ELECTRA, Texas, Oct. 2.—Lightning struck and ignited a \$5,000 harrel tank filled with fuel oil on the Waggoner Refinery tank farm, two miles west of this city Wednesday morning at 6 o'clock. One Divorce to 7.6 Marriages In United States Last Year Is Record; One for Five Marriages In Texas

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.69—One divorce to 7.6 marriages in the United States last year is the record disclosed today by the census bureau's marriage and divorce survey, the first since 1916, when there was only one divorce to almost 8.2 marriages. There were one-fifth more divorces and about one-fifth more divorces and about one-fiftheth fewer marriages per 100,000 population last year than in 1916.

There were 1,256,413 marriages recorded last year, while in 1916 alifornia fourth with 2,237.

South Carolina reported no divorce, as its laws permit none. The District of Columbia had the small-est number, 161, and the lowest rate with 1,522 as compared with 1,655 in 1916.

The following discussion of current market conditions was issued late in September by the National Bank of Commerce in New York:

At no previous period in the last five years has the general situation in the United States been as stable as today. Business continues active and there is confidence in the outlook. The advance in money rates which has taken place since the beginning of July is no greater than is to be expected as requirements for funds approach their autumn peak. Except where special factors affecting supply and demand are operative, the general price level shows no indication of radical change. Securities

Business and Events Abroad
Abroad, the period from August
6 to September 15 has been marked
by a series of notable events. While they can not fail eventually to have a certain repercussion here, quite as significant as the events themselves has been the relatively slight
response to them in the markets of
North America. It is so obvious as
to be a truism that in the long run
the business of each country is dependent on that of every other
country, but the fact is generally
overlooked that the international
character of modern business exerts a stabilizing effect, rather than
the reverse. Thus, the Japanese
earthquake is undoubtedly one of
the greatest physical catastrophes as significant as the events themthe greatest physical catastrophes of history. Official estimates place the total casualties, including dead, wounded and missing, at 1, 357,000. Estimates of property losses are as yet of little value but there is no doubt that they were very great and the disorganizing effect on Japanese business and industry in itself constitutes a heavy poten in itself constitutes a heavy poten-tial monetary loss. The response to the humanitarian appeal has been prompt, but except in the silk mar-ket the effects on business have been negligible. It is now believed that even in the case of that com-modity, other sources of supply will stablize the situation. Ultimately there will be need of materials and supplies in important amounts for reconstruction but it is now apparreconstruction but it is now appar-

ent that this demand will make itself felt only gradually.

It seems that real progress is at last being made toward breaking the deadlock in the Ruhr, the first and greatest step toward adjustment of the postwar difficulties of North Europe. Although this af-fords grounds for encouragement to American business it is no jus tification for the hope that European demand for many important products of the United States will show immediate expansion and much less does it justify the ex-pectation that that demand will

reach the proportions of war and postwar years.

The best evidence of gradual Eu-The best evidence of gradual European betterment in the face of apparently wellnigh insuperable political and financial handicaps is the increase in production, especially of foods. Better political and business conditions will unquestionably increase purchasing power, but the first requisite of economic health for a nation or an individual is limitation of expenditure to income, and the condition of most European countries is such that rigid national and individual economy must be practised for a long time. This is the great penalty of the war.

At least equally as important as international political events is the raising of the official estimate of the wheat crop of Canada from 181.-600,000 bushels at the end of July to 470,000,000 bushels at the end of August. The indicated yield is 71,-000,000 bushels in excess of the largest Canadian crop harvested heretofore, and is accounted for by an increase of 84,000,000 bushels in Alberta, Canada's newest wheat province.

Although actual changes in rates were not great between August 16 and September 15, the undertone of he market has been firmer. The volume of commercial loans of re porting member banks has increased steadily since the close of July. Re-discounts with the Federal reserve discounts with the Federal reserve banks have increased moderately. These are both normal seasonal movements and justify the expecta-tion of continued firmness of money rates with an upward tendency. 


