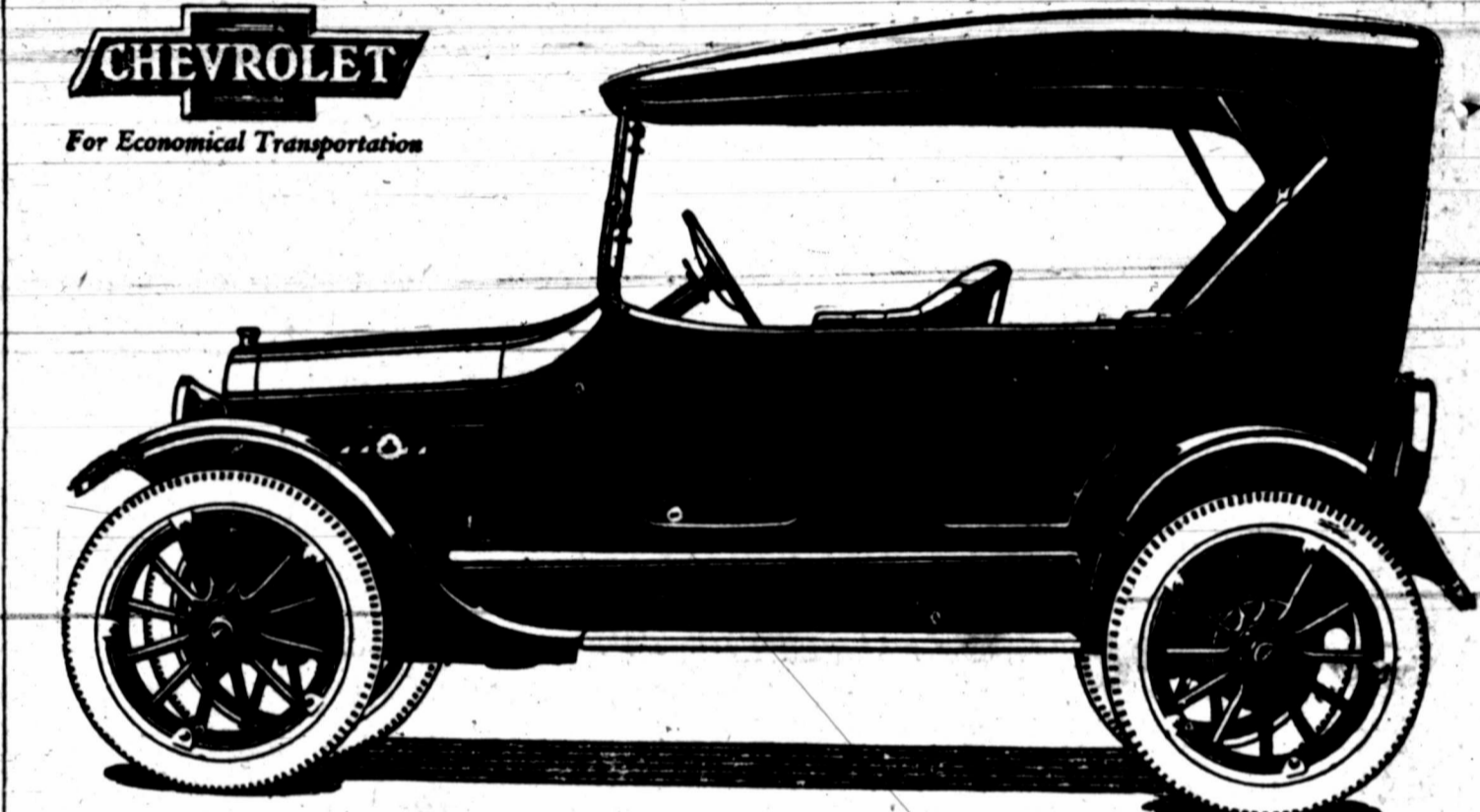
