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### 83 MISSING AFTER JAPANESE U-BOAT SINKS IN HARBOR

TOKIO, Aug. 21. (AP)—This afternoon 83 men were missing with the Japanese submarine No. 70, which listed and sank off Awaji Island yesterday after her trial trip. Thirty-seven of the victims were deck hands. Five were saved from the disaster, including the captain, chief officer and engineer.

The vessel, which was returning to Kobe from her first trial trip, was one of the latest type submarines. According to Submarine Engineer Yamaguchi, the vessel had just come to the surface when she listed heavily and started to sink. The captain ordered all the openings closed, but the submarine filled before the crew could carry out the orders. She sank in 25 fathoms of water.

Those who were saved owe their lives to the fact that they were hurried through the opening of the submarine by the rushing water.

Awaji is an island in Japan in the Strait between Hondo and Shikoku. It is 30 miles long.

### Sugar Stolen at State Prison is Clue in Still Raid

WACO, Texas, Aug. 21. (AP)—Two arrests probably will be made at Huntsville next Monday in connection with the disappearance of a quantity of sugar from a warehouse at the Texas penitentiary there, part of which was recovered in liquor raids. State Ranger Lee Shannon declared here yesterday. Shannon said he had been investigating illicit liquor manufacturing in Huntsville and Walker county for the past two months without making known his identity until recently when he obtained the services of other officers to assist him in a number of raids. In addition to the seven stills, a large quantity of corn whiskey and mash, Shannon said that fourteen of 25 barrels of sugar reported missing from the prison warehouse had been seized.

### LASSEN VOLCANO SHOWING SIGNS OF ANOTHER ERUPTION

REDDING, Calif., Aug. 21. (AP)—Forest rangers lookouts in the high Sierras east of Lassen Peak were at points of vantage before daybreak today waiting for sunrise to melt the haze which obscured their view of the peak. It is determined whether a slight eruption which was evident at nightfall yesterday continued until daybreak.

The volcano gave new assurances of its active life yesterday afternoon when it heaved a heavy stream of smoke mingled with high clouds and continued until dark, observers reported.

As near as can be estimated the outburst yesterday was the one hundredth since 1914, when Lassen shot forth its first smoke and lava within the memory of geologists. The violent eruption of 1914 which destroyed houses and cattle in Hat creek valley at its base.

