

IMPORTANT CASES ON OCTOBER DOCKET STATE COMMISSION

ADUSTIN, TEXAS, Oct. 6.—Application for general revision of freight rates on lumber shipments from southeast Texas and application of the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railroad for increased division on intrastate traffic will be two of the principal considerations to be heard at the October hearing of the state railroad commission here Tuesday, Oct. 10, according to the docket, announced by the commission. The October docket includes the following cases: Establishment of freight rates on floor sweeping compounds from San Antonio to Houston and other points. Application to eliminate present tariff rules from diversion or re-shipment of carload shipments of sugar. Freight rates to and from Beaumont to apply to Chalson and South Beaumont. Application to apply hardwood log rates on stave bolts. Application to apply 8-cent additional charge to Houston rates on flavoring syrup shipments to and from Galveston. Revision of coffee rates. Application authorizing three steps for unloading parts of carload shipments of ribbon cane syrup. Establishment of rates on Kalamine from Houston to Dallas.

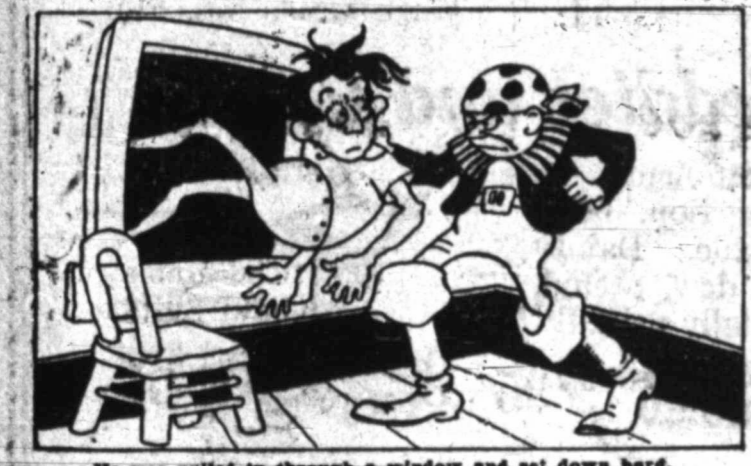

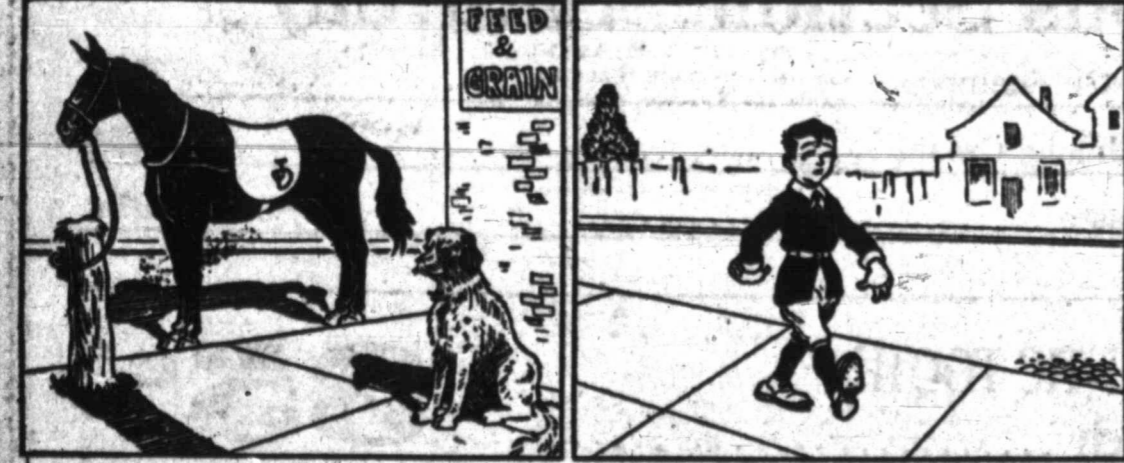

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SUES RECEIVER IN BANKRUPTCY CASE FOR \$10,000

J. R. Newland has brought suit against M. E. Stevens, receiver in the bankruptcy suit against D. P. Taylor alleging that by reasons of malicious, willful and oppressive conduct on the part of the receiver and creditors that he had been damaged in the sum of \$10,000.

The plaintiff alleges that he became the sole and legal owner of the Hotel Hearn on January 1, 1933, but that when the involuntary bankruptcy suit was filed against D. P. Taylor, former owner of the hotel that the receiver took charge of the hotel and is now trespassing on his, the plaintiff's property.

In filing his petition the plaintiff attaches an exhibit in which he lists the property and its value upon which he claims the defendant is trespassing. The property in the hotel is listed at a valuation of \$10,000. The suit was filed in the United States district court, Thursday afternoon.

