WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—The house passed the soldiers' bonus bill today over President Harding's veto. The vote was 258 to 54 or 59 more than the necessary two-thirds majority.

SHOP FORCES ARE BEING INCREASED TO NORMAL SIZE

CHICAGO, Sept. 20.—Shop forces of the nation's railways are gradually increasing to their normal size, according to indications today. While some lines are reabsorbing jobs to employ strikers under terms of the Baltimore peace plan for ending the shompen's strike, other roads, holding aloof from the arrangement with strike leaders, continued to recruit shop workers independently.

EFFORT TO SELECT HEARST DELEGATES DEFEATED IN N. Y.

ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 20.—Most of the candidates for delegate to the democratic state-convention who were pledged to vote for W. H. Hearst for governor were defeated in yesterday's primary. In Erie county (Buffalo) where William J. Conners sought the election of Hearst delegates four of them were successful. Thirty-four of the 25 delegates were classed as supporters of William H. Fitzpatrick, county chairman, and they were declared by Alfred E. Smith for the gubernatorial nomination.

"I HAD TO KILL HIM" DEFENDANT STATES ON STAND

LONNIE GRIFFIN TAKES WITNESS CHAIR SHORTLY AFTER NOON HOUR. BREAKS DOWN AND WEEPS THREE SEPARATE TIMES. Testifies That He Was in Fear of His Life When He Fired The Fatal Shot.

"I just shot. I had to kill him. I didn't know what he had in his hand. Breaking down and weeping bitterly, Lonnie Griffin, defendant in the murder trial, stood up before the jury and graphically described the incident on last Halloween night when he fired the shot that caused the death of E. H. Taylor. Carefully led by his counsel's questions, the defendant reached the incident of last October 31. He told of his birth in Tennessee and of his moving to the vicinity of Burkburnett 18 years ago.

SPECIAL GRAND JURY EXPECTED TO CHARGE OFFICERS NEGLIGENT

MAXIMON, ILL., Sept. 20.—The report of the special grand jury which is investigating the 22 killings at the Lester strip mine June 21 and 22 will comment on the riot and upon an dereliction of duty on the part of county officials which the evidence and testimony show have existed. It was announced today by Assistant Attorney General Middlekauff. The report is expected to be presented to court next Saturday.

PLAN FOR LEASING MUSCLE SHOALS IS BEFORE THE HOUSE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—A resolution authorizing the secretary of war in his discretion to lease for a year or less the Muscle Shoals, Ala., plant to private plants numbers 1 and 2 and Waco quarry near Muscle Shoals, at a price not exceeding 10 cents per acre per year, plus the cost of production of fertilizer components for sale to the public at a price not to exceed eight per cent above the cost of production at the house today by Representative Hull, republican, Iowa. The resolution also provides that the plants which may be leased either separately or completely, or to be kept in condition to produce nitrates and other components of munitions, such plants with their personnel to be turned over to the United States in case of national emergency.

CHARGE SHOMPEN SUFFER AT HANDS OF GUARDS

CHICAGO, Sept. 20.—Affidavits of leaders of shop craft organizations, submitted today in Judge James H. Wilkerson's court in opposition to the government's request for a temporary injunction, charged that members had suffered greatly at the hands of armed railway guards. Heads of the organizations involved in the strike declared every effort had been made to suppress lawlessness. William H. Johnston, head of the machinists, said that organization had been forced to expel members who refused to be subjected to other forms of assault by railway guards. Judge Wilkerson, interrupting the submission of affidavits by the defense, raised the question whether "peaceful persuasion by strikers to keep other workers from taking their places might, inevitably be followed by lawless acts and the suppression of peaceful persuasive methods be necessary to curtail lawless acts." Donald R. Richberg, defense attorney, argued that the strikers in adopting such methods, should not be held accountable for the small proportion of lawless acts which accompanied the peaceful methods.

