## Two of Hartleys Taken From Jail And Shot to Death

NASHVILLE, TENN., Oct. 20.—Ed Hartley and his son, George Hartley, recently convicted of manslaughter in connection with the killing of Connie Hartley, Ed Hartley's nephew, in Benton county last February, were taken from the jall at midnight and shot to death in a vacant lot 260 yards from the jall. vacant lot 260 yards from the jail.

News from Camden is that the mob, numering between 25 and 50 men with faces blacked appeared at the jail and overpowing Sheriff D. G. Flowers, took the Hartleys and marching them to the vacant lot, riddled them with bullets. At the time of the killing of Connie Hartley last February, his father, John Hartley, was seriously wounded, being at death's door for several days. Ed and George Hartley were convicted of voluntary manslaughter in the Benton county circuit court September 22, and made a motion for a new trial.
