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200,000 MILES OF HIGHWAYS BUILT IN U. S. IN 1922

EXPECTED AID WILL BE GIVEN FOR 180,000 MILES IN NEXT 20 YEARS

\$700,000,000 EXPENDED DURING THE YEAR 1921

Texas Added Greatest Mileage in 1922 With 933 Miles of Highway

AUSTIN, Feb. 15.—Texas completed a total of 2,957 miles of highway and began construction of 1,338 additional miles during the two-year period from December 1, 1920, to December 1, 1922, according to a summary of construction activities prepared by E. J. Hank, materials engineer of the state highway department, and issued today. In the same period, 15 bridges were completed and 16 placed under construction.

Highway construction in Texas during the two-year period cost a total of \$2,813,890, the summary states. Of this amount, slightly less than fourteen million dollars was supplied by state and federal aid, and the remainder by local aid.

Previous to December 1, 1920, Texas has completed but 967 miles of hard surfaced highways, at a total cost of \$3,326,000. It is stated, this amount was distributed as follows: Federal aid, \$1,204,622; state aid, \$1,994,352; and the remainder by local and county bond issues.

The average cost per mile of projects completed up to December 1, 1920, was \$5,410, the summary shows, while the average cost of the more than 2,957 million completed since that time was \$12,409. This increase in cost per mile, while partially due to increase in prices during 1920, is largely due to the fact that a better and higher type of construction was adopted, according to highway department officials. This fact is shown by a comparison of the mileage of the various types of construction completed prior to December 1, 1920, with the mileage completed during the following two years.

"On December 1, 1922, there was carried over into 1923 construction a total of 1,338 miles," the report continues. "The projects covered by this mileage are in the various stages of construction and will be completed by the beginning of next year. This 1,338 miles is divided as follows: Concrete, 45,793 miles; brick pavement, 18,711 miles; the top and surface treated roads on gravel or macadam base, 698,111 miles; crushed stone, 342,455; sand, rinky, caliche and shell, 118 miles; grading and bridges, 210 miles; and bridge projects, 11. This amount of projected highways is an increase of more than 200 miles over the amount projected at the beginning of 1920, the officials state, when 1,046 miles of highway were being planned.

It is estimated that the projects now being planned will cost a total of \$14,271,112. Of this amount, it is estimated that federal aid will cover \$8,193,056, and state aid \$1,993,960.

Texas is launching upon the largest highway construction program in its history during the present year, according to highway officials, and one of the most extensive programs of any state in the nation.

OIL COMPANIES IN RIVER BED FIGHT PENDING MEASURE

OPPOSE BILL THEY SAY WOULD GIVE THE BOTTOM LANDS TO 2 CONCERNS

HAS PASSED SENATE, NOW BEFORE HOUSE

Attorney Urges That Legislation Await Final Action of Supreme Court

Vigorous opposition has developed here and is being made known in Washington, to passage of the senate bill which gives title to Red river lands to the companies that first spent money in development of the lands.

The bill passed the senate last Friday and is now before a house committee. Its passage would give the state the title to the lands claimed, most of the river land east of the bridge, and the Burk Divide company most of that west of it. The Southern Petroleum company, Buckeye, National Petroleum, General, Lone Star and Kirby Petroleum are among the companies whose interests would be affected by the measure.

Judge C. L. Bass, representing stockholders in some of these companies, has wired Congressman Nicholas Sinnott, chairman of the house public lands committee, in part as follows:

"Received your wire stating hearings concluded on Red river oil matter. If your committee favorably reports the bill passed last Friday by the senate, it will be because they are wholly uninformed about the real facts and therefore do not understand the full effect of the bill."

The message then denies reports regarding the number of wells drilled and asks the committee to refer to Receiver Delano's report. Continuing, the message says:

"If your committee will call for Receiver Delano's evidence, it will convince your committee that the bill passed by the senate will give several million dollars worth of oil to those two placer claim companies simply because they were the first to drill under the act. It is not as afterwards drilled by various Texas claimants under Texas patents, and leases that the dissenting opinion of Justice McReynolds asserts were within the state of Texas."

"Which channel wells are within Texas and which within Oklahoma cannot be definitely determined until the supreme court speaks the last word by a final judgment and a final judgment will not be rendered until that court specifies what property the federal receiver shall deliver to the interior department."

"For this reason, Texas claimants have looked to supreme court and have not appeared before senate and house committees, for they thought those committees would understand the reasons why no action should be taken until the supreme court finally divested itself of control. The senate bill would be a monstrous denial of natural justice to Texas claimants who drilled only two or three wells."

