Destined to Be One of the Big Questions Before New Lawmakers

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—The proposed consolidation of the army and navy under one cabinet head, as contemplated under the governmental reorganization plan, is destined to be one of the big questions which the sixty-fifth congress will have to settle.

The consolidation of the army and navy under a department of national defense, which has been suggested by the president but privately they speak with candor. It is their belief that congress will never accept the proposal.

Under the plan suggested there will be a secretary of national defense and an assistant secretary for the army and another assistant for the navy. Thus in routine matters the two departments will function very much as they do now but in questions of policy the secretary will determine.

It is that which the trained men of the army and navy believe render the plan unworkable. They claim that on questions of defensive policy the army and navy are constant rivals and should this plan be adopted the secretary would be almost sure to favor one as against the other. Then, they claim, there would be alternate development in four-year periods for one branch of the service over another.

The principal advantage claimed for the proposed consolidation is that enormous savings would be effected; that there would be closer co-operation in the purchase of supplies. This is answered by critics of the Brown plan. They say that the army and navy are now working in closest harmony from an economic standpoint. They insist that the proposed system would be a failure.

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Take 26 In Raid On Fashionable Resort City of Washington

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—More than 70 men, most of them in evening clothes and presenting other evidence of social standing, were surprised by the police today in a raid on an alleged gambling resort in the fashionable northwest section of Washington, near the Metropolitan Club. Twenty-six of the men were taken to police headquarters where they were held with their hands cuffed and their pockets searched. The police were unable to locate the proprietor of the resort, but they were able to identify the men as being members of the city's elite.

The raid was part of a larger operation to crack down on gambling in the city. The police were looking for evidence of a large-scale gambling operation that had been reported to exist in the area.

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LEUDER AND DEVER ARE NOMINATED IN CHICAGO PRIMARY

CHICAGO, Feb. 23.—Arthur C. Leuder, postmaster, will be the Republican party's standard bearer against Judge William C. E. Dever, Democrat, in the mayoralty election next April.

City council seats for 30 wards were filled, while candidates in 20 wards failed of majorities and the two highest in each will contest at the April election.

Support generally understood to have been behind Mayor Thompson's re-election.

Mayor Thompson himself ceased to be a public principal when he recently refused to stand for re-election for a third time after three Republican

SEVEN APPOINTEES TO BE REFERRED TO SENATE THURSDAY

AUSTIN, Feb. 23.—The names of the seven appointees held up in the executive session of the senate yesterday probably will go before the senate tomorrow for confirmation or rejection without further examination. Chairman Floyd of the nominations committee declared today. He said he did not intend to call a further meeting of the nominations committee although it had been planned to examine the seven appointees further regarding their affiliations with secret organizations.

Four of Governor Neff's appointees were before the nominations committee yesterday and were questioned at length regarding their affiliations with the Ku Klux Klan. J. S. Myers, labor commissioner, and Adjutant General Barton were among those whose names were held up at the executive session. State Health Officer W. H. Beasley and Tax Commissioner John G. Willacy are two appointees who have not yet been before the committee.

FORT WORTH MAN TELLS OF PLAN OF SWINDLING GANG

DETAILS HOW HE WAS VICTIM TO THE AMOUNT OF \$54,787.75

LURED TO BUCKET SHOP AND ALLOWED TO WIN

Twenty on Trial at Denver In Connection With Operations of Gang

DENVER, COLO., Feb. 23.—Frank Donovan of Fort Worth, Texas, testifying at the trial of 20 men charged with being members of a nationwide ring of confidence men, detailed how he was swindled out of \$54,787.75 by the gang in Denver in August, 1921.

Donovan, who is 71 years old, formerly lived in New Orleans and is a former Mississippi levee contractor.

Donovan testified that he met a man named J. W. Bagby in a park at Colorado Springs and came with him to Denver. They walked up to the state capitol building, Donovan testified, where they met a stranger who was introduced to him under the name of "Buehring."

