POPULATION OF CITY 51,500

HAS MADE A GAIN OF MORE THAN 25 PER CENT PAST THREE YEARS IS ESTIMATE OF CENSUS BUREAU

WASHINGTON, March 28.—Wichita Falls made a gain of more than 25 per cent in population during the last three years, according to estimated population figures from the census bureau. These figures estimate Wichita Falls population at 51,500, against 40,750 shown in the census of 1920.

MAYFIELD'S HOLD ON SEAT IN SENATE IS PRECARIOUS ONE

SUCH IS BELIEF OF PAPER REPRESENTING VIEWS OF ADMINISTRATION.

FIGURE OPPOSITION IS ASSURED OF MAJORITY

Culbertson and Bailey Oppose New Senator; Sheppard Between Two Fires.

WASHINGTON, March 29.—That Senator Mayfield's hold on his seat is a precarious one is the belief of the Washington Post, generally recognized as newspaper spokesman for the Harding administration. In an article published here today this paper declares a poll of the senate shows the following results:

For Mayfield: Republicans 45; Democrats 27; total 72.
Against: Mayfield: Republicans 13; Democrats 13; total 26.
The seat is vacant. In part the reasons are:

Republican Democrats among them are Thomas Hefflin, Northern and Southern Democrats are generally opposed to him.

Reviewing the charges made by George E. B. Paddy, contestant, the Post stresses the Ku Klux Klan issue. In a survey of the situation, the paper says:

"Republican leaders here are going to the hat good and hard on the Mayfield position. Many Democrats are in close quarters in the controversy."

Sheppard's Position
Senator Sheppard of Texas is between two fierce political factions in the state. If he supports Mayfield he will alienate the C. C. Culbertson and Bailey forces. On the other hand, if he votes against Mayfield, he will anger the Ku Klux Klan and thousands of his prohibition friends. The plan is said to be to bring in the state and a show at the polls how would result in a South blow to the organization. In a recent majority contest in Houston, the Klan lost heavily.

Senator Samuel M. Hays of Indiana has aspirations for the White House. The Ku Klux Klan is a big figure in the last Hoover state election. It had the balance of power, eliminated many previously popular candidates. Vigorous efforts are being made there, however, to destroy the influence of the Klan. This makes a difficult situation for an ambitious senator. The Mayfield contest will force a lineup.

Culbertson and Bailey
Former Senator Culbertson and Joseph W. Bailey, Texas leaders for many years, are opposing Mayfield. They will ask the senate to reject him.

A group of younger Democrats in the senate are trying to make a "party house" of the Mayfield case. The leaders of this group charge a Republican conspiracy to take another seat in the senate. But this prominent Democrat frankly admits that Mayfield must clear up the charges made by his opponents or stand convicted.

It is up to those who assert that Mayfield was not lawfully elected, to prove their charges. If that is done, more than 75 Democrats will vote to oust him.

Deacon Is Sued By Preacher For \$100,000 Damages

MANFIELD CENTER, OHIO, March 29.—Rev. Harold Tillmuth of the Congregational Church here filed suit for \$100,000 damages today against Archibald W. Buchanan, deacon, Sunday school superintendent, and the teacher of the Bible class.

His charges Buchanan told his Bible class that the pastor was in the habit of buying the sermons he delivered on Sunday. Consequently, he claims his reputation as a preacher has been damaged.

He also says he has suffered great mental anguish over the affair. He has caused the deacon's automobile to be attached.

SETTLEMENT MADE IN CASE AFTER JURY HAD RETIRED

A settlement was effected in the case of the Continental Supply Company against the Burk Waggoner Oil Company and H. M. Waggoner late Wednesday evening after the jury had retired and was considering its verdict. The plaintiff had brought action for collection of a debt or two guaranty bonds which it claimed had been executed to it by the defendant Waggoner and C. A. Green for the extending of credit for the purchase of oil well supplies.