ACCIDENTS RESULT IN THREE RECEIVING INJURIES TO HANDS

The hands of three different Wichitans were injured in three different accidents Thursday and Friday.

Yancy, an employe of the H. V. Brillard Oil company of Iowa, was brought to General Hospital Friday morning for treatment. Mr. Yancy is suffering from a badly injured hand as a result of an accident in which his hand was crushed in the machinery.

It was at first thought that it would be necessary to amputate the entire hand. After a thorough examination, the thumb of the right hand was amputated and it is believed that the rest of the hand can be saved. He will be confined in General Hospital for several days resting from the injury.

J. L. Reese, a rig builder of 1411 Fourteenth street, was brought to General Hospital Thursday suffering with a partial amputation of the left hand. Mr. Reese is said to have been shaping some timber with a hand axe when the accident occurred. The axe slipped and caused him to strike his hand with the axe.

It is not thought that the wound will ever amputate but he will be confined to the hospital for some time recovering from the wound and the loss of his hand.

Frank Belcher, while moving some heavy machinery for a local transfer company Thursday, met with an accident which resulted in the loss of a finger being mangled off, causing a painful wound. He was reported resting easy Friday.

CHARGES ARE FILED IN CONNECTION WITH MEMPHIS ACCIDENT

JACK MALLORY ACCUSED OF THEFT FOLLOWING AUTO WRECK

CAPT. SMITH IS KILLED WHEN AUTO OVERTURNS

Charged That Mallory Took Purse and Clothing of Victim of Accident

MEMPHIS, TEXAS, Feb. 16.—Interest in the tragedy resulting in the death of Capt. E. M. Smith, retired army officer, who was killed on the public road just south of Memphis on Saturday morning, February 4, by the supposedly accidental overturning of his car, was renewed here today by the filing of charges against Lieut. Jack Mallory, who was with Captain Smith when the wreck occurred.

The charges were filed after an investigation conducted by A. E. Gilman of Houston, brother-in-law to Captain Smith, who arrived here Thursday morning. Two charges were filed, one for "theft from person" and another for "theft by conversion."

It is charged that Mallory, who admitted here that he took Captain Smith's purse from his pocket and that it contained \$115 in currency and some change, reported to the relatives at Houston, to which place he accompanied the body, that the purse contained only \$2.35 in silver. It is also alleged that he kept Captain Smith's clothing, military uniform, which he was wearing when arrested at Houston on a warrant from Denver on a charge of using the mails to defraud.

Mr. Gilman has information from Denver that Captain Smith probably had in the neighborhood of \$500 on his person at the time of his death. He had said a student roadster for that amount and it is thought that he had this either in cash or in cashier's check.

Warrants were issued here for Mallory's arrest and Sheriff Merrick telegraphed officials at Denver to hold him under these warrants. Mallory having been taken back to Denver to answer the charges mentioned above.

DECLARES PEACE WILL COME WHEN OUT OF POLITICS

SACRAMENTO, CAL., Feb. 15.—The problems of world peace and reconstruction will be solved only when they are divorced from political parties and from partisan issues to be discussed as national questions and not as material for campaigns. In the view of William Gibbs McAdoo, former secretary of the treasury, he spoke to this effect at a banquet given in his honor here last night.

Mr. McAdoo warned that unless something speedily was done republicans and democrats alike would face a situation "full of danger and possible disaster."

"Instead of directing criticism toward what has or what has not been done, it is not about time for us to throw aside this spirit of hate, of bitterness and of partisanship and for each of us to do something to help the world—don't tear how and I'm not offering any specific methods, and by the proper kind of cooperation to effect lasting peace."

