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# WICHITA FALLS NOW SIXTH CITY OF TEXAS

According to an announcement made by the Census Bureau at Washington, Wichita Falls now is credited with a population of 51,500 as compared with 40,079 in the census of 1920. This shows a gain of 25 per cent in three years. This report was a surprise to many people, even to Wichita Falls citizens who have not studied the statistics that indicate the growth of cities. Real estate men and public officials who have watched closely the basic facts about the community and who have kept in touch with its rapidly increasing building activities have known that Wichita Falls was building steadily.

It is now three years since the oil boom of 1919-1920. Wichita Falls is building on solid and varied resources. With the completion of the big irrigation project and the settlement of the irrigated valley, this community will continue its growth with rapid strides.

This growth shows that when a city looks after its conveniences and its facilities for comfortable living as well as its commerce that it will attract new citizens. Wichita Falls is now the sixth city in Texas. The other cities rank as follows: San Antonio 184,727; Dallas, 177,247; Houston, 154,970; Fort Worth, 143,821; El Paso, 96,319; Wichita Falls 51,500.

Wichita Falls' first boom started in 1874 before there was a single building or person in the vicinity, according to old data about the town's history, a townsite plan having been laid off in that year on the land owned by the J. A. Scott heirs and advertised by means of a very elaborate and fanciful map which showed a town on both sides of the Wichita River and the falls being eight feet in height. The identity of those who laid off the townsite in 1874 and also the first settlers of this section is somewhat indefinite. The first white settler of this vicinity is believed to have been M. Gilbert, who came to this country from Mississippi in 1859 or 1860. His ranch was located just north of Wichita Falls several miles, Gilbert Creek being supposedly named for him. In 1879 the first permanent settler came to Wichita Falls and lived in a small two room house located at the corner of 6th and Ohio. In a very short time other settlers came to Wichita Falls and the town began to grow. The first church was organized in 1881. On September 27, 1882 the first railroad train came to Wichita Falls, on the same day

that the townsite sale was opened. This railroad was the Fort Worth and Denver. The first court house was started in November 1882.

From that time on Wichita Falls gradually increased in population and then with the coming of the oil boom in 1919 it took the form of one of the large cities of the state.

In the ten year year period from 1910 to 1920 the population of Wichita Falls increased 389 per cent, placing it among the very first communities in the United States in percentage of population gain.

Of the 40,079 population in 1920, 90.1 per cent were native white born Americans and 98.4 per cent of the total population were literate, giving it a standing unequalled in a city of its size in the entire south.

Wichita County of which Wichita Falls is the county seat, had a population of 72,911, according to the 1920 census.