MAN ARRESTED BY POLICE HELD UNDER BOND OF \$500

Paul Mitchell, who was arrested Wednesday by members of the city police department and a narcotic inspector was bound over to await the action of a grand jury under bond of \$500 by U. S. Commissioner J. A. Lantz Wednesday evening. Officers stated that a quantity of morphine and needles were found in his possession.

SERIES OF FIRES AT LANSING, KAN. THREATEN TOWN

LEAVENWORTH, KAN., March 29.—A series of fires which threatened to wipe out Lansing, three miles south of here, and endangered the business district of Leavenworth were brought under control early today with an estimated total loss of \$75,000.

In Lansing, a garage, feed store, grocery and two dwellings were destroyed. The loss was estimated at \$35,000. The fire is believed to have started in the garage.

For a time the entire town appeared to be doomed. Only the timely arrival of fire fighting apparatus from Leavenworth, Fort Leavenworth and the state penitentiary at Lansing prevented greater destruction.

In Leavenworth, a blaze, believed to have been incendiary in origin, damaged the three story plant of the Heese Motor Car Company and caused a loss to building and contents estimated at more than \$40,000.

Shortly after the Heese fire was extinguished two dwellings in other parts of the city caught fire. One burned while the other was but slightly damaged.

KLAN OPPOSITION CANDIDATE'S VOTE CLEAR MAJORITY

NEW ORLEANS, March 29.—With virtually complete but unofficial returns from the 12 parishes comprising the fifth supreme court district, where a primary was held Tuesday to fill a vacancy on the supreme court bench, indications were that supporters of the Ku Klux Klan had been defeated in their first political campaign waged in Louisiana.

Newspaper compilations with only a few precincts missing out of the district's total of 372, gave Judge J. P. Brunet of Baton Rouge, anti-Klan candidate, a majority of 275 votes over his two opponents, Judge Columbus Reid and Robert S. Ellis of Amite, who were supported by the Klan. The Smith survey listed 5,372; Reid 4,532; Ellis, 4,377.

BEN F. SCOTT DIES OF PNEUMONIA AT SOUTH BEND HOME

SOUTH BEND, TEXAS, March 29.—Ben F. Scott, one of the noted men of Young county and known to his legion of friends as "Uncle Ben," died Wednesday evening after a brief illness. He had contracted a cold and taken to his bed and the cold gradually developed into pneumonia.

Mr. Scott was 71 years of age and had been a resident of Young county for 18 years. He was universally esteemed by all. The funeral will take place Thursday afternoon from his late home and interment will be at Graham.

Ben F. Scott was the owner of the Scott land in the Smith survey comprising 160 acres and nearly 600 acres of the Garrett survey. These two tracts adjoin the town of South Bend. The Smith survey land being leased to the North American Oil and Refining Company and the Garrett survey to the Roscoe. The

main road from South Bend to Breckenridge divides the two tracts. There are eight producing wells from the 220-foot sand on each tract and Mr. Scott was enjoying the one-eighth royalty from the production. His income was estimated at \$400 a day from these wells.

Mr. Scott is survived by a brother and two sisters and several nephews and nieces. The two sisters are Miss Sarah and Miss Sue Scott and the brother is J. J. Scott of Graham, who with his son, Leslie J. Scott, were owners of the principal part of the town of South Bend.

DEATH SENTENCE FOR FOURTH TIME FOR WAGO NEGRO

WAGO, TEXAS, March 28.—They seem to be running me through pretty fast," was Roy Mitchell's only comment after he had been given the death penalty for the fourth time in less than two weeks. Mitchell was convicted late Wednesday of the murder of W. P. Driskell, Waco cotton man, on the night of May 7 of last year. Driskell's skull was crushed with an axe as he drove into his garage late at night. Mitchell, testifying in his own behalf, declared, "I might be punished for these crimes, but if I do take my life it will all be before 1924."