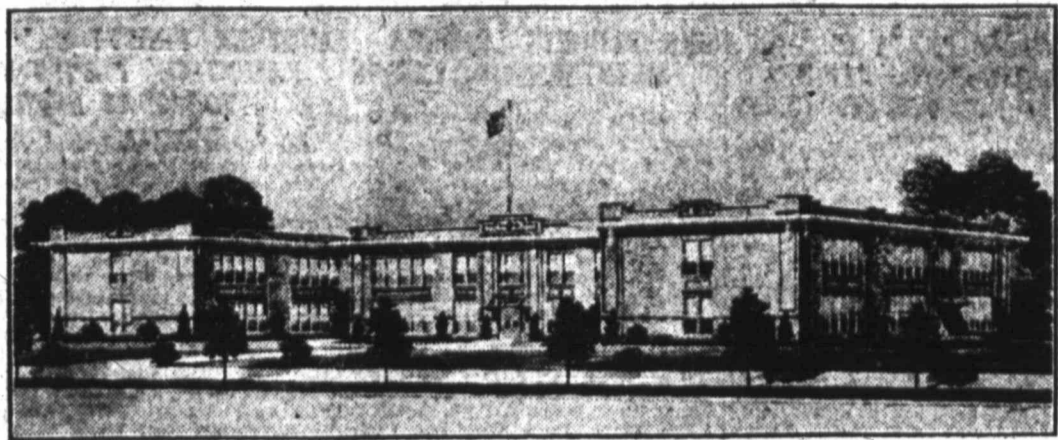

ROAD IS FIGHTING U. S. DEMAND FOR EXCESS EARNINGS

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 16.—Arguments in a suit brought by the Dayton-Goose Creek Railway company of Goose Creek and Dayton, Texas, in which the constitutionality of a section of the transportation act of 1920 providing that railroads whose annual earnings on the value of their properties used in transportation exceeds six per cent, must pay one-half of the excess earnings to the interstate commerce commission for the railroad operating fund, is being heard here today by three judges sitting in federal court. The suit, brought as a test case against the commerce commission and the United States attorney general, was declared to involve the right of the government to collect millions of dollars under the act and said to be the first instituted since it became effective.

The railroad asks for an injunction preventing that portion of the excess profits for part of 1922 and all of 1921, amounting to approximately \$16,000. The case was transferred here from the federal court for the eastern district of Texas.

Blackburn Esterline, assistant solicitor general, and P. T. Farrell, chief counsel for the commission will represent the government. The railroad company's case will be presented by Frank Andrews of Houston, John C. Townes Jr. of Dayton, and Robert H. Kelly of Beaumont.

PROHIBITION ISSUE BEFORE PARLIAMENT PRESENT TWO BILLS

LONDON, Feb. 16.—The ground-work for what is expected to be the first debate in the British parliament on a measure for total prohibition, was laid today when two private member bills dealing with the liquor question were introduced and formally read for the first time in the house of commons. The most sweeping bill was that sponsored by Edwin Scrymgeour, prohibitionist, and the other, backed by two or three labor members who are teetotalers. This measure would prohibit the manufacture, importation and sale of alcoholic liquors in the United Kingdom.

GRANT STREET HOUSE DESTROYED BY FIRE, ANOTHER IS DAMAGED

Fire broke out in the residence of Zack Waddel at 2111 Grant shortly after 7 o'clock Thursday night and before the blaze was completely under control the home was burned to the ground and slight damage had resulted to the residence of W. N. Porter, 2113 Grant.

Firemen were notified and reached the scene in time to control and confine additional damage to a slight damage to the roof of the Porter residence. The loss is thought to be about \$4,000.

The offices of the cemetery committee adjoining were also badly damaged, while the windows of many houses in the vicinity were shattered.

SEVERAL CLASHES BETWEEN POLISH AND LITHUANIANS

WARSAW, Feb. 16.—Clashes between Polish troops and Lithuanian irregulars have occurred at several places during the occupation of the neutral zone allotted to Poland by the council of ambassadors. Twelve Polish soldiers were wounded, while the Lithuanians left several wounded on the field before they were forced to retreat. No loss of life is reported.

ABILENE COLDEST POINT IN TEXAS THURSDAY NIGHT

DALLAS, Feb. 16.—The northwestern cold wave, diminished in intensity, is moving eastward north of Dallas, the local weather bureau announced today with coldest weather last night at Abilene where the mercury went to 23 degrees. 'MURDER FANS' VIGIL NOT ENDED UNTIL JURY GOES TO BED

MANY DRAMATIC MOMENTS IN LONG TRIAL GIVE THE CROWD THRILLS

COME EARLY, STAY LATE, AND SOME GO HUNGRY

Interest in Other Cities Apparently Scarcely Less Than in Wichita Falls

"Sh-h-h. There they are, now."

The "murder fans" hushed their conversation and stared. Many stood up to get a better view of defendant's wife and her daughters, who were entering the courtroom, and everybody wanted a look. Amid a silence that was appalling the crowd as it worked their way up the crowded aisle and took seats inside the rail.

For a few moments the "fans" craned their necks to see. Then the buzz of conversation resumed and grew in volume. It was during the recess that preceded the delivery of the court's charge, and there was nothing for the crowd to do but talk as it waited.

