OBREGON SAYS REPORT IS ABSOLUTELY BASELESS

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28.-Presi dent Alvaro Obregon of Mexico in a telegram to the San Francisco Chronicle last night said that news from Tampico of Americans held captive by bandits was "absolutely baseless." He characterized the dis-patch "as only one of the many malicious deeds to create unfavorable epinion between the two nations."


