HARDING ILLNESS IS MORE COMPLICATED; BULLETIN IS ISSUED

ROY MITCHELL IS HANGED AT WAGO JUST BEFORE NOON

PAYS PENALTY FOR KILLING MRS. ETHEL DENECAW IN JANUARY.

CONVICTED OF MURDER SIX DIFFERENT CASES

Confessed Double Crime For Which Two Other Negroes Had Been Sentenced.

WAGO, July 29. (AP)—Roy Mitchell, convicted of six murders, paid the extreme penalty here today for the murder of Mrs. Ethel Denehaw in January of this year. The trap was sprung at 11:02 a. m. and Mitchell was pronounced dead at 11:34. Mitchell's neck broke when he fell and he did not move after the drop. According to physicians his heart almost ceased to beat shortly after the drop, but then revived to a remarkable extent. Mitchell's last words, uttered after the black cap had been adjusted and just before the trap was sprung, were: "Take me home. Previously, just before he walked on to the scaffold Mitchell bellowed to the crowd: "God by a everybody. There were the only words uttered by Mitchell after reaching the gallows. He walked to the gibbet with a firm step and a smile on his lips. On the way to the scaffold he bade good bye to the prisoners in jail. To his spiritual adviser, Rev. O. H. Hatfield, pastor of the Nazarene Church, and to County Attorney Farmer who conferred with him an hour before he was led to the gallows, Mitchell confessed the crime of the murder of Mrs. and Mrs. W. H. Barker and 11-year-old Homer Turk. He told Rev. Hatfield, County Attorney Farmer, that he was alone in the commission of other crimes and that he had told the truth in his confession. Fifteen minutes before Mitchell was taken to the scaffold Deputy Sheriff L. Mack Wood went to his cell and told him he had come to "read the death warrant. "Let me read it myself," Mitchell requested. His request was complied with, and (Continued on Page 1, Column 1.)

WICHITA, July 29. (AP)—Motion to dissolve the temporary injunction granted by Judge George C. HARD RAINS WITH WINDS GENERAL OVER TERRITORY

MONDAY MORNING STORM IS MOST SEVERE IN SOUTH-ERN OKLAHOMA.

RAINFALL HERE WAS EIGHT-TENTHS OF AN INCH

Twister at Hollister, Oklahoma. Destroys Several Houses; Wires Down.

Reports from railroad offices Monday indicate that hard rains, accompanied by much wind, had fallen at many points along the railroad lines out of the city early Monday morning. The storm seems to have been over this entire section of Texas and Southern Oklahoma. The greatest amount of damage done by the storm was in southern Oklahoma. The rains, which extended as far as Altus, were heavier than in other parts of the Wichita Falls territory and a hard wind was reported. A small twister struck Hollister, Oklahoma, about 4 o'clock Monday morning and is said to have destroyed several houses. Telegraph wires at that place are down, however, and particulars have not yet been received.

According to reports from various other points, rains measuring from one-quarter of an inch to inch fell at Byers, Petrolia, Hollister and Dundee, with a great deal of rainfall between Childress and Decatur. The Wichita Falls Southern dispatcher's office reported a light shower at Archer City, but it is not known how far south the storm extended along this line. With almost every shower a hard south wind was reported. A word was received from Henrietta that rains, lasting for over 45 minutes, fell at that place about 4 o'clock Monday morning. During that time another tornado threatened. Rain was falling during the forenoon at Spur. It is said. Eight-tenths of an inch of rain fell at Byers Monday morning, according to actual measurement. RUMOR REPUBLICAN REVOLUTION IS SOON TO BREAK IN GREECE

LONDON, July 29. (AP)—Reports have reached the British government of an attempt to set up a republic in Greece in place of the monarchy. Ronald Hooley, secretary for foreign affairs, told the house of commons this afternoon. LONDON, July 29. (AP)—Mr. McNeill's statement was in reply to a statement from Commander Kenneth H. Thirty-Five Killed And Nine Injured in Crossing Accidents

CHICAGO, July 29. (AP)—Thirty-five persons were killed and nine injured yesterday and early today in nine railroad crossing accidents in various parts of the country. One Pennsylvania train struck two automobiles within a few hours, four being killed in the first crash and nine in the second. The first accident occurred at Highland, Ill., where an automobile apparently became stalled on the tracks as the passenger train struck. A few hours later the same train struck another automobile at a crossing at Liguett, Ind., eight miles from Terre Haute, six persons being killed. At Iron Mountain, Mo., a Missouri Pacific express train struck an automobile and killed four persons. Five persons were killed when a Long Island passenger train struck an automobile at Rockville Center, L. I. A report from Alameda, Cal., said that three persons were killed and three injured when a car in which they were riding was struck by a Southern passenger train. A Seaboard train struck an automobile, killing two and injuring one, probably fatally. Two persons were killed and two seriously injured at Robanna, N. J., when their automobile was struck by a Reading passenger train, and Rutland, Vt., reported that one person was killed and one injured by an accident at a railroad crossing.

