WITNESS TELLS OF MEADOWS MURDER; WOMAN INDICTED

MUTILATED BODY IS FOUND NEAR LONELY ROAD AT LOS ANGELES

VICTIM IS BEATEN OVER THE HEAD WITH HAMMER

Husband of Accused Ordered Kept in Custody as a Material Witness

LOS ANGELES, July 15.—Development in the investigation of the death of Mrs. Alberta Meadows, whose mutilated body was found Wednesday evening behind a lonely road here, came rapidly yesterday following the discovery of an eye witness to the slaying.

The details of the attacks upon Mrs. Clara Phillips, wife of Al Phillips, an oil promoter, in which Mrs. Meadows was said to have beaten Mrs. Meadows over the head with a hammer, were told to the county grand jury by Mrs. Peggy Caffee.

An indictment charging murder was returned against Mrs. Meadows, who is under arrest at Tucuman, Ariz., Sheriff William T. Traeger is on his way there to bring her back to Los Angeles.

Mrs. Caffee said Mrs. Meadows asked her to go see Mrs. Meadows, to which she consented. Mrs. Meadows, Mrs. Caffee said, asked Mrs. Meadows to drive her to her sister's home and as they reached the lonely spot on the road asked Mrs. Meadows to stop the car and get out as she wanted to talk to her alone.

When the woman reached the ground Mrs. Meadows accused Mrs. Meadows of being a KKK member, according to Mrs. Caffee. This Mrs. Meadows denied.

Then, Mrs. Caffee said, Mrs. Meadows commenced striking Mrs. Meadows on the head and shoulders with a hammer which she had been holding behind her back. Mrs. Meadows said she attempted to defend herself and Mrs. Meadows' cries for help, but that Mrs. Meadows immediately turned upon her and threatened to kill her if she attempted to help.

Mrs. Meadows' husband was ordered kept in custody as a material witness in the case.

FORD PROPOSAL FOR MUSCLE SHOALS IS PASSED TO SENATE

COMMITTEE DISAPPROVES OF PLAN BY VOTE OF NINE TO SEVEN.

ALSO VOTE AGAINST OTHER PROPOSITIONS

Defeat Bill Providing For Government Corporation to Operate Plant.

WASHINGTON, July 15.—Henry Ford's offer for purchase and lease of the government's projects at Muscle Shoals, Ala., was rejected by the senate agriculture committee today by a vote of 9 to 7.

Those voting for rejection were Senators Norris, Page (by proxy), McNary, Keyes, Gooding, Norbeck, Harrell, McKinley, all republicans, and Senator Kendrick, democrat, Wyoming.

Those voting for a favorable report were Senators Capper and Ladd, republicans, and Smith, Randall, Harrison, Heflin and Caraway, democrats.

The bill introduced by Chairman Norris calling for operation of the projects by government owned and controlled corporation also was rejected, the vote being 9 to 7.

Other offers including those of the Alabama Power company, Frederick Engstrom, Charles Engstrom and Charles L. Parsons, also were rejected without a record.

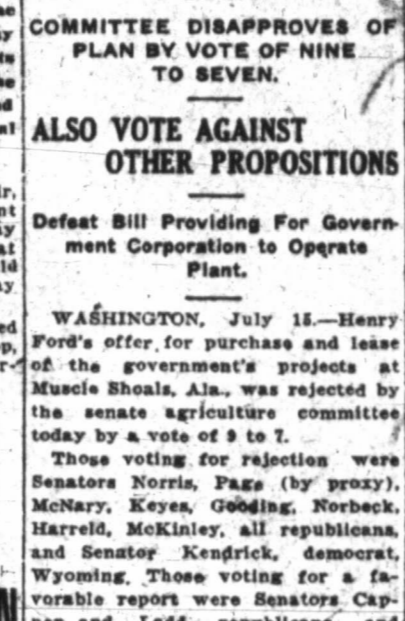
The committee also voted down without a record the bill introduced by Senator Norris at request of the Alabama Power company, proposing a semi-governmental corporation.

Despite the adverse vote, the proposal of the Alabama Power company for Norris will be presented to the senate for final decision through minority reports.

