NEWS OF ARMISTICE IS RELIEF TO ENGLAND

LONDON, Oct. 11.—A peaceful solution of the near eastern tangle has apparently been reached on the basis of the surrender of eastern Thrace to the Turks with proper safeguards for the Christian minorities in the territory of the Dardanelles. A convention putting into effect an armistice between the Kemalists and the Greeks was signed by the delegates in Mudanya last night. The news brought great relief here where there was considerable anxiety lest the Turks remain routed and the newly declared unity of the allies.

SCHOOL TO INSTRUCT OFFICERS TO ENFORCE PROHIBITION LAW

DALLAS, Oct. 11.—A school for the instruction of officers employed to enforce prohibition laws is being conducted in Dallas today and will continue through Saturday. David H. Morrison, of Austin, chief enforcement officer in Texas, is in charge. The officers not only will be instructed in their duties in regard to prohibition, but also given suggestions as to courts in which to file charges. In some instances the charges should be filed in state courts and in some cases they should continue to be filed in federal courts, the instructors of the school said.

SANTA FE PLACES ORDERS FOR 5,150 ADDITIONAL CARS

TOPEKA, Kan., Oct. 11.—The Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railway company has placed orders for 5,150 new cars for freight service, delivery of which is to start January 1, next, says an announcement here today by Edward Chambers, vice-president in charge of traffic. The list includes 2,900 refrigerator cars, 1,000 box cars, 1,000 automobile cars, 200 stock cars, 200 coal cars and 100 empty cars. These cars should aid materially in relieving the car shortage, Santa Fe officials pointed out.

### LLOYD GEORGE WILL REPLY TO CRITICISM OF TURKISH POLICY

WILL DISCUSS QUESTION AT MANCHESTER ON NEXT SATURDAY

### GENERAL ELECTION NOW CONSIDERED A CERTAINTY

Political Experts Do Not Expect the Prime Minister to Tender Resignation

By Associated Press. LONDON, Oct. 11.—Prime Minister Lloyd George has announced his intention of replying publicly at Manchester on Saturday to the recent outburst of condemnatory criticism aimed at the near eastern policy of the government.

The sudden announcement has taken the press by surprise and brought general interest in the domestic political situation to a keener focus than ever. The recent coincidences with increased definiteness in the rumors of an early break up of the present coalition in the near east may have opened some inner sources of information enabling the political writers to speak with greater certainty than heretofore: at any rate today's morning papers have the appearance of those usually accompanying the last days of a ministerial government and the early dissolution of parliament.

Necessarily a general election is commonly discussed as a matter of more or less certainty. The opinion of the majority of the political experts, however, is that Mr. Lloyd George has no intention of resigning and that he will put up a big fight on behalf of the coalition in which he will have the support of Austen Chamberlain in the latter's forthcoming speech at Birmingham.

At the same time there are some who confidently refer to dissolution of parliament and a general election in a manner implying knowledge that the premier has already decided upon this course.

Speculation is very busy over the probable result of an appeal to the country. The conservatives are credited in some quarters with ability to secure a larger number of seats in the house of commons than any other party, though not enough to constitute a possible combination of the liberals and laborites there—such a combination is one of the many matters of conjecture.

Elsewhere the growing strength of labor is emphasized, and the labor leaders themselves speak as though they were confident of sweeping the polls and taking office. It does not seem to be supposed that the liberals, whether Asquithian or Georgian, would be able to rally enough uncommitted support to bring them into power.

### THREE NEGRO PRISONERS AT FINE BLUFF ESCAPE OVERPOWER THE JAILER

FINE BLUFF, ARK., Oct. 11.—Three negro prisoners, one charged with murder, late last night overpowered the jailer here and after disarming him, locked him with 18 other prisoners in a large cell in the jail and made their escape. As they left the building they fired several shots into the cell into which they had crowded the jailer and other prisoners. No one was wounded. A posse of officers is securing the surrounding country for the three negroes, who walked out of the front door of the jail after securing the keys to the building.

### Pastor Complies With Terms of Offer of Voliva

WAUKEGAN, ILL., Oct. 11.—Rev. E. O'Brien, pastor of an independent flock in Zion City, today has complied with the terms of an offer from William Glenn Voliva, governor of Illinois. The new will stand in front of a newspaper office all day to show the people what a fool he is. The rain beat upon Mr. O'Brien most of the day, but he held his post from sunrise to sunset. He said he would give the award to Zion City poor.

### JUDGE ROBERT GRANT PRESIDENT OF HARVARD ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

He succeeds William C. Boyden, who was president of the association last year.