2 FIREMEN INJURED, ENGINE DAMAGED, IN FALSE ALARM UPSET

Somebody turned in a false alarm at 2 o'clock Saturday night from box 311 at Third at Burnett. 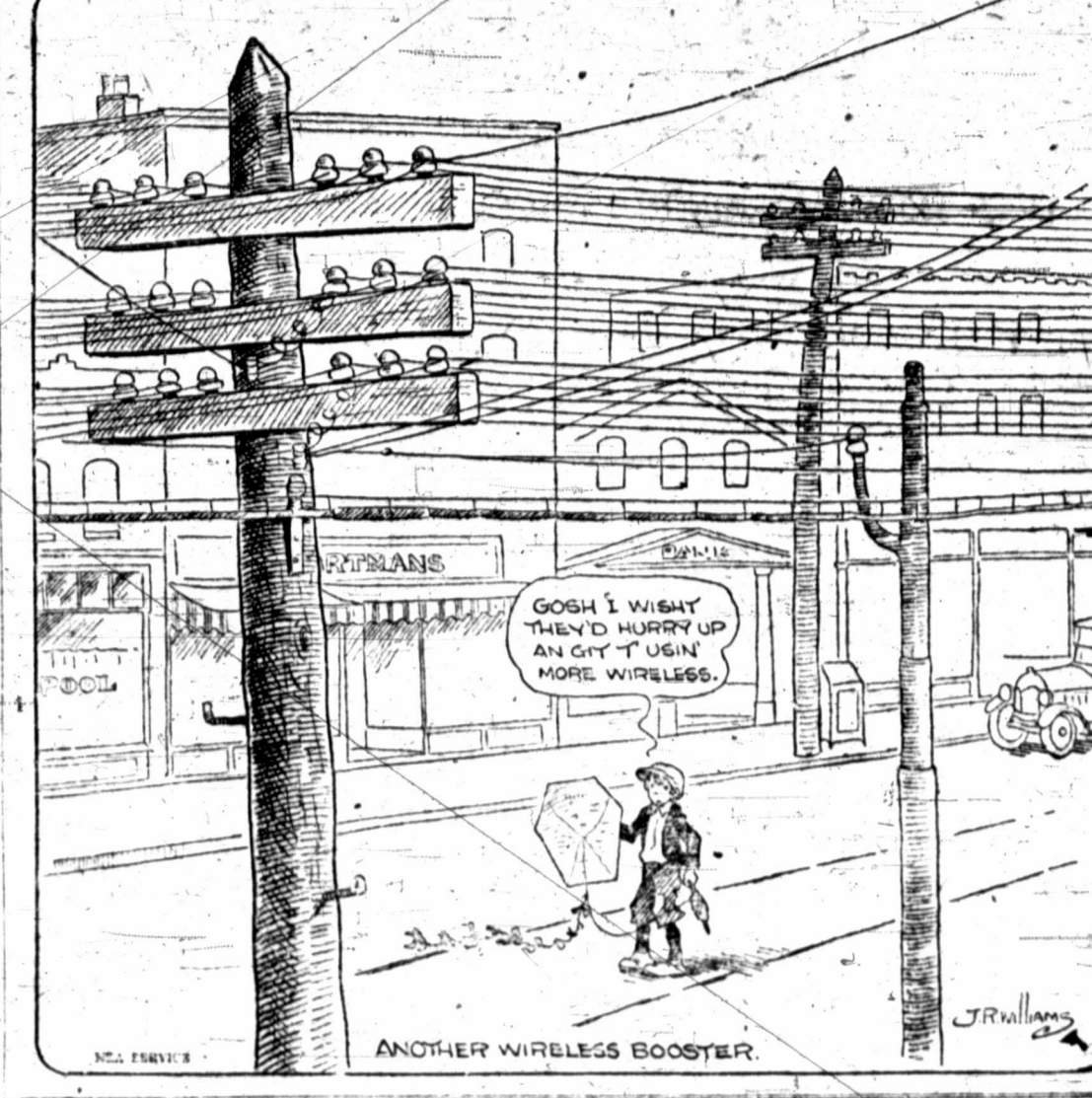

