From Three to Five Inches Rain Have Fallen Throughout Oklahoma And North Texas; Burk Bridge Out

SUMMARY OF FLOOD SITUATION.

Between three and five inches of rain reported from all sections of North Texas and Oklahoma. More than 50 railway and highway bridges in the territory washed out.

All railroads in the section are almost impassable. All railway service to northern points from this city through Oklahoma has been discontinued.

Most telephone and telegraph wires are down and others are damaged.

Canadian, Red, Little Wichita, Brazos, and Wichita rivers are all swollen to capacity and several places report that the waters are out of the river banks.

Transportation on this section varies from 4 to 25 degrees.

Lake Kemp and diversion dam are reported safe with small amount of damage reported at diversion dam Sunday. No further damage expected.

Extent of damage incurred by railroads, highways, corporations, all concerned in this section is being estimated as best as possible.

Gas lines badly damaged and serious shortage threatened.

More than five inches of rain had fallen in Wichita Falls at 11:00 o'clock Monday morning, since the rains began at midnight Friday, and the mercury is still standing at 45 degrees, according to George Simmons, unofficial weather observer here. It is still raining hard in this city and all railroads operating out of Wichita Falls reported heavy rains along their lines Monday morning.

Railroads are badly crippled and all service to the north is practically impossible. Wichita Falls is cut off from transportation north into Oklahoma, all railroad and wagon bridges across the Red River having been destroyed.

More than 25,000 yards of dirt, the temporary dyke and the earth filling in the gap in the diversion dam work on which was started last week, were washed out Sunday by the torrential rains.

R. A. Thompson, chief engineer of the Wichita County Water Improvement District No. 7, stated that the dam at Lake Kemp had risen six feet and that the big rise probably had not arrived at the lake yet. There is no danger of the dam breaking, he declared. Two spans of the bridge across the Wichita River at the diversion dam were washed out Sunday.

The Little Wichita River in Archer county near Archer City is reported out of its banks, flooding the surrounding territory.

Oklahoma Gas Lines Out

Accompanying the wind and rain when the gas lines were washed out in Oklahoma, the four big lines from the Lone Star Gas Company's pumping station at Fort Worth, Texas, to the Oklahoma territory, the Wichita Falls, Fort Worth, Dallas and all other points south of this city, are reported out of service, according to N. L. Bachman, of the Petrolia station of the company. The gas pressure Sunday was 150 pounds and Monday morning it had fallen off to 80 pounds, a little more than half of the needed supply. It is said that only one gas line, the one from the Oklahoma territory to the Petrolia station, is still in service.

Half of the toll bridge across the Red River at Burk Burnett has been washed away and the waters have cut the channel in the Oklahoma side of the river. The Missouri-Kansas-Texas railroad bridge was also washed out about 17 hours before the waters of the Red River reached the Oklahoma side. The rainfall at Burk Burnett has exceeded five inches.

All railroad bridges across the Red River have been destroyed. The Oriental bridge at Chillicothe was the first to wash out and the Red and Wichita Valley bridges followed. All wire connections north of Burk Burnett are out and the Red River still stands, according to latest reports from the Katy office. Wire connections from Elk City south were suspended at 3:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon. Rail service is being continued from Wichita Falls to Burk Burnett only by two morning express trains, to which mail, baggage and passenger cars will be added. No passenger trains are being run north of here and none will be operated until the waters of the Red River recede to a point which will enable workers to drive piling for a new bridge.

According to reports, service north of the Red River is practically at a standstill, as service over the Kansas River is suspended for some time on account of washouts.

Wichita River was damaged by heavy rains at the dam at St. Jo and Gainesville, with no break in the line yet reported.

The Wichita River is also on a rampage and Monday morning the river was practically bank full at this city.

The temporary dyke across the river channel at the diversion dam which was about 8 feet high and contained about 15,000 cubic yards of material washed away Sunday afternoon, and in addition the rising waters washed out about 15,000 cubic yards of the unfinished part of the top of the dam, according to R. A. Thompson. Since the drainage area of the Wichita River between Lake Kemp and the diversion dam is about 20 square miles, the waters sent down the stream are expected to be considerable, but in no way threatening.

Lake Kemp is reported rising at the rate of three tenths of a foot every five hours and has already risen more than six feet. According to R. A. Thompson, the big rise has not yet reached the lake. The total rise, including Monday, is expected to be about 10 feet. The water is still 25 feet below the spillway, which is 35 feet from the bed of the river and 15 feet from the crest of the dam. The only effect on the stream is that, below the spillway, there was some lowering by the heavy rains on the down stream side. The dam is not in danger of a leak.

