

VERNON CLAIM IS PRESENTED BEFORE 'TECH' COMMITTEE

VERNON INSTITUTION IS TO SERVE LARGE SCOPE OF TERRITORY.

CLAIMS ADVANTAGES IN LOCATION AS A RESULT

Committee Concludes Work and Will Hold Conference On Wednesday.

VERNON, TEXAS, Aug. 7.—On the assumption that the Texas Technological College is to be an institution for the south-west and north-west of Texas and on its location which makes it just as accessible from the standpoint of distance, industry and time from Port Worth, Oklahoma City, and Amarillo, Vernon found grounds for basing its claims for preference in the location of the institution. The school was also placed upon the facilities of the town for support by an educational institution of the high land of this district and the proximity of the site to the great irrigation project in the Wichita Falls district.

The locating board made the proposition of the site this morning and will leave at 6 o'clock for Port Worth, where tomorrow morning they will hold their first deliberation for the purpose of reaching a decision on the most logical place for the location of the new institution.

They arrived here last night when Quannah very jubilant that their long strenuous trip was at an end and with mingled feelings of appreciation for the very splendid courtesies and generous hospitality which have been accorded them at every point where they have been leaving their homes over the past several days.

At the welcome address given by E. D. L. Killough last night, Chairman E. B. Corwell, of the locating board, said that the board has long been sought but there has been no worry that it would not be.

A cheering reception was given on arrival. A caravan of 20 Vernon automobiles was lined up at the depot when the locating board arrived there from Quannah yesterday morning and the trip was made in the automobiles of Quannah with them without delay. The caravan moved into Vernon about 1:30 p.m. by an automobile which was driven by E. H. Fielder, secretary of the board of commerce. The local business club drew corps and the Vernon band took the lead and a procession followed around the square, after which the board was taken to the Country Club for dinner. Mr. Killough was the only speaker and he merely asserted that the town was "wide open" as far as the board was concerned and invited them to help themselves.

A trip to the site was made this morning followed by a business meeting and later luncheon with the board members and guests of the Rotary club. The last was held in the formal affair. Cy Long, president of the Rotary club was head of the luncheon. E. H. Fielder, secretary and member of the business meeting which followed the tour of site this morning.

Summarizing Vernon's location, he said it was situated about equidistant from three important centers of the south-western territory, Oklahoma City and Amarillo, and added that this territory around Vernon is the most populous and most highly developed of any similar section in west Texas.

"We feel that the present development of this section and the possibility of future development makes Vernon a peculiar claim upon the consideration of your committee as a site for the college," he said.

"In the state of Texas there are 24 counties from which Vernon can be reached in six hours ride by railroad and these 24 have a population in excess of 500,000. In addition to population in the counties adjacent to the site of the college, a large population in the state of Oklahoma can reach Vernon by rail in six hours.

Railroad Facilities.
Vernon is served by the Port Worth & Denver and is within easy reach of connections at Wichita Falls, Chillicothe and Quannah with other important railroads serving western Texas.

Quality of Realty Club.
Vernon has ample facilities for taking care of a great state institution, ample board houses and hotel facilities, private hospitals, modern church buildings and strong enough organizations. Light, water and sewerage systems which will be connected with the college property line.

Two land sites were offered, one north of town traversed by a creek which might be dammed to supply irrigation water and the other west of town as the Boardland farm. One well on both is very productive, the very finest crops of cotton, corn, alfalfa, corn, alfalfa and beans being there for observation. The land is known as subirrigated and water being reached in abundance at a depth of from 14 to 20 feet.

Location of Vernon on the edge of the great oil and gas field was another strong point in the local argument and the movement now on foot to establish here a great cotton mill is mentioned.

the nation's life, for the welcoming of new presidents and of honored guests of the nation.

Home of Great Men.
By that route came many great men to Washington in the past days. Thus came the men of peace and power in Europe during the war to consult as to America's part in the great adventure; thus Farnsworth came to receive the thanks and only plaudits of a grateful nation; thus came Harding himself only two short years ago, walking strongly, his wide shoulders great, his face lifted, his eyes alight with elation, yet showing the thoughtful resolve to spare himself nothing of the best endeavor in the nation's service.

That service was given lavishly; so lavishly that death swept down with terrible suddenness to check him in full course and turn him back to come again to Washington to give the president's room, but this time, sleeping in a flag draped casket, freed forever from the cares of the great office that capped his life away.

Before when Harding came to claim his post his countenance given him cheer and shouting greeted him as he stepped out under the archway entrance; the wide flung glass packed with happy people waving him friendly acclaim. A single beyond toward the west beyond the president's room, the white house, the door to the great laborer was to be seen.

