PAULS VALLEY, OKLA. FLOODED AS RESULT OF BREAK IN DAM

IMPERIAL WIZARD SUES EMPEROR OF KLAN FOR \$100,000

CASE IS FILED IN CIRCUIT COURT AT LITTLE ROCK, ARKANSAS.

ARTICLE PUBLISHED IN PAPERS BASIS FOR SUIT

Telegrams Charged Dr. Evans Deposited Klan Money to Personal Credit.

LITTLE ROCK, May 24.—Dr. Hiram Wesley Evans of Atlanta, Ga., imperial wizard of the Ku Klux Klan today filed suit in the Pulaski county circuit court against William J. Simmons of Atlanta, emperor of the Klan, asking \$100,000 for alleged defamation of character.

The basis for Dr. Evans' suit was a telegram which Emperor Simmons is alleged to have sent to local newspapers for publication May 18. According to the petition filed today the telegram charged that Dr. Evans, during a period six months prior to the telegram, received fees in excess of \$100,000 belonging to the Klan and deposited them to his personal credit and appropriated to his own use.

The telegram, it is set forth, was answered to charges against Emperor Simmons by James A. Comer, grand dragon of the realm of Arkansas Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, who was a member of the organization founded by Simmons as a "tea grabbing scheme."

Another statement in the telegram, the petition sets forth, alleged that Dr. Evans charged to the Klan his personal living expenses, including house rent, grocery, light and fuel bills and that he was splitting fees with his personal representatives in several states.

Dr. Evans, in his petition, states that the charges are false and alleges that they were composed by the emperor with the malicious intent of injuring his character and attacking his reputation for honesty and integrity.

As a result of the charges, widely published, Dr. Evans states that his name and reputation have been damaged to the extent of \$100,000.

NEW SUPREME CHIEF OF TRIBES OF BEN HUR NAMED

WINDYBORNEVILLE, IND., May 24.—The tragic death of Dr. R. H. Gerard, supreme chief of the Tribe of Ben Hur, on May 12 as the result of a hotel elevator accident at Terre Haute, Indiana, made it necessary for the executive committee of the society to elect a successor to serve during his unexpected term which ends in June, 1924.

PRESBYTERIANS TO HOLD MEMBERSHIP IN FEDERAL COUNCIL

ADMIT WOMEN AS MEMBERS OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEES

GENERAL ASSEMBLY HAS PROGRAM OF ACTIVITIES

Decision Favorable to Women Comes As Climax to a Long Fight.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., May 24.—A report received at the office of the United States marshal here today said that the Rush creek dam had broken at Pauls Valley, Okla., and that a portion of the town was flooded. Telephone communication with the city has been cut off. The report said that four feet of water was in the southwestern Bell Telephone Company's office.

VIRTUALLY EVERY SECTION OF PAULS VALLEY FLOODED

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 24.—Virtually every section of Pauls Valley, Okla., with the exception of a small area on the eastern side was flooded last night when waters from Rush creek broke through a dike as a result of heavy rains lasting several days, according to a report received by the Western Union Telegraph Company here from their office manager at Pauls Valley. The waters stood in some places seven feet deep, but have receded today, the report said. No lives were lost.

Every business house in the city was flooded, according to the Western Union office, and damage is expected to run far into the thousands. Many persons were rescued without injury from their homes in boats. Workers spent all yesterday in clearing up the debris, but the steady rain made their efforts futile.

Pauls Valley is located at the junction of Rush creek and the Washita river, the creek at the south side of the city with the river at the north edge.

UPHOLD AWARD OF \$7500 PER MONTH STILLMAN ALIMONY

NEW YORK, May 24.—The appellate division of the supreme court today upheld the award of \$7,500 a month to Mrs. Estelle Stillman, a woman's counsel fees granted Mrs. Anne U. Stillman by Justice Morschauer last week.

James A. Stillman, former New York banker, had appealed the award as excessive after he had divorced, naming Fred Beauvais, Indian guide, as co-respondent.

Mrs. Estelle Stillman said she had given Mrs. Stillman \$210,822 in addition to fees of \$47,500.

The appellate division was unanimous in its decision. Mrs. Estelle Stillman, named by Mrs. Stillman as co-respondent, today said she had no objection to the award as she had threatened to sue to support her child.

While no word was forthcoming direct from Mr. Stillman, his friends were quoted as saying he had given \$100,000 to Mrs. Stillman, who was quietly waiting to see if he would bring her threatened suit.

