ST. LOUIS, Dec. 1.—George Clemenceau arrived here this morning expressing his pleasure at his mission, declaring it "much better" than he expected.

Because of anonymous threats against the Tiger, sent to Mayor Henry W. Kiel, extraordinary precautions were taken and Francis P. Sullivan, publisher of the Tiger, did not alight from his train at the union station.

ST. LOUIS ARRIVES IN ST. LOUIS FOR ADDRESS

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 1.—George Clemenceau, former premier of France, who is touring the United States seeking to bring closer the relations of this country and France, arrived here today in session at the home of Joseph Pulitzer Jr., publisher of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch.

The Tiger launched into a tirade against the French statesman, who is to deliver his fourth formal address in America at 2:30 o'clock.

Instead of being down at the Pulitzer home as he was requested to do, Clemenceau insisted on giving an interview to newspapermen.

SAYS OUTSIDERS TO MARKET LANDS IF WICHITANS DO NOT

A. M. McPHERSON TELLS BUSINESS COUNCIL OF DEMONSTRATION FARM PLAN.

PREVIOUS MISTAKES HERE ARE RECALLED

Shipping of Trainloads of Unsuitable Cantaloupes Recounted As Showing Need For Planning.

If Wichita Falls does not take prompt and systematic steps for marketing irrigated lands, some outside agencies will do so, perhaps to the city's detriment. This was the message brought to the business council of the chamber of commerce at the weekly luncheon, Friday, by A. M. McPherson, consulting engineer, who has been working on measures for marketing the lands.

On a basis of 100,000 acres under irrigation, Mr. McPherson pointed out that a return of \$100 per acre annually would put \$10,000,000 in circulation here, not counting the benefits from the industries of mid-dlemen.

Mr. McPherson thought that the establishment of the demonstration farms could be financed from irrigation district funds.

HEARINGS SCHEDULED FOR DECEMBER 12 ARE POSTPONED TO JAN. 9

AUSTIN, Dec. 1.—All cases set down for hearing before the state railroad commission at its monthly meeting on December 12, were postponed today until January 9 by order of the commission. Included in the cases scheduled for hearing was application for general revision of freight rates on lumber shipped from southeast Texas.

SAYS RISING TIDE AMERICAN EXPORTS WELL UNDER WAY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—A rising tide of American exports appears to be under way, according to a statement today by Dr. Julius Klein, director of the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce of the department of commerce, who declared that the factors entering into the country's foreign trade "portend a most favorable future."

The director added that the total of \$74,000,000 in exports in October, the largest since March, 1921, marks a progressive increase and shows the trend definitely upward.

The importance of foreign trade to the country is more and more widely recognized as a national asset, Dr. Klein declared, and called attention to the forthcoming trade convention to be held in Cleveland December 5, as an indication of the awakened interest occasioned in an industrial city.

Improving conditions in Latin-American countries, the far east, and in Africa, forecast increased business with those quarters of the world, Dr. Klein said. In all of these, he explained, American exports are seeking to enlarge their operations as shown by the trade inquiries.

THIRD INTERNATIONAL ADOPTS RESOLUTION ON STATUS OF THE NEGRO

MOSCOW, Dec. 1.—The third international has adopted a resolution declaring that the United States is destined to play an important part in the struggle of the African race for liberty and that inasmuch as America today is the center of negro culture of the world, it is in that country that the communist campaign to bring freedom to the negroes of all countries should be concentrated.

The resolution was drawn up by a special commission of the international appointed to consider the negro question. One member of the commission was an American negro who has been very active in championing the cause of his race. He has been aided by several whites in the United States.

HILL COUNTY TEACHER INJURED THURSDAY IN A GAME OF FOOTBALL

WAXAHACHIE, TEXAS, Dec. 1.—Milton Eubank, 23, principal of the public school at Covington, was injured in a football game yesterday at Maypearl between the school teams of Covington and Maypearl. SEPTEMBER 30 TO OCTOBER 5 TO BE DATES

Message Received Thursday From C. H. Verschylle, Secretary Of Association.