Donovan testified Bagby gave Buehring \$10. In a short time Buehring came back with \$20. Bagby then suggested, Donovan said, "Let's go over to the bucket shop and we'll make some money."

"First we played \$500 apiece," Donovan declared. "Buehring wrote out the tickets and gave us the money. Then we made a play of \$5,000 and won \$108,000 each."

The witness told how their credit was questioned and he explained that he would have to put up money to establish a credit before he could take his \$108,000 "winnings." Donovan told how he went to Louisiana and got \$5,000 in Liberty bonds.

"What kind of money did you take up to the bucket shop?" he was asked. "It was in \$100 bills," Donovan replied. "They told me I would have to have cash, so I sold my bonds."

"Who carried the money into the bucket shop?" "Bagby did. He made another bet and lost. He stole all my money," Donovan testified.

### 5 CITY CANDIDATES FILE PETITIONS FOR ELECTION IN APRIL

Five of the twelve names necessary for candidates in order to have their names on the ballot in the city election, have been announced by the office of the city clerk with the required number of signatures. Petitions received from candidates for the office of sanitary and park commissioner have been returned by J. A. Patton, R. L. Yates and Max Schmitt. Four other petitions of candidates who have announced for this office are not yet in the hands of the city clerk. Julian Montgomery, J. H. Whitlaw, P. P. Brannford and J. R. Richardson have not been filed.

### HAVE MONEY FOR ALL OUTSTANDING STATE WARRANTS

AUSTIN, Feb. 23.—For the first time since last September, the state general revenue fund went on a cash basis today. State Treasurer C. V. Terrell announced. A call for warrants amounting to more than \$1,000,000 was issued this morning and it was announced in the senate that the treasury has sufficient funds to meet all outstanding warrants. The balance in the general revenue fund today was nearly a million dollars, it was said. The deficiency in the general revenue fund has reached nearly \$2,000,000 at times during the past six months. The cash basis today was made possible by the receipt of more than a million dollars in taxes collected during the past two months.

### Vaccination for Small Pox First 2,000 Years Ago

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—The old adage that "there is nothing new under the sun" applies to medical science as well as other activities of mankind. The average layman, if asked, would say that vaccination against smallpox is a comparatively recent development and yet Dr. G. W. McCoy, director of the hygienic laboratory of the United States Public Health Service is authority for the statement that it is at least 2,000 years old, having been practiced intermittently during all that time.

"Investigations have established," says Dr. McCoy, "that inoculations against smallpox were practiced in India and China as early as 300 B. C. Later, when the disease reached Europe inoculation went with it as well as another method called 'smallpox,' during which a sick person was exposed to the disease with a view of catching it and if survived, he thereafter was immune.

"True inoculation," says Dr. McCoy, "what from vaccination as devised by Jenner, but the principle is the same and this principle was known and practiced long before the development of modern medicine.

"Estimates show that before the days of vaccination one-third of all persons died of smallpox. In the United States death rates from this cause range from two per thousand of population, as in Kansas, to one-tenth of a case per thousand, as in Maryland."

**EASTERN TEXAS RAILWAY COMPANY CASE MARCH 5**  
AUSTIN, Feb. 23.—The state's case against the Eastern Texas Railway Company has been set for hearing before the federal supreme court Monday, March 5, according to information received at the attorney general's department today.

Attorney General Keeling will leave Austin tonight to represent the state in the case which is an attempt to prevent the railroad company from removing its tracks and discontinuing service permanently.

Attorneys for the road conferred with state officials today and agreed to an amendment to the case substituting the names of the new railroad commissioners for the old.

### STEWART IS GUILTY SAYS JURY IN TRIAL KANSAS CITY COURT

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 23.—W. E. Stewart, charged with use of the mails to defraud in the sale of Texas land, was found guilty by a jury in the federal court here today. He was found guilty of all the 10 points in the indictment.

