



"Jackson was never able to go to school," said Judge Carrigan. "And so could not spell, one fault in his apelling being to put an 'o' in the word 'all.' When he was president bills vetoed by him would be signed 'O. K., Andrew Jackson.' When asked what this was, Jackson replied that it meant 'Oll Korrect.'

Judge Carrigan further stated, that as a boy, Jackson in the world, was the greatest man in the world. "Now," he said. "I place Andrew Jackson next only to Washington."

Judge Carrigan has done much for the history department of the college since the founding of the institution this year, Some time ago he made a present of a set of books containing the records of the Red River dispute, and also gave the college access to his entire library of historical yolumes.



The raw sugar futures market opened firm and 7. to 10 points higher on builish reports from the street but broke violently on the Washington news which was followed by heavy general liquidation. May, which sold early at 6.40, broke to 5.90, July from 6.65 to 5.90 and September from 6.79 to 5.90, or 50 to 89 points from the early high point and 40 to 76 points from yesterday's closing quotations. The market then steadled on covering but was still very nervous and unsettled around midday.