### SIR ROBERT HORNE HEADS BRITISH DEBT MISSION TO U. S.

LONDON, Oct. 11.—Sir Robert Horne, chancellor of the exchequer, stated today that he was going to the United States as the head of the British debt funding mission, despite intimations in the press here to the contrary. There might be a delay of a couple of weeks in his departure, he said, owing to the near eastern situation and internal affairs, but there would be no change in the membership of the mission.

### CASE OF W. T. AVEN IS TRANSFERRED TO MARLIN

WACO, TEXAS, Oct. 11.—The case of W. T. Aven, charged with the murder of Leslie Keys in August 1931, was transferred to Falls county today by Judge Moore of the fifty-fourth district court. Aven is under conviction and death penalty for murder of his wife and the case is on appeal. Keys was his nephew. The case will come up at Marlin in November.

### APPOINTED SUPERVISOR OF NEGRO DEPARTMENT

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 11.—Mrs. Momen L. Gray of Chicago, president of the Negro Women's National Republican league, has been appointed supervisor of the negro women's department in the office of the registrar of the treasury at Washington. This announcement was made here today by J. Elias Harris of Kansas City, for many years a clerk in the United States senate. Mrs. Gray was appointed by H. V. Speelman, registrar of the treasury.

### WORK IS PROGRESSING ON SLATON CITY HALL

SLATON, Oct. 11.—The Slaton city hall for which Walter E. Taylor of Lubbock has the contract is rapidly going up. All needed material for its completion is assembled at the site. When completed it will be one of the most magnificent municipal buildings in west Texas. The chamber of commerce will have an office in the structure and there will be large auditorium for the accommodation of conventions which will be sought.

### LOSSES RESULT OF RECENT COAL STRIKE MORE THAN BILLION

CLEVELAND, OHIO, Oct. 11.—The recent strike in the coal industry caused a total loss of \$1,100,000,000, J. G. Bradley of Dundon, W. Va., former president of the National Coal Association, declared here today in an address before the annual convention of the American Mining Congress.

Resolutions condemning the paternalistic attitude of the government, deploring the entrance of government into private business enterprises and urging industrial cooperation between labor and capital as a means of increasing production, augmenting prosperity and lowering prices, were introduced by the resolutions committee.

The resolutions are to be considered by the committee which later is to make a report to the general conference.

According to Mr. Bradley the loss in wages by the United Mine Workers of America as estimated by the American Educational Association was \$450,000,000; the loss to railroads over \$200,000,000; the loss to the public in the cost of fuel \$400,000,000; and the loss to the mine operators \$400,000,000.

"If every family in America were to pay \$45 it would barely cover the loss," Mr. Bradley said.

### Epochal History Is Told in New Universal Film

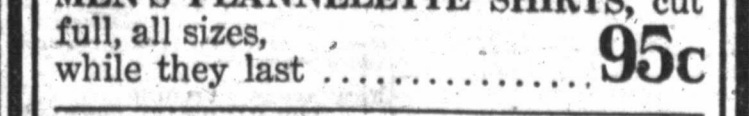

GENERAL ELECTION NOW CONSIDERED A CERTAINTY

Political Experts Do Not Expect the Prime Minister to Tender Resignation

By Associated Press.

LONDON, Oct. 11.—Prime Minister Lloyd George has announced his intention of replying publicly at Manchester on Saturday to the torrent of condemnatory criticism aimed at the near eastern policy of the government.

The sudden announcement has taken the press by surprise and brought general interest in the domestic political situation to a keener focus than ever. It also coincides with increased definiteness in the rumors of an early break up of the present coalition.

The improved outlook in the near east may have opened some finer sources of information enabling the political writers to speak with greater certainty than heretofore at any rate today's morning papers have the appearance of those usually accompanying the last days of a northward government and the early dissolution of parliament.

Necessarily a general election is commonly discussed as a matter of more or less certainty. The opinion of the majority of the political experts, however, is that Mr. Lloyd George has no intention of resigning and that he will put up a big fight on behalf of the coalition in which he will have the support of Austen Chamberlain in the latter's forthcoming speech at Birmingham.

Many dissenting politicians.

At the same time there are some who confidently refer to dissolution of parliament and a general election in a manner implying knowledge of the probable result of an appeal to the country. The conservatives are credited in some quarters with ability to secure a larger number of seats in the house of commons than any other party, though not enough to secure a possible combination of the liberals and laborites there and such a combination is one of the many matters of conjecture.

Elsewhere the growing strength of labor is emphasized, and the labor leaders themselves speak as though they were confident of sweeping the polls and taking office. It does not seem to be supposed that the liberals, whether Asquithian or Georgian, would be able to rally enough uncommitted support to bring them into power.