PEACE NEGOTIATIONS ARE TO BE RESUMED SOMETIME IN APRIL

By Associated Press. ST. LOUIS, March 28.—Peace negotiations between the allies and Turkey will be resumed at Lausanne some time between April 15 and 20. This announcement was made today by the secretariat which the powers met at Lausanne at the conclusion of the recent conference. The announcement said that the opening session probably would be held on the last named date. Inasmuch as the secretariat recently was notified to prepare to leave for Constantinople, the sudden change in scene is considered proof of the conciliatory attitude of the Turks. RADIO NIGHTHAWK.

The Kansas City Nighthawks now have 35,000 members among radio fans all over the United States and Canada.

The Nighthawks broadcast a radio concert from Kansas City after midnight. Between jazz numbers of the Coon-Sanders orchestra, the announcer reads telegrams from out-of-town radio bugs who are "listening in."

The reading of these telegrams makes the senders members of the Nighthawks. The ceremony is completed by "the professor," in charge of the band, ringing them up on a song.

This announcer in Kansas City has a better line of "patter" than any of the old-time minstrel show interlocutors.

Chicago has a similar concert-broadcasting outfit—the Sun Dodgers.

There's something almost uncanny in sitting up late at night, when concerts come in clearest because there are fewer stations sending, and by a few slight dial changes shifting from one distant concert to another.

It's like pulling teeth, for a radio bug to shut off the juke and go to bed. For radio has a peculiar lure, unlike anything else. This lure is in the fact that radio eliminates distance and carries the listener hundreds or thousands of miles in a twinkling.

Radio beats the Magic Carpet in the "Arabian Nights."

Recently we were "listening in" on a concert from Minneapolis. The usual telegrams were read, between musical selections from radio enthusiasts.

Then came one from an Indiana woman. She wanted to get word to her brother somewhere in the northern woods that father was dead. We wondered whether the brother heard the announcer read the telegram, or whether some friend heard and passed the word along.

The incident had a dramatic touch that is seldom equaled on the stage or in the movies. And it flashed through the night air with all the unexpectedness that is characteristic of radio.

We hear the joy-killers occasionally commenting about the great amount of time wasted by radio fans. They have the wrong slant.

The time devoted to listening is not wasted. The music that rushes in from far off is of secondary importance to the listener. His real interest is in the marvel of transmission. In this sense radio is awakening a scientific sense that will be indispensable to people who want to keep up with the times from now on.

Incidentally, radio is going to help enforce prohibition. You can't imagine a dyed-in-the-wool radio bug drinking bootleg in some dirty back room or making home-brew in the cellar, while concerts are waiting to be heard. Outfits like the Kansas City Nighthawks and the Chicago Sun Dodgers are embryonic scientific organizations that incidentally are keeping a lot of people out of mischief.

WOODROW WILSON'S TELEGRAM.

The action of former president Woodrow Wilson in sending a telegram to the governor of Colorado urging the appointment of a friend as a senator for that state is being interpreted in some quarters as indicating that Mr. Wilson will attempt to control the destinies of the Democratic party henceforth.

This is stretching a simple natural action rather far. Mr. Wilson was doubtless moved in sending his telegram to be of some assistance to a friend whom he knew to be worthy. It was a natural and proper thing to do.

The sending of the telegram does indicate that Mr. Wilson is keeping in close touch with affairs in his country, and it is probably right to infer that he is improved in health and from time to time will speak his opinions on public matters. That is his right and duty, but so far as attempting to dictate the nomination of his party and control its destinies, it is probable that nothing is further from his mind or desire.

Whether or not the leaders in either party wish it, our foreign relations are almost certain to be the principal issue in the 1924 campaign. The world unsettlement continues and America more and more must feel the effects of unsettled conditions in other lands. The Harding administration has developed no foreign policy other than a more or less successful effort to make American influence of no purpose or account. We don't register anywhere except in Central and South America where our success results from the carrying out of policies by this administration inaugurated by the Wilson administration.

There is certain to be a whole lot of unsettlement in the relations between nations and peoples in 1924. The American people are becoming impatient with our inaction and apparent indecision. They may turn to Mr. Wilson for advice in 1924, but it will be because of the force of conditions and events rather than through his own efforts to dominate and control his party.

THE DOPE TRAFFIC.

