GENERAL INCREASE IN AVERAGE DAILY CRUDE PRODUCTION

NORTH TEXAS FIELD GAINS 1,300 BARRELS DAILY FOR THE WEEK.

CENTRAL TEXAS SHOWS DECREASE OF 3,150

Oklahoma and Kansas Fields Increase 1,850 Barrels, Government Reports.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—The daily average gross crude oil production of the United States increased 31,550 barrels for the week ending October 21, totaling 1,378,000 barrels as compared with 1,346,450 for the preceding week, according to the weekly summary of the American Petroleum Institute.

Oklahoma-Kansas showed a daily average gross production of 590,300 barrels, an increase of 1,850; Texas showed an increase of 1,300 barrels; central Texas a decrease of 3,150; north Louisiana an increase of 1,350; and Arkansas an increase of 4,800 barrels. In Oklahoma production of the Chicago nation was shown as 126,950 barrels against 123,400, and output of the Lyons-Quinn pool was 14,480 against 14,900 barrels. The Mexico pool, central Texas, was reported at 48,000 barrels against 48,500; Haynesville, north Louisiana, 55,200 against 55,150; and Eldorado, Arkansas, 26,950 against 26,950 barrels. In the Gulf coast field West Columbia was reported at 24,000 barrels against 23,100; and Orange county 12,500 against 14,500 barrels.

No changes were reported in crude oil prices for the major districts. According to figures collected by the Institute the imports of petroleum (crude and refined) at the principal United States ports for the week ended October 21 totaled 1,011,909 barrels, a daily average of 172,118, as compared with 990,814, a daily average of 174,402 barrels for the week ended October 14.

MANIFESTO SAYS ENGLAND WILL AID IRISH GOVERNMENT

LONDON, Oct. 25.—Andrew Bonar Law, leader of the unionist party, in a manifesto issued this afternoon, declared the task of that party, if it is returned to power, will be to make good the Anglo-Irish treaty both in letter and spirit and to cooperate with the Irish government.

The manifesto declares it will be the government's earnest aim, if returned, to give "wholehearted and practical support to the league of nations, to fulfill the obligations Great Britain has undertaken abroad, but not to extend her commitments but preferably to curtail them, and to maintain friendship and good understanding with the United States.

NEGRO IS KILLED IN DALLAS STORE, LOOT RECOVERED

DALLAS, Oct. 25.—Walter Jackson, negro, was shot and almost instantly killed in a department store early today by a special night watchman. Merchandise valued at more than \$400 was piled in the basement ready to be carried away. Articles amounting to an estimated value of more than \$500 were found in the negro's home, officers said. More than \$2,000 worth of wearing apparel and jewelry have been stolen from the store since January 1, it is said.

Girl Suicide Has Flower From Her Sweetheart's Grave

BATTLE CREEK, MICH., Oct. 24.—A flower plucked from the grave of a boy friend, inconsolable grief at his death, and a note in which she said she was ill, were pointed to here today as possibly having a bearing on the sudden death of Gertrude Nason, 14 years old. Her death was from asphyxiation. Her friend, Myrl McGuire, died a week ago from a similar cause.

Parents of both today said they doubted the existence of a pact and believed the deaths were accidental notwithstanding the similarity of circumstances involved.

WELLS INDICATE LARGE AREA FOR BUNGER DISTRICT

GRAHAM, TEXAS, Oct. 25.—Interest is centered in the Bunger district at present with the Applegate-Rhodes showing for a good producer at 3700. PREFERS TO COMPLETE SENTENCE FOR CONTEMPT RATHER THAN APPEAL

CHICAGO, Oct. 25.—Hart Hanson, Chicago school trustee, waited patiently in his cell at the county jail today for midnight to end his three day sentence for contempt of court. He declined to accept immediate freedom yesterday, choosing to take his punishment all in one dose rather than await a reconsideration of his case by the supreme court, which stayed proceedings for some of his colleagues on the board of education.

Of the 10 present and former school officials held in contempt of court in the Chadsey case and ordered to pay the penalties imposed by Circuit Judge Scanlin in 1919, all but four had surrendered to the mandate of the supreme court when the reprieve came.

