The American legion knows by experience the need of a national program of preparedness. I wish to thank you for what you have done for the cause of preparedness so we shall not be caught again unprepared as when we entered the war."

Stamford Defeats Seymour Before Large Gathering

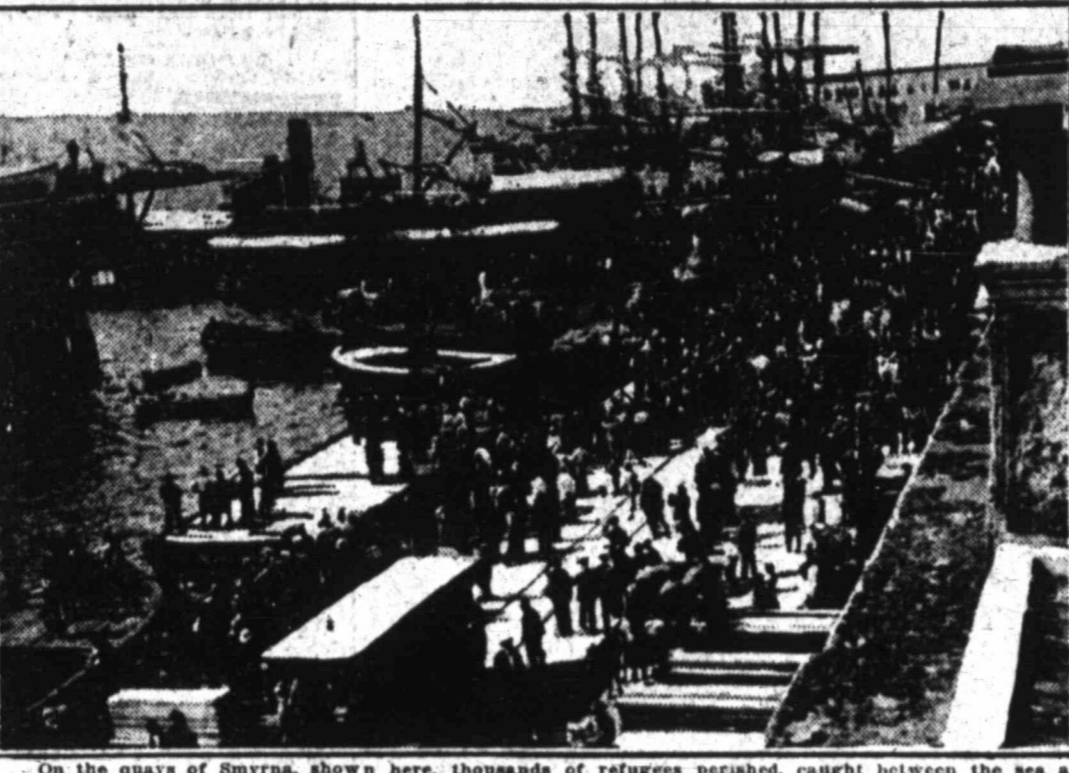

FRIDAY FLIGHT FROM EL PASO TO NOGALES HARD PART OF TRIP

NOGALES, ARIZ., Sept. 22.—"Friday's flight from El Paso to Nogales was the hardest part of our trip thus far," said Commander H. A. The well being an absolute wildcat opens up a big scope of undrilled territory in the above direction.

DEATH SENTENCE GIVEN BY JURY AT OKMULGEE

OKMULGEE, OKLA., Sept. 22.—Dr. Lansing, on trial here for the murder of Police Captain Homer Spaulding, was convicted by a jury last night and sentenced to death. Spaulding was killed last January 2 in a gun fight with alleged robbers. It is the first death sentence ever given in Okmulgee county.

HOLDS STRIKERS RESPONSIBLE FOR RECENT ACTS OF VIOLENCE INJUNCTION MADE NATIONWIDE

CHICAGO, Sept. 22.—Judge James M. Wilkerson today granted Attorney General Cummings' petition for a nationwide temporary injunction against the striking railway shopmen. Judge Wilkerson in a lengthy review of the case said the defendants could not deny knowledge and responsibility for the widespread violence which has marked the strike. Partial settlement of the strike, he held, has not affected the rights of the public to obtain nationwide injunction. The court gave attorneys for the defense until Monday morning at 10:00 o'clock to study the decision and prepare to argue the test of the injunction order which will be signed. Attorney General Cummings on Thursday presented the government's proposed draft, which is even more drastic than the restraining order now in effect. The order will affect 250 railroads and 400,000 members of the six craft unions belonging to the railway men's union, the American Federation of Labor.