September 29 to October 5 will be the dates of the 1923 Texas-Oklahoma fair, according to word received Thursday from C. H. Verschylle, secretary of the fair, who has been attending the meeting of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions.

The Texas-Oklahoma fair was the first fair in the history of the international association, to be admitted to full membership during its first year, and this is considered a signal honor.

Mr. Verschylle's message to George Keth, president of the fair, follows:

"Texas, as usual, scored not once, but twice when the International Association of Fairs and Expositions in convention here elected Seth Mayfield of Waco as its president, and admitted the Texas-Oklahoma fair to full membership."

"We have the honor of being the only fair in America to have been admitted into the international association without having first conducted two successful fairs, in the 23 years of the association. You can well appreciate this distinction when you consider every large fair in North America is a member of the international association and it was necessary to suspend all by-laws to allow Wichita Falls to come in."

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Attribute Death to Cold Contracted At Football Game

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—Members of his family today attributed the death last night of William Goodsell Rockefeller, son of the late William Rockefeller and nephew of John D. Rockefeller, to a cold contracted at the Yale-Harvard football game last Saturday.

Avery Rockefeller, a freshman at Yale, said his uncle had complained of a cold soon after he left the Yale bowl. Last Monday Mr. Rockefeller left his office complaining of a cold and his physician ordered him to bed. The illness developed into pneumonia and by Wednesday his condition had become critical.

At his bedside last night, according to a report from Melilla to Madrid, which is printed in the Times today.

CINDERELLA'S ADVENTURES AT THE PRIMROSE HOUSE



Double chin and ugly neck vanished when Helen carried her head correctly.

Much of a woman's charm depends upon the way she carries her head. The most lovely face loses its attraction if it is not carried by a graceful, beautiful neck, and an illusion of beauty, quite unfounded on features is created frequently by the vulgar way in which some women carry their heads.

Helen had allowed herself to slump and paid no attention to the way she carried herself, so consequently she had an unlovely neck and a decided double chin. Yet when she held her head correctly and stood properly, there was only a suggestion of this.

Ugly Neck Unnecessary.

The hollows in her neck, and the bad line about the back of her neck soon disappeared when she developed the pride in her appearance and the confidence in herself which she had lacked.

There is absolutely no necessity for an ugly neck. It is easy to beautify it if you go about matters scientifically.

If you have hollows in front of the shoulders, lines about the neck and bagginess just where the neck joins the chin, you may be sure the muscles have lost their firmness and have relaxed, permitting the skin to fall into lines and folds.

Learn how to mold the muscles of the neck and face to restore their firmness and contour. Also examine your profile in your mirror and see if you are holding your head too far forward. If so, you are giving fat a wonderful chance to settle on the back, across the shoulders, pushing forward the muscles of the neck so that they become relaxed.

Proper Exercises.

The following exercises are excellent to assist in restoring the smooth, firm contour to the neck and shoulders. Do these seated, being sure to hold the shoulders erect.

Turn the head to the right until you can look over the shoulder and down the back. Turn the head forward again, and look to the left as far as you can. Repeat this alternately.

Then drop the head back easily on the back of the neck as far as it will go. Raise the head slowly and let it fall forward on the chest as far as it will go, feeling a little pull on the spine. Repeat this slowly several times.

Stretch the Muscles.

Rest the head at the back of the neck, and slowly open the mouth, then close it drawing the lower jaw up to the upper one. You will feel a decided pull on the muscles of the neck.

Apply a good cream frequently on the neck and shoulders, turning the head to the right, massage from the back of the ear down to the shoulder blade, with a firm, rotary movement. Then turn to the left, and with the left hand massage the right side in the same way.

Too much flesh about the neck destroys the line of youth. However, you can rarely reduce the neck and shoulders effectively without reducing the flesh generally.

Remember this—it is really your mental attitude that determines the way you carry your head. Look up, not down. Develop a personality, and know that you really amount to something. Then carry yourself that way.

