President Coolidge Gives Attention To Plans For Funeral

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (AP)—As the Harding funeral train moved eastward today, President Coolidge devoted his attention to plans for fitting services here and prepared to carry on with the policies of the late chief executive.

Accompanied by his wife and several close friends, Mr. Coolidge arrived in Washington last night from Plymouth, Vermont, where shortly before dawn yesterday he took the presidential oath of office in his father's modest home.

Going immediately to the hotel suite which he and Mrs. Coolidge will occupy until they reach their residence in the white house, the new president went into conference with Secretary Hughes and other members of the Harding party before his departure last night from San Francisco, where he had performed the funeral services.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—The first official act of President Coolidge as the new executive of the nation was his signature today of a proclamation announcing the death of President Harding and calling upon the country to observe next Friday, August 10, as a day of mourning and prayer.

The proclamation was signed at 11:18 a. m. It was brought to the president's hotel suite by J. Butler Wright, third assistant secretary of state, and then was returned to the state department for the signature of Secretary Hughes.

TEXAS COMPANY WINS CHAMPIONSHIP OF TWILIGHT LEAGUE

Oilers Gain Easy Victory Over Public Utilities by Slamming 20 Hits and Scoring 18 Runs

Texas Company added to its long string of amateur baseball laurels Friday afternoon when the Oilers captured the championship of the Twilight League by defeating Public Utilities, 18 to 5, at Athletic Park. Texas Company had won the first half championship, while Utilities copped in the second half of the Twilight League's divided season.

An inefficient defense on the part of the Utilities made Friday's victory an easy one for the Texas Company. Twenty hits coupled with 11 errors allowed the Oilers to run themselves down on the base paths and runs were made cheap. Even the winners failed to show their usual form in the field and chalked up five misplayed that counted largely in the opposition's scoring.

Sanford Huston Well. Homer Sanford worked the first seven innings for the Texas Company and with a lead back of him, took things easy. "Slim" Kellogg went the final two in nice style. L. Smith and Kellogg led the healthy attack of the winning team, the former crashing three doubles and a single in five trips. Gordon crossed the plate five times while Kellogg made the rounds on four occasions.

Texas Company plays an all-star team selected from the other seven clubs of the Twilight League Sunday afternoon at Athletic Park at 7 o'clock.

The Texas Company bunched hits with errors in the first round and fell away to three runs. Nick Hill opened the game with a single and came all the way in on Gordon's double to left. 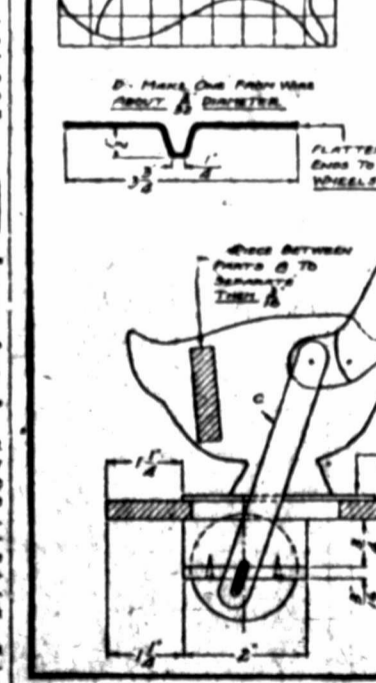

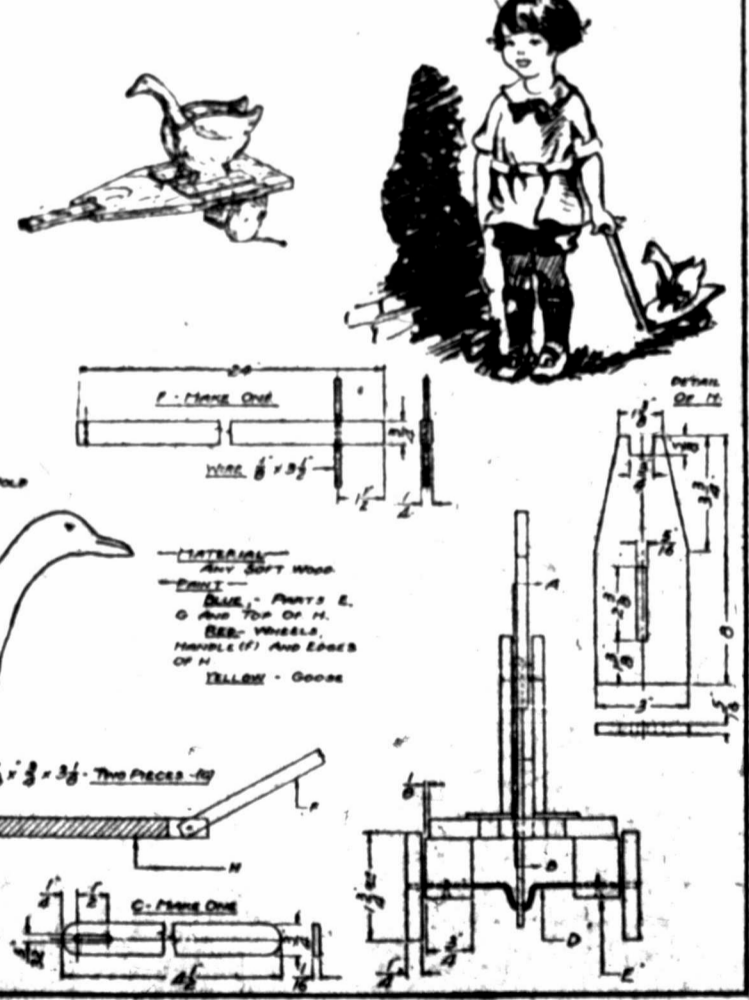
