LONDON, Sept. 11. (F) The Kobe correspondent of the Central News says that refugees arriving on the steamer Empress of Australia credit the commander and officers of the American naval destroyer 217 with the most outstanding act of heroism after the earth-quake. This was the dash of the craft up Tokio bay to rescue marooned foreigners in the Japanese capital.