WACO GRAIN MAN IS MENTIONED FOR GOVERNOR IN 1924

AMARILLO, Sept. 20.—B. E. Clement of Waco, president of the National Grain Dealers association, here to speak before the annual convention of the Panhandle Plains chamber of commerce, stated in an interview this morning that while not an avowed candidate for governor in 1924, he will be inclined to submit himself to the people. This statement was made after Mr. Clement had expressed his appreciation of the compliment paid by friends in urging his candidacy. Mr. Clement declared himself as an old fashioned, orthodox democrat and deplored the practice of politicians in their efforts to say and do only those things that please the people.

WITT WAS NOT HIT BY A THROWN POP BOTTLE

The letter was from James P. Hon of Evansville, Ind., who states he was a spectator at Saturday's game. Mr. Hon added that he was seeking no part of the \$2,000 in rewards for the arrest of the alleged thrower of the bottle and requested that the league make affidavit that the bottle was not thrown.

MINE RESCUE CREW BRINGS TO SURFACE BODIES OF VICTIMS

JACKSON, CAL., Sept. 20.—While a mine rescue crew continued to bring to the surface bodies of victims of the Argonaut mine disaster, the west today had turned its attention to relieving the plight of families and dependents of the 47 men who died after being imprisoned by fire far down in the gold workings. Compensation checks and funds realized from prize fight and theater benefit performances already are beginning to pour in. The state department of the California compensation insurance fund, has sent checks to 10 of the stricken families. He announced that 18 families would receive monthly checks ranging from \$65 to \$82 for a period of 24 weeks. Thirty-eight bodies still remained early today on the 4360 foot level in the Argonaut. Identification is possible only by means of scars, teeth and other personal characteristics. Mrs. Lola Potter, Amador county coroner, prepared to empanel 12 jurors today to investigate the disaster.

DALLAS INTERURBAN BROUGHT NEARER BY ELECTRIFYING KATY

The Dallas-Denton interurban to be brought into being by electrification of the Katy's tracks between two points, will be extended to Wichita Falls within two or three years, according to statements made at the hearing at Dallas Tuesday morning, when the city commissioners accepted the electrification plan.

The promise of the Houston interurban interests to extend the line to Wichita Falls was a deciding factor in bringing about the acceptance of the plan, Mayor Aldredges of Dallas announced.

It was pointed out here Wednesday that Wichita Falls business interests have already indicated their approval of the interurban idea, a substantial sum being pledged here several years ago when the project was first being broached.

At that time the route for the line was surveyed, three alternative routes being considered. It is pointed out here that the Dallas-Denton portion of such an interurban is the most expensive portion of it being across the Trinity bottom. Between Denton and Wichita Falls, it is said, construction costs will be comparatively light.

Northwestward from Denton, the proposed route crosses the Santa Fe at Fonder and extends thence across Montague county to Borwick, from which point it roughly parallels the Denver right of way to Wichita Falls.

The electrification of the Denton branch may lead to the electrification of other steam lines beyond Denton, toward Wichita Falls, in this way hasten the completion of an interurban service between the two cities, writes J. W. Sverman of Dallas, supervisor of public utilities in connection with his recommendation of acceptance.

He stated that the defendant passed by and spoke and then proceeded to the telephone post on the corner. Taylor was standing at the water plug at the time.

"Taylor, what are you looking at me like that for?" the witness stated, Griffin asked him.

"I don't know why it is that you got it in for me, because I've never done anything to you," was Griffin's response to the former's answer, the witness said.

"You're a liar and a with it," was the remark made by the deceased according to the witness. At this point he said Taylor started toward Griffin. He testified that Griffin told Taylor to stop two times but that the command was not heeded.

Mr. Troy said Griffin did not move but that Taylor kept coming forward with his left arm extended and his right hand in his pocket. When Taylor came within an arm's length of Griffin, the latter fired. The witness told.

