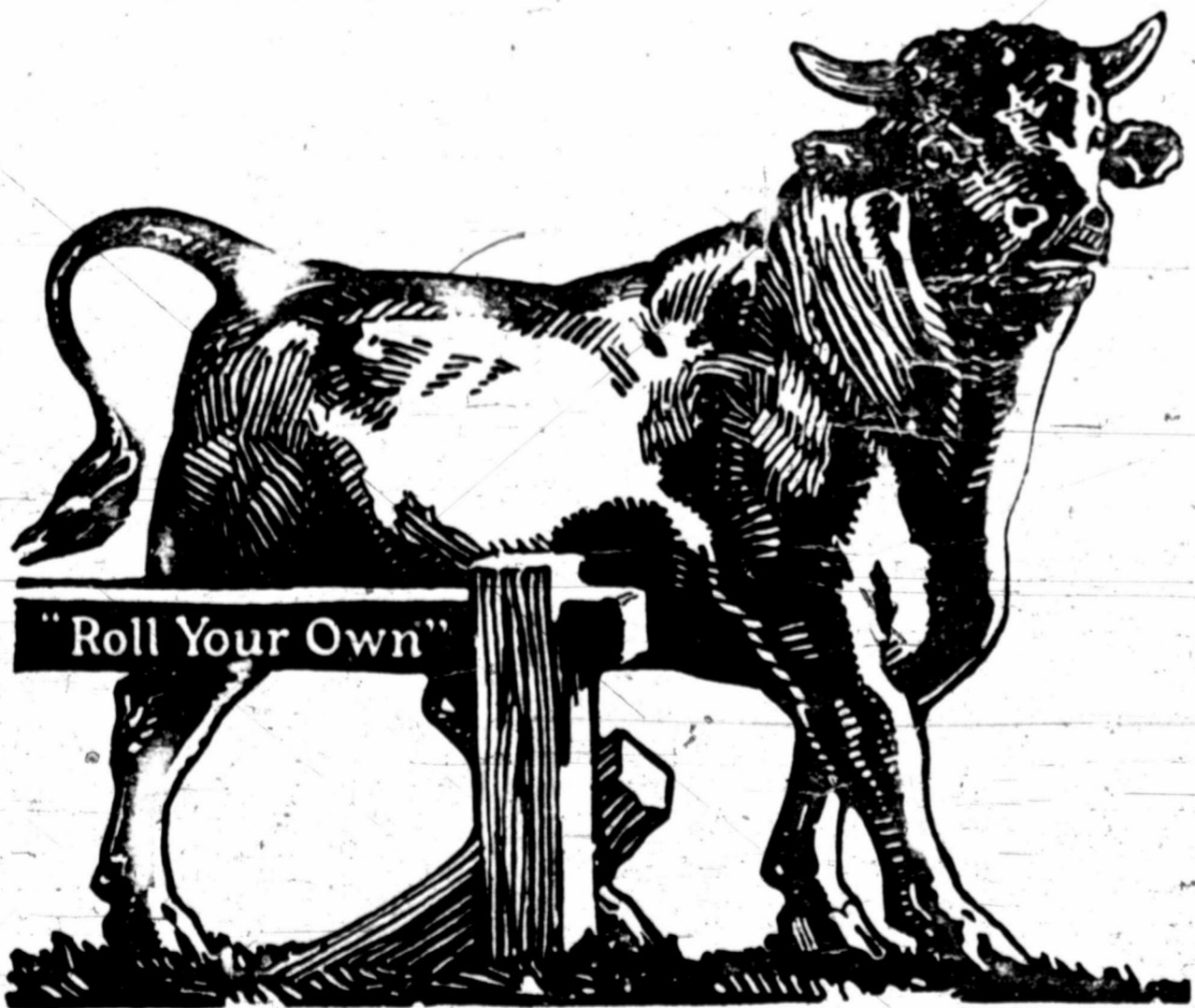

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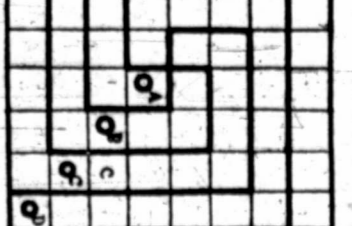

PAYMENT OF POLLS INDICATES TO MANY A HEAVY VOTE IN CITY ELECTION NINE OUT OF THE 12 BOXES ARE TOO LARGE

Tax Collector Concludes Work of Making Poll Lists for Precincts

The payment of 7,954 poll taxes by citizens of Wichita Falls this year is believed to be a record thus far unexcelled in any one year. 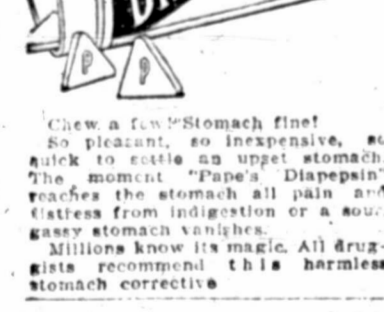