The trial, which was drawing to its final stage Friday morning, furnished diversion for record-breaking crowds. At no time from the beginning of evidence until the district attorney had closed his dramatic plea was there a vacant seat or a square foot of unoccupied standing room. The "fans" started gathering in the morning with the break of dawn, to come late and grow in volume. It was during the recess that preceded the delivery of the court's charge, and there was nothing for the crowd to do but talk as it waited.

Interest is widespread. The interest that Wichita Falls folk exhibited was manifested elsewhere throughout the state. Newspapers in other cities published reports of the trial under headlines as conspicuous as those of the local papers. The wide acquaintance of the defendant, the prominence of his position and his great personal popularity made the trial one of exceptional interest.

Mrs. Culbertson had been subpoenaed as a witness, and for that reason was "under the rule," which forbade her being present in the courtroom while evidence was being taken. Consequently, she did not get a sight of her until she entered the courtroom after the evidence was all in. She remained in the courtroom during the argument, and her apparent desire to challenge remarks made by counsel for the defense furnished dramatic moments for the onlookers.

Of scarcely less interest was the presence of Mrs. Ernestine Porter Lamar and her baby. The crowd knew, though the jury perhaps did not, her story.

Much "rough stuff." But the story of the killing, and the chapters leading up to it, were sufficiently charged with thrills to keep the interest of the crowd up, without needing to center that interest in individuals who spoke a "rough" story, with many incidents, and much language quoted, to furnish joints to the sensibilities of the modern and ancient alike. From the standpoint of the crowd, it was the sort of story that was worth getting up early and undergoing discomfort to hear. And they heard it.

Announcement of the noon recess would see few seats vacated, and those for only a few seconds. Some brought lunches with them; others patronized vendors of refreshments. Some went hungry. None surrendered their seats.

The argument was heard with even more interest than the evidence. Evidence is circumscribed by technical bounds, and the argument lent a witness can't tell what he thinks, but a lawyer can—and usually does.

Out-of-Town Attorneys. Three of those who spoke to the jury were strangers to the "fans," being out-of-town attorneys. C. E. Triplett, of Graham, law partner of District Attorney Schenck; E. A. Simpson, of Claremont, an over-seas comrade of the defendant and a speaker of tremendous lung power and much oratorical ability; and A. S. Owsley of Denton, veteran of the Texas bar, long active in politics, father of the national commander of the American Legion, had not been heard in Wichita Falls before in recent years. John Davenport, Dan Boone, and Walter Schenck, most of the crowd had heard before.

Each of the speakers seemed to realize the significance of the occasion, and each did his best. Friends of the local attorneys said that each had made one of the best talks of his career.

For the crowd, the address of Judge Owsley was of the most interest.

Wichitan Pushing Claim to Immense Estate in Which He Hopes to Obtain Share

C. O. Walton of 1902 Grant, who went to New York city some time ago on matters in connection with the \$500,000 Bogardus estate, of which he is among the claimants, is expected back in Wichita Falls shortly. Mr. Walton is understood to be obtaining data showing himself to be one of the rightful heirs to the immense estate, the story of which outdoes the most romantic fiction.

The claim of the numerous heirs, some of whom have already established kinship, is based upon the will of Anika Jane, daughter of William of Orange. When she married a commoner of Holland, Everardus Bogardus of Amsterdam, her father's displeasure made it necessary for her to leave Holland, and she and her husband moved to New York, where Bogardus became rector of a New York church, and the father related toward his daughter before he died, the story goes and left her a considerable fortune. Bogardus went to Holland to get it, and was drowned while crossing the Atlantic. The widow married her husband's successor as rector, named Brower.

When Mrs. Brower died she left an estate of 100 acres of farm land just north of Baxter point, and now occupied by a portion of New York's financial district. Before her death she granted a 99-year lease on this property, with instructions that at the end of that time the property should be divided among the heirs.

The will was lost. The heirs forgot about the matter. New York grew and magnificent, costly buildings appeared, as time rolled by, on the widow's 100 acres.

Several years ago the city of New York, wishing a portion of the land for subway construction, discovered that the occupants of the land did not own it; then the truth about the lease came to light.

Last May the will was found in an old trunk in a farmhouse in Can, Pa., by a Dutch farmer, William Schreff. How it got there nobody knows. Then the descendants started coming forward. The will was pronounced valid by the courts, but that of course did not clear up the matter entirely.

Several descendants live in Buffalo and have provided, under their claims, Mrs. William Good, Mrs. Joseph Lee, Mrs. Ernest F. Kelsey, Mrs. Ida Melody and Mrs. Sullman. Pratt are among those who seem to have established their right to share in the immense fortune.

Mr. Walton hopes to be able to also validate his claim.