Water Is Pouring Into Lake Wichita At Record Speed

Water continues to pour into Lake Wichita at a rapid rate from all sources and the lake is rising at a record speed. The casing and stream which feed the lake are swollen and water is expected to overflow the spillway before Monday morning. The water in the lake is over 15 inches Sunday night. A flow of over 57 inches was reported at the lake during the last week, and the water is now only five and two-thirds feet below the spillway. It is expected that the lake will be filled and the water will go over the spillway within the next 24 hours, it is believed.

SIXTEEN ALLEGED LEADERS OF FOOD RIOTS ARRESTED

BERLIN, Oct. 15. (AP)—Two civilians are reported to have been killed and several others injured at Mankings Saturday night when the police cleared the streets of rioters.

Three persons were injured in a food riot at Frankfurt-Am-Main on Saturday.

DUSSELDORF, Oct. 15. (AP)—The stores here remained closed today, but the looting which terrorized the city Saturday was not resumed. The municipal authorities have called upon the population to organize a self-protective body that will keep the police in case of further trouble.

The police today seized a number of houses situated near looted stores and recovered large quantities of merchandise. Sixteen alleged leaders of the looters were arrested by the authorities of occupation. Several of the prisoners will be court-martialed and the other surrendered to the German authorities.

The 16 alleged leaders are: Elmas, 21; Oelmann, 18; and Hagemann, 18, children of Godschalk's brother, and the unidentified Canadian rioter, who heard the German immigration authorities and scores police expressed the belief that the Armenians were being smuggled into the United States from Canada. This belief was strengthened when it was learned that the Armenians had made application to be admitted into this country a few weeks ago, but due to the Armenian quota being filled, their application was refused.

SIX DROWN WHEN STEAMER STRIKES RIVER ROW BOAT

PILOT AND FIVE MEMBERS OF ARMENIAN FAMILY LOSE THEIR LIVES.

WERE BEING SMUGGLED INTO UNITED STATES.

Row Boat Was Traveling Without Lights in Dense Fog When Struck.

DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 15.—Five of six Armenians in a row boat piloted by a Canadian were drowned in the Detroit river between River Rouge and Ecorse, Mich., early today when an unidentified steamer struck the small craft and precipitated its human cargo into the river. The Canadian pilot was drowned. Abedes Godoshian, 49, of Delray, Mich., was the only one saved.

The dead are: Elmas, 21; Oelmann, 18, and Hagemann, 18, children of Godschalk's brother, and the unidentified Canadian rioter, who heard the Government immigration authorities and scores police expressed the belief that the Armenians were being smuggled into the United States from Canada. This belief was strengthened when it was learned that the Armenians had made application to be admitted into this country a few weeks ago, but due to the Armenian quota being filled, their application was refused.

The riot was traveling without lights and was undistinguishable in the dense fog that hung over the river. The steamer struck the boat and hurried its occupants into the river. It kept on its course apparently unaware of the accident.

WAGON BRIDGE AT BURKURNETT IS WASHED OUT

FILE SUITS TO TEST STATE OIL AND GAS CONSERVATION RULE

AUSTIN, Oct. 15. (AP)—A test of the validity of oil and gas conservation regulations of the state railroad commission was involved in two cases before the Travis county district court here today. One case was brought by J. G. Bang and associates who attacked rule 17 prohibiting drilling of wells within certain distances of other wells without permits. The other was an attempt by J. P. Stranghouser, receiver for the J. O. Galloway interests, on rule 21 dealing with pipeline construction.

District Judge George Calhoun is hearing the cases. The court granted a temporary injunction against the receiver from enforcing rule 17, but time ago preventing the commission from attaching penalties in the Bang case.

In the Stranghouser case the commission seek to compel the plaintiff to issue orders directing pipeline companies to establish connections with three wells of the Galloway interests in the Navarro field, which are being drilled without permits. The commission is representing the oil concerns interested in the litigation while Stranghouser is representing the railroad commission.

I HOPE YOU PRAY. I have never been able to understand quite why so many people get shy at the mention of prayer.

Perhaps it is because the real function of prayer is not understood. To me, prayer is a relaxation of the human heart,

an opening of the cells of the brain, and a letting down, an acceptance of realities, and the acknowledgment to a higher force or power than our own that we are, after all, merely pilgrims, straying in a world of change and mystery—hoping for the rising of a better sun.