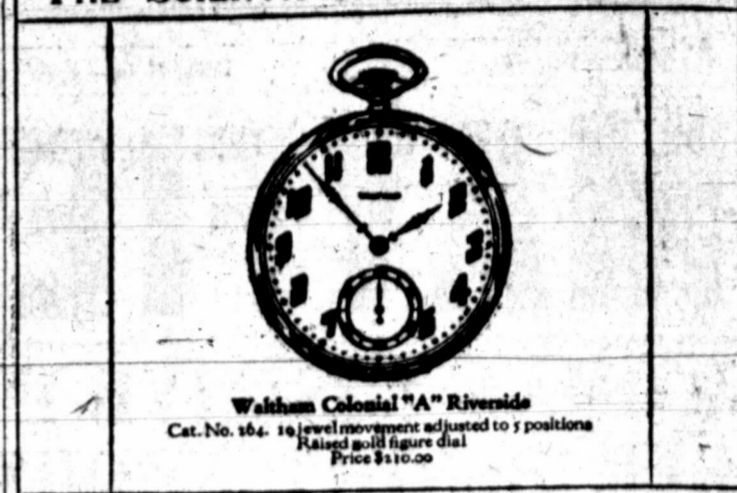

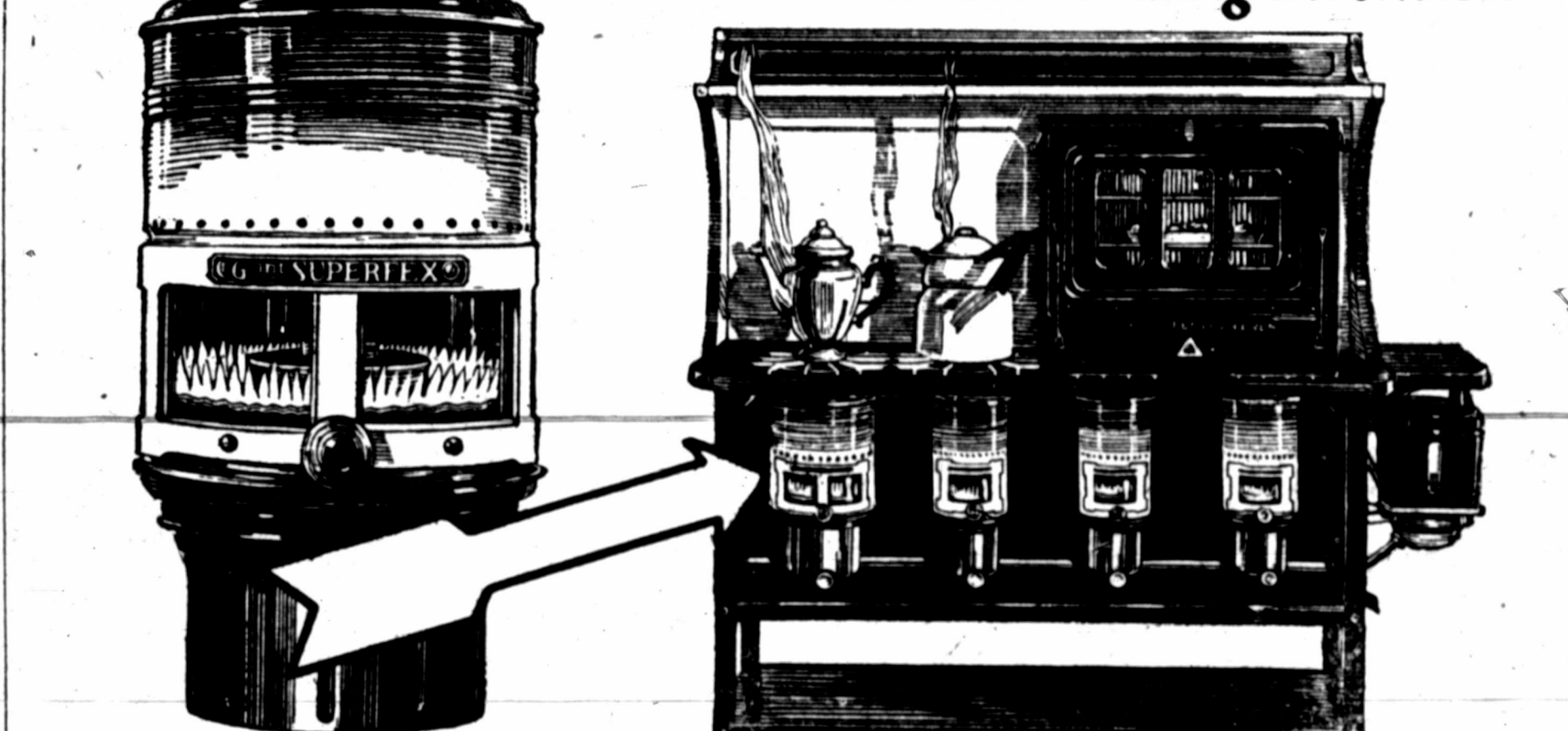

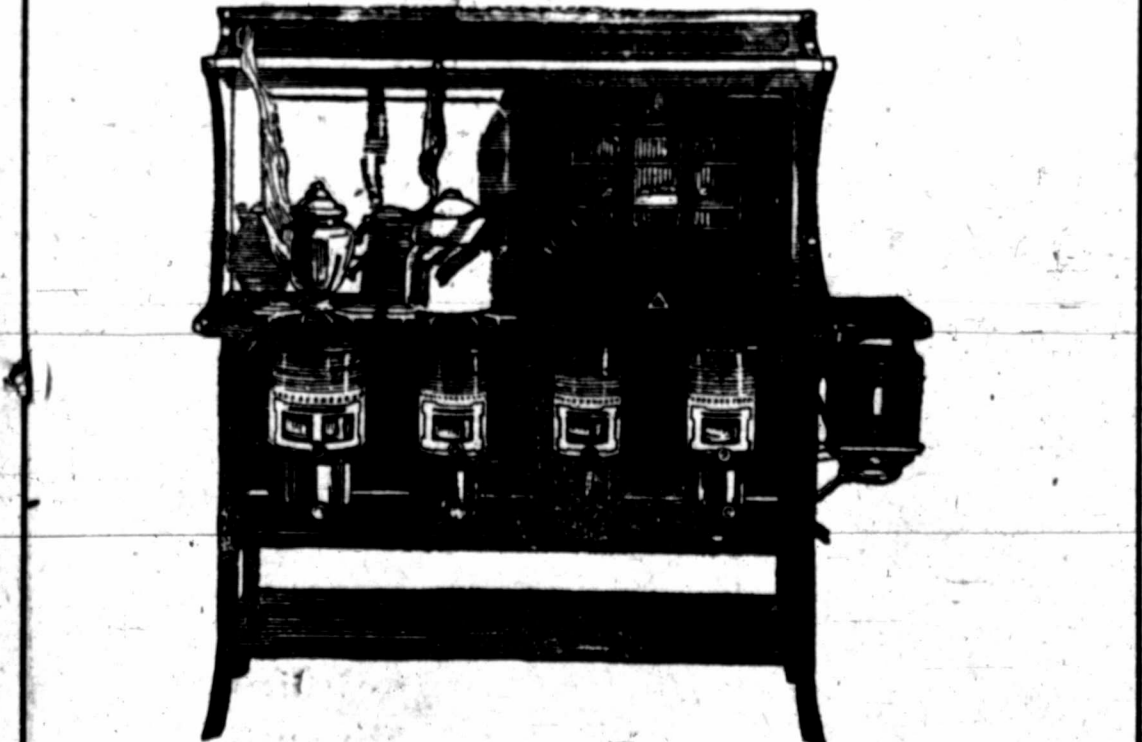

THE LAW AND PUBLIC CONSCIENCE.

The federal district court has been in Houston. Scores of defendants have appeared to answer charges of violations of the Volstead act for enforcement of the prohibition amendment. The situation has brought the following comment from the Houston Chronicle:

"No citizen can read even casually the report of the proceedings in the federal court during recent weeks without reaching the conclusion that while the law is functioning with vigor the public conscience is benumbed and dulled.

"Defendant after defendant came before the court and confessed without reservation, and many with an apparent air of nonchalance, that he or she had with deliberate purpose and formed design violated a statute, based upon and enacted in pursuance of imperative constitutional behest and which in every sense is the law of the land, obedience to which is obligatory upon every citizen.

