NEUTRALS WILL BE MADE TO FEEL PINCH OF RUHR OCCUPATION

STEPS TO THIS END ARE BEING TAKEN BY GERMAN OFFICIALS.
Cancel Coal Contracts with Neutral Nations
Less Coal Will Be Mined and Unemployment Will Be Increased.

CANCEL COAL CONTRACTS WITH NEUTRAL NATIONS

BRUSSELS, Feb. 22.—Steps to make the effect of the occupation of the Ruhr felt by neutral countries have been taken by German officials as part of the passive resistance program, according to information in the hands of the French. At a meeting in Bruchem attended by the coal-mine officials of the entire district it was decided to cancel all coal contracts with Holland, Switzerland and other neutral countries. It is stated that the mining officials agreed that they would supply only the local needs of the Ruhr district hereafter. This means that much less coal will be mined and unemployment will be increased.

JOINT PENITENTIARY COMMITTEE FAILS TO REACH AN AGREEMENT

AUSTIN, Feb. 22.—The joint penitentiary re-location committee of the legislature last night failed to reach an agreement on a report regarding relocating the prison system and today members of the committee were asked to answer questionnaires regarding various questions connected with the relocation work. Chairman Claude Teer said the questionnaires will be the basis for summarizing the opinions of the various members and the committee will hold another session tonight to attempt to draw up its conclusions. It has been indicated that the committee will favor a location in Central Texas rather than an East Texas state farm as recommended by Governor Neff.

WASHINGTON WOMAN IS ACQUITTED BY JURY CHARGE LIQUOR SALE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—Mrs. Elizabeth J. Hecht, who was arrested several weeks ago by police and prohibition agents in a raid on her apartment in a fashionable section of Washington, was acquitted by a jury last night on charges of selling and illegal possession of liquor. Police charged liquors found in her apartment had been obtained through a legation here. A man who said he was the minister of a Central American republic was in her apartment at the time of the raid.

MUTILATED BODY FOUND IN SNOW IN ILLINOIS IS NOT FULLY IDENTIFIED

CHICAGO, Feb. 22.—The mutilated body of a slain man, held at the morgue in Geneva, Ill., for 10 days for possible identification, today again was without a name, although nearly a dozen persons had given it two—those of Daniel Floyd Hawkins of Chicago, and Charles Lancaster, also of Chicago.
Robert D. Hawkins of Kalamazoo, Mich., father of Edward Floyd Hawkins, reported missing from his Chicago residence, after carefully viewing the body last night, failed to identify it as his son, although other persons had expressed positive belief that it was Hawkins. "Friends of Lancaster, who disappeared two days prior to the finding of the body in a snow bank near Geneva yesterday, failed in their attempt at identification."

SELF RELIANCE AND SELF CONTROL ARE IDEAL OF AMERICA

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Feb. 22.—The ideal of America is the building up of self-reliance and self-control among her citizens, Vice President Coolidge said today at a Lenten service here in observance of Washington's birthday. Under the American system of government, he declared, the individual must stand on his own feet. "It cannot be denied," he said, "that there are dangerous tendencies, the fact that one great simple broke down is not to be ignored. But self-government did not break down."
Great stress was laid on the fact that the American citizen must be self-reliant and self-controlled. "The example of Washington," he said, "will never be outgrown, for the wisdom of the principles which he advanced and established does not change. He was a great exponent of the moral force of the world of his time."
"It is because of his increasing power to inspire and lead that he still speaks to us, writes of him and hears of him, it is well that he still inspires the school, the editorial man and the pupil."

MRS. JOHN A. LOGAN DIES AT HOME IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—Mrs. John A. Logan, widow of the general who at one time during the civil war commanded the union army of Tennessee, and later was United States senator from Illinois, died here today of influenza after a 10 day illness.
Mrs. Logan was 84 years old. She was married in 1858, her husband coming to Washington two years later as a member of the house of representatives. During the civil war she frequently visited him at the battle front and was active in relief work among the wounded. Since her husband's death in 1884, Mrs. Logan had written extensively on civil war happenings and other historical matters. She was a world wide traveler and collected a valuable group of war souvenirs as a memorial to her son, Major John A. Logan, who was killed in the battle in the Philippines in 1899.
Against the advice of her physician, Mrs. Logan attended a Lincoln birthday memorial service on February 12 and exposing to what time is believed to have resulted in her death.

