Unusual Activity is Shown in All Young County Fields Since Rain

GRAHAM, TEXAS, Sept. 12.—The Halmac Oil company's No. 1, four miles southeast of Graham, continues to flow a steady stream and although the well is still in the hole it is making better than 1000 barrels a day. The well has been drilled less than two feet into the sand at present. When drilled in fully it will in all probability make 5,000 barrels.

The oil is being produced from a true oil sand instead of lime as first reported. Oil experts and geologists declare that it is the same sand found in the McCloskey discovery well at Ranger, which made the Ranger field famous. LARGE ADDITION BEING BUILT TO THE NOBLE REFINING PLANT TO ACCOMMODATE NEW PROCESS

BURKBURNETT, TEXAS, Sept. 12.—The Chas. F. Noble Oil and Gas company, who have what is said to be the largest casinghead refinery in the world, located on the south edge of Burkburnett, are now employing a large force of men to make over \$30,000 worth of improvements to the plant which will enable them to refine crude oil into gasoline in very large quantities. Most refineries secure only 30 to 35 per cent of gasoline from the crude by the usual method of refining.

Geo. M. Haselett, superintendent of the Noble plant here, has discovered a process on which he has a patent pending, whereby he claims to be able to get 48 per cent gasoline out of crude oil, where now they get only 35 per cent. The company is building five additional running stills, two big pipe stills and two vertical stills, that will cost around \$30,000 and which will be ready for use in the next 15 to 20 days. The workmen are being held up at present. When the equipment will be ready for use by October 1.

A great deal of crude oil from the northwest and Electra fields, besides considerable around Burkburnett, is run into this refinery by pipe lines to be converted into oil products.

The capacity of the Noble refinery for making gasoline has been 2,000 barrels per day, but under the new process and additional equipment, they will be able to refine 100,000 barrels a month.

Another thing that interested representatives of The Wichita Daily Times, who visited the plant Monday afternoon, was the neat appearance of the buildings and yards surrounding the refinery. Great care is taken to keep everything clean and attractive.

This plant employs a large number of men, making a pay roll of \$100,000 a month. Besides utilizing considerable of the crude oil being pumped out of the Burkburnett, northwest and Electra pools.

Their headquarters and offices are at Tulsa, Okla.

BURKBURNETT MACHINE AND TOOL CO. PLANT IS DAMAGED BY FIRE

BURKBURNETT, TEXAS, Sept. 12.—The fire department received a call yesterday at 4 o'clock in the afternoon from the Burkburnett Machine and Tool company's plant which is located in the building adjoining the Petrolia Supply company west of the railroad, and was able to extinguish the flames after considerable damage had been done to the blacksmith shop located in the building. The origin of the fire is unknown. This makes the second fire which has occurred here in the past 24 hours with but little damage reported.

WILBARGER GINS REPORT 1,307 BALES RECEIVED

VERNON, TEXAS, Sept. 12.—Reports from Wilbarger gins to date show that 1,307 bales have been run through the presses. Until the recent rain cotton had been opening rapidly and pickers are plentiful in this section. Five gins are operating in Vernon, and several of these are running nights.

ELECTRA BUILDING PROGRAM LARGEST IN CITY'S HISTORY

ELECTRA, TEXAS, Sept. 12.—Despite a shortage of water which has practically stopped drilling in the south field and the recent reduction in the price of crude oil, Electra is going right ahead with what is perhaps the most substantial building program in her history. Not counting the six-mile county paving project north of town, which has just been completed, improvements here are well over the quarter million mark. Including improvements being made by the city on its water and sewer extensions, the total will amount to not less than \$500,000.

The largest expenditure is that of the Magnolia Petroleum company. The erection of seven buildings which that company will use for forge plants and shops, involves an expenditure of about \$150,000. Work is being rushed on the First Baptist church, which will cost \$60,000. The church of Christ is erecting a wooden structure in Southland addition, to be used temporarily, their plans calling for a permanent structure of brick or stone.

A survey completed today shows more than a score of homes being built. All of these are modern, and most of them are bungalows containing five or six rooms. Their cost ranges from \$2,500 to \$10,000 each.

NEGRO BELIEVED TO BE ESCAPED PRISON CONVICT

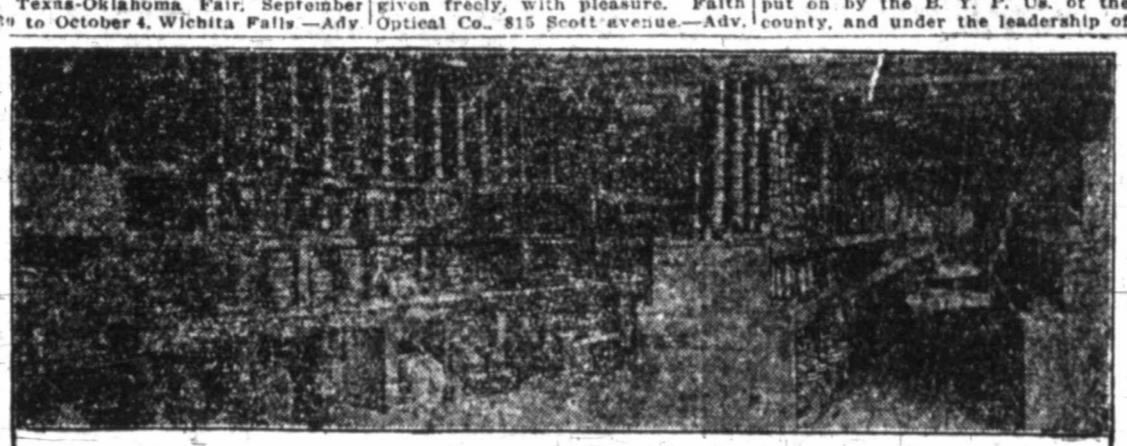

Home Decorations have improved greatly in the last decade, and I believe a much greater development is ahead. There will be more so-called "interior decoration" and more individuality and comfort.

The world's champion mouse trap would never be bothered with having his own path, even if he lived in a forest, according to a philosopher.

What is true of mouse traps holds true with bird cages.

Once demonstrate to a few people that you have a knack for making the most beautiful ones ever thought of, and the world will find you out though you have only a tiny shop on a side street in busy New York.

This actually happened in the case of Adam Byers.

Though an artist, decorator, maker of jewelry and connoisseur of beautiful things generally, she is forced to make bird cages to the exclusion of practically nothing else—just because she makes them a little more exquisitely and painstaking than anyone else does.

Her cages are all hand made, according to her exclusive designs, with an idea of making the bird comfortable as well as affording a bit of decoration to the sun room or garden.

She sometimes expends as much as a month's work on a single cage, and when she finishes she has something that goes into a home as utilitarian as a bird house.

The difference between her products and the average commercial cage is the difference between rare lace and a five-cent machine-made edging.

Old bits of antique carving, Chinese figures, rare pieces of jade and ivory go into the making of these cages which sell at figures that sound exorbitant until you realize the exquisiteness of the materials and the beauty and finish of the work.

"I believe," she says, "that everything that goes into a home should be beautiful, but that the effect should be that of livableness and comfort rather than formality.

"I think birds and plants give to a home a feeling of life and activity that no static beauty can give.

"My cages are always designed for the spots in which they are placed and are meshed down and worked with until they are a part of the room, never a conspicuous feature.
