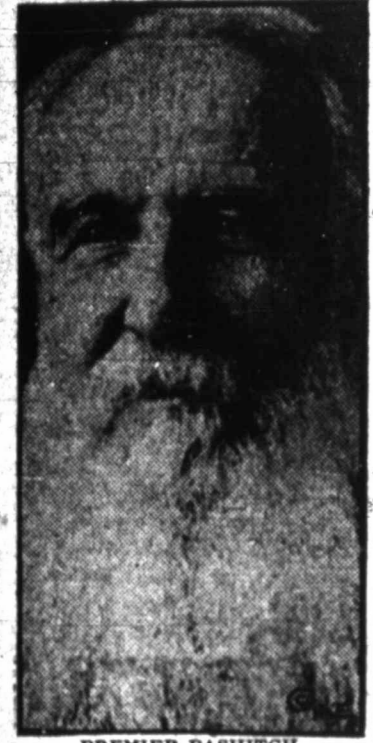

PASHICH LOOMS AS 'JUGO-SLAVIA'S DEFI TO ITALY' THREATS

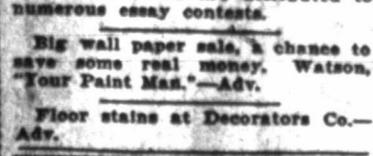

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—Italy took her argument with Greece, but her argument with Jugo-Slavia is not settled yet.
If it comes to a showdown, Premier Mussolini will have to choose between Jugo-Slavia and Greece, as he did over Premier Gonatas of the Greeks.
Well, Austria tried it in 1914 and the world knows what happened to Austria.
As for Pashich, he was premier then of a Serbia with 2,000,000 population. He's premier today of a

Jugo-Slavia (Greater Serbia) with a population of 12,000,000.
Doesn't Bluff
Pashich's personality is in sharp contrast to Mussolini's. Pashich never bluffs, but he stands pat.
The world was not the only conflict he's seen his country through. He was at the helm during the struggle with Turkey in 1913 and the Balkan strife of 1915.
And he knows how to hang on. The Serbian army was driven clear out of Serbia during the world fight and Pashich went along. He was above it when, in the terrible winter of 1915, he journeyed across the Albanian mountains and set up the skeleton of a government in a foreign land. But he was on hand for the peace treaty and got Serbia out of the war with six times the population she had when she went in.
Mussolini for a public man, is very young. Pashich is very old. He won't tell just how old, but the best guess is 60 or thereabouts.
He's an Engineer
Nikola Pashich was born at the Serbian town of Rayetchich. He grew up during the reign of King Milan, took part in an unsuccessful rising against him and was sentenced to death, but escaped to Budapest. Finally Milan was deposed and Alexander came to the throne. Pashich returned and entered politics. He has been in politics ever since—premier a dozen times and holder of lesser portfolios more times than he can count. King Alexander was assassinated. King Peter followed and died and another Alexander came. Pashich remained his country's leading man all this time.
By profession he's an engineer. He's Serbia's greatest mine owner—a very rich man. In fact, many Serbians say he's too rich, also, that he's less a statesman than a politician. If so, he's a mighty practical, successful one. King Peter is true and tried. He knows his countrymen inside out.
The difference between Italy and Jugo-Slavia is territorial, centering around the Adriatic port of Fiume, which Italy wants because its population is largely Italian and Jugo-Slavia insists on as her only "window" on the sea.

