

It has been one of the fine things in the citizenship of Wichita Falls that while its members might be divided on an issue and contest between them selves with all their might, after the issue had been carried to the people and decided, the fight ended.

NO DIVISION ON SCHOOL PROGRAM NOW.

Saturday there came to a conclusion a warm contest in the election of members of the school board. This paper believes that the election ended the contest and that the whole school board and indeed the whole citizenship will stand behind the newly elected superintendent, J. W. Cantwell, in the continued improvement of our public schools. The results of the election will make no change in the election of Mr. Cantwell as all the candidates had pledged themselves to support the action of the board in his appointment. Mr. Cantwell is coming to Wichita Falls with such a record as a school executive and with the high commendation of so many good people, that there cannot be any doubt but that he will be a good man for the place.

-And Lee Clark will go from Wichita Falls with the gratitude and good wishes of its citizens. Wichita Falls does owe such a debt to him. He took up his work here when our school system was a very small thing compared to what it is today. He headed our schools through as difficult and trying conditions as ever faced a school man in Texas and some way he brought them through continually increasing their efficiency until they now occupy a very high rank among the schools of the state. He first, so far as this paper knows, conceived the fdea of anior college for Wichita Falls and quietly urged the advantages of such an institution until others took up the idea and carried it forward to accomplishment. So wherever he goes he will go with the good wishes of the people of Wichita Falls and will be remembered as a man who did much for the schools of this city.

W. M. Priddy was defeated as a candidate for re-election as a member of the school board. But Mr. Priddy at least has the satisfaction of knowing that all the members of the board are pledged to support the election of Mr. Cantwell. It is the testimony of other members of the board that Mr. Priddy did more work than any other member of the board and that his duties engaged his most earnest attention. At his own expense he visited many cities in connection with the starting of the Junior College and he has done work in connection with the new High school and college building that has been invaluable. It will be difficult to find another member of the board who can give as valuable a service as Mr. Priddy in this matter. It is also the testimony of other members of the board that Mr. Priddy's actions have always been governed by a sense of duty, which has been discharged with courage.

For instance, the National Surety in one year paid 1528 bond claims under \$10,000 each, and only 58 claims above \$10,000. You often hear people say, "I wouldn't steal," but if I was going to I'd pull off something big."- It doesn't work out that way on the law of averages.

Rather extraordinary is the National Surety's statement: "The smallest bond we gave was for \$1." You'd find it interesting if you could trace that

Who was the man who couldn't be trusted with \$1 except under bonding protection? It's just as well we don't know. An investigation might prove disappointing.
