

## FINE ESTROYS HALF OF OIL CITY

### 1300 CHRISTIAN WOMEN AND CHILDREN MASSACRED BY TURKS

#### MORE THAN HALF OF OIL CITY DESTROYED LATE TUESDAY NIGHT

Twenty houses burn in Young County town; \$150,000 damage.

#### FIRE ORIGINATED IN THE HOTEL ON FRONT STREET

Flames light up country for miles around and many visit scene of flames.

#### GRAHAM, TEXAS, June 14.—Oil City, a new oil town 10 miles south of Graham in Young county, was almost wiped off the map by a disastrous fire last night. Forty business houses were destroyed. Loss estimated at \$150,000 with an insurance.

#### SOUTH BEND, TEXAS, June 14.—A good portion of Oil City, 10 miles east of South Bend, was destroyed by fire last night. The first started in the Rex hotel at 8 o'clock and spread eastward until it had destroyed 12 buildings on the north side of the street, taking in the postoffice, telephone office, four of five drug stores and butcher shops and two groceries.

#### GRAHAM, TEXAS, June 14.—Fire starting late last night destroyed more than half of Oil City, inflicting damage estimated at \$150,000 before it was brought under control early this morning. The blaze started in a hotel on the corner of Main street and swept all before it. There was just enough wind to make fighting of the flames difficult. Twenty-five houses were destroyed.

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### SLATON IS ENJOYING MANY IMPROVEMENT ERA OF PROSPERITY;

SLATON, June 14.—The Mississippi bubble "burst," but the Slaton boom is still booming. Construction is taking on an added impetus in the last few weeks.

Last week permits and contracts were let for more than 40 new residences. More than 200 were built in the last 12 months.

The school board is advertising for bids for the erection of a new brick school structure in southeast Slaton and repair to other school buildings, the total cost of the improvements to be about \$50,000.

Contract for the \$25,000 municipal building, including auditorium, will be let in a few days. Delay in closing contract was due to negotiating with the federal government looking to its using part of the building for a postoffice.

The new laundry is now in operation in a few days. It is one of the enterprises secured this year by the chamber of commerce.

The West Texas Compress and Storage company has set its machinery and lumber and other materials are on the ground. This plant will be ready for commission about October.

The new compress, costing about \$10,000, represents much material. In order to bring this in many cars were required, distributed as follows: Thirteen cars of lumber, two of corrugated iron, three of common brick, one of cement.

The new form will have a shed 200 by 240 feet, with a large shed outside, with tracks for 10 cars. There will be a 70,000 gallon water tank and a 16-foot water line with nine fire hydrant connections.

The plant will employ about 50 men when in operation this fall.

### REVIVAL SERVICES NORTH SIDE METHODIST CHURCH

A historical outline of God's dealings with Israel was rapidly and interestingly traced. How when destruction confronted them, when facing starvation, when their enemies were strong about them, Jehovah came down and effectively to their help, sending hosts of angels to fight their battles. It would seem that after all this they would have been wise to Him. But not so. Because of their faithfulness He removed their religious privileges and left them to their enemies as a chastisement. Finally, in the days of Ahasuerus, who reigned from India to Ethiopia over 127 provinces, a decree of doom to the Jews residing there brought the opportunity for imperial womanhood to assert its power of influence triumphantly, as the biblical account shows.

The evangelist with consummate skill applied the lessons of exquisite womanliness as exhibited in the faithful and sacrificial lives of Vashti and Esther to the desperate and urgent needs of society, civilization and Christianity today. In a dramatic passage he declared, "A decree has been issued by Almighty God condemning to eternal death every unsave one. They are your loved ones and you are needed as the Esther of North Wichita Falls to make just now a resolute endeavor for recovering the lost."

### REALTY MEN PLAN FIGHT ON MOVE TO TAX VENDOR'S LIEN

A vigorous protest against the announced policy of the commissioners' court, to enforce the law providing for taxation of realtors' lien notes, will be presented to the court at its next meeting. It was decided Tuesday night at a meeting of local real estate dealers.