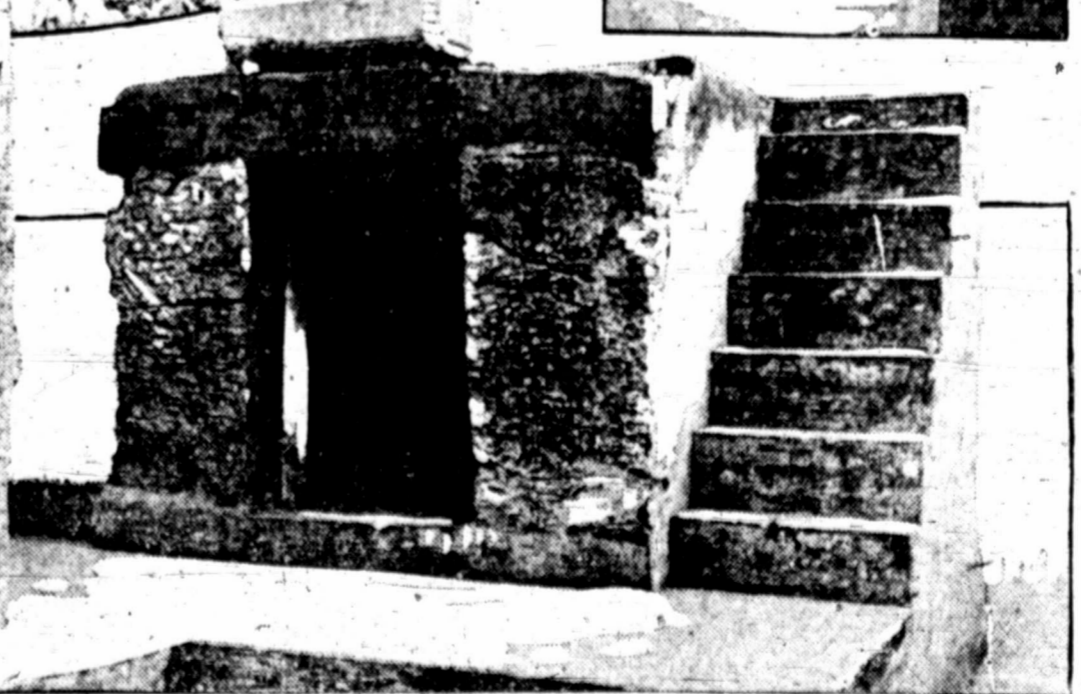
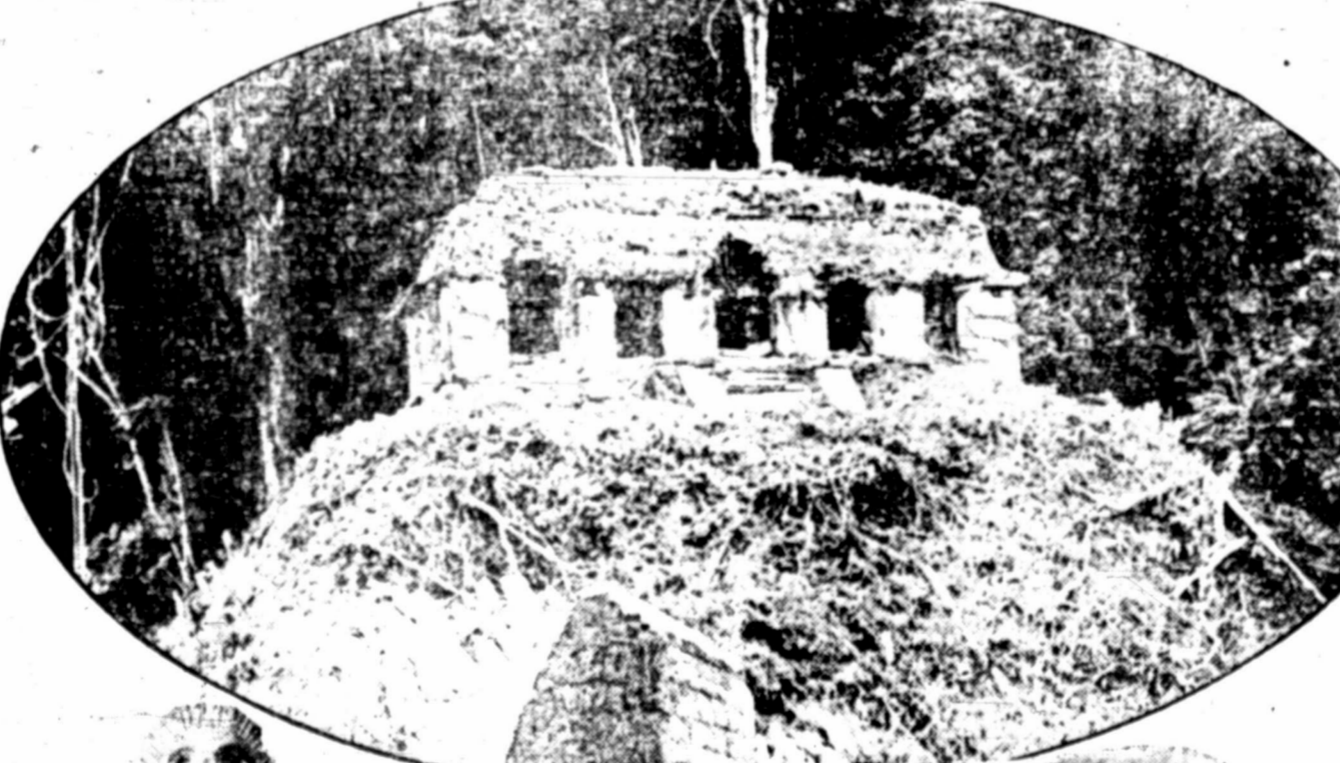

### General Improvement Indicated in Livestock and Agricultural Industries.

EL PASO, April 7.—President and Mrs. Harding probably will visit cities of the southwest on their proposed trip to the Pacific coast, Fred Starck, managing director of the war finance corporation declared today.