Menage Only for Dead.
Today he was awaited by a plaza crowded with people who stood long hours to do him silent honor; by flags drooping at half mast from the tripod staffs that front the great building and from the roof of the silent capital beyond. He comes to honor prepared for him such as peace and rest at last in the dim, stately setting of the east room of the white house.

Before the train came the cavalry escort had clattered in from Fort Meyer to form a line around the head of the caisson, but with their restless mounts until the caisson was delivered into keeping of the army comrades of the dead commander in chief to be carried to the white house as fallen soldiers are carried. A battery of field guns, each in war paint, with their link and buckle of the horses' trappings shining, also waited and over at the entrance. From which the caisson and the general party would emerge the marine band was clustered ready to take its share in the sorrow as it has so often through the years led the joy of the nation.

Steadily Await Funeral Train.
Through the soldiers no pains had been spared that each man and animal might do honor to the dead on his appearance. Blooded mounts of officers and rangy troopers and gun teams shown with grooming. The men themselves were trim in olive drab with tan brimmed caps low over their eyes and skin straps fringing taned young faces at death. At each officer's sword hilt rested a cluster of crepe that will clear there a month in token of the nation's loss. The colors bore long streams of black. Within the station President Coolidge and his cabinet members had been reserved a place to greet the train out in the long shed. The great concourse with its high glass roof was swept clear of all but the official group and those immediately connected with the sorrowful functions. The platform terminal and the miles of trackage stretched empty and silent to await the funeral train.

The funeral program called for no ceremonies of greetings at the train or elsewhere, except for the strains of the band and the salute of the troops outside. There was just to be the slow walk behind the caisson down the silent concourse and out through the president's room to the awaiting gun carriage. Arrangements had been made to spare Mrs. Harding even this and a check car waited to hurry her by different route to the white house in order that she might be there

DECLARE REPORTS EXAGGERATE FRENCH BRITISH QUARREL

Cavalry Leads Way.

LONDON, Aug. 7.—While little tangible evidence is at hand to indicate the probability of British and French statements arriving at any sort of agreement at present on a method of solving the Ruhr and reparations problems, British government spokesmen declared today the situation was not so serious as the weekend press reports and comment had seemed to indicate.

It is true, commentators agreed, that the British have been out maneuvered in stating their case to the world. The French publication of documents relating to the diplomatic negotiations of recent months is cited as an example of this. But it is said the British have a number of possible solutions for the present impasse, any one of which may be adopted.

Premier Baldwin and his ministers will meet again at Downing street tomorrow to formulate answers to the French and Belgian requests for reparations out of the Ruhr district. The cabinet will decide upon the date for the publication of the allied correspondence covering the last three months.

The Japanese opinion on the note Great Britain had planned to send to the Germans as an allied answer to the German reparations communication has been received by the foreign office. The opinion expressed general agreement with the British proposals and emphasized the hope that Japan's European allies would come to a final and definite reparations settlement as soon as possible.

when the caisson was lifted down and carried into its first night of repose since it started from San Francisco.

Cavalry Leads Way.
Two troops of cavalry had been ordered to lead the way from the station, swinging off at a quick trot for the swift journey to the capitol grounds, then down around the Peace monument to Pennsylvania avenue and on to the treasury and finally through the shaded grounds of the executive mansion. The funeral caisson drawn by four black horses was allotted the next place in line, close on the heels of the troops.

There was to follow the long string of motor cars bearing President Harding's traveling party and the sad conclusion of their long journey; then other senators carrying President Coolidge and the officials, folk of Washington. Behind these were to be arrayed the third group of cavalry and rumbling guns of the artillery were to bring up the rear of the escort.

At the white house orders to the troopers directed that they were to swing aside to line up along the broad avenue and sit silent with sabres at present as the caisson passed and followed by the motor cars, turn in through the gates to stop before the wide door of the mansion.

The official party was to be ready to break at the white house, those who made the fateful journey with President Harding going to their homes only to reassemble at the train tomorrow evening and go with him to the last, when the caisson is lowered in the quiet cemetery at Marion. For tonight it will lie at the white house, untroubled by the pomp and circumstance of the nation's woe and with only the sorrowing widow and close friends to watch through the long hours until the nation again claims its great dead.

HARDING BE BURIED MOTHER

BODY TO BE GIVEN VERNON

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HARDING WILL NOT BE BURIED BESIDE MOTHER AND SISTER

BODY TO BE PLACED IN RECEIVING VAULT TO AWAIT MAUSOLEUM.

FUNERAL PLANS CALL FOR THE UTMOST SIMPLICITY

Mrs. Harding Voted Plan to Have Cavalry Act As Honorary Escort.

