Presidential Party Reaches the Scene After a Cross-Country Motor Trip,

PRINCETON, N. J., June 5.— President Harding reached here to-day at 1 p. m. to dedicate the Princeton battle monument after traveling across country by motor from Somerville, N. J., with his arts.