HIGGINBOTHAM IS ON TRIAL BUT ASKS CHANGE OF VENUE

CROSS CITY, FLA., May 24.—Water Higginbotham, convict whipping boss, charged with murder in connection with the death of Martin Tabert of North Dakota, went on trial here late today. At the trial for the state immediately filed a motion for a change of venue and arguments by counsel for the state and defense will be heard tomorrow morning.

SOCIALISTS FROM THIRTY DIFFERENT COUNTRIES MERGED

NEW BODY IS FORMED AT A MEETING HELD AT HAMBURG.

DESIGNED TO INCLUDE ALL SOCIALIST WORKERS

Victor Berger From the United States Attends the Convention.

HAMBURG, May 24.—The second and second-one-half session of the international socialist congress in their places has been created a consolidated organization known as the "international workers' international." The new body was formed here by socialist party delegates from 30 different nations, including Victor Berger from the United States.

THE NEW INTERNATIONAL IS DESIGNED TO INCLUDE ALL THE SOCIALIST WORKERS OF THE WORLD, ALTHOUGH AT PRESENT SPECIFICALLY EXCLUDING THE ZIONIST REPRESENTATIVES, WHO VOTED AT THE CONGRESS IN PALESTINE AGAINST JOINING THE SECOND INTERNATIONAL.

Point two notes that the organization is endeavoring completely to replace the existing socialist movement.

The third point states that the international is practically operative only insofar as its decision, and binding on all its parts, adding: "Such decision of the international organization therefore means voluntary restriction of the autonomy of parties in the individual lands."

Point four specifies that the organization must serve as an instrument during the war as well as peace.

STUDENTS OF OKLAHOMA A. & M. PROTEST WILSON

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 24.—Governor W. W. Keighton today announced that he had received a delegation of protest today by several hundred students of the Oklahoma A. & M. college, who are protesting against the recent appointment of George Wilson, farmer-labor reconstruction league leader, as president of the school.

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 24.—A delegation of several hundred students of Oklahoma A. & M. College at Stillwater and residents of that city arrived at the capitol here today to protest to Governor J. C. Walton against the recent appointment of George Wilson as president of the institution. Wilson is a former state manager of the Oklahoma Farmer-Labor reconstruction league.

Lawton Preacher Is Ordered Reinstated By General Assembly

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., May 24.—The Rev. Thomas J. Irwin, of Lawton, Okla., who was suspended by the 21st General Assembly a year ago when it was charged that he had performed a marriage ceremony with the principals in a banking suit, was ordered reinstated today by action of the 125th general assembly of the Presbyterian church in the United States of America.

The assembly concurred in the report of the judicial committee, which investigated the case and found that the punishment meted out to the Rev. Mr. Irwin was "too severe and unwarranted by the facts in the case." After announcing the minister's reinstatement was ordered prepared.

While the controversy between the Rev. Mr. Irwin and the 21st Assembly was at its height, the church in Lawton, Okla., of which Mr. Irwin was pastor, was partially destroyed by fire and Mr. Irwin's wife and children were killed and beaten by masked men.

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### FUNDAMENTALISTS AT ASSEMBLY WIN GREATEST VICTORY

RESOLUTION IN CASE OF DR. HARRY FOSDICK IS ADOPTED.

### OPPOSED TO THE LIBERAL BIBLE INTERPRETATION

Voices Losing the Moderation, Declares William Jennings Bryan.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 24.—Action of the general assembly of the Presbyterian church of the U. S. in adopting the resolution on Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick, sponsored by the fundamentalists, and rejecting the recommendations supported by the liberalists, was being hailed today as the greatest victory of the convention by the former group.

The fundamentalists opposed to the liberal interpretation of the Bible, as expounded by Dr. Fosdick, succeeded in forcing the adoption of a minority report of the committee on bills and overtures, which directs the New York Presbytery to require the preaching in the First Presbyterian Church of New York City, where Dr. Fosdick delivered his famous "shall fundamentalists win" sermon, to conform to the Presbyterian doctrine. The committee in its majority report, which the liberalists sought to have adopted, rejected an overture from a Philadelphia Presbytery denouncing Fosdick and his teachings. William Jennings Bryan, who with two Philadelphia ministers, the Reverend Gordon A. McLean and the Reverend Clarence E. Macartney, led the fight against the majority report, was highly elated at the result.

"This is worth losing the moderation," Mr. Bryan declared in commenting on the action of the assembly.

The minority report made provision for the New York Presbytery, which is conducting an investigation into the Fosdick case, to report the action in full transcript to the general assembly next year. The report also reaffirmed the utterance of the general assembly of 1910 to denounce the doctrine of the "Kingdom of Christ and other points of the doctrine of the denomination."

