How They Originated

"Ragie Flat" was the first name given to the settlement which later grow into the city of Varnon. It is naid that a large number of sautes frequented these marts in the early days, hewer the name. Hearrich, was the nemes official postoffice, but a postal singuline was maintained from Hearrichta. A townsite was inid off here in the latter part of 1858, and early in 1851 application was made for a postoffice. Postal authorities at Washington stated that there were already loo many "Eagle" towns in Rasse—Ragis Pass, Eagle Lake, etc., and suggisted the name "Vernon," in honor of some official in the office of the permaster general, The name was accepted, and thus this city was named for a man who was never the first, settlement in Wil-

Don's in 1977 by J. Donn and Colven Donn. In the fall of 1879 R. F. Jones and the Chownings settled on different settlens in the vicinity of modern Vernon. Before that time the land had been used as a pasture for estimate belonging to the Wagdoners and to the "R-9" outfit. In 1880 It was decided to lay off a townsite and try to lecate the sounty site here.

R. F. Jones agreed to donate the south half of his section of land for locating the town, provided the other town builders would agree to make certain improvements. Accordingly, the half negtion was divided into wingor stormen, a to proving and laving off the town; John Thowning, 8, for a black-smith shop; Ease Chowning, 2, for a sign building; G. /W. Darby, 3, for a store; Tin Chowning, 1; for a restaurant. These six men were the original township owners. J. A. Crongtownsite owners. J. A. Creag-er later bought a fourth of Mr. Jones' interest, and Uel Musick, C. H. Scott and C. M. Byars bought interests from other