One important result of the crisis, according to the papers, is that Sir Robert Horne, chancellor of the exchequer, has postponed his trip to the United States and that the debt funding mission will not be undertaken by another, being held up until Sir Robert feels free to go.

CORSICANA HISTORICAL PAGEANT HAS A CAST OF MORE THAN 2,000 DEPICT EARLY EVENTS IN TEXAS

CORSICANA, TEXAS, Oct. 11.—The Navarrese county pageant is still in pleasant reverie over the Navarrese county historical pageant recently held in Corsicana. The pageant, which was held on the evening of October 9, depicted the early history of Navarrese county, with the parts played by Houston, Austin, Navarro, Crockett, Bowie, Falls, Bonham and others.

A party of white surveyors in the early forties encountered a band of hostile Indians, near Dawson, and all but one being slain in the attack. The part Navarrese county played in the internal struggle of the southern Confederacy during the following years of reconstruction was played.

Columbia finally reviewed Navarrese county's part in the world war before whom patriotic heart dances glistened under the big spotlights. The festival of green corn, which was the first of the series, included the Cherokee Indians' Thanksgiving ceremonial, "The Festival of the Green Corn," which concluded with an Indian war dance about the camp fire. Sam Houston appears and talks with the Indians and Chief Oolooteka gives the beautiful Princess Tallinna to him in marriage and the wedding is celebrated with an Indian wedding ceremonial.

The Spanish came in an episode preceded by the Spirit of Conquest showing the gold hunters of Spain. The Spanish adventurers were played by the boys of the state normal school. A Franciscan monk, played by E. C. Cox of the state home, came into contact with Indians and tomahawks. The monk gains the confidence of the redskins and baptizes one of their members and is invited to the mission of the natives of the new discovered land.

GEORGIA SHERIFF AND BROTHER TRIED ON PEONAGE CHARGE

ATLANTA, Oct. 11.—The trial of Sheriff Harvey K. Persons of Jasper county, who figured in the famous John R. Williams "murder farm" case and the resulting peonage inquiry, and W. F. Persons, his brother, both charged with kidnaping and holding in peonage Robert Lee Griggs, an Atlanta negro, was expected to be concluded in the United States district court today. The indictment against the sheriff and his brother was returned March 15, 1921, shortly after the Williams had been convicted and sentenced to life imprisonment for slaying one of the 13 negroes for whose deaths he was indicted.

In their statements to the jury the defendants denied Griggs' charges that they had kidnaped and forced him to work on their farm in Jasper county. The negro was arrested in Atlanta by them, they stated, on a warrant charging a misdemeanor. Sheriff Persons said he offered to pay the negro's transportation to his home in Mississippi out the amount on the farm. Griggs accepted, the defendant continued, adding that he was not compelled to work by threat of violence.

ANNOUNCE THE CENTER OF NEGRO POPULATION DADE COUNTY, GEORGIA

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—The department of commerce announced today that the center of negro population on the basis of the fourteenth census enumeration is located in the extreme northwestern corner of Georgia, in Dade county, about one and three-quarter miles north-northeast of the town of Rising Fawn, in latitude 34 degrees 48 minutes, 57 seconds and longitude 82 degrees 10 minutes and 43 seconds.

The department's review made the following comment on the cause of the movement: "The northwesterly movement of the center of the negro population between 1910 and 1920 is due principally to the great increase in the negro population in Massachusetts, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Ohio, Indiana and Michigan. This northward movement of the negro population was due mainly to the expansion of certain industries during the world war and the high wages being the great attraction. It is probably true that there has been a considerable return movement since the war, due to the depression in certain industries and that a large number of negroes have moved south to their former homes."

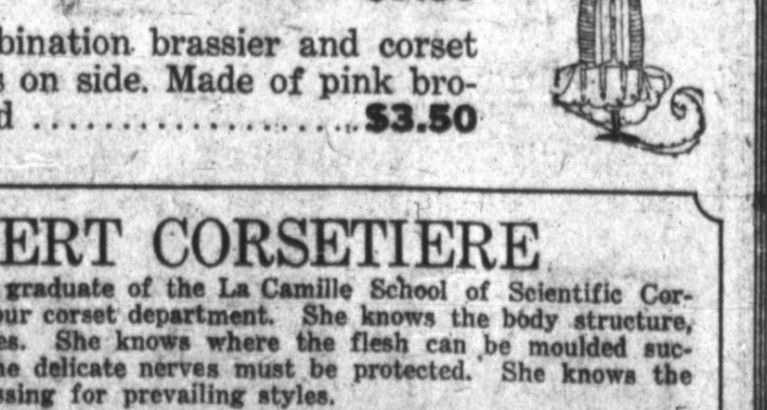

MORE ABOUT THE OFFICIAL BALLOT Muddle

George Peedy, one of the senatorial candidates, has offered what must appeal to many as a fair solution of the legal tangles into which the senatorial contest has become involved.