The meeting, which was held in N. O. Monroe's office, took a unanimous and firm stand against such taxation, members pointing out that it would handicap home-building and farm development and that it would amount to double taxation.

No other county in Texas, it was stated, is levying such a tax. Fears that wholesale foreclosure on existing notes would result if the court persisted in its plans were expressed by some of those present.

W. S. Curtis, J. M. Baber, J. N. Frothro, P. S. Richardson, N. L. Inge and N. O. Monroe were named as a committee to oppose the proposed action to the commissioners.

### WANTS RAILROAD COMPANY TO PAY HIM FOR TRUCK

J. E. Zimmerman and J. C. Jones have brought suit against the Fort Worth and Denver City Railroad company in the 85th district asking judgment against the defendant for \$2,300, the amount of damage they contend was occasioned on or about November 23, 1921.

The plaintiffs allege that the truck that was destroyed was the property of Wichita county and that by reason of the fact that it was demolished that they were forced to pay the county the value of the car.

The petition recites that the accident occurred at a crossing two miles west of Iowa Park and that it occurred by reason of the fact that the defendant company had thrown up a high embankment so that the driver was unable to see the approaching train. Negligence on the part of the defendant's employees is also alleged by the plaintiff.

### REVENUE OFFICE CALLS ATTENTION TO PAYMENTS DUE ON CAPITAL STOCK

The local revenue office has issued the following announcement with reference to capital stock taxes:

Notice of Tax.—The capital stock tax due July 1, 1922, is an excise tax payable in advance for the privilege of doing business from July 1, 1922, to June 30, 1923. Every domestic corporation is required to pay annually a special excise tax with respect to carrying on or doing business equivalent to \$1 for each \$1,000 of its capital stock for the preceding year ending June 30, as in excess of \$5,000. It is immaterial whether the corporation is organized for profit or has a capital stock represented by shares.

For the purpose of this tax, the fair value of the entire capital stock as a going concern regardless of stock ownership or the ability of individual stockholders to liquidate their holdings.

The Tax.—From the total fair average value of the capital stock the sum of \$5,000 is deductible and the tax is at the rate of \$1 for each full \$1,000 of any balance.

Penalties.—In case of any failure to make and file a return or list within the time prescribed by law or prescribed by the commissioner of internal revenue of the collector in pursuance of law, the commissioner of internal revenue shall add to the tax 25 per cent of its amount. In case a false or fraudulent return or list is willfully made, the commissioner of internal revenue shall add to the tax 50 per cent of its amount. The amount of the tax is payable to the collector at any time after July 1, 1922.

Penalties Return.—Filing of a tentative return will avoid penalty for delinquent filing but does not authorize withholding the tax.

Date of Filing.—Date of filing return is during the month of July. The revenue office at WICHITA FALLS has a good supply of these forms on hand at this time and persons needing these forms will be supplied by calling at room 324, postoffice building. Every corporation must file a return or submit conclusive evidence that it is not liable for determination of liability rests with the commissioner of internal revenue. This applies to all companies claiming exemption.