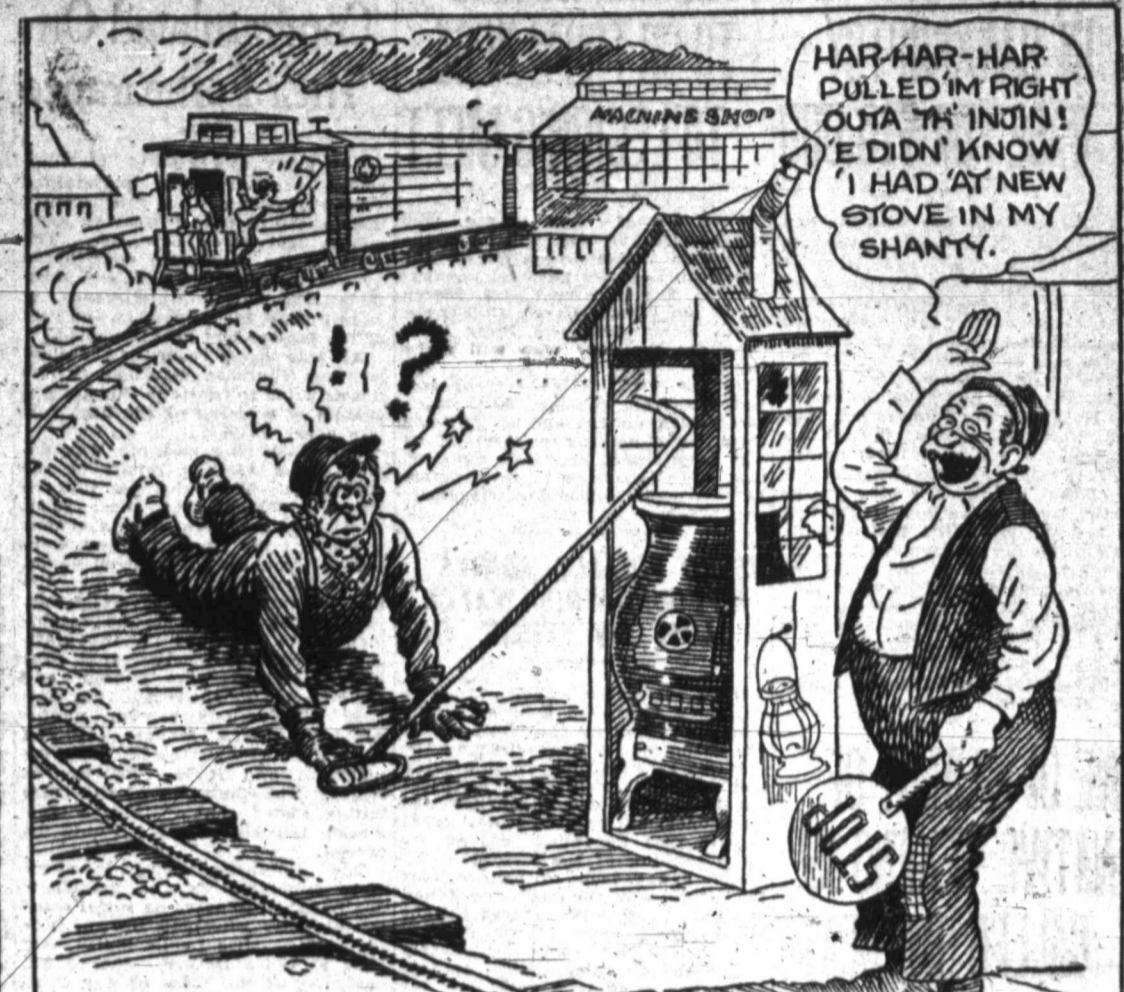

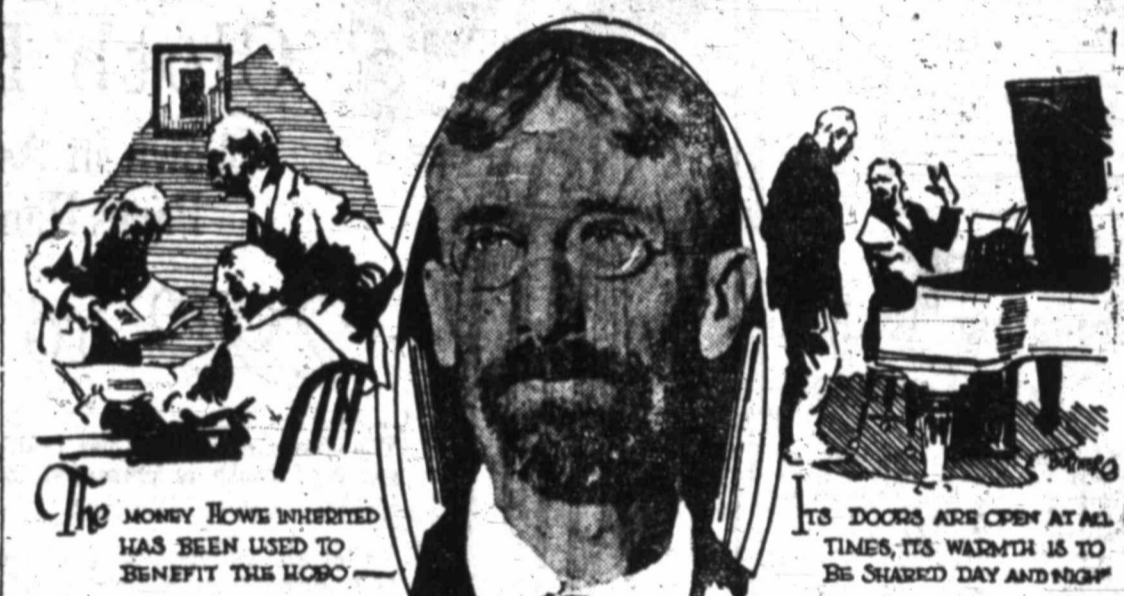

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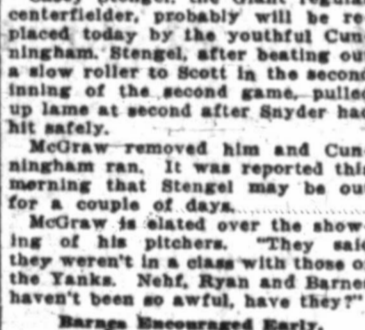

For Chocolate And Fruit Cookies

By BERTHA E. SHAPLEIGH
Two eggs
Two-thirds cup sugar
Half cup grated chocolate
One cup sifted flour
One and a half teaspoons baking powder
Half cup citron and suitans raisins, chopped
Half teaspoon salt
One teaspoon vanilla extract
One cup sifted flour
One and a half teaspoons baking powder
Beat eggs until thick. Add remaining ingredients and mix thoroughly.
Drop by the teaspoonful on a buttered tin, spaced slightly.
Place half a nut meat on top of each and bake about 15 minutes in a moderate hot oven. This recipe will make from 34 to 36 small cakes.

MOLDED SALMON WITH ENGLISH PEAS

One pound salmon, freed from skin and bones.
Half teaspoon salt
Few grains pepper
One and a half cups thin cream or top milk
Two eggs. Slight grating of nutmeg.

Turn into a buttered mold, set mold in a pan of water and bake until firm, about 30 minutes. Remove from mold and serve with one cup sauce to which has been added one cup cooked peas.

be fried with onions and fat, and cooked with milk and water for an excellent soup.
Often the toast is used for a garnish. Cut a slice of toast across cornerswise and dip the points in melted butter and chopped parsley.

Bread Pudding

Then there are the bread puddings! Sometimes they are so poorly made one tends to suggest a bread pudding. Just one recalls a poor dessert by that name and refuse to try another.

But a bread pudding well made is one of the best desserts. First there is the "bread and butter" pudding—then the plain pudding made with crumbs.

This is varied by adding raisins and currants, stewed fruit, or by caramelizing the sugar used in it, or by adding melted chocolate or cocoa.

Then a more elaborate dessert is called queen's pudding or cold cabinet pudding. The first has the top of the baked bread pudding covered with jelly and a meringue. The second is combined with fruit, canned or fresh, and often has stale cake in its makeup.

How to Use Crumbs.
Stale bread crumbs are used in preparing all kinds of scalloped dishes, and as a top covering in dishes "au gratin." Bread crumbs are used in nearly all stuffings, either alone with seasonings or combined with meat.

Dried, rolled and sifted, they are used for coating croquettes, meat and fish which are to be fried or sautéed.

Soft, stale crumbs are used for thickening puddings and become, when cooked in milk or stock, the foundation for timbales and soufflés.

The dark brown crusts would best be removed from the slices, leaving the bread white to take a golden color when baked, toasted or fried.

This dark brown crust need not be thrown away, but used with other crumbs for making a chocolate or special pudding where the color will not show.
Soft bread crumbs may be used for thickening sauces, one-fourth cup taking the place of one tablespoon of flour.

