# PAUL HADLEY HANGS NO OFFICIAL ORDER IN ARIZONA JAIL FOR BARRING KLANSMEN SLAYING OF WOMAN FROM U.S. POSITION

FLORENCE, ARIZ., April 13.—Paul V. Hadley died on the gallows be-fore sunrise today for the murder of Mrs. Anna C. Johnson. The trap was pulled at 5:10 o'clock and Hadley was pronounced dead at 5:22. The condemned man maintained to the end his claim of innocence of the crime for which he was exe-cuted. He met his fate calmly. cuted. He met his fate calmly.

Hadley mounted the platform without hesitation. He had eaten no breakfast, but had dressed with deliberate care. "I am innogent and ready to meet my death," was his only statement.

Hadley, at his own request, was baptized during the night by the Rev. J. W. Henderson, prison chaplain, and DC James Hunter, a former chaplain. Dr. Hunter remained all night at the cell and sang hymns.

Just before the mask was adjusted Dr. Hunter offered a prayer and kissed Hadley on the cheek. Hadley, an escaped life termer from the Oklahoma state peniten-tiary, was convicted of murdering Mrs. Johnson during an automobile trip over the Arizona desert in No-vember, 1921.

In the group of 38 persons who witnessed the hanging was Peter Johnson, husband of the slain woman. Johnson, himself severely wounded at the time his wife was killed, was the state's principal witness in Hadley's two trials.

Body Not Claimed

Body Not Claimed Hadley's body, unclaimed by relatives, was buried on the prison grounds. At his request the mask was not removed from his face. He is survived by his aged mother, two divorced wives and two children, according to his attorney. 'Mrs. Ida Hadley, the second wife, who served with him in the Oklahoma peniten-tiary, obtained a divorce recently. The first wife and two children are living in New York but the attorney refused to disclose her name.

When the connection was made a woman's voice was heard but she spoke with such excitement that the warden could not under-stand her. MIAMI, FLA., April 13.—Like men returning from the dead, three members of the party of 19 men and five women who disappeared into the floodswept Everglades eight days ago, came out of the morass covered with sores and completely exhausted. 

Leaving out of the question the relationship of the league to the court, and as to how far it takes us into the leaving he says. takes us into the league, he says.

"All we do, if we ratify President Harding's proposal, is to promise to pay a share of the running expenses of the court, and to take part in the choosing of the judges."

I think that is a fair statement,

although rather strongly stated, because we cannot take part in the choosing of any judges until 1930, unless some one resigns or dies. So really the only immediate effect of, going into the court, so far as getting results from the court is concerned, is to pay a share of the run-

ning expenses of the court.

We have an American jurist sitting on the court (although he does not represent America), and we have no opportunity to participate in the selection of judges for seven years unless there is a vacancy. So when it is boiled down the great boon to be derived is the opportun-ity to pay a part of the running ex-penses of the "consent court," a court which has not been given jurfadiction over any vital matter benot consent for it to have jurisdic-

GREAT POSSIBILITIES IN REFORM OF CHINESE ALPHABET.

A Chinese alphabet with some forty characters has been perfected and is in successful use and may be officially adopted by the government,

The annoucement is of extraordinary importance for from the new alphabet may come the spread of information among the whole Chinese people. And the enlightenment of China will bring possibilities almost beyond the imagination of man.

One of the reasons why China has been a backward nation has been the fact that it is almost imossible to convey thought in Chinese writing. The Chinese alphabet contains thousands of characters which with other thousands of combinations and in flections requires a lifetime of study to master that it can be written understandingly and inderstood when written. And it is a cumber some languard to write or to print. A printer can easily un-derstand this when he is told that here are some five thousand characters in the enlinese alphabet compared with the twenty-six in the English. Even for the most elemental printing such a supply of characters is required as to make it almost beyond the ability of the printer to supply.

Now that a Chinese alphabet of some forty charactions has been devised we may soon expect to hear hat American typesetting machines such as Linotypes, Intertypes and Linographs have been equipped with Chinese mats and keyboards and shipped to China. When this is done the real spread of knowledge will, begin in China and we may expect such an awakening of the Chinese people as they have never experienced.

China has the oldest newspaper in the world. And the Chinese people might, centuries ago, have been the most enlightened people of the world if their language had been such that thought and information could have been easily transmitted in written form.

FOR A BUILDING CODE FOR WICHITA FALLS

Wichita Falls should have a building code. Such a code is especially needed for dwellings. It is justified as a measure for public safety, as

measure for the prevention of the spread of fires

and against destruction of life by windstorms. Flimsy structures have gone up that are a menace o life, houses have been built in rows so close together that an outbreak of fire would be almost imcossible to control, and purchasers of homes in some nstances have been defrauded by the failure of contractors and speculators to observe rules necessary for the construction of safe and substantial struc-

tures. It isn't right to permit such practices. Public safety is imperiled and individuals are defrauded. The municipality ought to adopt a code of minimum requirements for every building erected within the city and provide inspection to see that these requirements are met. It does this now with plumb-

ing and electric wiring with good results. What ought such a code to require? We, of course, cannot answer that question, but a special building code committee was appointed some time ago by Secretary Hoover, of the United States Department of Commerce. After many months of study and investigation this committee has made a report in which it has recommended minimum requirements for small dwelling construction. This report has been published by the government and is ready for distribution. The Times has obtained a copy of this report which it will be glad to loan to anyone interested. It may or may not be suited to Wichita Falls but it at least can be made a basis for discus-

Certainly the city council could take up no more important matter than a study of this subject.