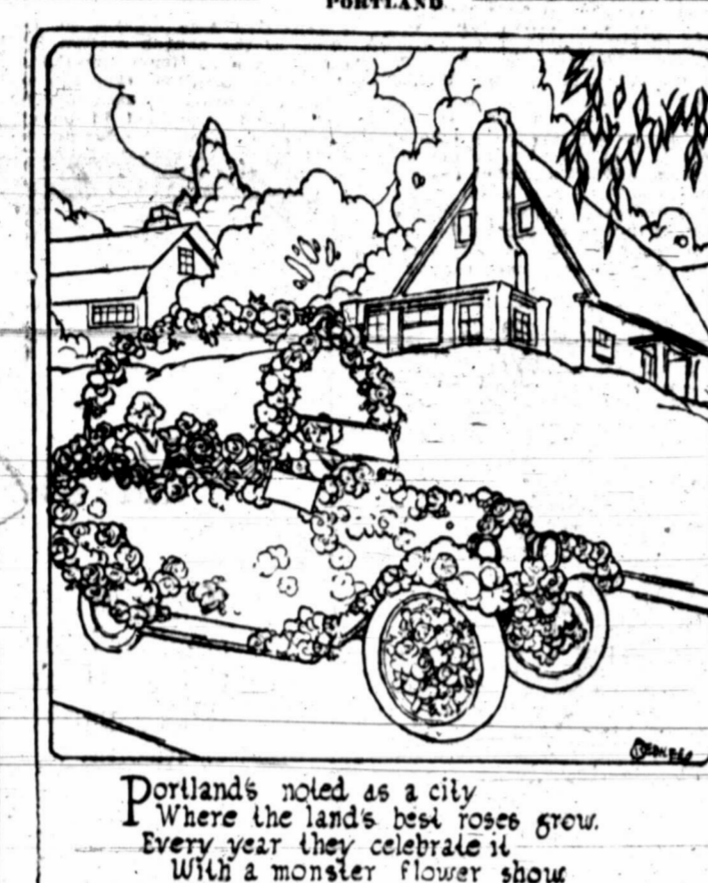

## Can Your String Beans Right Now By This Recipe

Wichita Falls household gardens are full of deliciously tender string beans this month, and many of them are going to waste. Conflicting methods of canning, and such a diversity of advice and variety of recipes has discouraged many housekeepers from canning the vegetable, with the result that one of the most healthful and wholesome of green foods is absent from most tables in the winter season.

The following recipe has been tried out for a number of years by a Wichita Falls housekeeper, and evidently suits the Wichita Falls climate, and requirements of canning. The housekeeper in question puts up a few pints of beans every day or so, rather than a large quantity at once, and never loses them in the winter. The recipe is as follows:

First, can the beans the day they are picked, and as soon after picking as possible. String, break, and wash them thoroughly. Then put them in a sack or vessel and acid them. Let them set three to five minutes. Then drain and pack them well in the jars. For flat jars, put a teaspoon of salt on top. Fill the jars with boiling water after putting on the rubbers, and give the caps a few turns, if that kind of jar is used. Do not screw tight, and if the clamp top jars are used, set the lid on but do not clamp. Then put the jars in a larger vessel into which either a false bottom, rack, or folded cloth has been set, and cover to the shoulders—the top curve of the jar—with hot water. Boil them three and a half hours if they are young and tender, and about four hours if they are not so tender. As soon as the boiling is finished remove them and tighten or clamp the lids.

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SAYS U. S. COURTS WREST SOVEREIGNTY FROM THE PEOPLE

CHARGE IS MADE BY SENATOR LA FOLLETTE IN SPEECH AT CINCINNATI

CITES CHILD LABOR LAW CONSPICUOUSLY IN INSTANCE

Scores Attitude of Chief Justice Taft Who Wrote the Opinion

CINCINNATI, June 14.—Asserting that the process of gradual encroachment on the country's federal courts have "wrested sovereignty from the people," Senator La Follette of Wisconsin, speaking here today before the American Federation of Labor conventions, proposed a constitutional amendment denying the lower courts power to set aside a federal law as unconstitutional and provide for supreme nullification of any such decision by re-assignment of the statute.

Citing the recent decision by the supreme court holding unconstitutional the child labor law as typical of the conduct of the federal judiciary and particularly the supreme court whenever congress has sought to enact progressive and humane legislation which was offensive to great financial interests, Senator La Follette declared that the present tribunal of the country was "today the actual ruler of the American people."

"The law is what they say it is," he continued, "and not what the people, through congress, enact. Even the constitution of the United States is not what its plain terms declare, but what these nine men construe it to be. In fact, five of these nine men are actually the supreme rulers, for by a bare majority the court has repeatedly overridden the will of the people."

