newspaperman friend, Ben Ezzell of Canadian, had some comments that we felt were appropriate for Friona in his column of November 4. We quote editor Ezzell herewith:

"An out-of-state publisher, juding newspaper contests in the Texas Panhandle, once criticized area editors for "giving too much space and prominence to football" in their small-town weekly newspapers. The man obviously was not familiar with Texas in the Fall.

"The same criticism might be applied to eastern newspapers for "giving too much space and prominence" to the World Series. . . and it wouldn't be any further off base. In Texas high school circles, the "World Series" takes place almost every weekend on countless gridirons all over the state. . . and interest and excitement build in intensity as September fades into October, and reaches a peak as the championships go on the line in November.

"Over-emphasis on football? Maybe. But the newspapers which give the most coverage to the events which interest the greatest number of their readers don't overemphasize football. . . .they just keep in step with the public pulse. In Texas in the Fall, Footballis the name of the game.

"Here on The Record, we give a lot of space every fall to the gridiron successes (and sometimes failures) of the Canadian Wildcats; and spend a substantial part of the editorial budget covering and photographing the high school games, . not because the editorial staff thinks that football is necessarily the most diate Friona area on the DDD important thing that's going on, but because newspaper sales indicate that this is where a substantial amount of reader interest lies. And in the newspaper business, this is the name of the game.

Pause and Reflect By Nelson Lewis

Panhandle Texas of a half century ago had this school bussing thing developed to a fine art.

When faced with the problem of getting pupils to a certain school they heeded the advice of the ancients who being unable to move the mountain to the prophet, moved the prophet to the mountain.

With typical pioneer resourcefulness they simply hooked up to the little one room temple of learning and skidded it across the prairie to wherever the pupils were thickest. The structures were set on short cedar posts so no great amount of engineering was needed.

In the very early days draft animals furnished the motive power; later steam "traction engines" chugged along over the sea of grass.

The Star Ranch of Lazbuddie was the site of one of these rambling classrooms.

Star Ranch School was established north east of the headquarters buildings and within the period of a very few years was dragged to several locations.

Deaf Smith County boasted a fine little building known as the Messenger School.

Old timers tell us that this building was moved almost yearly.

"Bootleg" was another well traveled Deaf Smith County school.

As the population increased it was no longer necessary to search out pockets of student habitation as targets of the moving crew.


The establishment of permanent buildings and the advent of the school bus (Friona led the State in this operation) afforded better education for rural students.

Educating our youngsters has never been an easy task. The problems besetting this most important of all our public programs are in direct proportion to the magnitude of the effort.

Then the ugly head of Big Brother Government rose above the polluted waters of the Potomac.

30 YEARS AGO .- NOVEMBER 21, 1941 The collapse of a large water supply tank at the Blackwell Hardware and Furniture Store Tuesday night caused severe damage to a transformer bank on the lines of the Texas-New Mexico Utilities Co. and shattered some boards on the rear wall of the Rockwell Bros, Lumber shed. The tank and tower, one of the landmarks of Friona, was constructed by Logan Sympson and Fred White some time in the early twenties.

25 YEARS AGO .- NOVEMBER 15, 1946

E.L. Price, one of Friona's pioneer barbers, who, some time ago sold his shop here to Ralph Taylor, and has recently been working in a shop at Hereford, has purchased a shop at McLean and has taken charge of it.

20 YEARS AGO .- NOVEMBER 15, 1951

The proposed district would in no way be detrimental to the county road program, rather enabling state-approved construction and releasing local road funds for additional road work in other precincts.

Friona led in first downs, 18-15. The Chieftains had their second straight great night offensively, with 386 total yards. But the speedy Longhorns outgained them by 38 yards, with 424.

Add the two figures together, and the total offense comes to 810 yards. In addition, Friona had 110 yards on returns, and Lockney had 122. The total figure of 1,042 yards of advancing the ball shows that the game was one of the wildest offensive games Friona has been involved in for years.

The Chieftains surprised their hosts with an early 7-0 lead, and were still in command at 21-20 in the third quarter, before a series of bad breaks went against the Chiefs, and allowed Lockney to take the upper hand.

James Sims, starting only his second game of the year at quarterback, directed the team 80 yards in only nine plays in Friona's first possession. Bill Bailey got the TD from four yards out. Lockney scored seven plays later, with Ford again starring in as fine an option run as you'll see, from the Friona 30. Carthel's kick made the count 35-21.

That should have been the final score, as both teams began to tire from their racehorse pace, and it appeared that neither would score in the final period.

But with 11 seconds left, Friona got the ball back at their own 13, and tried one more wide option toss. The ball went wild, bouncing into the end zone, where a Longhorn back fell on it with just four seconds showing. That made the final margin 41-21.



Many fields of sorghum are lodging due to stalk rot diseases throughout the High Plains. Three major diseases are responsible for this problem. Charcoal Rot is present every year when the crop is allowed to suffer from oisture stress during the late growing season. Charcoal Rot is recognized by the black powdery masses of fungus in the rotted stalks. Fusarium Stalk Rot causes a mass of white or pink mold in the stalk and the pith is not so completely destroyed as with Charcoal Rot. A third root and stalk rot disease had appeared in a widespread area. Milo Disease caused by the fungus Periconia had appeared in many fields causing lodging and loss of nearly mature grain. The roots are killed with darkened lesions on them. Stalk rot follows but there is very little evidence of fungus growth in the stalks rotted with Milo Disease. Microscopic examination is necessary to positively identify the stalk rot organism in a given plant.

What about sulfur for the Texas High Plains? Sulfur has been included in a great number of research fertilizer tests over the past ten years. With only one exception on a land leveled soil located on the Lubbock Agricultural Experiment Station where yield increases of cotton occurred the first two years after leveling, no yield increases have been found from the additions of sulfur in any form. It has been tried on cotton, grain sorghum, wheat and corn. Sulfur is present in the available sulfate form in the irrigation water, thus a very adequate supply of this element is constantly being applied.

Drip or trickle irrigation is another irrigation method that stretches water over maximum acreage. This unique slowwatering process drips water onto the soil surface at or near the base of the plants. Irrigation water requirements are normally reduced at least 50 percent, Production has been greater in some tests; however, this is inconclusive at the present time. Like subsurface irrigation, drip installation costs restricts its application to high cash crops and small acreages. Costs will range from \$200-400 per acre for pecan orchards to \$500-800 for close lateral spacings. Costs are less when the grower installs the system. Several drip emitters that have performed well in the field can be obtained.