SCHOOLS TO CELEBRATE WASHINGTON'S BIRTHDAY

DALLAS, Feb. 22.—Washington's birthday anniversary will be observed by more than 100 schools of Texas as national citizenship day. The Interscholastic Citizenship League, with headquarters in Dallas, reported. The schools, as well as clubs and other organizations in Texas and the southwest, are planning a program of observance. It is the plan of the league to establish Washington's birthday as a national holiday. The program to be observed by all states.
As part of the program, school children will compete in a story contest on the subject of "The Higher Penalty of Speeding." A prize of a number of books to the school whose representative is awarded first place and a book to the author of the prize-winning story are offered. The object of which is to impress the children with the carelessness in automobile speeding, both on the part of drivers and pedestrians. Another contest is for the best 200 word tribute to the American flag.

LIEUT. COLONEL LANHAM SUICIDES AT MANILA

MANILA, Feb. 22.—Lieut. Col. Charles I. Lanham of the army finance department in the Philippines, committed suicide today by shooting according to an announcement from army headquarters.
Lieut. Col. Lanham had been in poor health for some time. His widow survives him.

FORMER MINISTER FOREIGN AFFAIRS FOR FRANCE DIES

PARIS, Feb. 22.—Theophile Delcasse, former minister of foreign affairs, died suddenly at Nice last evening.
He left his hotel during the day to convey his sympathy to Minister of Marine Ribbert on the occasion of the death of the minister's mother. After this visit M. Delcasse, apparently in good health, returned to the hotel where he had been passing several months. Death came suddenly in the course of the evening.
Delcasse's ministry lasted, however, little more than 27 months. In October, 1915, he resigned the foreign affairs portfolio as a result of criticism directed against him because Germany had so badly beaten him in diplomatic negotiations with the Balkans.
French and English diplomacy was rather slow in realizing the German plan of securing an ally in the Balkans, which finally evoked in the Bulgarians joining the central powers.

INFERNAL MACHINES FOR OPPOSITION LEADER IN BUDAPEST PARLIAMENT

BUDAPEST, Feb. 22.—Infernal machines were received yesterday by the opposition leader, in parliament, Herr Fia, and Deputy Bessay, editor of the opposition newspaper. Being nervous of the parcels they called in experts. Each parcel contained a bomb and a card bearing the words "Hearty Greetings from the Committee of One Hundred and One."
The news of the attempt on the life of the deputy caused a storm of indignation in the national assembly. There is no trace of those responsible for sending the bombs.

SHERRIFF GOES TO KANSAS AFTER MAN HELD THERE

Sheriff Murphy left Wednesday evening for Parsons, Kansas, to bring back a man who was arrested there on information furnished by agents of this county in connection with the disappearance of a car from the streets of the city. Washington's Platonic Love For Friend's Wife Throws New Light on Character

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 22.—For over two centuries the romance that powerfully swayed the character and destiny of George Washington has remained obscure. Eugene E. Prussing, a noted authority on Washington, has reconstructed the romance from documents and fragments collected in eight years of intensive research.

"We have," he said, "no convincing published evidence of Washington's interest in any other woman from the time he was 17 until he married Martha Custis at 27, although there are the susceptible years of any man's life."

"The story of his affection for Sally Cary Fairfax is the true one. It is attested by his own letters of that time and is confirmed by one he wrote 40 years later to the object of his professed love."

"When the full story can be published it will add greatly to Washington's reputation as a man."

As a young man, survivor, Washington went to live for a time with the Fairfaxes at Belvoir, George William Fairfax, his companion on many trails, was 22, his wife 18, and a toasted belle of the colony.

Mrs. Fairfax spurred Washington's interest in literature and history and provided his ambition. Through this propinquity to a graceful, vivacious woman, Washington quickly developed a platonic affection, as his letters indicate—only to be confessed in writing in an hour of peril and loneliness on the eve of a military campaign.

Then came his renunciation and his marriage to the widow of Daniel Parke Custis and 49 years of happy wedded life.

The two families lived in full neighborhood for 14 years, when the Fairfaxes removed to England. And once more, in mellowed sentiment, far down the sunset years, Washington advertises in the young hearts race beside the Potomac.

"At all times," said Prussing, "Washington's devotion was without reproach. The story of it gives testimony of sound magnanimity of an ardent nature to match his glorious greatness."

