

The daily average production east of the Rocky Mountains was 1,266,850 barrels, compared with 1,268,500, a decrease of 1,650. California production was 685,900 barrels, compared with 695,000, a decrease of 10,000.



HE ENFORCEMENT OF PROHIBITION LAWS.

This newspaper has ventured the opinion that wets in the state of New York will get small comfrom the action of the legislature of that state voting to repeal the state's prohibition enforcent laws. Prohibition is now written into the Fedral Constitution and is a part of our basic law. It till be enforced by the federal government alike in ates that don't want it and those that do. It will inforced in New York as it is in Texas and in ory other state of the Union. The repeal of the obibition laws in New York may have the effect or the time of making enforcement by the federal rament more difficult but this will be remedied

The time is coming when the whole duty of enreing prohibition will be turned over to the federal rnment where of right it now belongs since the tion of the prohibition amendment. Some day expect to see Texas repeal its prohibition laws to see them become a dead letter, so far as the tate government is concerned. We are in agree on this point with the Waco Times-Herald. United States government," says the Times Herald, "is empowered to enforce its own laws. It to no assistance from the state. For example, fi authorized to coin money. No state can coin The federal government enforces the law to coinage; if any one undertakes to coin money, e is subject to arrest and imprisonment-not by at by the federal authority. Just as the federal authority can arrest and the counterfeiter, so the federal authority can errest and try the bootlegger. And just as the state cosn't defy or sidestep the federal authority as to unterfeiting, so the state doesn't defy or sidestep the federal authority when it declines to exercise the ower it is presumed to retain under the Eighteenth ndment. If the state should authorise the coinge of money or the manufacture and sale of intoxiating liquors, it would thereby assert its right to et along without the United States, but nothing of this sort is being done by New York; what New York has done, if the governor signs the bill is merely to rve notice that two bodies can't very well occupy same space and perform identical feats one of the other is superfluous, and therefore the task of nforcing the prohibition law belongs to the federal uthority. And that, we predict, is what will eventsally take place the country over; state after state will repeal its laws on the subject, leaving to the federal authority the sole exercise of the power conterred by the Eighteenth amendment. There will then be no divided responsibility and no chance for confusion and conflict. There never was a greater absurdity than this of concurrent power; the thing is a contradiction on its face. The question of prohibition is not involved; that is settled so long as the Eighteenth amendment stands. The enforcement of the prohibition laws belongs either to the state or to the federal authority; it can't belong to both with out all manner of confusion, with consequent injus tices.
