



time any one practicing as a gradu-ate nurse must be able to show her license card or permit, if requested. All nurses registered in the state of Texas must be reregistered be-fore July first. Reregistration blanks may be obtained from the

the fee is ten dollars; after that time the fee is fifteen dollars. The original certificate Issued by The original certificate issued by the board must be recorded with the county clerk of the county in which applicant resides before July 14. This only has to be done once and a fee of fifty cents must be paid the clerk. The certificate of registration must be accompanied by a certificate of the county of the certificate of the certifi

by a certificate of identity signed by two nurses, physicians or well known people of the community. All other graduate nurses will be All other graduate nurses will be allowed to nurse under a permit which is only effective until the applicant can qualify for registration by taking the next examinations. Applications for permits must be made to the secretary of the board and accompanied by the fee of two dollars. Those who have failed on one or more examinations will be allowed to nurse under a permit. The next examinations will be held October 25, 26 and 27. A certificate issued after June 13 must be recorded with the county clerk within thirty days. A cer-tificate of reregistration does not



#### CHIEF JUSTICE TAFT AND HIS PENSION.

Radical elements are demanding the resignation or the impeachment of Chief Justice Taft because very train owed its life to that hive of activity and he accepts a pension from the Carnegie Foundation exchange. growing out of his services as law teacher in Har-

Those who join in this agitation profess to see in Mr. Taft's acceptance of this pension the assumption of an obligation to favor property and capital in reaching decisions in the supreme court. They profess to believe that it does not leave Mr. Taft free to give unbiased consideration to questions coming before the court, especially questions in which there might be a conflict between human and property

This fear, if it is really fear and not the seizing of a pretext to raise an agitation in which there are too many who find their favorite employment, will appear to ordinary, sober minded folks as entirely groundless. If there is basis for it no judge who owned property or enjoyed an income of any kind, could be qualified to sit in any court, for if a man is subject to influence on account of a pension he would be subject to influence on account of receiving income, rents, interest or revenue of any character from property. To limit judgeships to those having no property or income from property would be to nit them almost entirely to a few socialists, communists and anarchists, and this would soon become a country fit for only those kind of folks.



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

The average daily wage paid this tear for harvest hands is \$2.50 with coard and lodging. This is fifty tents higher than last year, according to the agent. It has been noted that a number of former railroad employees are assisting in the harthat a number of former railroad employes are assisting in the harvest fields this summer.

The short straw of wheat this rear, has forced many farmers to use headers instead of binders and in probably one-third of the fields this method is resorted to in gathering the heads of wheat. The straw is so short that if is practically impossible to bind the sheaves flut for this reason the other method is resorted to.

The county agent states that in many instances the wheat fields will not pay for the cost of harvasting the grain. However, the heads have filled out better these was anticipated and it is believed that the wheat will be of a higher grade than the preceding year as the grain kernels are plump.