"The point of the whole episode is that while Sally Fairfax rocked his heart and held him enthralled for 19 years, she did not upset his character."

Reconstructing George Washington's personality and activities by inspecting records in 50 counties in seven states, Prussing presents an entirely new picture of him in his forthcoming volume, "The Estate of George Washington, Deceased."

"The story of Washington's love and faithfulness," said Prussing, "as well as the story of his business affairs, will appeal powerfully to the present generation, to whom the real flesh-and-blood Washington, a gentleman without peer, is practically unknown."

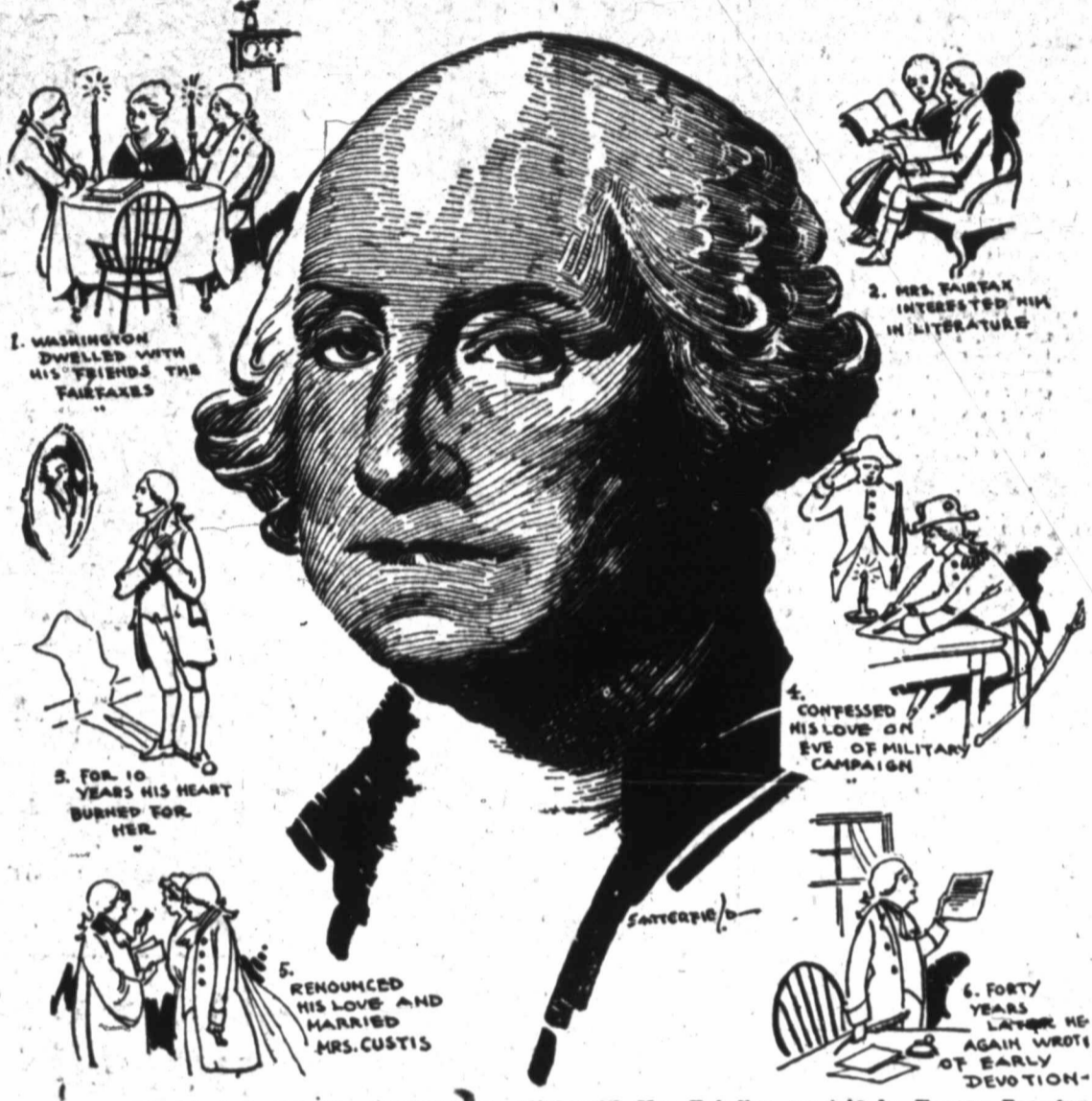

GEORGE WASHINGTON WARNS FLAPPERS THEY'LL DIE OLD MAIDS

OUNT VERNON, VA., Feb. 22.—George Washington was interviewed today by NEA Service for The Times on many subjects ranging from flappers to the League of Nations.