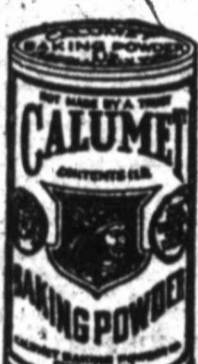

COMMISSIONER BOYD URGES GAME REFUGE FOR THE PANHANDLE

ALSO SUGGESTS ADDITIONAL FISH HATCHERIES IN REPORT

CALLS ATTENTION TO VIOLATIONS OF THE LAW

Report Declares Dallas Hatchery Doing Splendid Work Raising Crappie Fish

AUSTIN, Oct. 4.—W. H. Boyd, game, fish and oyster commissioner, has completed his annual report to the governor and makes some interesting observations in connection with the fish and game of the state, as well as an accounting of the fish and oyster business.

He recommends a game refuge in the panhandle, additional fresh water fish hatcheries and closed breeding areas in the salt water along the Texas coast, where fishermen could not make any thing do away with restrictions in other waters. He reports an increase in quail, mountain sheep and antelope are fast disappearing. They will soon be exterminated unless protective measures are taken, he said.

Doves are reported scarcer in north Texas, but plentiful in south Texas. He recommends a new adjustment of the open season on doves to fit the different climatic conditions in Texas.

Spring rains, with resulting sprouts and growth, furnished food for the young quail, says the report, and the statement is made that the quail will survive civilization. Attention is also called to the increase in quail in sections where the 1,200 imported from Mexico were distributed. This is particularly true of the valley below 30

feet, where they have been seen in large numbers. This shows what can be done in the barren districts, says the report, where quail can be planted and increased in large numbers.

Many Deer Deceased. A goodly number of turkeys and deer are reported in the large southern Texas pastures and the ranchmen who have given them protection are pleased. The high waters of last year's floods are reported as having resulted in the death of thousands of deer; that, while many were drowned, hundreds were driven out of the thickets into the highlands and ruthlessly slaughtered by "local unscrupulous hunters."

Outside of his report, today, Commissioner Boyd said that his office is flooded with letters from over 200 sportsmen complaining of game violations by the killing of game out of season. He says he has no way of preventing it, as he is allowed only six deputies, though the department has several thousand dollars in the treasury he has collected in business fees and from tax on mudshell and sand. He wants the next legislature to make it possible to use some of this territory and the game law amended to allow a ten-day open season in August, where a bag limit of ten birds a day, and a season limit of thirty. Boyd is further observed that an open season on chickens would afford some sport and permit the killing of chickens which the farmers kill in the winter to keep them from eating their stocks of grain.

There are 100 pheasants at the Dallas fish hatchery and they have been distributed over the state with good and bad results. Their distribution created an interest in game protection, which makes the effort worth while, though the effort is too small, so far as stocking the state is concerned.

A recent report of antelope shows 547 head in Texas, where formerly they ranged in Texas by the thousands. A recent report shows they have been exterminated, but the remaining few have taken to the foothills and rough lands where they can not be seen and shot from automobiles.

Three new fish hatcheries are recommended, one in the panhandle, one in the western part of the state, and one in the southern part of the state. It is recommended that all farmers and stockmen plant the trees in their orchards and fields, for which L. E. Whitman has the contract, will also start shortly. Wichita Falls relatives of Mr. Creath have called the attention of The Times to the fact that the report that such a verdict had been returned is incorrect, and that the verdict as rendered was that Mr. Creath met death in a manner undetermined. The coroner's verdict was not rendered until Sept. 23.

IS NOT LIMITED TO THOSE TAKING PART IN PREVIOUS ELECTIONS.

4500 TO 5000 BALLOTS EXPECTED TO BE CAST

Primary is Result Of Agreement Growing Out of Election Contest Suit.

All voters, qualified under the democratic primary law to vote, will on Saturday determine who will be the nominee for sheriff of Wichita county on the democratic ticket.

The third primary of the year will be held Saturday and the polls will open at 7 p. m. All arrangements have been completed and the boxes with the election supplies were distributed to the precinct judges Friday.

The third primary became necessary as a result of a contest filed by Fred K. Smith, the incumbent, W. (Pat) Murphy who, according to the official count, was nominated by a majority of 23 votes at the run-off primary, agreed with Mr. Smith to submit the question to the voters after two days were spent in arguing law questions which were raised in the contest suit.

An erroneous impression has been conceived by many voters in the county with reference to who are qualified to vote in the election Saturday. Some have the belief that only those who voted in the run-off primary in August will be permitted to vote at this election.

It is stated that all democrats, whether they voted at either of the first or second primary or did not vote at either one can vote in the election Saturday.

Those who have taken an active part in the campaign express the belief that between 4,500 and 5,000 votes will be polled. At the run-off primary in August a total of 6,000 votes were cast in the sheriff's race.

Much interest, however, centers around the election due to the small difference that existed when the votes were counted at the second primary.

Judging from the results of two months ago, it appears to many that the success of either candidate this time depends entirely on the percentage of friends that will go to the polls Saturday and mark the ticket.