"In more than one case the defendant had been before the court in the recent past on the same, or a similar charge, and in one instance a local citizen was arrested during the session of the court for an alleged third offense.

"The most discouraging phase of the situation is not that men offend against the law, but that the general public appears to be, if not in sympathy with the offenders, indifferent to widespread violation of a plain law, which violation is not mitigated or rendered less heinous by the fact that it is the result of sudden impulse or transient emotion.

"Every citizen should grasp the truth that the law was enacted out of sheer necessity, after nearly three-quarters of a century of agitation and discussion, and after the conviction had taken hold upon the public mind that the social, moral and economic welfare of a nation of more than 100,000,000 people was imperiled by continuance of a traffic which all men conceded, and which judges of the highest court of the land had declared, unflinchingly bred poverty, crime and every form of social and moral harm. Its passage was the exercise of that elastic and comprehensive power known as the 'police power' of the nation—that is, the unwritten statute of protection and defense of society against harmful evils.

"Provision for its exercise in nationwide scope was made in strict conformity with the requirements of the federal constitution, and the tribunal of ultimate resort has declared and approved its ultimate validity.

"The language of the constitution. 'This constitution and the laws of the United States which shall be made in pursuance thereof . . . shall be the supreme law of the land; and the judges in every state shall be bound thereby, anything in the constitution or laws of any state to the contrary notwithstanding,' means exactly what it says.

"The law against which so many offend is supreme wherever the American flag flies, and all personal opinions, personal habits, and personal rights previously possessed must yield to it. This fact should find lodgment in the public mind and take hold on the public conscience.

"The law is universal and all-embracing. No man can successfully plead his desires or opinions or beliefs when called to the bar of the court for its violation, and no citizen has the right to discountenance, discourage or obstruct its enforcement.

"While the people's representatives may have preferred not to enact it, yet they did enact it in obedience to the peremptory behest of a constitutional amendment, which was adopted in most careful conformity to constitutional requirements, and which, therefore, presumably at least, was an expression of the popular desire and will.

"It is therefore the law of the land, and it is but to state a truism to say all citizens are in duty bound to obey it.

"They are further bound to give their moral encouragement and support to those charged with its enforcement. When the public conscience is quickened, and not till then, they will perform that duty."

SHORT SIGHTED ECONOMY.

Wednesday was celebrated as Navy Day in observance of the birthday anniversary of Theodore Roosevelt.

Had congress been in session it might have observed the day by cutting the naval appropriation so that the navy department could not buy enough fuel to keep the war vessels afloat or provide for manuevers and might have cut appropriations so that officers and the personnel of the navy would be reduced to a number that would be entirely inadequate.

That has been the tendency in our government as regards both the navy and the army. We have gone from the extreme of prodigality of wartime to the extreme of parsimony of peace time in provisions for the army and navy forgetting many of the lessons of the world war. It is not difficult to imagine the fine scorn with which Theodore Roosevelt would have rebuked the shortsighted, expensive economy of our government in some of its provisions for our army and navy.

WASHINGTON NAVAL TREATIES STILL LACKING RATIFICATION.

Will the naval treaties drafted at the Washington conference fall of ratification?

It begins to look like they might. The Washington conference ended many months ago and while Great Britain and Japan have accepted the treaties "in principle," France and Italy have failed to take any steps toward ratification. Both France and Italy are reluctant to ratify the treaties because that it will fix the status of the Mediterranean as a British sea.

If France and Italy fail to ratify the treaties then they will go by the board and we will be just where we were before the Washington conference so far as actual results are concerned, although we do have a better understanding of the attitude of Japan and Great Britain.

In the meantime the British elections will likely bring the League of Nations again to the front. Lloyd George, former premier, is bringing friendship and cooperation with America into the contest. He wants every possible concession made that will help get the United States into the league. In a speech Wednesday he said that the League would be eclipsed until the United States became a member. "Working with the United States," he declared, "ought to be the purpose of any government. We have more in common with the United States than any other land. If we work together that is the best guarantee of a just and lasting peace. The United States is the great country whose friendship is important."