"What do you think will become of the flapper?" he was asked on this, the one hundred and ninety-first anniversary of his birth.

"It would be a great departure from the truth," he answered, "with careful consideration. To say that it rarely happens otherwise than that a thorough-paced coquet dies in celibacy as a punishment for her attempts to mislead others by encouraging looks, words or actions given for no other purpose than to draw men on to make overtures." (Letter to Eleanor Parke Custis, Jan. 16, 1795.)

"But why should a flapper die a spinster?" he was pressed. "Why shouldn't she propose?"

"The declaration (of love), without the most indirect invitation of yours (the girl's), must proceed from the man, to render it permanent and valuable," he insisted. (Same letter as above.)

"But suppose a girl is tremendously in love and the man seems slow to..."

"The general interrupted impatiently.

"Love is said to be an involuntary passion," he said, "and it is, therefore, contended that it cannot be resisted. This is true in part only; Love may, and therefore ought, to be under the guidance of reason." (Same letter as above.)

"Do you advise early marriage for flappers?" he asked.

"Care and will be insuperable obstacles, in my opinion, to marriage." (Letter to Benedict Calvert, April 3, 1782.)

"Still sticking to flappers, what do you think of bobbed hair and short skirts?" the interviewer pressed.

"His gesture indicated his opposition.

"And Mrs. Washington's wishes coincide with my own," he said, "as to simplicity of dress and everything which can tend to support propriety of character, without partaking of the follies of luxury and ostentation." (Letter to Mrs. Catherine M. Graham, Jan. 9, 1796.)

"What about bootlegging?"

"He referred to his use of the army in 1794 to put down the Whiskey Rebellion, and added: "If the laws are to be so trampled upon with impunity, and a minority is to dictate to the majority, there is an end put to republican government." (Letter to Charles M. Thurston, Aug. 19, 1794.)

"Washington admitted liking a glass of beer or Madeira wine, but "Rum," he declared, "is the bane of morals and the parent of idleness." (Letter to Count de Moustier, Dec. 15, 1788.)

"General, do you believe in the League of Nations?"

"The great rule of conduct for us in regard to foreign nations is, in extending our commercial relations, to have with them as little political connection as possible." (Farewell address, Sept. 17, 1796.)

"To be prepared for war," he said, "is one of the most effectual means of preserving peace. A free people ought not only to be armed, but disciplined." (Speech to Congress, Jan. 8, 1790.)

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PRICE ADVANCES IN PROSPECT.

The price of steel is going up. Cotton and cotton goods are already high. A Kansas City agricultural expert predicts that corn will sell for a dollar a bushel next fall and that the price of wheat will advance.

If steel and cotton and wheat and corn advance in price we can expect a general advance practically all down the line. Indeed, merchants tell us that such an advance is already under way.

When prices advance there is generally great activity, that is, up to a certain point, and that point is when the public quits buying. That is what happened in 1920. The fly in the ointment in the present outlook is that the advance won't have far to go until it reaches the point where the buyers struck in 1920. INCOME TAX FACTS

No. 24

The Bureau of Internal Revenue has at its command innumerable sources of information for checking up delinquents. Under the "information at source" provisions of the revenue act returns of information are required by all persons, trustees, guardians, fiduciaries, and by corporations, partnerships, and organizations, and officers and employees of the United States who pay or receive during the calendar year 1922 \$1,000 or more.

Income to be reported includes interest, rent, premiums, salaries, and all fixed and determinable income. Separate returns are required for each employee whose salary for 1922 was \$1,000 or more is required of employers. Special attention is directed to the requirements that partnerships in addition to filing a regular partnership return on form 1065, shall file an information return showing the salaries paid each member of the partnership.

Payment for overtime fees, commissions, bonuses, shares in the profits of a business, and other items, which are board and lodging furnished as part payment for services should be included in the total salary paid. Banks and other financial institutions are required to report interest paid or credited to a depositor if the total during the year equaled or exceeded \$1,000.