The Elks fraternity, which has been conducting a nationwide fight against the illicit narcotic drug traffic has now been joined in that fight by the American Legion. Hearst's Magazine is also running a series of articles emphasizing the prevalence and the dangers of this traffic. With these great agencies and many lesser ones at work the country is being awakened to the menace of this insidious evil which has been far more widespread and destructive than the public has realized.

Garland Powell, national director of the American commission of the American Legion, says that one person in every 73 in this country is a confirmed drug addict with the number being steadily increased. In Hearst's Magazine it is shown that in many cities efforts are being made to extend the market for the drug by its sale in various forms to high school and even grade school children. Children have been found easy to sell and the drug habit quickly forms with them. After that they are little better, and in some respects much worse, than the slaves of the drug peddlers.

The death penalty has been suggested as a proper punishment for those who are found guilty of selling dope to children. At first thought this may seem extreme, but death is the penalty that is asked when life is destroyed. The murderer destroys only the physical life of his victim. The man or woman who fastens the dope habit upon a child has done the most that he or she could to destroy not only the child's physical body but its mind and very soul as well.

Old England worried. A swallow's heart. Deaths fair fortune.

Public opinion, especially, is powerful. It has proved itself strong enough to control the government of Russia, causing a postponement, a permanent perhaps, of the execution of Roman Catholic priests.

Appeals and protests reached Russia from all over the globe, from many governments, from rabbis in New York, from enemies of Russia in Poland and elsewhere, but especially from friends of Russia in those who believe that religion has lost its influence are mistaken.

A special wireless tells across the ocean of England's worry over the military power of the French. It is enough to control the newspapers and military experts anxiously dwell upon France's over-ambition in the East. England and her cities would be at the mercy of France in war. Submarine building goes on favorably in France, where they have wisely lost interest in battleships. French submarines could make it impossible for England to supply them with raw materials.

England has 32 "air squadrons." France has 200 "air squadrons." England once ruled the waves, now she is being outwitted by the air and ocean waves no longer count.

England's deep worry was thus expressed by Major T. B. Britton, military expert, in the London Daily Telegraph. "Before 1914 we were content with our arms, we should have aimed to create arms. That assurance has gone forever. For peace, our homes, workshops, transport and munitions plants would be attacked."

Attack would come through the air. No time to mobilize troops. No possibility of using that fleet, with dynamite from the air and from the sky, making battleships easy targets.

No wonder the government of Great Britain is so anxious to develop a submarine to all responsible concerns that will develop commercial aviation.

And what about that famous "League of Nations"? If it can't protect you in the East, England's "dear ally," France, how will it prevent war in general? And why should this nation become mixed up in the quarrels of Europe? It is not allied nations from fear of each other's flying machines?

Great Britain's air ministry has developed a 1,500 horsepower flying machine, capable of generating 1,000 horsepower, would seem like foolish raving now. But our descendants will build such engines, now to be used in the air, and carry them around the world, as they fly collectively or individually wherever they please. "Large flocks of iron birds flew over our town today," the small newspaper will say.

However, what we need just now is the machine that keeps alive, and flies machines that need improvement. That is the machine in man's skull that needs improvement.

The strongest instinct in man is self preservation—desire to go on living. "No matter what the conditions, the prisoner sentenced for life fears death as much as others fear it. Men cast away, will add such other, to keep alive, and fleeing families have thrown their younger children to the wolves that the others might escape.

Nature determined to keep us here, for her mysterious reasons, winds us up so that we want to stay.

That is what makes suicide so interesting. He who makes up his mind to plunge alone into the dark? Thirteen thousand five hundred had thirty men, women and children killed themselves in this country last year. The suicides included students, college professors, students, preachers, bankers, judges, doctors and both men and women of great wealth. We hang on in spite of poverty, and get out in spite of wealth.

Among last year's suicides, which included 900 boys and girls, the boy suicides averaged 16 and the girls 15 years. In three years the number of children suicides has doubled. "Too much excitement," is given as a reason. One boy wrote his mother, "I died 'just to get a new thrill.'" Another girl took poison because she did not like the way she looked after she had bobbed her hair.