WAGO MAN SERIOUSLY INJURED BY STREET CAR

WAGO, July 29. (AP)—A. M. Garrett, aged 39, received injuries early this morning from which he may die, when struck by a street car in the downtown district. Mr. Garrett, according to eye witnesses, was driving a one-hour wagon across the street car track. The impact of the car threw the wagon several feet to the side. Mr. Garrett being struck several times by the car before it was brought to a stop. The injured man received head wounds under the chin, the left eye, a slight cut from the nose and a crushed left jaw.

Byers Wagon Bridge Wrecked by Tornado Damage Is \$50,000

Special to the Times. FREDERICK, OKLA., July 29. (AP)—A wagon bridge, built by a local contractor, was completely destroyed by a tornado early this morning. A hundred yards or more of the bridge was torn out through the center, even the piling being blown out of line and broken. Some estimates placed the damage as high as \$50,000. The bridge is owned by a local company and it is expected that it will be rebuilt. The storm originated on the Oklahoma side of the stream early in the morning and moved down the bed of the river, striking at about the middle when it struck the bridge. The tornado moved on eastward and southward and spent its force in the piling being blown out of line, causing any further damage. There was a hard blow about the Oklahoma side of the river at about 1 o'clock in the morning, but no serious damage has been reported. A light shower fell here and at other points in the morning, but not sufficient to be of any benefit to crops which are needing rain badly.

BELIEVE GERMANY PASSING TO GOLD CURRENCY BASIS

BELIEF IN OPINION EXPRESSED BY LEADING FINANCIAL WRITERS. LITTLE DEMONSTRATION ON ANTI-FASCIST DAY

Communist Boas One of Chief Elements of Aggravation During Past Week.

BERLIN, July 29. (AP)—Now that the scare caused by German communists in threatening to overthrow the Cuno government and wipe out the bourgeoisie has passed attention has centered on the views of financial writers that Germany is passing to a gold currency basis. Demonstrations on anti-Fascist day yesterday were mostly orderly at indoor meetings, although fear of the outcome of the meetings had been one of the chief elements of aggravation in the perturbed economic and political situation for a week. Various financial writers express the opinion that Germany is entering, perhaps unconsciously, undergoing a transition to a gold currency basis. The commentators believe that the increasing probability of involving on a gold standard at the government's announcement that wages will be adjusted to conform with the currency suggests that the market may be being discarded as the unit of computation. Some of the more definite indications that the paper marks now are being discarded as the unit of computation. It is pointed out, suggest the facility as well as the menace of retaining the paper marks, the currency unit and numerous commercial organizations are earnestly urging their members to adopt the system of "gold accounts" which they said attests for foreign gold currencies would be created. The transition to gold on which the government is urged to place on the market and which can be purchased with paper marks at the current gold equivalent will materially contribute to encouraging investment in gold pledged securities. The specialists are very demanding that the nation compute its tax levies and conduct its bookkeeping on a gold basis.

## Mexico Expected To Break Record Producing Silver

By Universal Service. MEXICO, July 29.—Mexico's 1922 record silver production of 11,292,000 troy ounces probably will be broken again this year, according to officials here, because of the Mexican embargo today.

The silver yield for the first four months of 1923 was 4,600,414 ounces in excess of that for the corresponding period of 1922, thus indicating that last year's figures will be beaten by about ten million ounces.

Production of silver in Mexico last year was 11,292,000 ounces, a gain of 12.5 per cent over the year before.

This record breaking production is being produced by the Y. W. C. A. of Mexico, which is producing silver in the state of Chihuahua.

The production of gold, silver, lead, zinc, copper, iron, tin and other metals is expected to be stimulated by the influx of American capital into Mexico once recognition is extended. Many companies have taken recognition for granted and discontinued it in order to share as largely as possible in Mexico's expected prosperity.

The principal mining activities at present are being pushed forward in Chihuahua, Durango, Sonora, Nuevo Leon and Lower California.

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
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## First Picture of Fight That Gave Feather Title to Dundee