Returns of information are filed on form 1099, Form 1098, on which must be shown the number of separate returns, serves as a letter of transmittal. Information returns must be filed with the commissioner of internal revenue, sorting section, Washington, D. C. Collectors of internal revenue are not authorized to receive these returns.

The period for filing is from January 1 to March 15, 1923. Information returns are carefully checked with individual returns by the commissioner of internal revenue. Returns reported on an information return is omitted, quick action by the board of internal revenue follows. Thousands of delinquents, and additional taxes aggregating hundreds of thousands of dollars, have been discovered as the result of this audit.

SENATE HAS PASSED CODIFICATION BILL ENACTED IN HOUSE

The committee recommends that the senate investigate recent text book awards also named as follows: Darwin, Howers and Witt.

Action on the Jones "truth in fabric" bill which has received considerable attention, was postponed until next house bill day because of absence of senators interested in the measure.

In addition to several local bills passed and engrossed by the senate, the Stewart house bill relating to directors of water improvement districts, was finally passed. The Davis bill relating to the appointment of deputies in justice precincts, and McMillin bill on independent executors were engrossed as was the Clark bill making it an offense to report incorrect readings of light and water meters.

The senate refused to adjourn until tomorrow morning in view of the fact that today is Washington's birthday and recessed until this afternoon. It is planned to have some ceremony in honor of the first president this afternoon. All state departments were closed today.

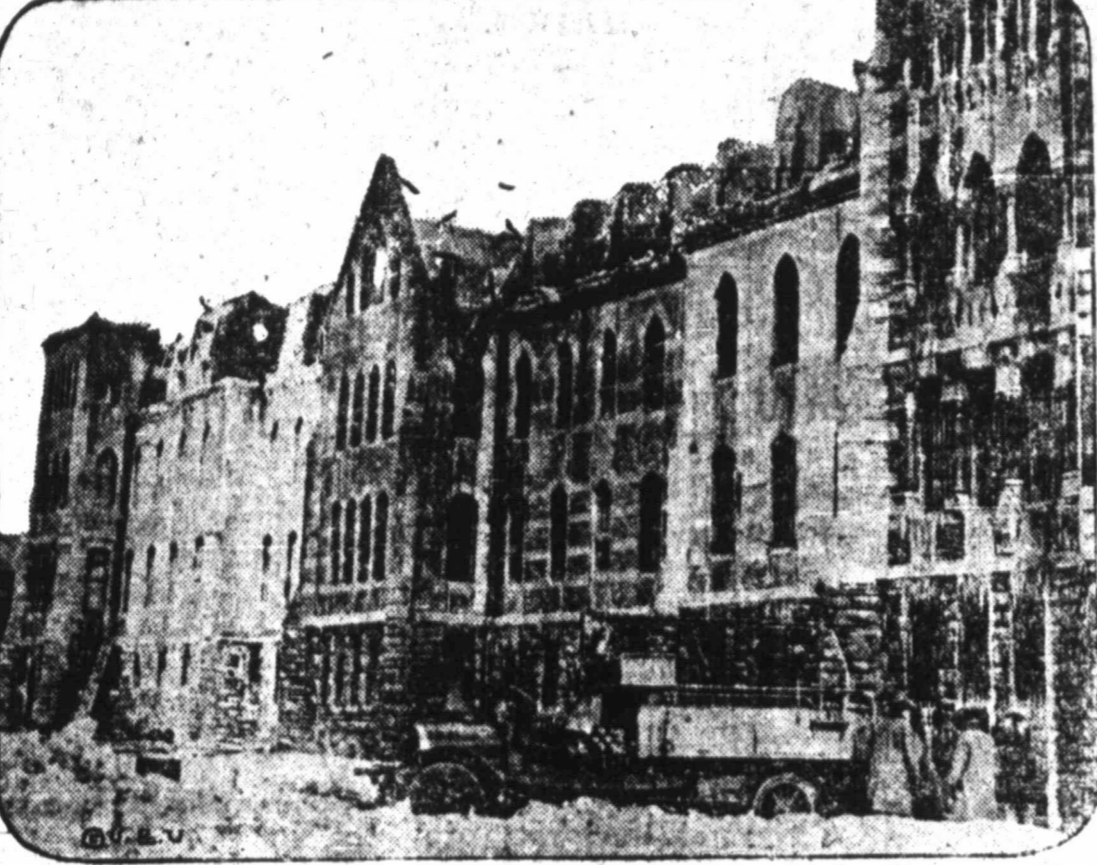

Alleged Purposes of Klan.
The alleged purposes of the Ku Klux Klan are set forth in the petition in the following terms:

(1) Subversion of visible government into a mendacious invisibility where corrupt and unpatriotic men and women (unrestrained by law or morals) may possess and exert great power over the lives and liberties of the people, the erection of a super-government wherein the governed have no voice of representation in the ordaining or execution of the secret laws and decrees clandestinely established for their control, such super-government being operated by its decrees executed, primarily against citizens who are not members of the Ku Klux Klan and for the wrongful protection of members of the Ku Klux Klan in their immoral and lawless practices.

(2) Entrustment of commerce and industry and restriction of the fruits and benefits thereof to favored groups of avaricious confederates.

(3) Prostitution of the Christian religion and defeat of its blessed atavisms.

The Klan, the petition further declared, fraudulently professed adherence to activities, practices and creeds, many "unobjectionable and worthy of commendation" in order to secure members. The petition then proceeded to charge that the following specific things are sought by the Klan:

(A) To seduce and defile the public conscience and character by teaching and encouraging men to lie, perjure and false swear.

"With money gifts and insidious flatteries, corrupting ministers of religion, enticing them away from the preaching of Christ and Him crucified" to the worldly forums of partisan politics, to the support of lawlessness and to encroachments of hatreds, bickerings and back bitings.

"Generating in and from racial and religious characteristics, unreasoning prejudice, sinful passions and avaricious ambitions."

"Breeding and developing, through practices, precept and example, widespread disrespect for duly constituted authority and public discontent with restraint of law."

"Placing and maintaining in positions of power and responsibility (in and out of said organizations) men and women of dissolute and degraded character."

"Establishing and seeking to establish multimethod commercial and industrial boycotts and social discrimination and ostracisms."

Say Constitution Involed.
(B) To impair and destroy, defeat and evade each and all of the various provisions of the constitution of the United States and of the constitution of the several states drawn from the experience and wisdom of mankind and ordained and established to secure:

(a) The equality of all men before law; (b) the right to life, liberty and property and the general pursuit of happiness; and (c) freedom of thought and conscience in matters of religion; and for the accomplishment of such purposes, the conspirators have caused and encouraged and contributed to cause (in Texas and in other states):

Search for Man Brains Behind Big Theft of Bonds

WARREN, MASS., Feb. 22.—With Frank L. Taylor, president of the First National Bank of Warren, under arrest in Chicago, local authorities today turned their attention to a search for Joseph B. Marcino, alleged to be the brains behind the disappearance of \$12,000 in bonds and securities from the bank vaults.

ARRESTED IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Feb. 22.—Frank L. Taylor, president of the First National Bank of Warren, Mass., today was under arrest here and detectives awaited the arrival of his wife.

Meanwhile a search was being conducted for Abraham Goldman of Chicago, owner of the controlling interest in the institution, and Joseph B. Marcino, his son-in-law, who was said to have purchased a controlling interest in the Merchants and Mechanics Bank of Philadelphia, and the Niagara Life Insurance Company of Buffalo, N. Y.

Taylor's story to detectives here indicated the operation of those concerned were interwoven, the Merchants and Mechanics Bank, which failed last week, then working of \$120,000 being the depository for the insurance funds of the Niagara Insurance Company.

Only scattered scraps of the life history of Taylor and Marcino, also called Marcino, were available here, but Marcino was declared to have come as an immigrant from Italy, and was a barber in a South Main Street shop.

The immigrant barber is said to have soon blossomed into a tonsor and genius who indulged in verbal flights as he honed and stropped and shaved his customers.

So convincing were his stories, it is said, that he soon attracted the interest of wealthy Italian patrons of the shop. Some of these patrons took to back him financially and through these friends he was said to have been elected a director of the old Atlas bank on the west side.

Through his new connections Marcino met and married a daughter of Goldman, a direct descendant to have supplied Marcino with money for some of his later more ambitious ventures.

WOULD LIKE TO SEE FORD OPERATE PLANT WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—Secretary Hoover told the house appropriations committee considering the third deficiency appropriations bill that he favored the movement of Muscle Shoals for making nitrates, and that he was against government operation of the plant.