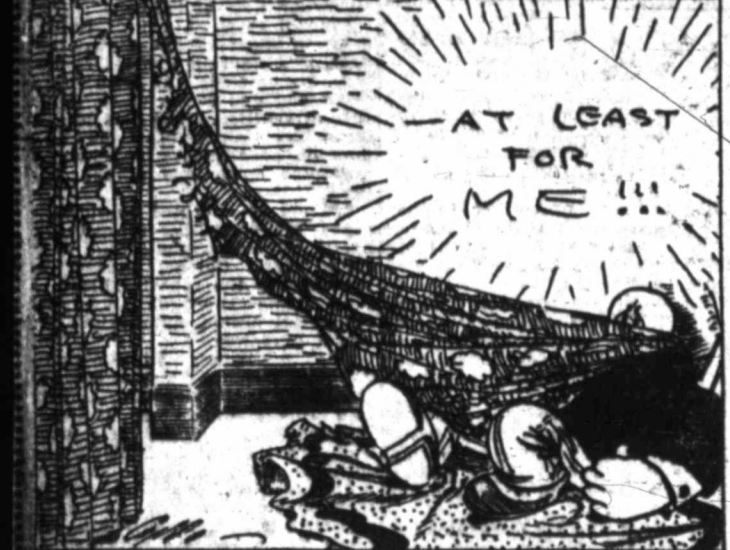
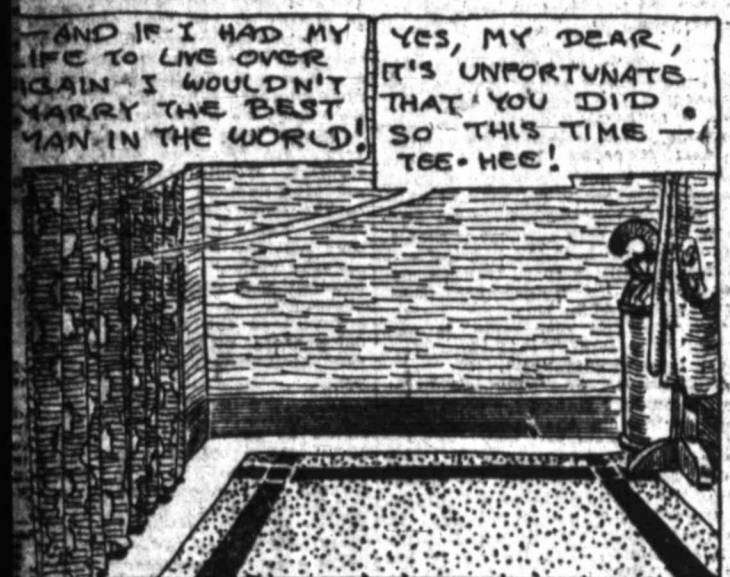

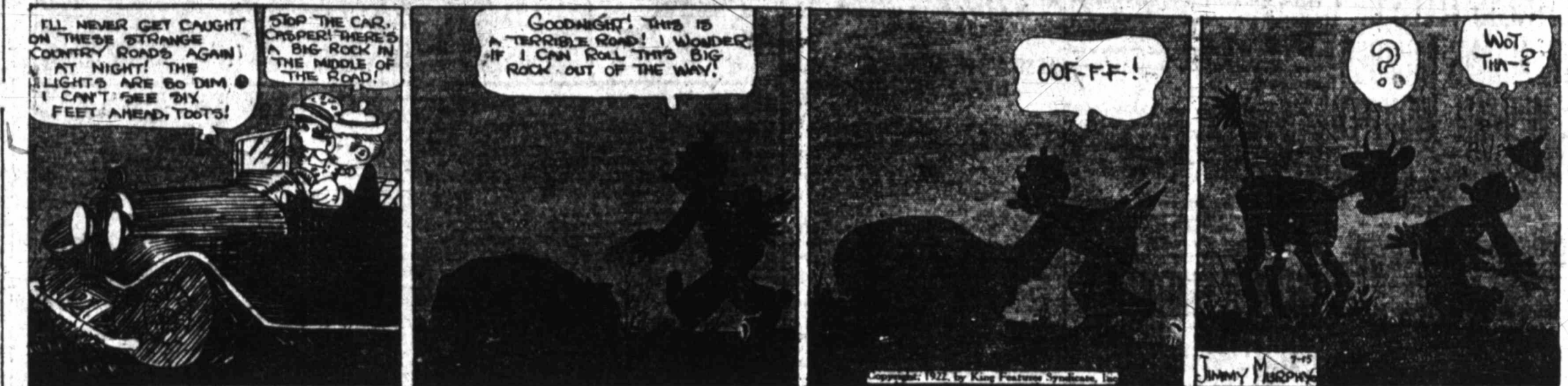