MARION, OHIO, Aug. 7.—President Harding will not be buried beside his mother and sister in the Marion cemetery. His body after the funeral services here Friday afternoon will be placed in the receiving vault at the cemetery and held there pending the erection of a mausoleum to receive it.

The funeral plan approved by Mrs. Harding calls for the utmost simplicity. Rev. J. M. Landis, pastor of Trinity Baptist church, will officiate at the funeral, which will be held at the president's place of worship in Marion, Ohio, at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

ITALIAN REPLY TO BRITISH NOTE OF FAVORABLE TONE

ROME, Aug. 7.—The Italian reply to the British note on reparations as published in Rome shows that Italy generally approves of the British proposals. It sets forth, however, that the Italian policy still is inspired by the Italian views expressed at the London conference in December, 1922, where Franklin Roosevelt gave prominence to two important questions—the intellectual and productive guarantees.

The reply, the substance of which is given in a semi-official note explaining the Italian policy, says that the government would have preferred to discuss the subject with the allies on a basis of the inter-allied debt and product guarantees in conjunction with the general reparations problem.

Pioneer Resident Of Haskell County Dies In Colorado

HASKELL, TEXAS, Aug. 7.—Funeral services for F. M. Merion were held at the First Methodist Church of this city Monday morning at 10:00 o'clock by Rev. Ed. B. Walker of Amarillo, former pastor of the church here, after which the body was given burial in the Haskell cemetery with Masonic honors.

Mr. Merion moved to Haskell county in 1882 and has lived here continuously. He has been connected with several successful business institutions in Haskell and was director in the Farmers State Bank and was also a stockholder and one of the directors of the Haskell Telephone Company. He also owned large tracts of ranch and farm lands in Haskell county.

Deceased was 67 years of age at the time of his death and has always been an active and energetic life. He was driving his automobile along the highway near Trinidad, Colo., when he was stricken with heart failure and died suddenly and without warning to his wife and other relatives in the car.

Troops on Guard At City Election Charleston, S. C.

CHARLESTON, S. C., Aug. 7.—Four companies of South Carolina national guard stood in readiness for emergency duty today while voters of Charleston gathered at the polls to cast their ballots in what is termed a bitterly contested municipal primary. Two military units are at their armories and troops in Orangeburg and Waterbury have received orders to stand by.

DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY IS HELD IN MISSISSIPPI

JACKSON, MISS., Aug. 7.—Voters were casting their ballots today in Mississippi's Democratic primary for the governorship and other state county offices. This was the first general election in which women participated and it was predicted more than a million would be polled. In their closing campaign speeches the five aspirants for governor expressed themselves as confident of victory. The candidates are: Benoit "Mike" Connor of Safford, speaker of the state house of representatives; Henry A. Whitfield of Columbus; Theodore O. Bilbo of Bogalusa; former governor; Judge Tracy Bell of Greenville and Lester C. Franklin of Clarksville, former state senator.

SHIPPER'S BUREAU TELLS MEMBERS ABOUT DALLAS-FORT WORTH RATE CASE

Circulars detailing the case being made to all members of the Shipper's Bureau of the Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce, advising them of the situation, and the Interstate Commerce Commission, in which Dallas, Fort Worth and a group of North Texas cities are seeking to have the Texas freight rates that would break up the Texas common point territory and to have the Texas freight rates, in the opinion of bureau officials. The members are asked to aid in opposing the failure of which it is believed, would be prejudicial to the interests of Wichita Falls.

Charges Georgia Convicts Being Cruelly Treated

ATLANTA, GA., Aug. 7.—Charge that Georgia convicts are being suspended by their thumbs for hours or bound to trees with heavy chains or placed in "cattle boxes," Representative Bennett, of Dodge county, attacked the system of punishment now in use in convict camps at a hearing before a committee of the Georgia legislature. The committee before adjourning early today voted against a measure to amend the state constitution, offered by Representative Bennett, to restore the use of the strap on convict convicts.

The Dodge county representative went into detail as to how convicts were chained to trees and the methods used to move them. He related the alleged hanging of an unguilty convict by his thumbs, and added that these practices had been stopped at the request of the law of the state forbidding whipping offenders.

New First Lady of the Land Is Wife and Household Manager First; "Listens" To "itics"

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—A thoroughly feminine woman is Mrs. Calvin Coolidge, the first lady of the land. If any proof of this statement were demanded, it could be supplied by the presence on her dress of a doll baby that was sent to her by an admirer last Christmas. The doll, possibly, fits the

vacancy caused by the absence of a girl among the children. Mrs. Coolidge has three children. They are "you shall not talk politics"—"do your own job"—"play the game."