PRESIDENT FAVORS ABOLITION OF THE TWELVE HOUR DAY

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—President Harding favors abolition of the 12-hour day, it is revealed in a statement by him issued today by the federated American engineering societies.

The statement follows:

"It rejoices to note the conclusions of this great body of experts are identical with those which I have reached from a purely social viewpoint.

"It has seemed to me for a long time that the 12-hour day and the type of worker it produces have outlived their usefulness and their part in American life in the interests of good citizenship, of good business and of economic stability.

"The old order must give way to a better and wiser form of organization so that the proper family life may be enjoyed suitably by all our people.

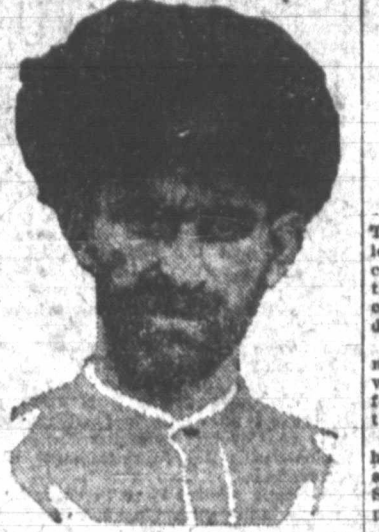
"This clear and convincing report of the engineers must prove exceedingly helpful in showing that this much to be desired result can be achieved without either economic or financial disturbances to the progress of American industry."

The report referred to by the president was issued by a committee of the societies after a two years' investigation of more than 40 industries including iron and steel.

The report found that the 12-hour day was not an economic necessity.

OPPOSE NAMING COMMISSION TO DETERMINE 'KICK'

ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE P. R. TESTS PROPOSAL MADE TO CONGRESS.

WILL SERVE NO USEFUL PURPOSE SAYS WHEELER

Suggest "Scientific Commission" to Decide What is Intoxicating Liqueur.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—The Anti-Saloon league is opposed to the proposal that congress, with a view to possible amendment of the Volstead act, appoint a "scientific commission" to determine what is intoxicating liqueur.

Wayne B. Wheeler, general counsel of the organization, announcing today that representatives of the league and prohibition workers from 48 states and the District of Columbia had voted unanimously at a meeting to fight such a resolution, declaring "the finding of such a commission would serve no helpful purpose in determining legislation to enforce the eighteenth amendment."

"We believe this movement for a so-called scientific commission, initiated by wet interests many months ago, is not designed to work out a solution of the law enforcement problem," said Mr. Wheeler, "but on the other hand to confuse the issue, break down law enforcement and ultimately to secure the repeal of the eighteenth amendment."

"A scientific commission can determine accurately what is intoxicating liqueur for a group of 100,000,000 people. Alcoholic liquors affect people differently, according to age, temperament and many other conditions. Consequently no accurate conclusion could be reached with reference to this question."

Mr. Wheeler said that the test in determining what was appropriate and effective legislation was not what liqueur would actually intoxicate, but what standard in the definition of intoxicating liqueur was best to enforce the law effectively.

Leave It to the Protestants Says James W. Gerard

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—Jewish organizations need take no action against the Ku Klux Klan but may leave the task of combating the body to protestants, James W. Gerard, former ambassador to Germany, told members of the congregation of Beth Jeshura in a Thanksgiving day address.

"I have been informed that a Jewish organization, Beth Abraham, has said it will crush the Klan," Mr. Gerard said. "I will say to you that no Jewish organization need take any action. Leave it to the protestants."

The principal reason for thanksgiving, he said, was that there still is liberty in America, but he added, organizations like the Klan are its enemies. Religion, morality and Americanism do not need masks, he said.

RED CROSS SPENDS BUSY THANKSGIVING ASSISTING THREE THOUSAND ORPHANS

By Associated Press. ATHENS, Dec. 1.—Fifty representatives of the American Red Cross in the near east spent a busy Thanksgiving in assisting 3,000 orphans from Asia Minor to disembark from the steamship Belgravia and Carnaro. Two thousand of the youngsters were immediately sent to Corfu where they will occupy the famous Achilleion palace. The other thousand were housed in the ancient royal palace in the center of Athens.