"After spending three days in Texas I find that many sections that were hard hit by drought have begun to recover and cattle raisers, particularly those whom the war finance corporation aided over the crisis, are looking forward to a comfortable year. Rains during the first three months of the year which represented about 40 per cent of the average annual rainfall form the basis of optimism on the part of the cattlemen.

"One of the best indications of a general improvement in livestock and agriculture is the fact that almost 50 per cent of the money advanced by the corporation to help in an emergency has been repaid in other words, a total advancement of approximately \$20,000,000, of which \$17,000,000 have been repaid.

"The policy of the war finance corporation will be to continue to contribute to the recovery of the state until the cattle interests are entirely reestablished.

### FREIGHT TRAVELS OVER 179 MILES; DESTINATION IS 13

NEW YORK, April 7.—How a freight shipment traveled 179 miles to accomplish a distance of 13 miles, was told here today at a hearing of the interstate commerce commission and the port authorities.

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# WICHITA FALLS NOW SIXTH CITY OF TEXAS

According to an announcement made by the Census Bureau at Washington, Wichita Falls now is credited with a population of 51,500 as compared with 40,079 in the census of 1920. This shows a gain of 25 per cent in three years. This report was a surprise to many people, even to Wichita Falls citizens who have not studied the statistics that indicate the growth of cities. Real estate men and public officials who have watched closely the basic facts about the community and who have kept in touch with its rapidly increasing building activities have known that Wichita Falls was building steadily.

It is now three years since the oil boom of 1919-1920. Wichita Falls is building on solid and varied resources. With the completion of the big irrigation project and the settlement of the irrigated valley, this community will continue its growth with rapid strides.

This growth shows that when a city looks after its conveniences and its facilities for comfortable living as well as its commerce that it will attract new citizens. Wichita Falls is now the sixth city in Texas. The other cities rank as follows: San Antonio 184,727; Dallas, 177,247; Houston, 154,970; Fort Worth, 143,821; El Paso, 96,319; Wichita Falls 51,500.

Wichita Falls' first boom started in 1874 before there was a single building or person in the vicinity, according to old data about the town's history, a townsite plan having been laid off in that year on the land owned by the J. A. Scott heirs and advertised by means of a very elaborate and fanciful map which showed a town on both sides of the Wichita River and the falls being eight feet in height. The identity of those who laid off the townsite in 1874 and also the first settlers of this section is somewhat indefinite. The first white settler of this vicinity is believed to have been M. Gilbert, who came to this country from Mississippi in 1859 or 1860. His ranch was located just north of Wichita Falls several miles, Gilbert Creek being supposedly named for him. In 1879 the first permanent settler came to Wichita Falls and lived in a small two room house located at the corner of 6th and Ohio. In a very short time other settlers came to Wichita Falls and the town began to grow. The first church was organized in 1881. On September 27, 1882 the first railroad train came to Wichita Falls, on the same day

that the townsite sale was opened. This railroad was the Fort Worth and Denver. The first court house was started in November 1882.

From that time on Wichita Falls gradually increased in population and then with the coming of the oil boom in 1919 it took the form of one of the large cities of the state.

In the ten year year period from 1910 to 1920 the population of Wichita Falls increased 389 per cent, placing it among the very first communities in the United States in percentage of population gain.

Of the 40,079 population in 1920, 90.1 per cent were native white born Americans and 98.4 per cent of the total population were literate, giving it a standing unequalled in a city of its size in the entire south.

Wichita County of which Wichita Falls is the county seat, had a population of 72,911, according to the 1920 census.