Mrs. Coolidge's job is that of being a wife and household manager. While she is in thorough sympathy with equal suffrage, she believes that unless women can vote intelligently, they should not vote at all.

Mrs. Coolidge has always "played the game," not merely with her husband and children, but, of course, listens politely to those who wish to discuss the subject. She has never been a campaigner for any cause, but she is in her element when subjects concerning women and children are discussed.

Her intense Americanism is illustrated by the fact that she never buys any but American-made goods. She declares that clothes designed by Americans for American women out of American fabrics are good enough for her that, indeed, they are usually more becoming than foreign goods.

As a rule, she wears conservative black or white for evenings, and has a penchant, like many New England women, for tailored suits for day wear. Beige and cream lace also form the basis for some of her costumes. Her friends say she really looks best in soft shades of

red or rose. These accentuate the beauty of her olive skin, wavy dark hair and soft dark gray, wide, smiling eyes.

In her home, or apartment, Mrs. Coolidge is exact, methodical, even punctilious. Her desk is always in complete order. There are no dusty pigeon-holes, jammed with neglected and forgotten notes. All communications are answered promptly. The writing paraphernalia, pens, ink, blotter and the like, are arranged along the desk like soldiers at attention. Mrs. Coolidge delegates her letters to her secretary, Miss Mary Randolph. However, Mrs. Coolidge devoted several hours to her letters. There was a terrific mass of letters and telegrams that had been piling up since Saturday.

At 10:15 a. m. Mrs. Coolidge took an hour's walk, driving some window shopping along N street and strolling along the shaded walks of the Mall back of the treasury, and while walking she was accompanied by Mrs. Edward T. Clark, wife of the president's secretary. A secret service agent followed. Keeping close to the first lady of the land, which she can not do without, Mrs. Coolidge is not yet so well known that she attracts general attention.

In the afternoon Mrs. Coolidge received a number of visitors, among whom were Frank B. Kellogg, wife of the former senator from Minnesota, and Mrs. Frederick H. Gillett, wife of the speaker of the house.

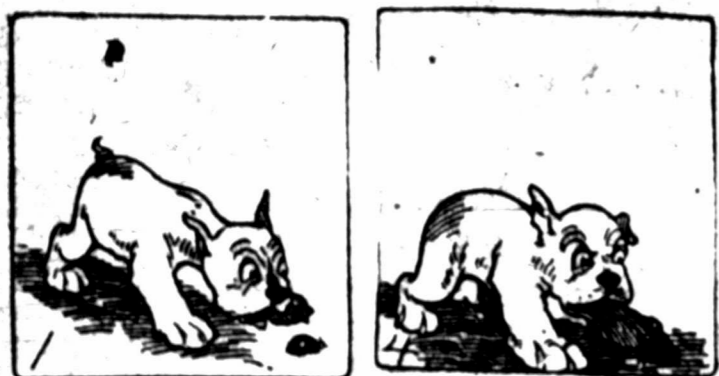

Quannah Urges Claim for Location Of Texas Technological College on Occasion of Board's Visit Monday

Special to The Times. QUANAH, TEXAS, Aug. 7.—Chiefly on her claims of commanding location with reference to the plains on the west and close touch with the great population of the east and the opportunity of offering like privileges to both the sons and daughters of the east and west, Quannah, rested its claims with the locating board of the Texas Technological College here Monday afternoon.

The trend of population and the future development of the Quannah territory were the two points on which the argument revolved. For the purpose of showing the trend of population to be in the direction of Quannah the local spokesmen divided the area designated for the location of the college in two parts, taking 45 counties for the northern section and 42 for the southern territory and on this basis it was contended that the largest influx of population has been within 140 miles of Quannah. The figures presented show that the percentage of gain in favor of the north half of the area was 271 per cent.

Further, it was contended that the population of the northern district was evenly distributed while in the southern the inhabitants are concentrated in El Paso and Leram counties. With its three railroads, Quannah claimed to serve the western Texas to a good advantage and at the same time make it possible for students who wish to enter from eastern Texas to attend without inconvenience, and on its superior railroad connections Quannah depends to continue in the lead as population increases.

Claims were also advanced showing favor to the district in which Quannah is located in the matter of increasing agricultural production and scholastic gain. While the southern half of the district has approximately 5,950,000 acres more in land area the north half has nearly 2,500,000 acres more in improved farm lands.

Tabulations were made for the purpose of showing that the north half of the district has a larger productive value, and the general average tax rate of the north is 74 cents per \$100, while in the south it is only 47 cents.