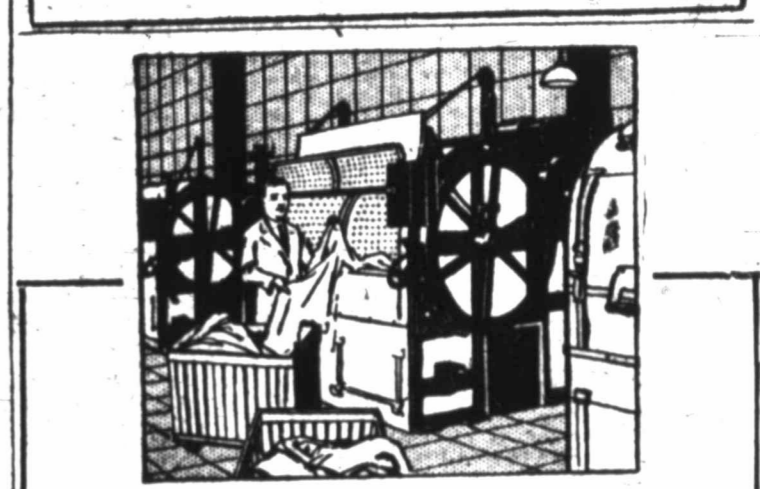

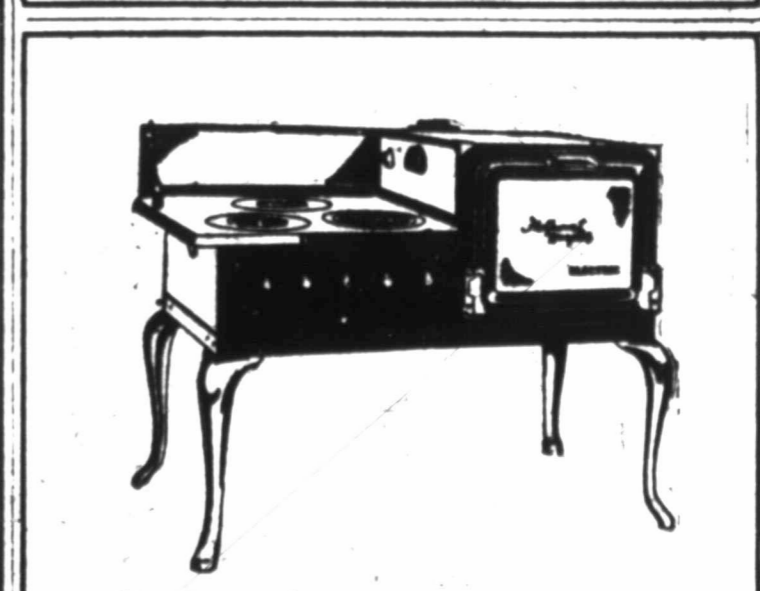

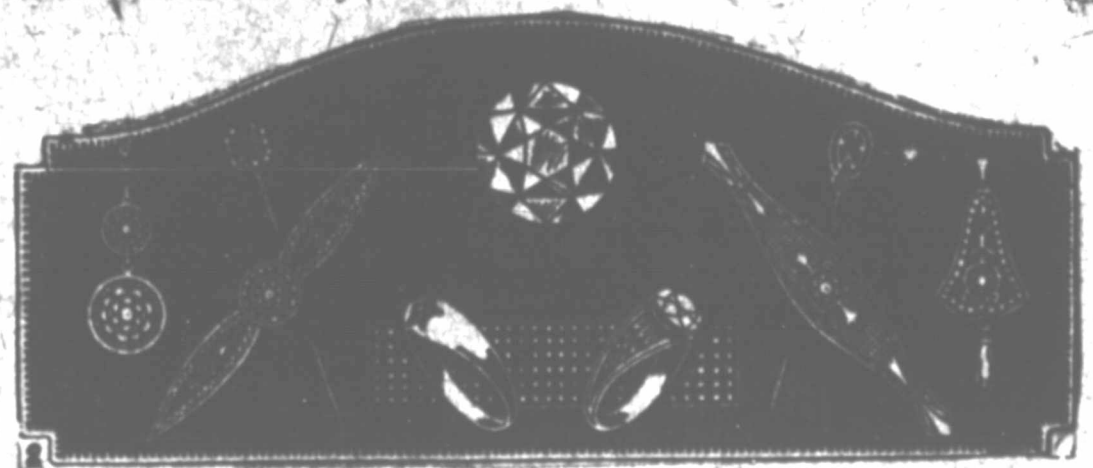

ANTI-BONUS FIGHT IS BROUGHT BEFORE LEGION CONVENTION

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 17. (AP)—A fight on the anti-bonus issue was brought before the convention of the American Legion here today through a letter received by National Commander Alvin Owsley from Knowlton Durham, national president of Ex-Service Men's Anti-Bonus League, New York city.

President Durham urged Commander Owsley to place before the convention the following proposal: "Formal action toward government aid being conducted and centered on disabled veterans.

"Or, as an alternative that the convention agree to cooperate with the Ex-Service Men's Anti-Bonus League to determine by referendum the will of the majority of the world war veterans on the question of adjusted compensation."

