

GOVERNORS DEBATE ASKS MEASURES TO DRY' ENFORCEMENT AND KU KLUX KLAN

SEVEN SESSION CONTINUES UNTIL AFTER MIDNIGHT THURSDAY.

KLAN DENOUNCED BY OL'COTT AND PARKER

Governor Morrison of North Carolina Protested Action By Conference.

WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, W. Va., Dec. 15.—State executives attending the fourteenth annual conference of governors turned out yesterday in inspection of coal mines near Beckley, after engaging at midnight in the first flurry of debate which has marked the session. From the Ku Klux Klan was the two questions which brought a clash of views when the meeting was thrown open to debate shortly before midnight after an address by Governor Olcott of Oregon, which he assailed the Klan as a "stark menace." Governor Morrison of North Carolina declared he opposed introduction into the conference of either the Klan or prohibition questions, while Governor Parker of Louisiana, who had brought an address in which he declared prohibition was almost a farce and the Klan should be curbed by state legislation, as well as the concluding question before the country, Governor Morrison said, he opposed its consideration at a conference which he believes should be devoted to an exchange of ideas on the administrative duties of government.

Particularly did he object, Mr. Morrison said, to Governor Parker's proposal that the conference adopt resolutions on these questions, or any resolution that would warrant immediate action of a police character. Governor Sprout of Pennsylvania interrupted to say that the North Carolina governor need have no fear of the conference departing from its policy against adopting resolutions.

Governor Morrison further declared that he disagreed with Governor Parker and Olcott on their proposed methods for fighting the Klan which he said could not be effectively met by existing laws, but could be met effectively only by amendment. As to Governor Parker's assertion that prohibition was not being enforced and he explained that he sale of light wine and beer was prohibited, and never been regulated, Mr. Morrison said he was "astonished" at what he described as the Louisiana governor's willingness to surrender to the administration among actions he assists in the cause of law and his efforts to fight what he conceived to be lawlessness in the Klan on the other side.

Mr. Parker rejoined that he did not conceive his attitude on prohibition to be a yielding to lawlessness. He did not mean to defend the Klan and deplored its possible anger to the country in arousing the spirit of racial animosity and racial feeling. Governor Morrison said he could relate many acts of benevolence attributed to the Klan organization.

Taking up Mr. Morrison's assertion that the way to stop the Klan was to tax the Klan, Governor Kirby of Alabama asked how it was possible to argue with a masked man. Mr. Morrison replied that highwaymen were masked, but the states knew how to argue with them.

ITEM OF \$6,000 FIGURES IN BANK CASE IN ARIZONA

RECOMMENDATIONS MADE BY SECRETARY OF LABOR DAVIS.

DECLARED A MENACE TO AMERICAN LABOR

Charges Illegally Admitted Mexicans Came As Result Railway Labor Supply Agents.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—Measures to control what is said to be a vast body of alien Mexican unskilled labor in the United States are recommended to Secretary Davis in a report by special agents of the department of labor made public today. The report sets forth that the alien Mexican laborers illegally in the United States are a menace to American labor and American communities.

Recommendations for meeting the situation include a system of registration, together with more rigid medical and physical examination and selective immigration regulation through examination before entry. It is suggested that the enforcement of immigration laws be placed under federal control in the hands of a central body, such as a "border patrol." Cooperation with state and municipal authorities is also suggested, not only in the enforcement of immigration regulations but also in the judicial investigation of Mexican labor already in the United States and legally admitted under the immigration laws.

The report indicates that there are about 416,492 foreign born Mexicans in Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, California, Nevada, Oregon and adjacent states. The tide of Mexican immigration, it is declared, is creeping in every direction throughout this country and Mexican colonies are springing up in communities throughout the entire middle west. The principal centers for these immigrants into the United States are given as El Paso, Eagle Pass, Laredo and Brownsville, Texas; Douglas, Naco and Nogales, Ariz., and Calixton, Calif.

Detailed discussion is given of Mexican labor employed in mineral industry in the United States and it is asserted that virtually every family in northern Mexico has one or more members in this country, who from time to time remit sums of money to their relatives at home.

The report says the agency sees no reason why Mexican labor should be admitted into the border states as the local flow of Mexican immigration will take care of all seasonal activities if the labor is judiciously distributed.

It is noted that most of the illegally admitted Mexicans come in as a result of the activities of railroad labor supply agents, and later drift away from the railroads into other occupations, often supplanting American residential labor.





He believes the number may reach 3,000,000.

In explaining the deplorable psychological effect on the minds and spirits of the coming generation from being hungry and homeless and from constantly seeing at first hand the sordid results of economic depression, he said:

"Don't judge our people by those who still smoke English cigarettes and live in the best hotels and restaurants but by the actual condition of the populace," he said.