The presence of the relief workers at the thanksgiving gathering of the American colony at the American embassy yesterday made the attendance at this function the largest in many years.

ONE MAN IS DEAD, OFFICER WOUNDED; MEETING INVADED

CHICAGO, Dec. 1.—One man is dead and a policeman is seriously wounded as a result of an invasion made early today on the Union Walters' club by 15 armed men.

The dead man is Frank J. Ragen, former president of the union. The wounded officer is Sergeant Archie Cooper, assigned to the waiter's meeting at the request of Ragen, who feared rioting. He was shot above the heart during the fusillade of shots that riddled the hall.

Police said Ragen told them before he died that the men walked into the meeting unannounced, pulled their guns and started shooting. One of the three men arrested by police, according to their announcement, was identified by Ragen as a leader of the 15.

HASKELL GROUP LEASES RANCH OF 160,000 ACRES

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—A contract has been closed by which the Oil Lease Development company, the big development company jointly controlled by Middle States Oil and Southern States Oil, has been granted the oil and gas privileges on the Indian ranch, a 160,000 acre property in southern Texas. The ranch is the property of Oscar Strauss and family of New York, is situated between Laredo and Eagle Pass, and stretches for 40 miles along the Rio Grande. Seven test wells in nearby territory have proven oil bearing values of large magnitude, and for months negotiations were under way on behalf of several big oil companies to lease Indian ranch. Oscar Strauss' investigation of the stability of the Haskell properties and Governor Haskell's promise of "actual drilling within 30 days" on behalf of Oil Lease Development company, secured the lease. Development work on the property will proceed with diligence.

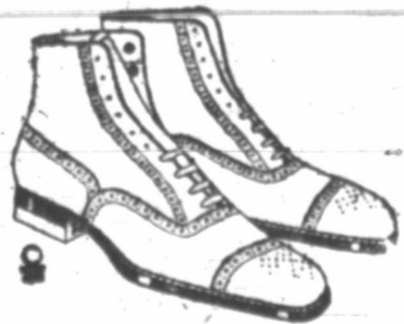

PERMANENT RANGER CAMP AT DENISON; HICKMAN IS CAPTAIN

AUSTIN, Dec. 1.—A permanent ranger camp will be established at Denison, near under open port law, Adjutant General Thomas D. Barton announced today, following conference yesterday with Ranger Captain Tom Hickman, in charge of state rangers at Denison. Denison will be headquarters for the ranger company of which Hickman is captain, Barton stated.

The action making Denison ranger headquarters was decided upon because of the belief that it would be advisable to keep rangers there for probably six months, it was said. Denison was placed under the open port law when martial law was lifted.

GENERAL WHEELAN DIES AT HOTEL IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—Brigadier General James Nicholas Wheelan, U. S. A., retired, died at a New York hotel yesterday in his 88th year. He was a veteran of the Civil war, of the Spanish war and had been in military attacks at the court of the Netherlands, Belgium and Berlin.

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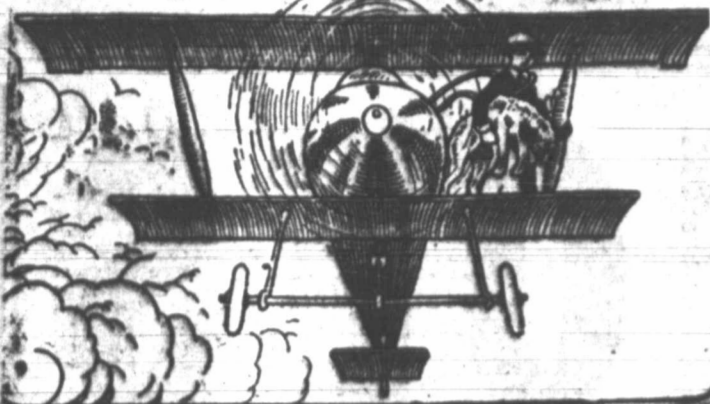