### WOMAN WHO AIDS ANOTHER AND CHILD SECRETLY MARRIED

KANSAS CITY, May 24.—Mrs. Frank Warren, who became acquainted with Miss Nancy Jordan, when Miss Jordan came to this country from England, secretly married her with her little son, Francis, who was secretly married here March 19 to Lieutenant Thomas E. Whitson, according to information made public here today.

The bride and groom are reported to be spending their honeymoon in Washington, D. C., and planning to be at home at Fort Meyer, Va., after June 1.

When it was known that Miss Jordan had been held by immigration authorities and faced the possibility of being sent back to England, Mrs. Warren reached for them and obtained their admission to the United States.

Mrs. Warren declared that her husband was drawn to the young woman by her divorced husband, Major Frank Warren, who had told her, she said, that Miss Jordan had aroused his interest while he was in the service of the United States Army abroad. Miss Jordan and her husband made their home here for several weeks with Mrs. Warren, but later moved to a separate room. Miss Jordan is said to be employed in this city under an assumed name.

### CHAIN STORE MANAGER IS SHOT TO DEATH AND YOUNG LADY WOUNDED

MEMPHIS, TENN., May 24.—W. C. Spencer, chain store manager, was shot to death and Miss Laura Whitten Johnson, school teacher, was wounded in the back of the head early today by an unidentified negro who attacked them in their automobile on a suburban road on the eastern limits of the city. Both victims were robbed.

Spencer's body was found slumped in the front seat of the car with bullet wounds in the back of his head. The young woman was taken to a local hospital, where her injuries were pronounced superficial. She was in such a state of nervous excitement she could give little information of the affair.

### STRIKERS HOLDING TOWN IN GERMANY FOLLOWING BATTLE

BERLIN, May 24.—Striking workmen, said to be communists, are holding Gelsenkirchen where bitter fighting occurred yesterday with heavy casualties to the forces of both the police and strikers, according to information reaching here today.

The Gelsenkirchen civilian defense force and the fire brigade are said to have been driven from the city last night and there is no force available for police duty. The strikers say that it is impossible to give a correct estimate of the number of casualties.

The communists took possession of police headquarters, smashed everything in the building and then fired it. The commanders of the mob had evidently marshaled their forces in preparation for an onslaught, as the whole action was carried out on a military line under the order of the strikers.

The citizens of Gelsenkirchen are watching further developments with anxiety and terror.

### POLICE HEADQUARTERS IN CHARGE OF COMMUNISTS

BERLIN, May 24.—The communists have taken possession of police headquarters at Gelsenkirchen and have hoisted the red flag over the building.

Reports from German sources say that five persons were killed and 41 wounded in the fighting for possession of the buildings. The struggle began late last night and continued early this morning.

The building is said to have been defended by the civilian defense organization which was finally forced to quit when one wing was set on fire by the attacking mob. The fighting was not confined to the building, but spread through the streets and many street cars were shattered. A number of non-residents were wounded.

### COMMUNIST WAVE IS SWEEPING THE RHINELAND

BERLIN, May 24.—A communistic wave threatens to spread over the industrial sections of the Rhine-land and Westphalia if the communist strikers succeed in extending and organizing their present wild strike to the dimensions of a general strike.

This resolution was reached at Dortmund when a mass meeting of striking miners and smelters adopted the following program:

- 1.—To hold out to the end and whether it means bread or death.
- 2.—The establishment of a labor dictatorship.
- 3.—Formation of new "hundred men" units.

There has been fierce fighting for the last two days at Dortmund in which the Communists have endeavored to disarm and oust the police. This attempt was frustrated by the energetic front presented by the police, who made a hard stand when the Communist leaders tried

to inflame the masses by cries of "bloodhounds." So far the police are masters of the situation, but bloody scenes are expected at any moment.

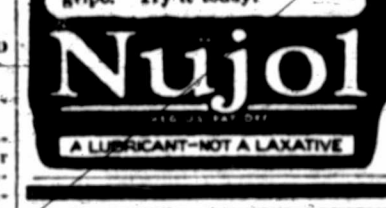
The French solidary are passive onlookers when the Communists invade shops and fixed prices at a half to one-third of those prevailing, and use forcible measures to make the protesting merchants submit. Fuel is added to the flame by the rapid rise of the dollar in exchange, as it is feared that it will now be only a question of days when the German currency will slide to the level of Austrian money. The opinion is general that an explosion cannot much longer be avoided.