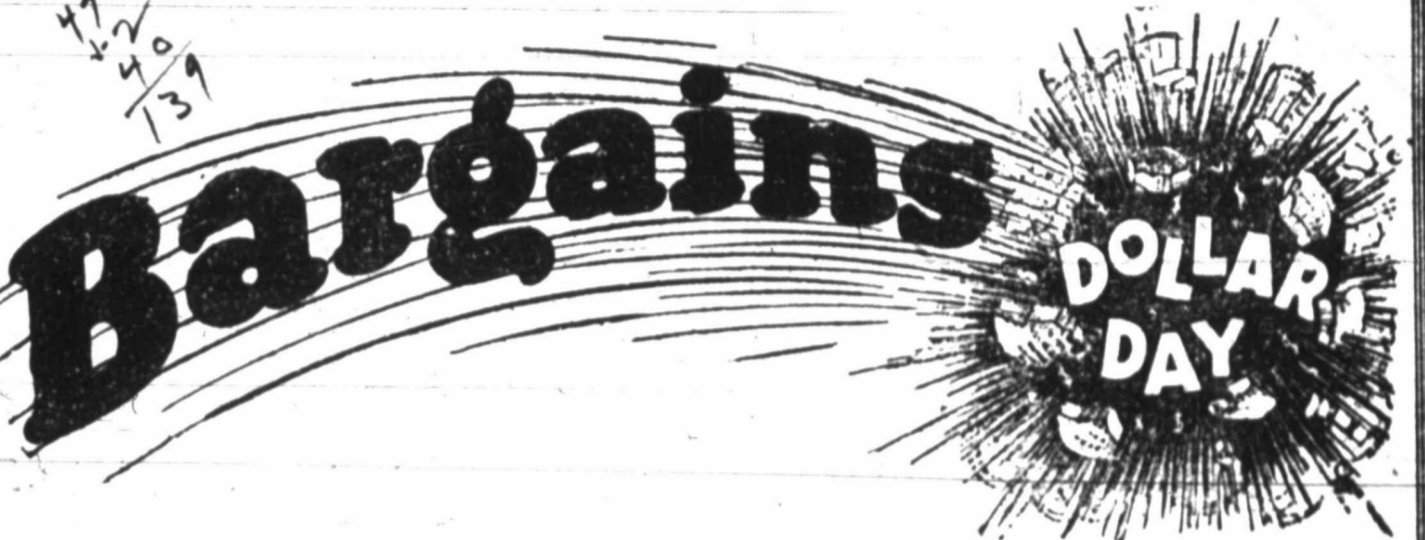

NO YIELDING IN REPLY OF FRENCH

she holds until after complete payment of reparations has been made. Referring to the proposed re-estimate of Germany's capacity to pay, she replies: "We confess we are unable to understand what the British government means by capacity of payment and present capacity of payment. Germany's capacity is equal to nothing by will of the empire itself. All expert calculations are useless."

The note then asks, "Does the British cabinet want to suppress Germany's debt entirely under the pretext that her capacity for payment has been provisionally annihilated?" The premier replies pointedly to Lord Curzon's intimation that Great Britain may soon be obliged to ask France to pay her war debt. He says: "France has never repudiated her debts and never will, but she is convinced that no British government will ever agree to an ally the measure that the London cabinet does not find it possible to apply today to the former enemies of France."

DISAPPOINTMENT FELT IN BRITISH CIRCLES BUT NO OFFICIAL UTTERANCES

LONDON, Aug. 22. (AP)—In the absence of Prime Minister Baldwin, Lord Curzon and other cabinet members, no expression of official opinion regarding Premier Poincaré's latest addition to the reparations issue was forthcoming today. In official quarters in London the first impression of the note, based upon the French official summary, was one of disappointment. Many of those versed in the intricate details of the reparations problem felt that the note constituted no substantial advance on the French president's previous communications, although they were impressed by its friendly, conciliatory spirit. Other observers, while regretting the argumentative, yielding tone of the document, felt there were some elements of satisfaction in it and that it at least kept the field clear for further discussion. Regret was expressed over France's refusal to have an international commission assess Germany's capacity to pay and at the French insistence that the present reparations commission shall continue periodically to determine the German financial ability. The British view is that the existing reparations commission is essentially a Franco-Belgian organization. Disappointment also is manifested regarding M. Poincaré's unalterable stand regarding the legality of the Ruhr occupation. Similarly it is inevitable that disappointment should be caused by France's statement that an understanding could be reached if the reconstruction of the devastated areas were given priority over other reparations and the discharge of the allied debts. The feeling in Great Britain is that this constitutes a selfish disregard for the French of Great Britain's own pressing need of repayment and indemnification. It is pointed out, however, that the foregoing represents only a brief non-official summary of the note, and that a careful reading of the complete text may reveal some points of agreement or compromise which are not apparent in this summary. The note is of such voluminous character that it suggests the attention of several translators in the British foreign office most of the night and the ministers will not have full translations before them until this evening. The British cabinet will examine the document with painstaking care to discover if it offers even a partial ground for agreement and effort will be spared by the government. It is forecast, to establish unity of purpose and aim with a view to continuing the friendly cooperation of Great Britain and France in the settlement of this and other European problems. —TIMES DOLLAR DAY THURSDAY— Good or made good. inch. Indications are that the rain was general throughout Wilbarger county, breaking the prolonged drought in this section and bringing long-sought relief to farmers. Two inches at Henrietta. HENRIETTA, Texas, Aug. 22.—A slow rain began here last night and is raining a slow steady rain this morning with clouds that indicate an all day rain. General in Haskell County. HASKELL, Texas, Aug. 22.—A general rain fell last night over Haskell county, ranging from one-half to an inch and a half. It is the best season since early spring and the farmers are rejoicing over the good rain, which will greatly benefit late feed and cotton. More than 100 bales of cotton have been ginned here this season, but the rain will shut down the picking for a while. This rain improves crop conditions more than can be estimated at this time. Four inches at West Bayler. SEYMOUR, Texas, Aug. 22.—One and one-half inches of rain fell here early this morning beginning about 10 o'clock. In the west half of the county in the Red Springs and Vera communities the rainfall was much heavier, being about four inches. The rain was general over the county. Two inches at Burk Burnett. BURKBURNETT, Texas, Aug. 22.—Heavy rains at intervals have been falling in Burk Burnett and vicinity since early Tuesday evening, and local gauges registering more than two inches. The rain apparently is covering a large area. Heavy threatening clouds indicate a continuance of the precipitation which is the first of material benefit since June 1. Over Inch at Kirklind. KIRKLAND, Texas, Aug. 22.—A good rain which was very heavy needed fell here Wednesday morning, breaking a two months drought. The precipitation was more than an inch. Quench Gets Downpour. QUANAH, Texas, Aug. 22.—One and nine-tenths of water fell here last night in a general rain that covered all of this section, according to government observer, W. R. Crawford. Clouds still show indication of more rain. This is the

