





"The Chronicle has no doubt of the sincerity of purpose on the part of the governor as regards law sent, and his courage and persistency are in the highest degree commendable; but the opinion may well be ventured that it is not because any member of the legislature is against law enforcement that the bill proposed by the governor was again defeated. The reason is that the governorseemingly sees only violations of the prohibition laws and calmly overlooks such atrocities as were perpetuated at Teneha, Goose Creek and Sour Lake, that at the latter place being to very recent date.

"The Chronicle would have been encouraged and delighted if as soon as the tidings of that outrage reached the governor he had offered a substantial reward for the arrest and conviction of the brutal perpetrators of it, and had followed his proclamation by a detachment of rangers.

"The thought is not in mind to minimize the unlawfulness or condone violations of the prohibition hw. They should be punished vigorously and unrelentingly, but as between the bootlegger, vile as he is, and the tar and feather crusader who in the darkness seizes and binds and beats his helpless victimnot even sparing defenseless womanhood—the offense of the former is trivial and insignificant compared with the cold, deliberate, premeditated, cowardly brutality of the latter.

"The act of the one is malum prohibitum, or an act made evil and prohibited by statute; the act of the other is malum in se, or inherently evil within itself and essentially criminal and brutal, and all the power given the governor by the constitution to enforce the law-and all is but little-should be employed by him to hunt down and bring to the bar of justice all those who boldly and brutally defy the law, as do the hooded and gowned midnight marauders whose coat of arms is a strap laid upon-a bucket of tar.

"There is also still fresh in the minds of Texas people the Teneba outrage, where a woman was beaten and mutilated by masked men. It is still recalled throughout the Union to the disgrace of Texas, and to the shame of the governor, who sent no rangers and offered no reward for capture of the guilty ones.

"Perhaps when the governor grows as vehement n denouncing the lash and the tar bucket as he does in excoriating booze and the bootlegger, he will find the legislature and the people generally taking more interest in his law enforcement crusade."


