

CREDIT HALF MILLION **DOLLARS TO ACCOUNTS** FRANCE AND BELGIUM

SUICIDE.

Doctors are more apt to resort to suicide than embers of any other profession. This is revealed by the latest suicide records, which show doctors at the head of the list among professional men. Discussing this in American Medicine magazine,

Dr. S. Dana Hubbard of New York City reaches the conclusion that occupational strain is greatest in the medical profession.

A physician is in constant danger, dealing with diseases in their most advanced stages, especially the incurable kind.

An unthinking public overlooks this meritorious service. You never heard of a doctor backing out of a case because he fears the malady, however dread. A lesson in courage and self-sacrifice for the good of humanity.

In proportion to numbers engaged in the profession, the suicide rate among doctors in 1921 was not much higher than among lawyers. Suicides last year totaled 86 doctors and 57 law-

yers. But there are many more doctors than law-

Both professions require courage and the will power of endurance. They have this in common: years of costly education, then years of comparative inactivity, sitting around waiting until they have a paying business built up.

Forty-five seems to be the average age of suicide. Hence it must be the danger year, the blackest hour that comes just before the dawn of success.

At 45 a man is beginning to grow weary, after years of dogged effort, and is apt to become discouraged unless constantly on his guard.

WITHIN THE LAW.

Congressman Frear fears that some of the recent big stock dividends may be tax-dodging schemes. He writes Secretary Mellon regarding section 220 of the 1921 revenue act, "which provides methods for reaching holders of surplus held for the purpose of escaping taxation."

If Frear follows up his clew, he'll find that the najor financial crimes these days are staged in some bookkeeping departments—though, being within the aw, they are not technically crimes.

Bookkeeping has become one of the fine arts. For nstance, a certain rich man took \$100,000 and bought 1,000 shares of stock at their par value of \$100 each This happened in 1919.

During one of the 1921 stock market slumps, the alue of this stock dropped to \$40 a share. So the rich man sold his holdings, losing \$60 a share, or a total of \$60,000.

He "wrote off" this \$60,000 as a loss in making out his income tax return. This enabled him to dodge paying income tax on \$60,000 of his 1921 in-

The "loss," however, was all on paper, for he no sooner sold the stock than he bought it back at the same price. To keep within the law, he could not buy back until 30 days after the sale, so he bought in his wife's name, the stock to be transferred to him later. Thus he was out of pocket nothing except a small commission to the broker.

This re-bought stock is on his books at \$40,000. ater, if he sells it for \$100,000 he'll realize a profit of \$60,000 and have to pay income tax on it. But he loesn't intend to sell. When he does, the income tax rate probably will be much lower than now. Can you beat it? You cannot. Neither can Uncle

The high art of tax dodging, of which the above is sample, is possible because, as lawyers say, "every law has its loophole." The loophole is there because lawyers make the laws.

More fundamental, as a cause, is the American court system of haggling over technicalities instead of interpreting a law at its plain and intended mean-