first general rain here since early spring and will be of untold benefit to this country.

Wire connections were cut off south of Quanah this morning but indications were that repairs would be made soon and connections restored. Weakest Near Clarendon. 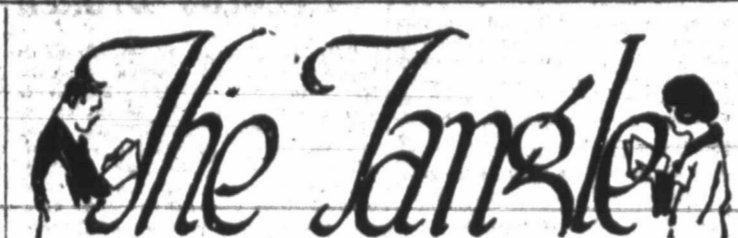
### THREE MILES DEEP IN 1899; THREE QUARTERS MILE NOW

### Wednesday's Rain Will Delay Work Of Installing Big Pump at Diversion Dam, But Will Aid Seasoning Canal

Rain which was general in Baylor county and in the neighborhood of the diversion dam Wednesday will have a two-fold effect on the progress that is being made in replenishing the city water supply with water from the diversion dam, Burton Station, commissioner of public utilities, said Wednesday morning.

Engineers and water company officials were hopeful of completing the work on the electric high line from Dundee to the diversion dam by the first of next week; Tuesday was the date originally set to begin pumping. It is probable that the work will be delayed on account of the rain. The work in swinging the high line is over half completed and is being rushed as fast as possible. Unless there is continued rain it will still be possible to complete the job on schedule time.

The new 10,000-gallon pump, ordered recently to be used on the job, arrived at Dundee Wednesday afternoon. It is doubtful if an attempt will be made to move it from the station there to the diversion dam, until the condition of the roads improves. The weight of the pump and motor are of such proportion as to require that the roads be in the best condition to make hauling possible.

The new pump and motor will be

moved at the earliest possible date and it is hoped that work on the installation will be finished by the date that the high line is available. One pump will be started as soon as the current is connected.

Rain Seasoning Canal.

The apparent delay that has been caused by the rains, it is thought, will be more than overcome by the benefits derived from the seasoning of the canal. If pumping could be started at once, the rain would have been of untold benefit and would have eliminated several days of extra pumping which would have been necessary in seasoning the canal.

Officials of the water department

believe that the rain which has already fallen will season the canal to the point where much of the pumping figured on for seasoning the canal will be unnecessary.

F. N. Lawton and Todd Williams, manager and superintendent, respectively, of the water department, are both at the diversion dam pushing the work to completion. Without further delay it is believed that at least one pump will be started on Tuesday of next week.