Among other things, the letter cites the belief of the anti-bonus league that the great majority of veterans are opposed to any form of compensation that includes able bodied ex-service men; that a great number of members have been lost to the American Legion during the past year through its policy of eliminating the compensation of physically fit veterans; that the adjustment of the present bonus issue will do much to weld together the legion and make this organization an important factor in the spread of true Americanism.

CHIEFS OF ROCK ISLAND STARTED IN LOW PLACES

CHICAGO, Oct. 17. (AP)—Each of the executives of the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific railroad has come up from the ranks.

President J. E. Gorman began as a car checker in the switch yards. Others began their railroad careers as stenographers in the law department, chain-man in a surveying outfit, stenographer in a freight department, yard clerk, storekeeper, helper, clerk in the treasurer's office, and station helper. Four of them are now members of the board of directors.

"The chances are that the men who pleaded those men stand them up for the job further on," said a bulletin. "Some day some member of the board will retire from active service and another office boy, stenographer or clerk will be employed."

INDICATED FRENCH AND BELGIANS TO REMAIN IN GERMANY INDEFINITELY

ESSEN, Germany, Oct. 17. (AP)—The occupation authorities have requisitioned 218 furnished dwellings in Essen and have also demanded stable accommodations for 230 horses. This action is construed by the Germans as indicating that the French and Belgians expect to remain here indefinitely.

"Ninety-three trillion marks have been confiscated by the authorities at various points in the occupied area in the last 10 days."

POLISH SENATORS REFUSE TO CUT SALARIES FROM BANK

WARSAW, Oct. 17. (AP)—When members of the Polish senate called on the Polish state loan bank recently for their salaries, the bank had no large notes, and could only pay in 4,000 mark bills, which were worth two cents. Most of the senators objected to carrying great packages through the streets, and said they would call again, when the bank received its next shipment of 25,000 mark bills from the national printing office.

VOICE OF THE PEOPLE

Violating the Amendments.

Editor the Times:

Senator Borah said yesterday, before the citizenship conference now being held in Washington, D. C., as reported in your daily paper: "I would count myself a whitening hypocrite to come here to insist upon the enforcement of the 18th amendment and remain silent upon the utter disregard of the first amendment. If I cannot speak for the constitution as a whole, I should not speak at all. And if I do not respect the constitution as a whole, I am unfit to speak in behalf of any part of it."

We hear a great deal said these days about the violation of the 18th constitutional amendment, and justly so, for that amendment is a part of the law of the nation and should be obeyed. But as suggested by Senator Borah, there are other amendments besides the 18th, and all of them should be obeyed. And while the senator referred more particularly to that portion that relates to freedom of speech, I would like to refer to that portion of the first amendment that refers to freedom of worship. As stated by Senator Borah, if we are not prepared to stand by every part of the constitution, we are not prepared to stand by any part of it.

According to the newspapers of Amarillo, the social service committee of the Polk Street Methodist Church of that city recently presented a petition signed by one hundred twenty churchmen and women of Amarillo, requesting Governor Stanley S. Bishop to institute grand jury action against all who refuse to observe Sunday, according to their way of thinking. The Sunday law of Texas is "a law respecting an establishment of religion," and therefore is a violation of the first amendment to the constitution. This law prohibits the sale on Sunday of cold drinks, candy, chewing gum, dry goods, groceries and playing of baseball games and many other items. But it allows the sale of drugs, foodstuffs, newspapers, lotteries, milk, and other items of the same character.

But Amarillo is not the only place on the map where the amendment to the constitution is being flagrantly violated, by the imposition of religious dogmas upon the unwilling citizen. Many of your readers, moreover, would doubtless like to know by what process of reasoning these church people, who are responsible for this law being upon the statute books of Texas, and who demand its enforcement in Amarillo and elsewhere, have arrived at the conclusion that it is a crime to sell candy on Sunday, but no crime to sell ice cream; that it is a crime to sell a newspaper; that it is a crime to sell a cold drink on Sunday, but not a crime to sell milk. But those who clamor for the enforcement of the 18th amendment and persistently violate the first amendment, can doubtless distinguish these fine points of difference.