Federal Judge Arba S. Van Valkenburgh announced that he would impose sentence March 15. The sentence on all of the counts, he said, may be permitted to run consecutively.

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 23.—The jury in the case of W. E. Stewart, land dealer, continued its deliberations this afternoon. Shortly before noon Federal Judge Arba S. Van Valkenburgh called the jurors into court and asked if they had any report to make.

A. R. Duncan of Appleton City, Mo., foreman, replied that they had not reached an agreement. When asked if they differed on a point of law or a point of fact, the foreman said no question of law had been raised by any of the members. No hint was given as to how the jury stood.

At the same time the president named Frank W. Mondak, republican floor leader of the present house, to succeed Mr. Davis as a director of the war finance corporation.

### WEDNESDAY FINAL DAY TO PAY TAXES WITHOUT PENALTY

Prospects are bright for the collection of the necessary 80 per cent of the city taxes according to a statement from the office of the city tax collector Wednesday. At the close of the office Tuesday afternoon \$450,841.25 had been collected in city taxes. The sum represents 75.45 per cent of the total amount of city taxes assessed for the current year. Wednesday is the last day for the payment and in order to collect the 80 per cent, \$525,480 must be turned in at the tax collectors office.

Payment of school taxes has already exceeded the 80 per cent mark. Over \$268,500 has been collected. The office was busy all day Wednesday as city officials are hopeful of a minimum of delinquent taxes for the current year.

The 36-day extension granted by the council and board of education terminates Wednesday. Taxes will become delinquent on the first day of March.

### K. C. SOUTHERN IS OPPOSED TO MERGER OUTLINED BY I. C. C.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—An unqualified attack upon the theory, principle and details of tentative government plans for consolidation of railroads was placed before the I. C. C. today by the executive committee of the Kansas City Southern Railroad of which L. F. Loree is chairman.

For the Kansas City Southern, which the commission has proposed tentatively to unite with the Missouri Pacific and the Chicago and Eastern Illinois, the executive committee demanded "its right to be left alone to work out its own destiny in the light of its own experience, in its own way."

"The consolidation proposal is so socialistic in its tendencies," the committee continued, "so contrary to the genius of our institutions, so inimical to the protection afforded by the constitution, that it is not our purpose to discuss the matter from that point of view, believing that it cannot be successful in the light of the political embarrassment growing out of the war."

As the general plan, the commission has proposed for working out the consolidation scheme authorized by congress, the committee said that it was "impracticable and unworkable." In the consolidation proposal as it affects the Kansas City Southern, the committee contended that the point of "antislavery making a venture hazardous" in the extreme.

PLAINTIFF GIVEN JUDGMENT IN PARTNERSHIP SUIT  
E. E. Fuller and others were granted judgment against W. S. Robertson and others in a suit to close up a partnership. Judge Martin of the 89th district court, before whom the case was tried, rendered judgment in the amount of \$3,000.

The suit was the outgrowth of the making of a note in oil property developing. When the note came due, according to the plaintiffs, they paid off the full face of the instrument and brought suit to recover the pro rata part of the remaining partners.

ARDMORE, OKLA., Feb. 23.—Jeff Smith, Hialeah oil field worker, was acquitted of the murder of Joe Carroll, alleged bootlegger, by a jury in district court here at 2 o'clock today. The jury was out about two and a half hours. Smith's first trial several weeks ago resulted in a disagreement.

ARDMORE, OKLA., Feb. 23.—Judge W. F. Freeman late today overruled a motion by the state to dismiss charges of murder against six of nine well-known citizens in connection with the killing of Joe Carroll, alleged bootlegger, in December, 1921, and selection of a jury to try all nine was commenced.

Lack of evidence was assigned by the prosecution as the reason for wishing to drop the cases. After objection from the defense the court refused to investigate the law and later sustained the objections.

The men against whom charges would have been dropped are Dr. E. C. Harlow, W. L. Thilton, Dan Hildreth, G. C. Whitescharch, Frank Curdwell and Tom Hallen.






