

Standing thoughtfully on the curbstones, watching their deceased brethren going to Dun & Bradstreet's cemetery, are nearly 2,000,000 business organisations that have weathered the storm without

In two years of very severe depression, only one business in each 53 has failed.

In a flash this illustrates the great underlying strength of our business organization, the Gilbraltar that cannot be toppled by any storm.

As usual, of course, attention centers on the ships that sink. Ships that weather the storm are ignored. Thus the financial ocean, like the Seven Seas, gets a worse reputation than it really deserves. In May, only 1960 failures. Many will snort and wonder why the "only."

If they turn back four months, they find 2723 faffures in January.

Steadily the storm subsides. Observing this young blood desires to put to sea-to try its hand May, 954 new companies were incorporated in the principal states, with capital of \$100,000 or more apiece. Thousands of smaller ones also ventured forth. They are the rowboats.

How much did they fail for? That is the important question. Failures, during the depression that now is nearing its end, have had total liabilities or debts at a rate of about \$600,000,000 a year.

Assets have averaged enough to pay about 50 cents on \$1.00.

The total or net less, due to failures, has been running around \$300,000,000 a year-or about \$3 a year for each American. That, after all, is not such a big price to pay for getting out of the woods.

SENATOR BORAH ATTACKS THE DYER ANTI-LYNCHING BILL.

The Dyer anti-lynching bill which got through the house with a considerable majority isn't going to have such easy sailing in the senate. Indeed, it appears very doubtful whether the bill can get through that body. A number of influential republican senators together with the entire democratic membership are opposing the measure on the ground that it is contrary to the constitution and seriously disturbs the distribution of powers delegated the states and to the federal government in that instrument

Among republicans opposing the measure is Senator Borah. He is opposing the measure with his accustomed vigor and logic.

"Shall the national government be authorized to take over the police power of the state in whole, or in part?" he asked. "There is no dodging the question. If the people of this nation want to redistrib-ut the powers of the government, lets face the questie through a constitutional amendment and put an end to this constant pressure on congressmen to disregard their oaths and the equally persistent pressure on the supreme court to give us a court made constitution.

"Year after year congress is lashed into passing laws which are manifestly unconstitutional, and it has come to be a settled principle apparently that the congress should disregard the constitution and leave the supreme court alone to protect it. To my mind, such a rule is so utterly shameless, so utterly intolerable, that it is startling that it should be urged even spasmodically."

TURKISH ATROCITIES WILL STOP WHEN HUMAN SUPPLY RUNS OUT.

Thirteen hundred Christian men and women are ported to have been driven out of a town on the Black Sea by Turkish soldiers and massacreed.

Such massacrees are going on while the govern ments of the United States, Great Britain and others are differing among themselves as to the scope of a commission to investigate. Turkish atrocities. Our own diffident government appears to want to limit the scope of the commission to investigation and the publication of the facts ascertained.

Massacrees of Christians by the Turks have been going on for many years. They have been directed chiefly against the Armenians and the Greeks. The Armenian population, which was friendly to the al-

this people will stop within a rew years because the Turks will have exhausted the supply of human material on which they wreak their passion and ven-

geance. The allied governments were under every mora obligation to give protection to the Armenians. They failed to do so. And now the most this country wants to do is to appoint a commission to make an investigation and to publish the facts.
