How many realize that Britain became a democracy for the first time in 1917? Until then, the majority of its adult population had no voice in the making or administrating of the laws that ruled their lives.

It is the last word in cold storage, he said, and one, of the most modern houses in the United States has just been completed by the same produce company in Abl-lene. The local plant is being mod-eled after this one and as soon as it is completed the same system will he installed in the parent produce house in Fort. Worth, according to Mr. Keith. The question has now arisen among the interested citizens of the state of Texas—who in some degree have made a study of the fax question, why should there not be a penalty attached in cases of be a penalty attached in cases of such persons who do not make a rendition to-the county tax asses-sor and permit their pipperty to go on the unrendered , roll year after year?

after year?
This matter has been given careful consideration by a large number of people and it is apparent

ber of people and it is apparent that such a measure may be presented to the state legislature at its called session. This is not the only tax measure that is under consideration.

When property owners permit their property to be listed on the undrendered rolls, it means added expense to the state as the work required and the time spent is far greater than in cases where prop-

required and the time spent is far greater than in cases where property is rendered for taxation.

It has been suggested that should measure be passed which would place a penalty on those owners who either negligently or wilfully do not render their property for taxation, that the unrendered rolls in every county of the state would

be brought down in size to prac-tically nothing.

The suggestion which has been nade and which may be embodied in a measure which is under con-sideration, would place the valua-tion of such property not rendered at 25 per cent higher. The property so placed on the unrendered roll would be assessed against for taxes without recourse.

.Under the present system, own-ers who permit their property to be placed on the unrendered roll ran await with time and pleasure to see at what figure the assessor places the valuation at and if it suits all right and if not they have a better chance of getting it re-duced than do those who have tak-en the time of making a rendition. The matter as it now stands is unfair to the honest man who either takes the time to give his rendition to the assessor when he calls or takes the time to make a