When the church enters the civil realm, and seeks to manipulate the judicial and municipal affairs of a community, and asks that the civil magistrate use the police power of the state to enforce religious obligations and her dogmas, it is very evident that she has departed from her proper sphere of activities. It is not the mission of the church to employ force or to appeal to it in doing the Master's work. When she employs her legitimate means to make disciples for her lord, she will confine herself to the power of persuasion and free grace. These church activities in behalf of the enactment and enforcement of Sunday laws only prove, more and more, that Sunday laws are religious laws, that they are a violation of the first amendment to the constitution, and that these political churches are seeking to legalize their religious customs and force them upon all people alike, irrespective of whether they have faith in God or religious convictions.

God seeks to induce men to worship Him in spirit and in truth. And in the attempt to bring the worship of God into any sort of relationship with the state, is not in harmony with God's purpose. Jesus said: "My kingdom is not of this world; if my kingdom were of this world, then would my servants fight, that I should not be delivered to the Jews; but now is my kingdom not from hence." John 18:36. The principle of entire separation of civil matters from religious matters, was taught by Christ himself when he said, "Render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and unto God the things that are God's." Luke 22:21. Sabbath observance belongs to God and not to Caesar, or civil government. To demand it by civil law is a perversion of God's plan.

This persistent effort to enforce religion upon an unwilling recipient by municipal law is bringing about a change in the American principle of an entire separation of church and state; it means the enactment of religious laws, contrary to the first amendment to the constitution, and a return to the regime of the Dark Ages. And it is passing strange to see our good Methodist, Baptist, and Presbyterian friends take such an active part in this establishing of church and state, who themselves in their earlier history, suffered so much at the hands of the state, when the established government undertook to compel them to conform their doctrines to those held by the established church. It is time that the days prior to '76 be recalled, and the histories of that time be read and studied anew.

This proposed Sunday law leaves little or no conscience of the individual. This religious movement to capture politics, backed by sixteen denominations, proposes by municipal legislation to express, and to place into the organic law of our beloved land, "our national determination to honor the Sabbath day and keep it holy." What a violation of the first amendment, which prohibits the enactment of religious laws! What a travesty upon God's method of preaching the gospel—the church attempting to do by law what is commanded to do only by entreaty and persuasion!

Owing to the continuance of a slight temperature his doctors have ordered him to remain in bed and rest the greater part of the day.

Lloyd George has a cold, aggravated by fatigue, his secretary, William Butherford, said, but he confidently hopes to speak tonight at the public meeting. He added that with so much of the tour ahead of Lloyd George and with the example of President Harding's death and former President Wilson's breakdown on tour, it was felt that the former premier's health must be given the best of care.

WOMEN WOULD RESTORE LIBRARY OF LOUVAIN

NEW YORK, Oct. 17. (AP)—Every woman's club in the United States is urged to address the day between now and Armistice day, November 11, to further the restoration of the Louvain library.

The appeal is coming out from Mrs. Percy V. Penneybacker, chairman of the National Committee of Women which is leading the movement.

Printed programs containing an address on "Restoration of the Library Louvain," the Belgian national anthem, and a poem, "In Flanders now," by Edna Jacques, have been sent to over 10,000 groups of women.

"Every woman who has a part in restoring this library," declares Mrs. Penneybacker, "has been for centuries one of the great research libraries of the world, may feel that she is making a direct contribution to Belgian life, in the highest sense of that word, and is helping to create that sympathetic understanding among nations which will eventually lead to peace."

The sum required to restore the library is \$1,000,000, of which approximately one-half has been given or pledged. The purpose of Mrs. Penneybacker's committee is to see that the gifts from American women are coordinated into definite memorials.

USE OF GAS INCREASES; FREIGHTS ARE URGED

DALLAS, Oct. 17.—Gas companies in the United States are selling the greatest volume of gas in the history of the industry. Sales of gas burning appliances are showing a corresponding increase. Appliances sold by gas companies to their customers this year will represent an investment of more than four dollars for each customer. This takes no account of appliances sold by other dealers. As there are about ten million gas meters in use the total will be seen to amount to more than forty million dollars.

Users of gas in Texas enjoy an inexpensive fuel that is not subject to the vicissitudes of the coal mines, says the Texas Public Service Information Bureau. These gas users are being urged by the companies supplying them to use their appliances in a manner that will insure safety and the best service at the lowest cost for gas.

