LONDON, May 19.—Great Britain is determined to avoid embarrassing France in the Ruhr, to be generous toward her in all respects and manage so that time and patience may be used to cure the irritation on the part of France which arose during the Ruhr air equipment case.

After the war Britain demobilized her air service with the rest of her allies, on the familiar theory of being equal to any other power.

USUAL "LATEST RUMOR" IS NOT PERTINENT SATURDAY.

PALMER IS RELEASED TO APPEAR ON MONDAY

Interest Now Centers In Death of Freshman Killed in Automobile Accident.

CHICAGO, May 19.—The mysterious disappearance of Leighton Mount, Northwestern University student who vanished 20 months ago after a freshman-sophomore class rush, was without its latest rumor today, the most recent of which having been eliminated last night by assistant state's attorneys who have conducted an inquiry since the finding of a skeleton, accepted by authorities as Mount's, under a pier in Evanston.

Failure of Miss Doris Fuchs, friend of Mount's, and her two brothers, William and Joseph, to throw any light on the mystery last night came on the heels of the release of Charles "Chuck" Palmer, football player of the university, who was held in custody without formal charge for more than 24 hours. Palmer will appear in court again Monday.

Interest in the Mount case today seemingly centered in the inquiry into the death of Louis Aubere, a Northwestern freshman, killed in an automobile accident April 24. Assistant state's attorneys held the Mount case through the ramifications of testimony given by witnesses.

RAILROAD RATES FOREST PRODUCTS ARE UNREASONABLE

WASHINGTON, May 19.—Railroad rates on forest products from north Pacific coast producing points to the southwest, including parts of Nebraska, Colorado and New Mexico are all of Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas, were found unreasonable today by the interstate commerce commission, in comparison with rates on similar commodities from California and from the producing territory grouped with Spokane in northern Idaho and western Montana. A complete reexamination was ordered, effective August 1.