On cross examination the witness testified that he had made a statement to an officer the following day. The state pointed out the statement made at that time different from the testimony of the witness.

The difference it was pointed out lay in the fact as to who the person was who made the remark "You're a liar and a with it."

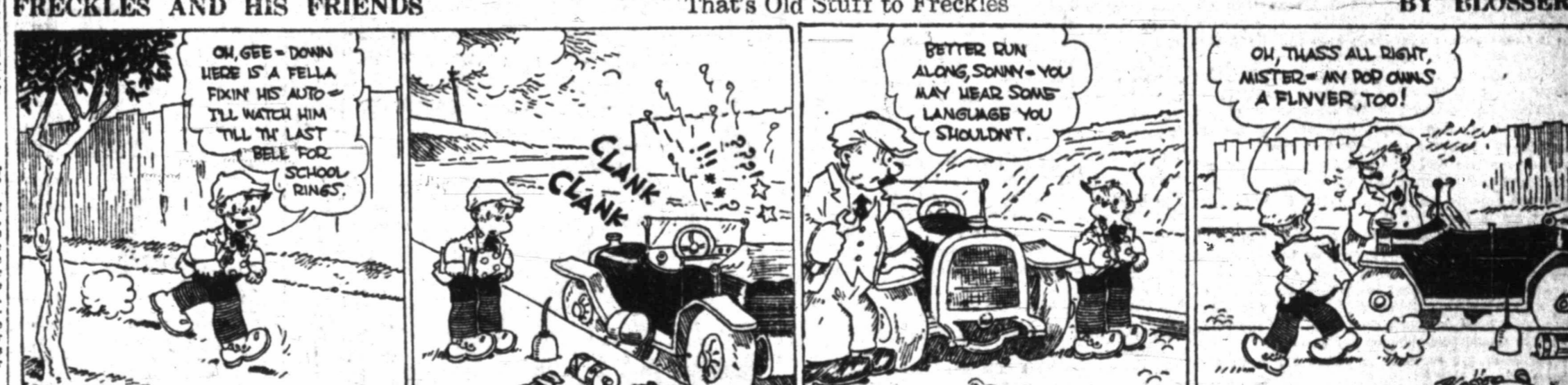

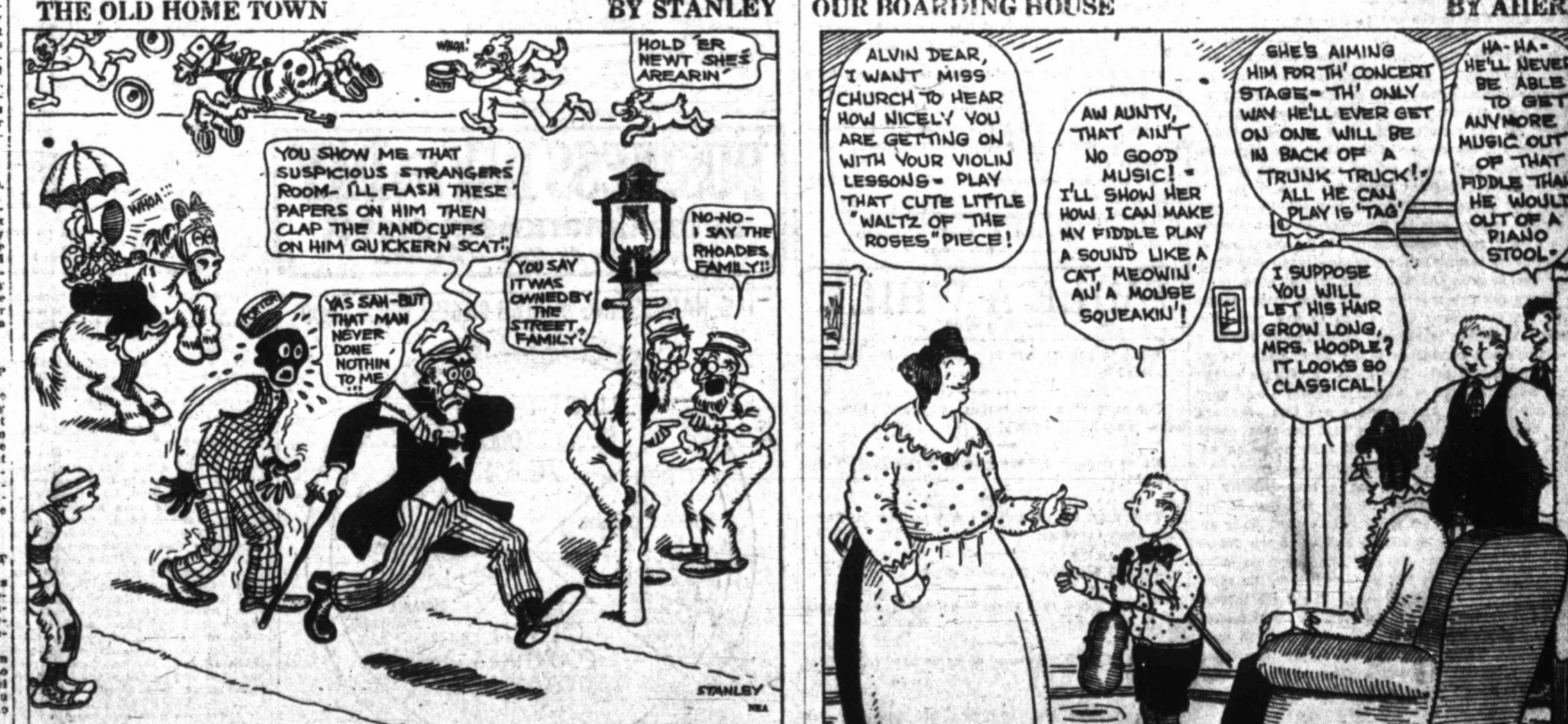

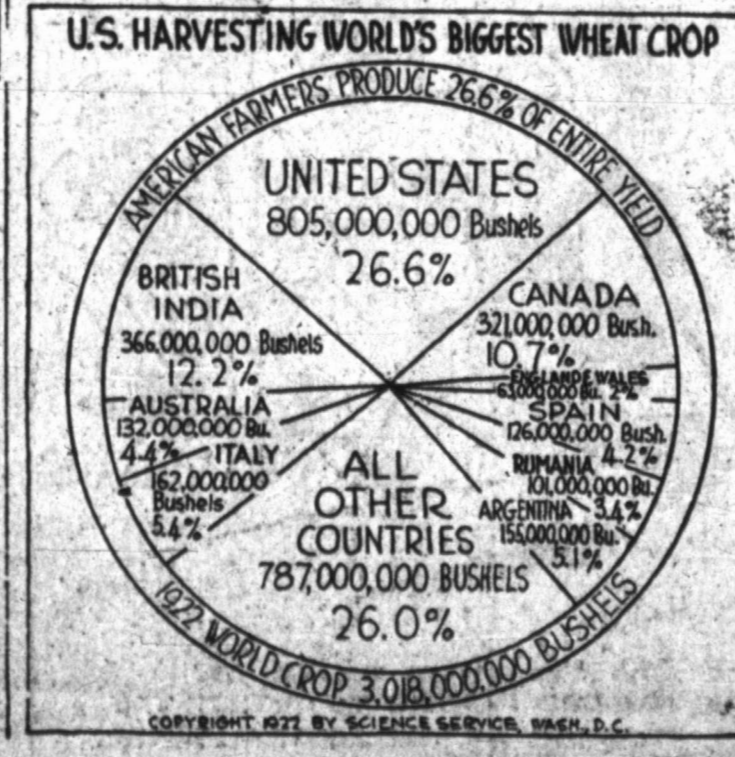