So closely connected is the world today a contest like that which will be waged in England will be followed with interest in the United States. And the result in England will be reflected in this country.

CEBAR RAPIDS, IA., Oct. 25.—Ellis Cutting, sole survivor of the famous "Charge of the Light Brigade," rode unscathed through the gallant but futile action—to be hurt by a snow plow near here.

Blunder Apparent.

For cavalry, mounted and armed with lances and sabres, to charge cannon was plainly suicidal. Lord Cardigan read the order, questioned the aide delivering it, the latter, Captain Nolan, waved his arm down the valley toward the Russian cannon.

"Forward, the Light Brigade," commanded Lord Raglan. Unquestioning, the 400 horse galloped forward, guided, flying, sabers flashing.

Beyond the allied lines, Russ artillery fired point blank from three sides into the gallant horsemen.

DRY ENFORCEMENT ON FOREIGN SHIPS FURTHER DELAYED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—Pending a final interpretation of the statute by the supreme court today, probably late next month or in December, enforcement of the national prohibition laws under the ruling holding it to prohibit possession of liquor on foreign ships within American territorial waters will be withheld, according to the indicated policy of administration officials. It was after the decision to defer enforcement of the law as construed by Attorney General Daugherty had been formulated and communicated to Associate Justice Brandeis of the supreme court yesterday that he denied the writ of supercedens sought by various shipping lines to stay enforcement of Federal Judge Hand's decision at New York dismissing their petition for a permanent injunction against application of the Volstead act.

The department of justice has quiesced in the petition for the writ, the department said in a statement, in view of the completion of preparations to expedite a decision by the supreme court, but counsel for the government and the steamship lines were understood to have agreed with Justice Brandeis that the decision as to enforcement had removed any necessity for granting it.

This decision was announced by Secretary Mellon in a statement explaining an informal order issued to customs officers and prohibition agents under which foreign ships are permitted to continue to carry liquor within American territorial waters under seal as heretofore.

OUTLOOK FOR ORIENT RAILROAD IS BRIGHT SAYS PARTY EXPERTS

SAN ANGELO, TEXAS, Oct. 25.—The outlook for a sound and profitable rehabilitation of the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railroad is brighter now than in many months, if not in its history, said Clyde Reed, chairman of the Kansas public utilities commission, when he, with a party of experts from connecting lines of the Orient, stopped in San Angelo today. The party was returning to Wichita, Kan., after inspecting the Orient to Alton.

The larger lines are not unfriendly to the Orient, which is a "feeder" to them, Mr. Reed asserted. He said they looked their best for the inspection of the Orient only to give disinterested advice on problems confronting the management. The Orient has never been and is not now a dividend paying road, being operated with government aid solely for the public's benefit. Reed explained, saying that to reduce expenses and increase earnings so far as to eliminate the existing deficit, decisions will be made as to whether or not order cars should be repaired at a cost of \$1,000 each and whether Orient engines should be converted from coal to oil burners at an estimated cost of \$1,700 to \$2,000 each.
Mr. Reed said it is unlikely that any recommendations concerning rate changes will be made to the interstate commerce commission. Reduction of the tax valuation of the road to \$100 a mile by practically all counties penetrated by it has helped materially, he said.
The special train, carrying the inspection party, ran from San Angelo to Fort Stockton, 144 miles, in four hours and twenty-five minutes yesterday, showing, the officials said, that the line has good roadbed and fair equipment.

REPORT CONTRIBUTIONS TO DEMOCRATIC FUND; HASKELL GIVES \$2500

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—The first financial report by the democratic national committee filed today by Wilbur Marsh, treasurer, showed contributions of \$112,500. The figures thus far exceeded this figure by \$12,500 which the report showed had been borrowed. Former President Wilson gave \$25,000. C. N. Haskell of Oklahoma gave \$2,500; W. G. McAdoo \$100 and Thomas W. Gregory, Texas, \$200.

HOUSTON LIGHT COMPANY INCREASES CAPITAL STOCK

AUSTIN, Oct. 24.—An amendment to the charter of the Houston Lighting and Power company, increasing the capital stock of the company from \$1,500,000 to \$2,000,000 was filed with the secretary of state today. The increased stock, it is understood, will be used to construct a power plant at the Houston ship channel.