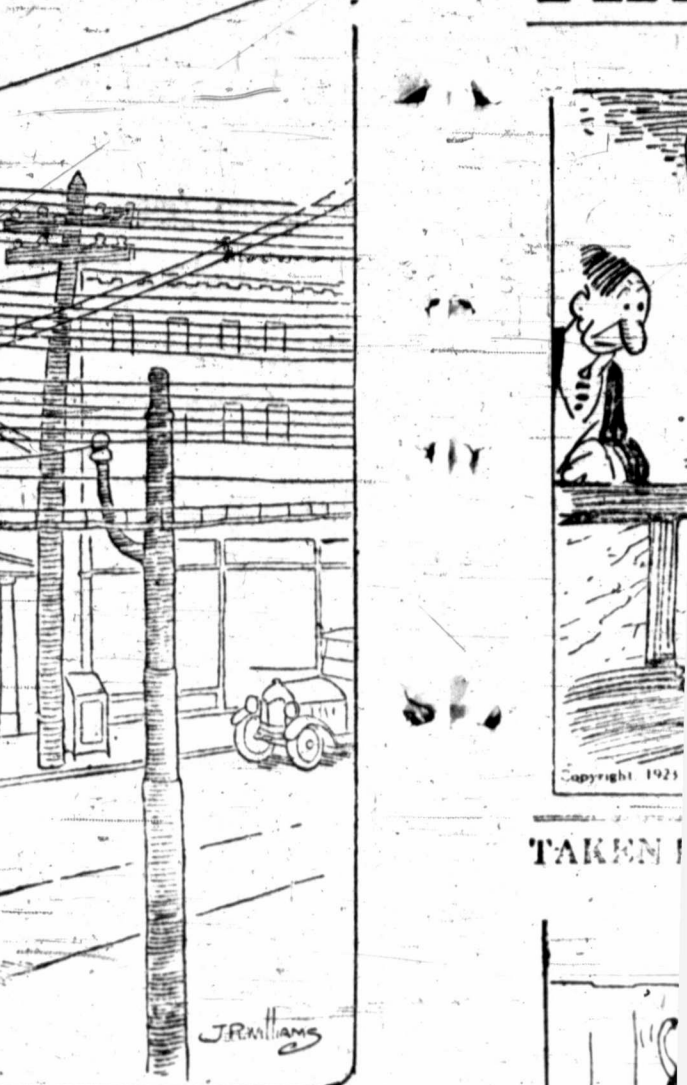

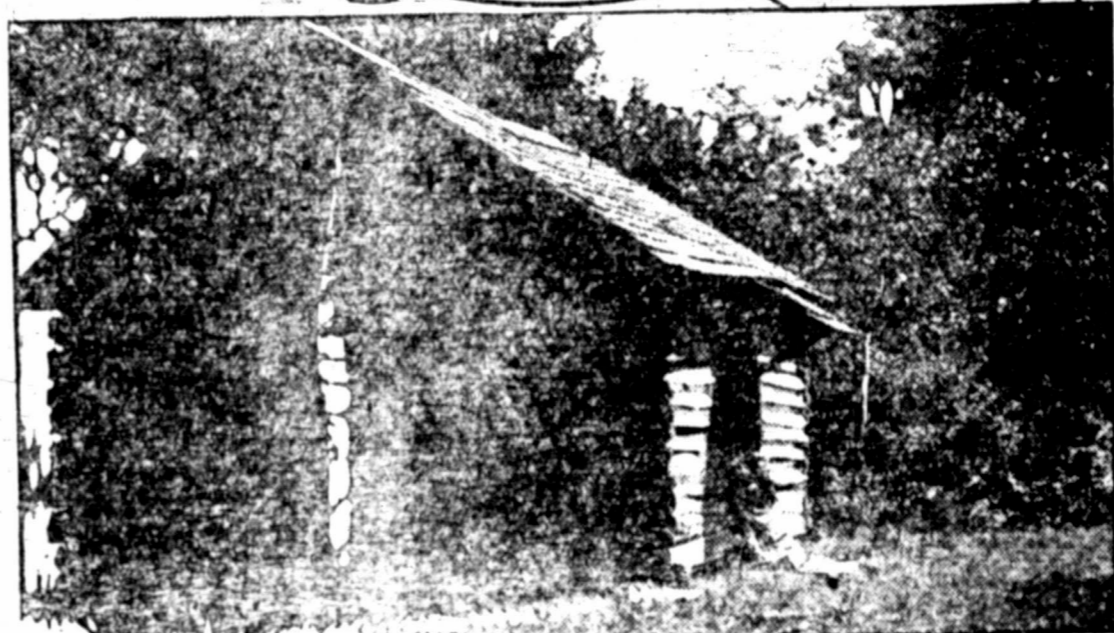

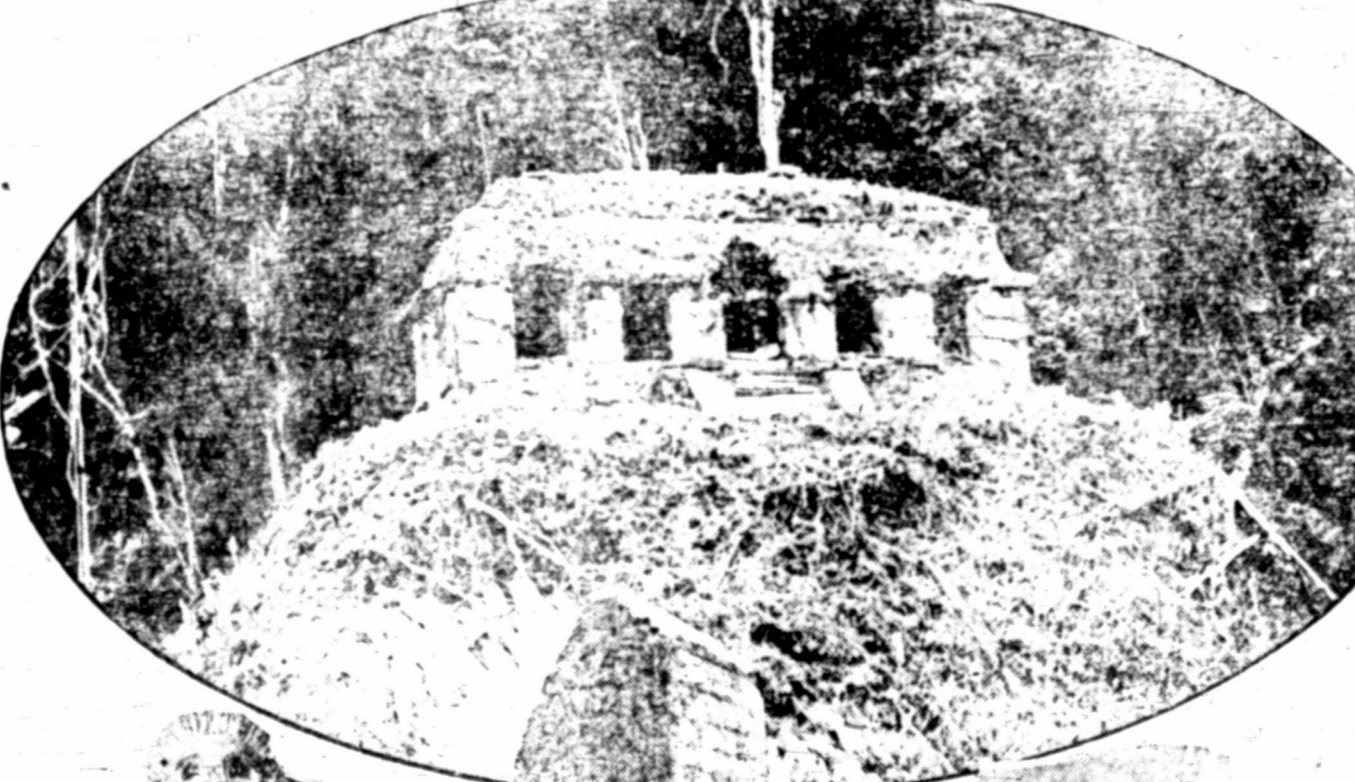

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How to Make a Fernery

If you want to earn extra money for these spring fogs, take orders for making flower boxes like those shown in the illustration above.