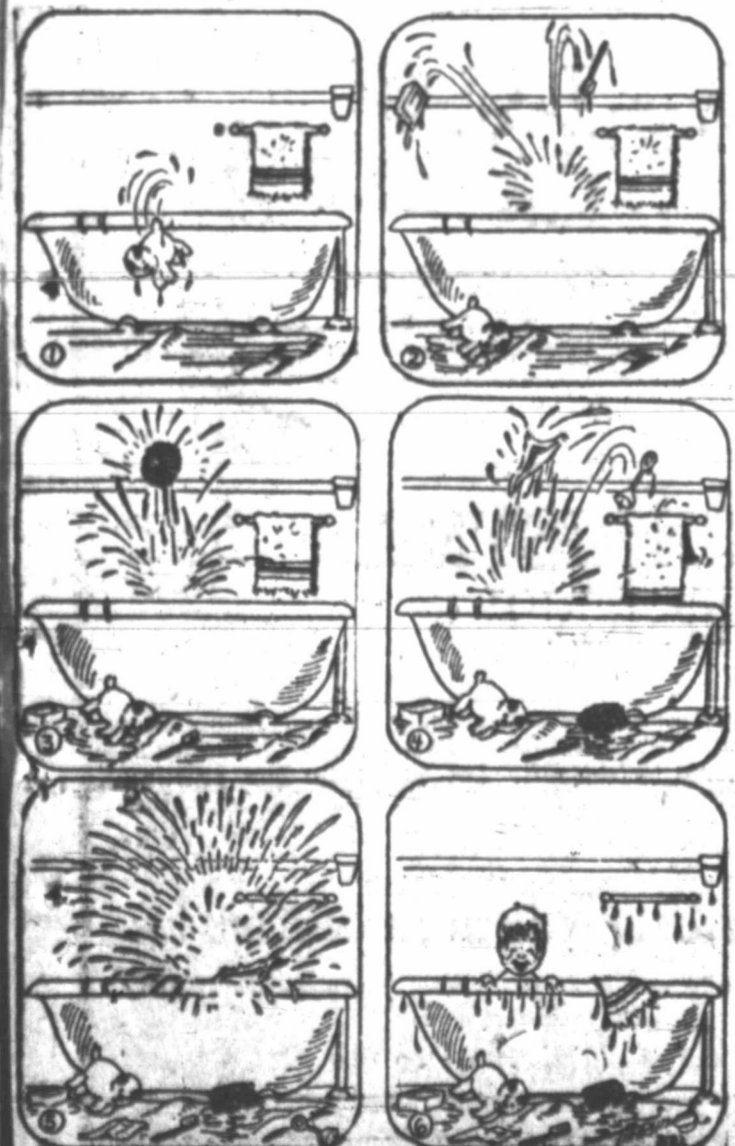

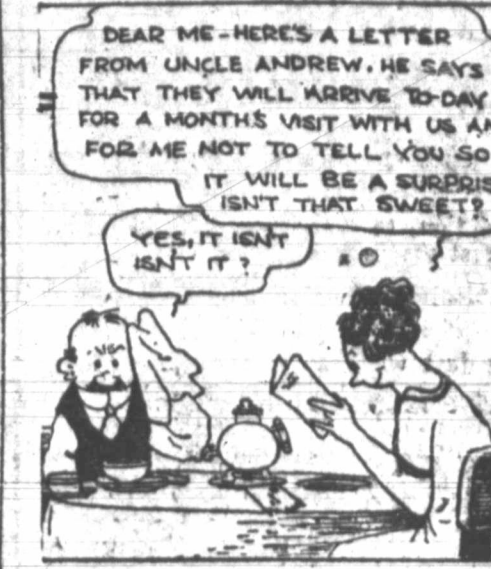
