Stabilize Money or Face Fascisti Move in U. S. Economist Warns

A recent circular sent to bankers and employers expresses deep anx-lety over the fascisti victory in Italy and the gains of the labor party in England and elsewhere. It predicts that the same idea of the political domination of labor will soon appear more explicity in America and will threaten existing

ployers, not to say the rest of us, have cause for anxiety. But what the circular overlooks is that, as Roosevelt so often warned us, the only real escape from the danger of an overturn lies in redressing real grievances.

What is needed is to interpret the recent labor unrest as symptoms of social diseases needing to be cured. There are several such social dis-sases which I could name, and probably several others which would be revealed by a searching investigation. But there I shall point out only one probably by far the most important. This is the un-stable money growing out of the