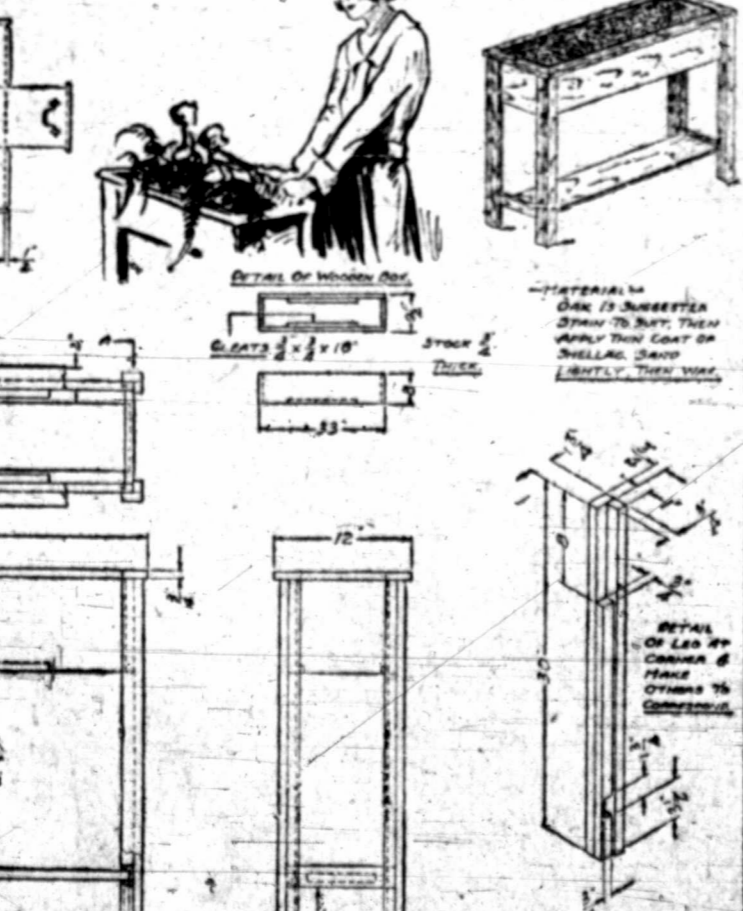
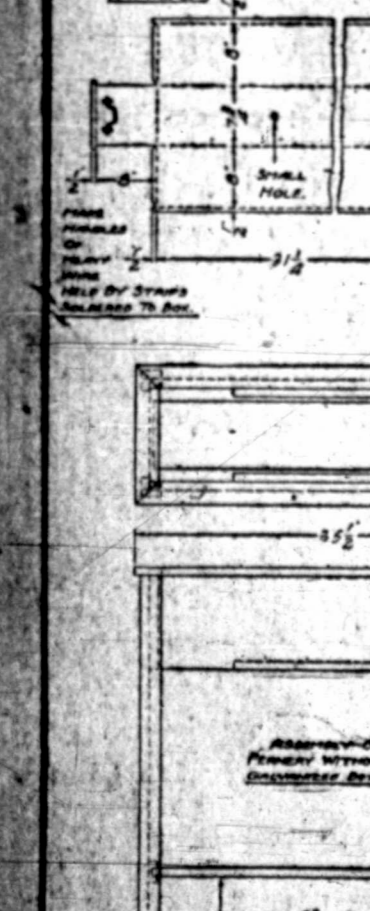
Select your material carefully, so that the box will finish up beautifully. Oak is best for this purpose, although it requires careful workmanship to get a good finish on this wood.

Now as to the making, construct the wooden box first. Before fastening the parts together with screws the cleats on the inside for the support of the galvanized box should be fastened in place. Then make the fernery building them up in three pieces glued together. The center piece is eight inches shorter than the two outside pieces, making a support for the fern. A piece is also cut out three and a half inches from the bottom to receive the end of the shell rack. The legs are fastened to the corners of the box by means of screws run through corners of the box from the inside and into the legs.