### COMMISSION SUIT ON TRIAL IN 97TH COURT

The case of J. A. Lockett against E. L. Smith and others, which involves the sale of ten acres of land in the Red river valley lands in 1921 is on trial before Judge E. W. Napier and a jury in the 97th district court. The plaintiff seeks judgment for \$3,000 which he claims is due him as commission. The case was tried once before in the same court but resulted in a hung jury. Judge Napier excused the jury just before the noon hour until 1:30 o'clock, during which time the court heard arguments on defendant's motion for an instructed verdict which was presented after the plaintiff had rested his case.

(AP)—The daily average gross crude oil production of the United States decreased 11,650 barrels for the week ended May 19, totaling 1,951,850 barrels, compared with 1,963,500 for the preceding week, according to the weekly summary of the American Petroleum Institute. The daily average production east of the Rocky Mountains was 1,268,850 barrels, compared with 1,268,500, a decrease of 1,450. California production was 651,000 barrels, compared with 650,000, a decrease of 10,000.

Oklahoma-Kansas showed a daily average gross production of 583,150 barrels, an increase of 1,500; north Texas a decrease of 2,500; central Texas an increase of 1,700; north Louisiana an increase of 1,050, and Arkansas a decrease of 4,500.

In Oklahoma production of the Osage nation was 127,700, against 129,050; Tonkawa 112,300, against 109,800; Lyons-Quinn 6,900, against 7,400, and the Bristow pool 16,400, against 14,100.

The Mexico pool, central Texas, reported 32,400 barrels, against 33,000; Haynesville, north Louisiana, 2,275, against 20,700; and Smackover, Ark., light 14,600 barrels, against 15,950; heavy, 68,150, against 67,550 barrels. In the Gulf Coast field, Hull reported 16,900 barrels, against 16,900, and West-Columbia 18,700, against 18,600.

There were no changes reported in crude oil prices for the major districts, Mid-Continent being quoted at \$1.10 to \$1.12 a barrel, according to the gravity of the oil, and Pennsylvania districts, Bradford district, Pa., \$1.10 a barrel.

According to figures collected by the institute, imports of petroleum (crude and refined oils) at the principal ports for the week ended May 19 totaled 1,407,000 barrels, a daily average of 201,000, compared with 1,448,000, a daily average of 206,800 for the week ended May 12.

**Oil Well Abandoned.**  
The wildcat oil well two miles east of Charlie has been abandoned after having been drilled to a depth of 2400 feet. It is reported that the machinery will be removed to some place west of Clara.

**Road Work.**  
The workmen on Charlie's 10 miles of the 31 miles of good roads in district No. 1 have yet about 4,000 yards of gravel to lay down before the work is finished. With the present force of workmen it will require about 40 days to complete the work.

**Small Boy Injured.**  
Jack Winningham, a nine year old boy living in Charlie, was injured late Saturday evening by attempting to jump on a car while it was being driven. Two bones of one arm were broken. No other injuries have been reported.

**Meteor Seen.**  
The falling of what was supposed to be a meteoric fragment, from the northwestern sky Sunday afternoon, was seen by several people of Charlie, and the sharp detonation which occurred some 20 minutes later and which shook buildings and jarred windows much like a slight earthquake tremor, was noted by everyone.

The meteor appeared as a ball of fire falling straight down from the sky, leaving in its path a streak of fire and smoke. The detonation which followed several minutes later sounded like two rapid succession explosives, the first being the greater of the two.

It is believed that the meteor struck the earth a good many miles from here as it was seen to fall several minutes before the detonation was heard and felt.

### PRESIDENT URGES REDEDICATION TO IDEALS OF NATION

#### DELIVERS AN ADDRESS BEFORE NATIONAL AMERICAN COUNCIL

#### FORMED TO ENCOURAGE BETTER CITIZENSHIP

#### Will Revive Interest Lacking Since End of the War, the President Says

WASHINGTON, May 24. (AP)—An appeal for a re-dedication of the American people to the aims and purposes of their government as set forth in the preamble in the constitution was made by President Harding today in an address at the opening session of the National American Council, an organization recently formed to encourage better American citizenship.

Such a re-dedication, the president said, would furnish to the nation "a commanding and dominating national interest" which he said had been lacking since the end of the world war. Quoting the preamble, Mr. Harding said it constituted "the complete statement of our nation's aspiration; \* \* \* the chart for our course; \* \* \* and the inspiration to every effort to make one and all of us better citizens."

While deploring the lack of a definite common purpose such as was set up by the war, the president said that he had meetings with respect to the "common observation nowadays sometimes \* \* \* altogether too easily and hastily made, that democracy is on trial."

"We will be quite safe in admitting," he said, "that many of the institutions which have sprung up in the hope that through them the best aims of democracy might be realized, are on trial. We will make no mistake if we consider that the attitudes and conduct of many people who are devoted to democratic institutions are on trial. All this may be admitted without implying

that any part of society is seeking an alternative of democracy.