Home conditions, unendurable, temper school system, and "emotional disorders" are given as the main causes of child suicide.

Since the war and more than 1,000 shell shocked and maimed soldiers have killed themselves.

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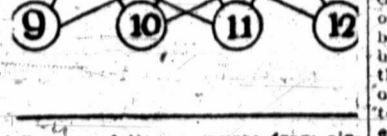

Senator Moses Writes of Europe And Conditions Obtaining There As Observed on Tour of Country

LONDON, March 28.—The American traveler visiting these shores after an absence of 10 years finds an astonishingly scanty change in the external things, even though the world has gone round so many times in the interval and half a dozen wars have taken place and the air is still filled with rumors of new ones.

London is reacting to whatever is the British equivalent of a "bigger, brighter and bolder" city; the old and begrimed buildings are receiving a bath and a coating of distemper. New construction is proceeding at an astonishing rate when one considers the cost of building and labor. British shipping chieftains are rejoicing in the defeat of the ship subsidy bill in the American congress and are looking forward to an unchallenged primacy on the seas for another generation at least. The British who once more regard themselves as the seat of tribute from all the world—and there is little on the surface of things to antagonize the general feeling of superiority and supremacy which has seeped for so many generations into the veins of the British people.

But underneath all this there is a something which causes a certain amount of uneasiness. It is a something which contains the germ, at least, of a great disaster. The situation today seems to be paralleled in a degree at any rate by that which I found here on my first visit to London, some 10 years ago.

Impressions gained.
I arrived here then when the first imperial press conference was in progress and I found myself lodged at the same hotel with the delegates who attended the gathering. The talk then was all of the approaching and inevitable war with Germany and of the peril, indeed the probability, of a German invasion.

One would have thought that the German was at the door and that the British were to be the first to be annihilated. After having observed the leisurely manners of commercial London, and if the Germans ever did come to capture London and arrived before 5 o'clock in the morning, the trick could be easily turned.

Today the talk is all of the possible, indeed, as many frank say, the probable war with France and this time, no one expects the French to come before nine o'clock in the morning.

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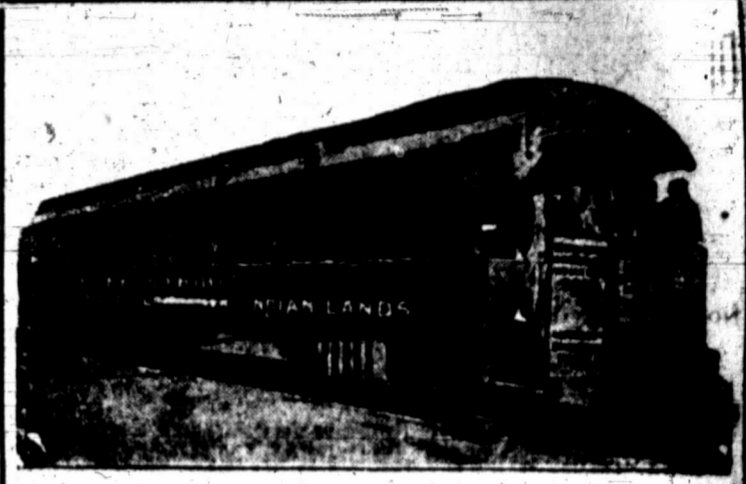

Instead of the gentile Jess, one finds a man of serious focus, who listens carefully to his advisers, with an avowed intention of forcing Jack Dempsey into the ring for a championship fight before the summer is over.

He looks upon the Floyd Johnson fight as a sort of tryout. He is not underestimating the ability of the youthful Iowa, but he does expect to win decisively by a clean-cut knockout.

Willard's desire to whip Dempsey really amounts to a passion. He has worked up a cold, calculating hatred for the present champion, who licked him unmercifully in 1915, left him in a heap on the canvas at Toledo.

Toward Johnson he holds no personal feeling whatsoever. He regards him as just a fighter he must beat in order to regain the right to challenge the champion. But for Jack, however, it is entirely different.