"The nine lawyers who constitute the supreme court are placed in positions of power for life, not by the votes of the people, but by presidential appointment. Ex-President Taft was made chief justice by President Harding. Thus a man was invented with enormous prestige and influence of chief justice by presidential appointment who had been repudiated by the voters of the country on his records. No one will contend that he could have been elected chief justice by a vote of the people. And yet Chief Justice Taft wrote the opinion that annulled the child labor law; he wrote the opinion the coronado coal case. In making this observation, I level no criticism at the personnel of the court. I am dealing with fundamental principles."

It cannot be denied that "was asserted by a judicial oligarchy," the senator asserted, adding that while many of the minor federal judges sharing the "sovereign power" of the supreme court were "enlightened and enlightened men, some of them, notably Judge Anderson of Indiana, and Judge McClintock of West Vir-

CHICAGO, June 14.—Mrs. Alice Gray Wilson, university of Chicago graduate, who forsook society in 1916 for the life of a beach dweller on the Indiana dunes, was reported today as a dazed, hospitalized today as a result of injuries received in a battle on the sands last night.

Mrs. Wilson, known along the Indiana shore as "Diana of the Dunes," was said to be suffering from a fractured skull caused by a blow with a revolver butt. Her giant husband, Paul Wilson, was wounded by a bullet. His adversary, Eugene Frank, a boatman, was held by Gary police.

Authorities turned for a time from their investigation of the mysterious death of the unidentified man whose partially burned body was found on a pile of driftwood last week, to probe the circumstances surrounding last night's battle. A long feud between the beach combers and the dunes authorities belatedly caused Mrs. Wilson to believe to have been wounded when she leaped into the fight after her husband and Frank.

The scene of the night battle is a desolate spot along the lake shore two miles from the Wilson shack.

DRUGGISTS TO DEMAND APOLOGY FROM SMOOT

FORT WORTH, June 14.—Apologies will be demanded of Senator Reed Smoot of Utah, for charges of profiteering he is alleged to have made against the pharmaceutical profession at Washington May 23, according to a resolution unanimously adopted by the Texas Pharmaceutical association in session here today.

The resolution set forth that the prescription department of the average pharmacy, the particular target of Smoot's, is the point of slowest turnover and the one which causes the druggist most effort and labor. It declares that the senator's alleged charges were inflammatory and prejudicial and gave "undue publicity to a condition that does not exist. It asserted also that Smoot was "densely ignorant" of the subject of which he essayed to speak.

HASKELL FAMILY HAS NARROW ESCAPE WHEN HOME IS DESTROYED

HASKELL, TEXAS, June 14.—About 4:00 o'clock this morning Hay Hayes and family narrowly escaped being burned to death when fire had destroyed the kitchen and dining room and smoke had almost overcome the entire family. All contents, egg building, were destroyed, with some insurance. The residence belonged to Dr. O. M. Guest.

MORE COTTON IS CONSUMED IN MAY THAN A YEAR AGO

WASHINGTON, June 14.—Cotton consumed during May amounted to 495,474 bales of lint and 57,314 bales of linters, compared with 440,714 of lint and 48,071 of linters in May last year, the census bureau announced today.

Cotton on hand May 31 in consuming establishments amounted to 1,419,936 bales of lint and 139,171 bales of linters, compared with 1,359,723 of lint and 216,233 of linters so held a year ago. Imports amounting to 2,501,007 bales of lint and 94,181 bales of linters, compared with 4,282,267 of lint and 268,374 of linters so held a year ago. Imports amounting to 1,829,200 bales compared with 1,052 in May last year.

Exports for May were 469,297 bales, including 12,681 bales of lint, compared with 477,269 bales, including 434 bales of lint exported in May last year.

Cotton stocks active during May numbered 31,642,681, compared with 32,336,107 in May last year.

