

As a young frontier surveyor, Washington went to live for a time Washington went to live for a time with the Fairfaxes at Belyoir. George William Fairfax, his com-panion on many trails, was 22, his wife 18, and a toasted belle of the

colony.

Mrs. Fairfax spurred Washington's interest in literature and history and prodded his ambition.

Through this propinquity to a grathrough this propinquity to a gra-tious, vivacious woman, Washing-ion quickly developed a mute, hope-less affection, as his letters indi-cate—only to be confessed in writ-ing in an hour of peril and loneli-ness on the eve of a military cam-baign!

Then came his renunciation and his marriage to the widow of Daniel Parke Custis and 40 years

of happy wedded life.
The two families lived in full neighborliness for 14 years, when the Fairfaxes removed to England. And once more, in mellowed senti-ment, far down the sunset years, Washington adverts in a letter to Sally Fairfax to the time when young hearts raced beside the Po-tomac.

GEORGE WASHINGTON WARNS FLAPPERS THEY'LL DIE OLD MAIDS

OUNT VERNON, VA., Feb. 22.—George Washington was interviewed today by NEA Service for The Times on many subjects ranging from flappers to he League of Nations. "What do you think will become of the flap-per?" he was asked, on this, the one hundred and ninety-first anniversary of his birth.

"It would be a great departure from the truth," as answered, with careful consideration, "to say hat it rarely happens otherwise than that a thorough-paced coquet dies in celibacy, as a punish-ment for her attempts to misled others by encourag-ing looks, words or actions given for no other pur-pose than to draw men on to make overtures." (Let-

rose than to draw men on to make overtures. (Letter to Eleanor Parke Custis, Jan. 16, 1795.)

"But why should a flapper die a spinster?" he was pressed. "Why shouldn't she propose?"

"The declaration (of love), without the most indirect invitation of yours (the girl's), must proceed from the man, to render it permanent and valuable." he insisted. (Same letter as above.) But suppose a girl is tremendously in love and the man seems

The general interrupted impatiently.

"Love is said to be an involuntary passion," he said, "and it is, therefore, contended that it cannot be resisted. This is true in part only: Love may, and therefore ought, to be under the guidance of rea-(Same letter as above.)

"Do you advise early marriage for flappers"

"Youth, inexperience and unripened education," he replied thoughtfully, care and will be insuperable obstacles, in my opinion, to mar-(Letter to Benedict Calvert, April 3, 1793. "Still sticking to flapperism, what do you think of bobbed hair and short skirts?" the interviewer pressed. His gesture indicated his opposition.

"And Mrs. Washington's wishes coincide with my own," he said, "as to simplicity of dress and everything which can tend to support propriety of character, without partaking of the follies of luxury and ostentation." (Letter to Mrs. Catherine M. Graham, Jan. 9, 1790.)

"What about bootlegging?"

He referred to his use of the army in 1794 to put down the Whiskey Rebellion, and added: "If the laws are to be so trampled upon with impunity, and a minority is to dictate to the majority, there's an end ut to republican government." (Letter to Charles M. Thurston, Aug.

Washington admitted liking a glass of beer or Madeira wine, but "Rum," he declared, "is the bane of morals and the parent of idleness." (Letter to Count de Moustier, Dec. 15, 1788.)

"General, do you believe in the League of Nations—"



Denison Herald: Since the present legislative session began approximately one thousand bills have been introduced and referred to proper committees. To the thoughtful man this number of proposals to enact new laws or change existing statutes may seem out of all proportion. And, when we examine proportion. And, when we examine the law books and take stock of the vast number of laws we now have for the government of man as well as for the regulation and control of property rights, it would seem that every phase of human endeavor has been covered and that no occasion exists for new legislation or for any radical changes to be made in laws now in force. However, with each blemuial session of the lawmaking ody, we have practically the same number of propositions finding their way into the legislative hop per before the session is well spent. It is difficult to understand, sometimes, how the mind of the average lawmaker manages to think up the varied subjects which, in his judgment calls for legislative ac-And were it left to the lawmaker alone, it is reasonably cer-tain that the number of proposi-tions would easily be requed one-Which is to say that not all of the bills proposed represent the original thought of the members. The fact is that while our legislais composed of three—one some-times referred to as the third house. This branch which has become quite distinctive and exercises much influence is that portion of the lawmaking power which sits in the galleries and conducts its campaign from that vantage point. It is the all-powerful lobby, with its presence in both state and national legislative halls, that is doing more to load the status books with unload the statute books with unnecessary and, oftentimes, unrea-sonable laws than the members themselves would be able to think themselves would be able to think of in a decade. The special interests, therefore, are responsible for the floodtide of legislative proposals that first and last, encumber the calendar at every session. Each organization, or individual if a selfish purpose is to be promoted, hikes to Austin or to Washington with bills prepared covering the particular thought in mind and a member is quickly secured to father the idea. Were this plan not followed it be a physical impossibility for the members to draft the mea-sures themselves and the number introduced would be cut at least one-half. And after the measure has been read and referred then th real work of the interest to be af-fected begins. He attends the committee meeting and submits argu-ment in support of the proposition And if it comes out with favorable report it is followed up by persons woted on and goes to the govfor members to study and digest al the bills introduced.