If such an arrangement can be made it will be a happy solution of a situation that appears to be growing more tangled every day. All that may be said is that it is a free and fair test at the polls and that is what a growing number of voters want.

But here comes another question. The West Times Herald, exponent of Jeffersonian democracy, declares that the so-called "official ballot" is without warrant.

"Where does it call it an official ballot and say to you that you must vote that or not vote at all?" asks the Times Herald and goes on to say:

"If there be constitutional warrant for that sort of thing, it is in some amendment with which we are not familiar. Here is how section 4, article 6, of the constitution reads:

"In all elections by the people the vote shall be by ballot, and the legislature shall provide for the numbering of tickets, and make such other regulations as may be necessary to detect and punish fraud, and preserve the purity of the ballot box; but no law shall ever be enacted requiring a registration of the voters of this state."

"We were wiser than our fathers—wise in our own conceit—did so make a poll tax payment a prerequisite to casting a ballot, the said poll tax receipt to be obtained before the first day of February in each year—a monstrous perversion of democracy.

"But, as said, unless there be an amendment to the constitution of which we are ignorant, there is no constitutional warrant for this thing which we call the official ballot. Read over that section again: nothing in the world is said about the sort of ballot you are to cast; all in the world that is authorized is the proper handling of your ballot from the times it leaves your hands until it is counted.

"Add yet here we are having contests in the courts as to whether or not certain names shall go on the official ballot. Why, that's your ballot, brother, with which nobody has anything whatever to do, save to receive it at the ballot box and properly number it and later count it. That's what the constitution says, unless, as said, there be some amendment with which we are not familiar.

"An official ballot contradicts our democracy, fellow-citizens. Sovereignty is in the citizen. He delegates to the state certain powers—does this at the ballot box. The sort of ballot he casts is none of the state's business; the state is merely his agent to receive his ballot and make a record of his will. It is pure autocracy for the state to say what sort of ballot the sovereign citizen shall cast. In a thousand ways, fellow-citizens, we have compromised our democracy—we have permitted the thing of our hands and the hobbling of our feet until we scarcely are able to call our souls our own. Oh for a revival of old-fashioned democracy down here in grand old Texas!"

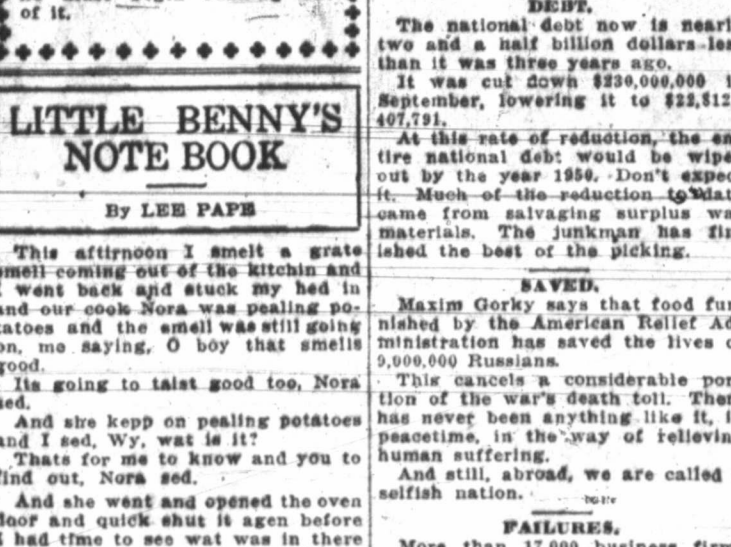

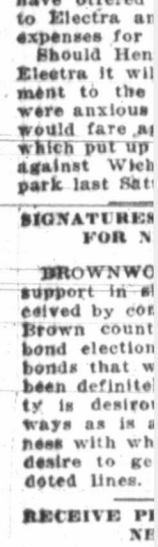

Nazalia's family lived in Mardin, Armenia. When the victorious Turks swept through, her uncle and brother were arrested along with 500 of the more important citizens of the town.

All were taken away and were put to death a couple of days later. Her other brothers were arrested, and she was taken care of by the American missionaries.

On her arrival at Aleppo she received news that her brother, who is a photographer here, was on his way from Canada to take her home with him. After 11 years of separation, brother and sister were reunited at Beirut.

Her dark eyes still hold the mirrors of the horrors through which she has passed.