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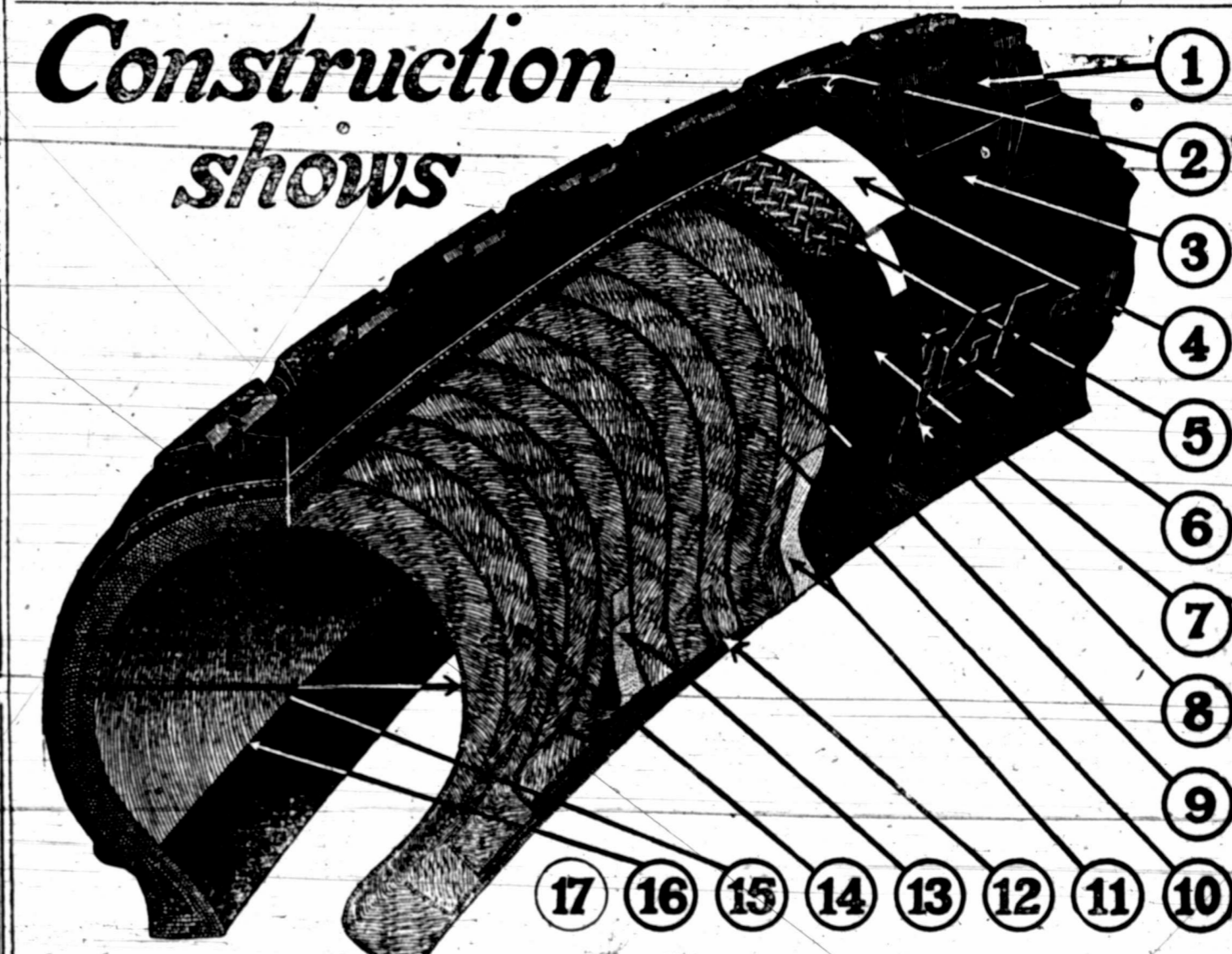
