The chamber faces the new year with a deficit of \$430.31, a figure much smaller than when the



The story is told that the publisher of an early Soston newspaper made a beat upon his competitors by sending a boat outside the harbor to meet the ships coming in from Europe to obtain letters and copies of European newspapers, rushing back with them to the printing office where excerpts were reprinted and gotten into circulation ahead of other publications which waited until the ship docked before obtaining their news.

That Boston publisher started a competition in speed in obtaining news that has kept up between newspapers ever since. Speed not only in obtaining the news but in printing it and in circulating it after it has been printed is one of the big and necessary efforts in newspaper work. It would appear that the ultimate in speed had been reached in newspaper work but a photographer for the Detroit News a few days ago showed the way ried to Ann Arbor, Michigan, by airplane to take photographs of a football game. Having taken the photographs he hopped into the waiting plane to be carried back to Detroit so that the photographs could appear in his newspaper at the earliest moment possible. There was nothing new about this. It had been done by newspaper photographers many times before. But at this point the Detroit News photographer departed from custom and like the Boston publisher, brought something new into newspaper work. As the propeller of the airplane began to revolve the photographer slipped the film into a black bag and as the airplane flew faster than any bird toward Detroit he developed the photographs, having them ready for the engraver when he landed in De-

His was a spirit and enterprise which has made American journalism lead the world.

MR. METAL MIKE.

An uncanny new invention, known as "Metal Mike," is perfected by Elmer A. Sperry, the marine inventor

Metal Mike is an automatic ship steering device It looks a lot like a street car motorman's control, box. Hook it to a ship's wheel and it steers six times more accurately than the best human wheels-

The Moffett, largest tanker of the Standard Oil fleet, recently made a 4,000-mile trip in which it was steered almost continuously by Metal Mike.

If the ocean waves twist the ship off her course, Metal Mike instantly detects the deviation from the route mapped out inside him before leaving port, Automatically Mike whirls the steering wheel and corrects the ship's course.

When you have a device like Metal Mike, by which a ship can practically steer itself from San Francisco to Hong Kong, you have about the nearest human piece of machinery ever made.

It's enough to have made a skilled navigator like Christopher Columbus drop dead from fright. ... It makes you wonder, is there any work we do

that eventually will not be duplicated by machinery? Metal Mike, of course, lacks judgment, the most important quality of a human pilot. That is, Mike can steer a ship to destination unless another ship gets in the way.

Still, it would not be impossible to improve Mike's cog-wheel brain so that, nearing another ship, he aumatically would steer away from it.

This would be just the reverse of the selenium torpedo, which automatically pursues its prey, no matter how many twists and turns are taken in the attempt to escape.

We recall an "automatic man" that years ago toured the country in cheap vaudeville houses. It walked. It bowed. It did many stunts. Its operator epened its coat, displaying a maze of machinery visible inside through a glass.







Changes in Business Policy

Many and far-reaching changes are today taking place in the policies upon which business is conducted. Most of the policies that have been in force for the past 25 years were based on the cardinal fact of a steadily rising market. Fluctuations were accepted as incidental and temporary; but the assurance of a general average tendency upwrad was the basis of every attitude that became formulated into a policy.

Recent changes in business policychanges coming about with the past year or more—are based on the final acceptance of the fact that we have entered a period of a non-rising—in all likelihood a falling-market. So long as it was possible to assume that the new price levels represented but a temporary depression the old policies were bravely and tenaciously adhered to; but when it became clear that in all human probability the market would continue downward, then an adjustment of basic policies became imperative.

Chief among the policies that have necessarily been changed are those that relate to the creation of demand.

Under the old policies a certain demand was inevitable, and came to be accepted as a matter of course. It was the cardinal policy of almost every producer and distributor to atempt to capture a generous share of the existing demand. Not a great deal of thought was given to creating demand itself.

But now that the great demand has relaxed until there is not enough to give everybody a liberal share, it has brought business to the imperative consideration of two things: One is how to get a full share of the demand by taking it away from others by force of competition. The other is how to create more demand, so there will be enough for all.

The great and imperative necessity of stimulating and creating demand for the products of industry has at last given advertising a position of importance in business policies far in excess of any that it has ever known.


