SPECIAL TRAIN OF PRESIDENT PASSES HEART OF ALASKA

CALLS "AMERICA'S WONDERLAND" BY CHIEF EXECUTIVE OF NATION.

PASSES A SUCCESSION OF BEAUTIFUL SCENES

Trip On Train Has Given Party Vision of Alaska, Not Otherwise Possible.

ABOARD PRESIDENT HARDING'S Special Train, Alaska Railroad, July 14. Here a two hour stop was made. The president greeted citizens and was shown about the town which is the heart of operations in connection of the railroad and has become the center of trade in coal from the Chickaloon and Kaktovik fields to the east of the line. The train was parked, for the night.

BRITISH EFFORTS

BEING PUT FORTH

TO SAVE GERMANY

Believe that such course is the best in the interest of civilization.

CHARGE FRENCH PROPOSE TO BREAK THAT COUNTRY

PARIS, July 12.—Great Britain bases her divergent view from France on the broad ground that, in the event of a breakdown of civilization, Germany must be saved from breaking into pieces, and that truth is that and that it is a consideration that eclipses all other considerations. There is also in the present strain between Britain and France, a financial question in the matter of some sympathy tends to Britain.

The question is intricate, but essential to understanding is that actual damage done to the devastated districts, leaving the remainder, if it should be possible to get any more from the French, to take care of inter-allied debts.

Defining Reparations

Again in this exchange of documents, Marquill-Curon, with apparent guilelessness, asks, "How do you define reparations?" and Premier replied, "How do you define reparations?"

Poland wants to know if the debts due from France to Britain are to stand on an equal footing with reparations of the devastated districts as part of the reparations, or whether reparations are to be defined as meaning primarily restoration of the devastated districts on the soil of France and Belgium.

To examine the matter from another angle, at the Paris peace conference, the original definition as applying to the actual damage to civilization and property, but later, at the investigation of the League of Nations, the payment of soldiers' pensions. How much this meant to Britain is understood when it is realized that the reparations of the devastated districts was done on French and Belgian soil and very little on British soil, so that Britain's only way to qualify for getting a considerable share of reparation money depended upon insertion of soldiers' pensions.

Little Hornawagled

The truth is that France thinks she is being a little hornawagled in this matter of reparations. Premier Clemenceau refuses to assent to the fixing of reparations by an international tribunal, and thereby seems to be in the position of a man who has been asked to pay a sum of money to a creditor, but who has refused to do so, and who has instead insisted that the creditor should pay him a sum of money.

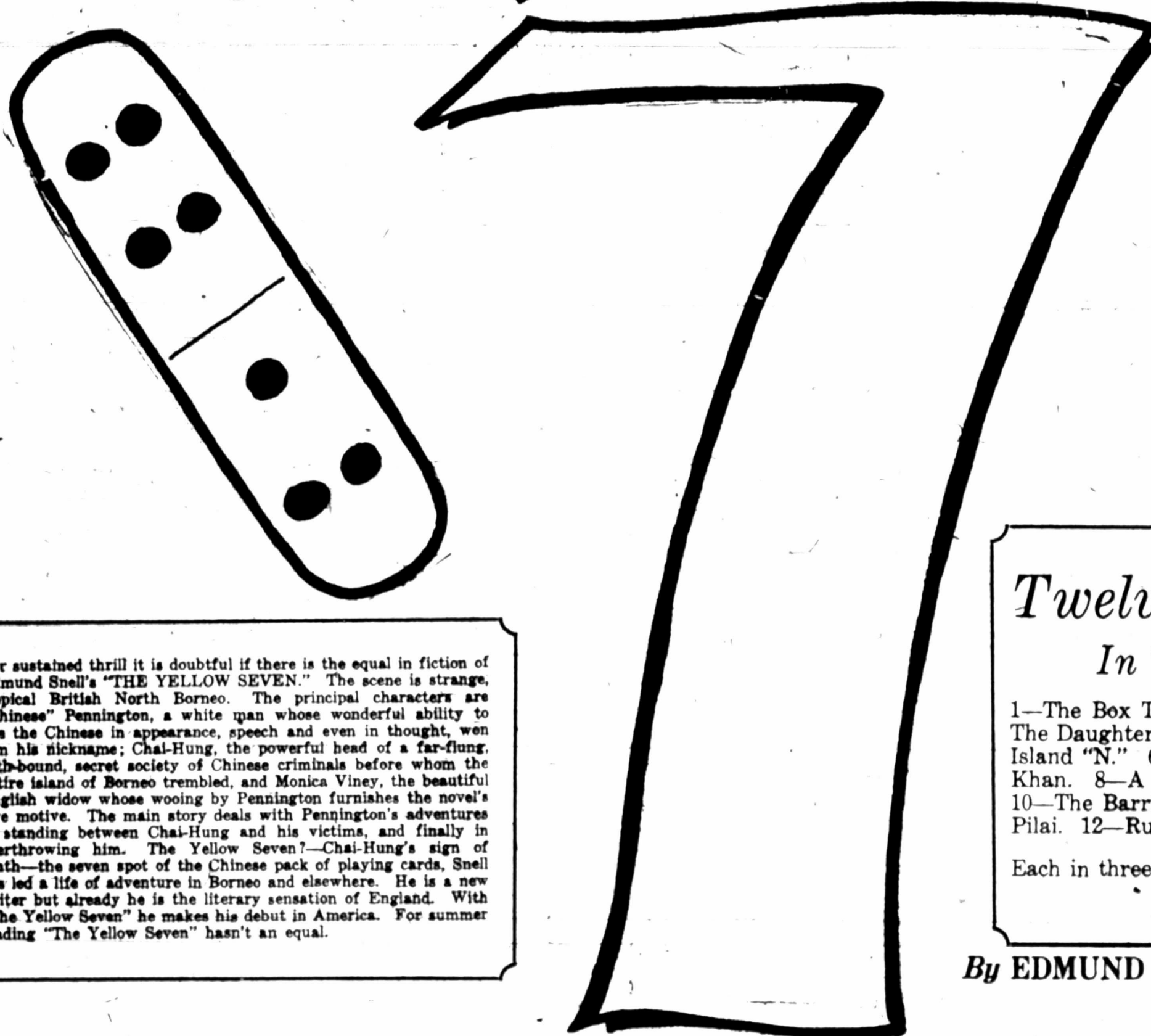