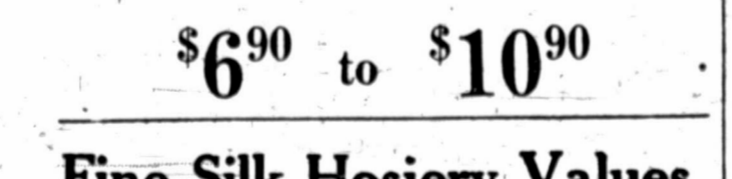

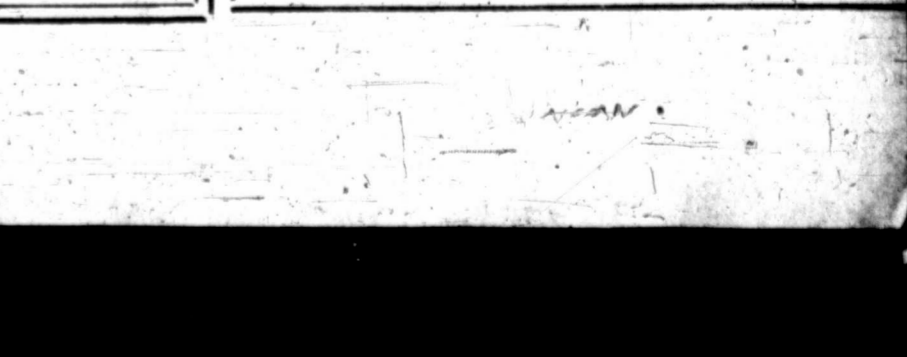

Flawless in her girlish perfection, Margot, the beautiful mannequin, has captivated the hearts of all the titled youth of London while performing her daily duties as a model in the establishment of Lady Duff-Gordon. But this is not her greatest achievement, although a perfectly natural one. She has gained the admiration of every woman who has seen her, sometimes dressed in the fashions of a bygone day

freedom, America! But Margot is not the sort of a girl who will jump at a chance to go to America when she has had a small success here. She wanted to go as an established Continental or British artist, not as just one of many. So, much to the surprise of the impresarios and Gilbert Miller, she stayed in London. For just at that time Lady Duff-Gordon appeared on the horizon. There was an opening in her establishment for the post of principal mannequin. 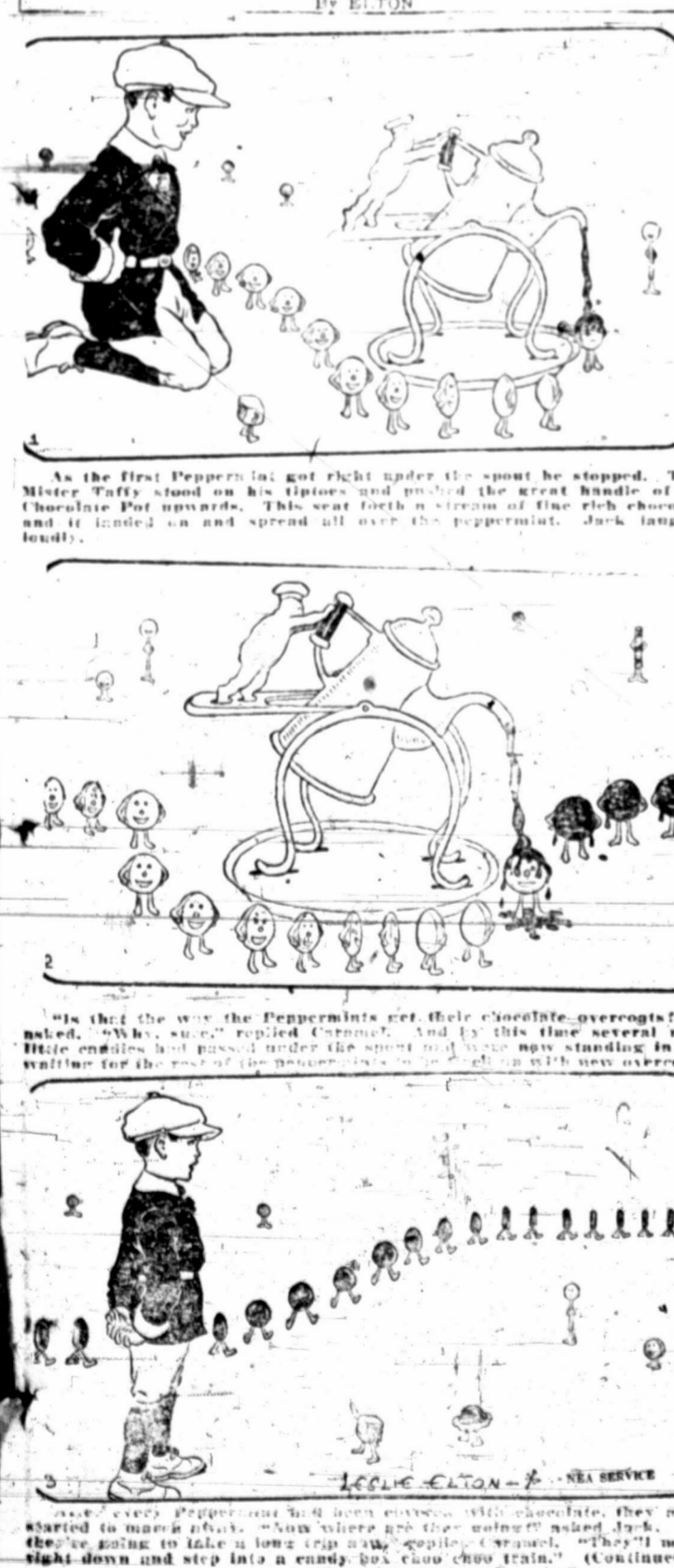