"There is much questioning of ways and means and institutions, but as to the fundamentals it certainly can be said that never since our country more firmly committed to the broad ideals and purposes of democracy and never were so many other countries and people seeking to establish like commitments."

**Complex Situation.**

"Human society has never faced a more complex or difficult situation; and it is therefore of first importance that all Americans be brought to understand the underlying purposes of this commonwealth and to fix firmly in their hearts the determination to maintain institutions capable of progressive evolution and development along the lines of our fundamental principles."

"In some ways Americans are a very conservative people in other ways quite the reverse. Having been compelled for generations more or less to improvise institutions fitted to their needs, they have largely lost the fear of placing too much reliance on this kind of protection. It is liable to deaden the whole nation of progress."

"It seems to me that two conditions must be met if our quorum of democratic institutions are to continue improving and adapting themselves to the requirements of an increasingly complex social order. Every governmental unit must be so nearly as possible a miniature of the ideal state which all hope to realize, capable of standing on its own bottom and managing its affairs as may best serve the public welfare. But, since such a collection of independent self-governing communities does not form a nation, there must be also some potent bonds of sympathy, interest, and common purpose uniting these communities into a great united commonwealth."

**Have Not Changed.**

"Our national experience during the war afforded illustration of how a great common purpose, intense and universal, would weld the nation into a true unity. As a people, we have not changed with the return of peace, but definitely we have lost much of the unity, the solidarity, the eagerness for simple service that marked our wartime attitude. Plainly, it is because we have been preoccupied with the complexity of our time and situation.

"No one great dominating and appealing cause has been visualized before us to command our loyalty and devotion. We have not discovered any single, all-absorbing enterprise capable of commanding the services of the whole united community.

"We need to find such a commanding and dominating national interest, I believe it would be found if we could contrive means to set before all the people the full meaning and implication of that simple statement about the aims and purposes of our government, which is contained in the preamble of the constitution. In that preamble the fathers of the republic set forth the objective of this great democracy: 'We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this constitution for the United States of America.'

**Suggestion Offered.**

"No doubt the working implications of this thesis will be developed in your discussions. But one brief suggestion may be offered. Consider one phrase in the preamble: 'To \* \* \* establish justice.' In our mechanism of government we have set up an elaborate organization for the establishment of justice, but the courts are sometimes impossible, unless citizens subject to their jurisdiction are sincerely desirous to do justice and see it done in the affairs of day by day life. Thus the immediate and continuing opportunity for every citizen to contribute toward the achievement of this particular objective by the nation as a whole, lies in so guiding one's personal affairs that they shall fall into confidence with this injunction, 'to establish justice.'

"If we sincerely wish to leave a better and greater nation to the next generation, to bequeath institutions better adapted to achieve the greater aim of social organizations, we shall accomplish these things by adhering in our daily conduct to the rule of seeking and doing justice. To the end and the federal government has important contributions to make. Along the same lines the state and municipal governments have important duties. Beyond these the citizen has a personal responsibility in this business of training better citizens.

"The result of individual and collective effort to make this democratic program a moving force in our lives and conduct, will extend beyond our own borders. The nation which makes this democracy a program, has discovered how to 'insure domestic tranquility,' can point the way to world peace, not by force of arms, but by living the precepts of representative democracy's true platform in all its dealings with mankind."

### SUN WELL BELIEVED ON SWASTIKA SAND; IS SETTING CASING

#### MEGARGEL, TEXAS, May 24.—

The Sun Company is reported to have found the Swastika-sand at a depth of 1,385 feet in its Kovar No. 1, northwest of the discovery well. Two more wells are due to reach the sand in a few days. United Royalty Company's Richardson No. 1, one-half mile northeast of the discovery well, should be on the sand early next week as it is between 100 and 161 feet lower than the discovery well and the dip of the formations is supposed to be to the west.

The Richardson No. 2-A will be good for 200 barrels a day when placed on the pump, according to unanimous opinion among oil men watching the field. Casing was set almost four feet in the sand found at 1,379 feet and the water has apparently been shut off as none is coming out with the oil. The crew is removing a shallow bridge formed during the last haul, which lasted one hour and 20 minutes. There is still some mud in the hole and very little sand is being brought out with the oil. The sand is light brown in color and packed very tight.

Richardson No. 1-B, 606 feet west of the discovery well, is drilling below 1,519 feet.

There is much speculation here as to what direction the field will extend and where the center of the structure is. The wells due to reach the sand in a few days will be closely watched. There is little lease activity.
