"No citizen can read even casually the report of the proceedings in the federal court during recent weeks without reaching the conclusion that while the law is functioning with vigor the public condence is benumbed and dulled.

"It is therefore the law of the land, and it is but to state a truism to say all citizens are in duty bound to obey it.

"They are further bound to give their moral encouragement and support to those charged with its inforcement. When the public conscience is quickened, and not till then, they will perform that duty."