Appliances should be kept clean and properly adjusted. Flues large enough to carry all combustion products into the outer air should be connected with safety and economy in using gas for fuel.

MORE ACTIVE GOVERNMENT AID URGED FOR DISABLED VETERANS

CINCINNATI, Oct. 17. (AP)—America's wounded and disabled veterans of the world war can be converted "from a liability to the United States treasury into a source of revenue and cents," into a group of assets, if rapid and effective means of assisting these disabled veterans in their present and future rehabilitation, vocations and welfare are adopted by the government, according to Charles McFarland, national head of the Disabled American Veterans of the World War.

Mr. McFarland is assisting in preparations for the National "For-Not Day," to be observed tomorrow, November 18. He asserts that the government should display a more intimate and fatherly interest in the futures of several thousand of America's wounded veterans.

Alaska Mountain, Moun ts With Growing Pains

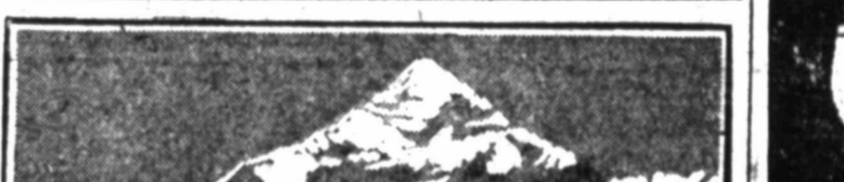
SKAGWAY, Alaska, Oct. 17.—Mount St. Elias is 18,974 feet high today—but wait until it's through growing.

It may get taller than Mount McKinley and even take the worldwide leadership from Mount Everest.

St. Elias is a rapidly growing little cuss. Already St. Elias is third highest of North America's peaks—and it is a mere infant, geologists declare.

One of science's favorite sports these days is watching St. Elias grow. And it is performing, too, scientists tell the world.

Mount St. Elias is in southeastern Alaska, part of the St. Elias range, which forms the boundary between American and Canadian territory. Its lower sides and base are buried in massive glaciers, which stretch along the coast for more than 100 miles. It is just a few miles inland from Yakutat Bay. This makes St. Elias visible from steamers traveling fairly close to shore.



Mount St. Elias, the growing mountain, seen from the ocean, with glaciers in foreground.

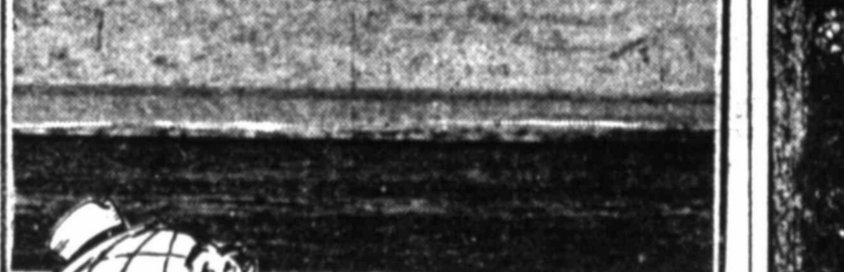
Rising from the coast through its glaciers, Mount St. Elias presents a vista not to be found elsewhere—a sheer sweep from ocean to sky, with the peaks of the mountains breaking the view of the mountains.

But to get back to growing mountains—

It's not the climate, geologists say, although it is admitted that perpetual snow is an asset to a peak's height.

Rather, it is geological formation that makes Elias grow. The St. Elias mountains were formed by the earth's uplift, involving folding and faulting. Mount St. Elias is still actively growing, growth being accompanied by movement of the earth along a series of fault lines. Through these, the mountain block is being uplifted.

Earthquakes are the "growing pains" of the mountain's growth. In addition to sending the peak closer to the sky, these tremors have also made many changes in the Yakutat district.

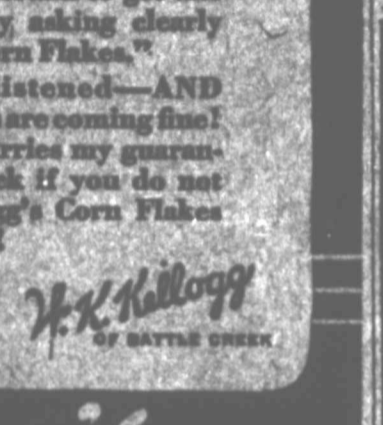