He regards Dempsey as a much-accosted fighter. He believes that there are two or three other heavyweights who can whip him. But he only names one. That one is Jess Willard.

And unless all signs fail, Floyd Johnson will enter the ring on May 12 pitted against the athletic marvel of the age. For Willard, as experts to be in the fiscal condition since he defeated Johnson.

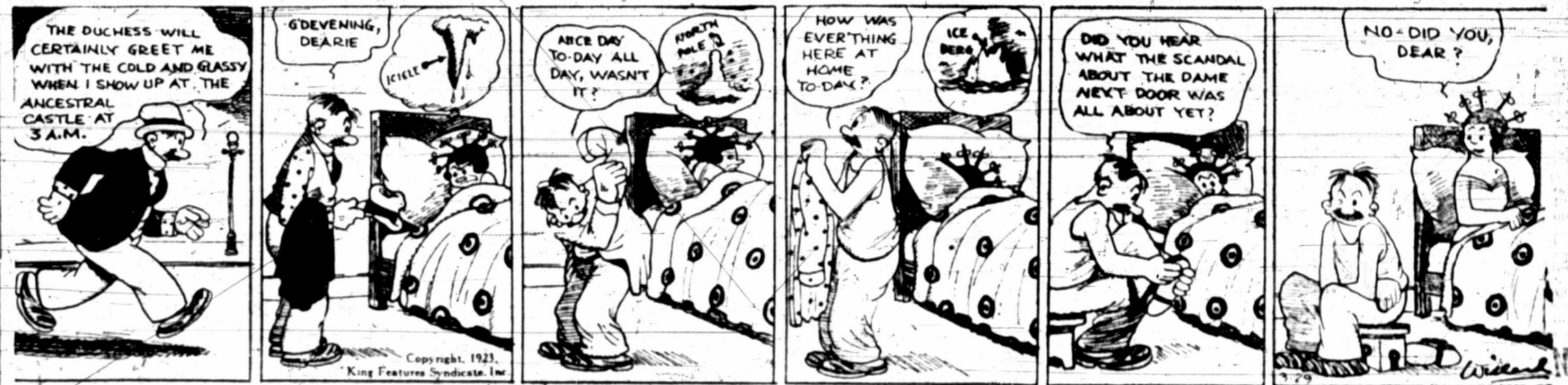

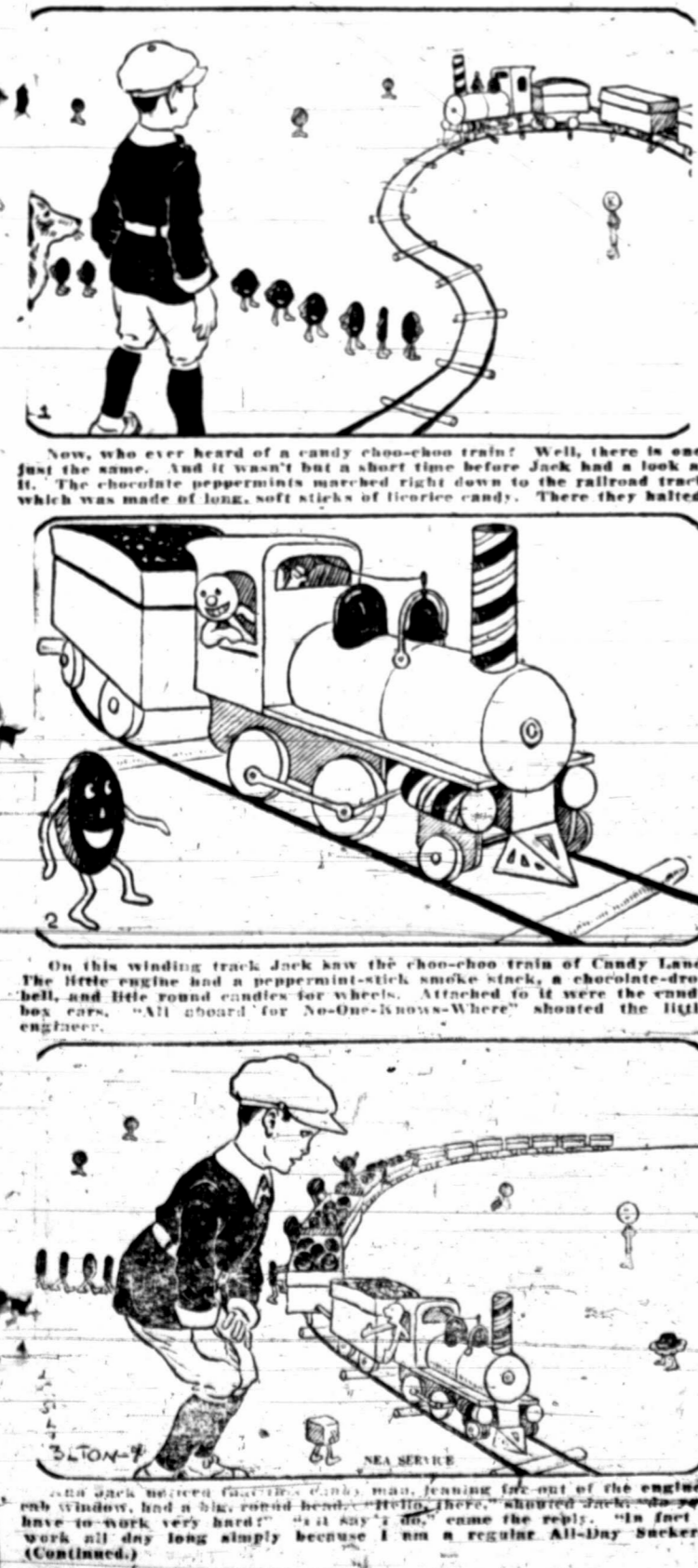

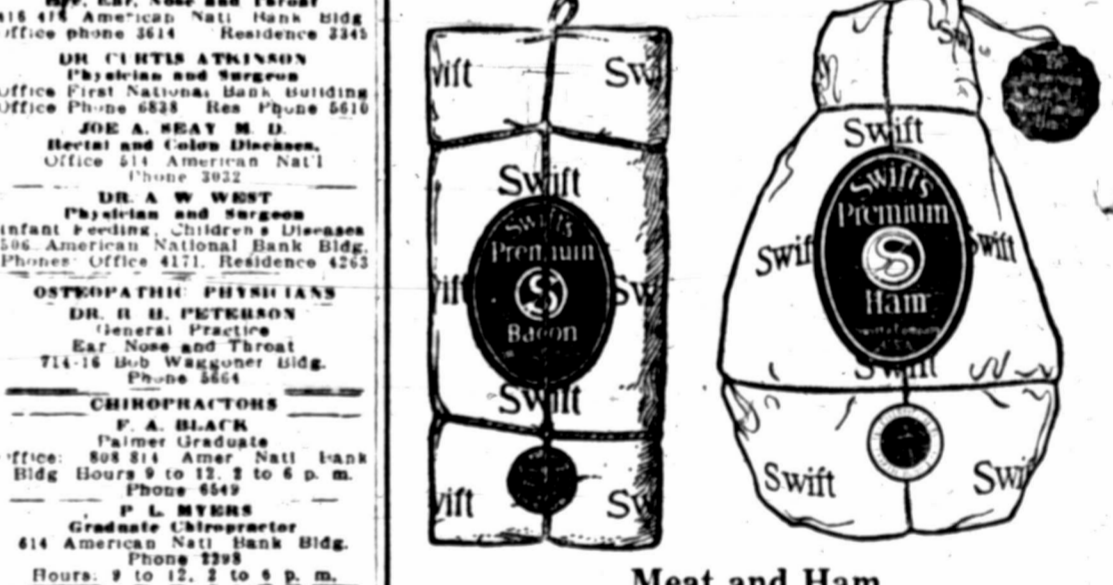
