LONDON, May 9 .- It is expected that not the least important result of the British note to Moscow will be its reaction on labor here. Even. before the publication of the text which showed a much more vigor-ous paraphrasing than had been an-ticipated the independent labor par-ties, the communists and spokesman of the parliamentary labor party let it be known that they would regard as deplorable a cancellation of trade-relations with Russia, which step they believed the impending note

Now that the communication had become public there is a general be-lief that it may lead to a break in the relations between London and Moscow, although it is pointed out in some quarters that this government only demands that Russia cease her anti-British tactics. The communication serves notice on the Moscow government that Great Britain will-feel herself free from the obligations of the trade agreement in the event that Russia

agreement in the event that Russia within 10 days does not: (1) Offer satisfactory assurances concerning propaganda; (2) admit her liability for the various offenses committed against British subjects and ships, offering proper compensation; (2) withdraw unequivocally her reply to the notes submitted by Great Britain in protest against the recent religious prosecutions in Russia.
