TESTIMONY OF WITNESS REGARDED IMPORTANT BY GOVERNMENT

"NOT READY FOR ASYLUM" WITNESS TELLS ATTORNEY

Statement Made in Reply to Question Regarding His Education

FORT WORTH, Nov. 5. (AP)—Under a lengthy cross examination by defense attorneys, L. Bailey, witness for the government in the trial of oil fraud cases in the federal district court, stood by, in the main, his direct testimony given Saturday.

Ray is a defendant in the oil fraud cases, having entered a plea of guilty. His testimony for the government is regarded as being important as it is stated that it covers alleged transactions in the scheme to use the mails to defraud, not previously given by other witnesses.

When former senator J. W. Bailey, attorney for Dr. Frederick A. Cook, one of the defendants, attempted to cross examine the witness about the wording of certain literature said to have been mailed in the promotion of the Standard Petroleum Syndicate, of which Ray was the trustee, the witness replied that he limited education prevented understanding the literature.

"You have been talking about education ever since you've been on the stand," Bailey said. "Do you mean to say that you haven't any sense?"

"Well, I am not ready for the asylum," the witness replied. "Some of the smartest men have ever known never had any education, the counsel for Cook asked you 'Don't mean to say that you were not smart enough to plead guilty and get out of this case do you?'"

"Well, I don't know that I am out of it," the witness said.

Throughout the morning Bailey cross examined Ray relative to the mergers into the Petroleum Producers' Association, Cook's company, in which Ray participated and alleged by the government to be a party to the scheme to defraud. The witness reiterated his testimony brought out under direct examination.

HABEAS CORPUS FILED IN CORSICANA COURT

Fight For Possession of Child is Being Waged By Its Grandmother

AUSTIN, Nov. 5. (AP)—A slightly new version to the puzzle that was posed by Governor Neff's given today by Governor Neff of Texas, in deciding to let the courts of Illinois determine whether a 9-year old girl should belong to her mother or her grandmother.

The plea of a mother's natural love failed to move the governor in the requisition proceedings for the return to Chicago of Mrs. Clara Moore, an actress, whose stage name is Clara Stead and who is charged with having kidnapped her own 9-year old daughter, Mary Moore, from the home of the child's grandmother, Mrs. Josephine Moore, 422 North Kildare avenue, Chicago, last July.

No sooner had the requisition papers been granted than a race was on between the regulation and a habeas corpus proceeding in Corsicana, where the child is now with her mother. The mother is playing in a stock company there. Senator J. W. Thomas of Dallas, representing the child's mother, immediately telegraphed his associate to file habeas corpus proceedings at once to head off the requisition.

The fight for the child started following divorce proceedings in Dallas, Texas, several months ago. The father, Moore, was granted a divorce in Chicago on grounds of desertion and given custody of the child. He changed his wife left him to go on the stage.

The paternal grandmother came to Texas several months ago, taking the child. She instituted habeas corpus proceedings at Belton and last week a district judge there declared the mother should have custody of the daughter because domestic conditions of the principal had changed greatly since the divorce. The grandmother filed charges against the actress-mother, her being a fugitive from justice. She subsequently secured a requisition paper from the governor of Illinois and the hearing on this requisition was the one held this morning in Governor Neff's office.

Mrs. Mollie Oliver of the Chicago police department, accompanied by Attorney Joseph C. Tansberg of Chicago and Victor Moore, the child's father, departed this morning for Corsicana with the requisition papers. The hope of obtaining possession of the child and taking the mother into custody.

"Clara Moore is not out of Texas yet," said her attorney, Tansberg. "The child rightfully belongs to her. A Texas court has granted her custody and the Illinois courts are the only ones who have jurisdiction. We are going to fight to keep the child with its mother."

Bastrop was crowded with citizens from all parts of the parish who had come to town for the trial.

The first case called was that of W. McIntosh, charged with carrying fire arms on the premises of another. Assistant Attorney General Odum suggested that all the defendants charged with this offense be tried jointly in order to save time. The defense agreed. The other defendants are Captain W. Skiptwith, Marvin Pickett, Cud Pickett, Sam Eldridge and Sam Cox.

This charge grew out of a raid made on the home of Mrs. Braddock, alleged bootlegger. Braddock was brought to Bastrop by the raiding party and delivered to Sheriff Carpenter.

NEARLY 3000 CITIZENS FACE MOREHOUSE JUDGE

BASTROP, La., Nov. 5. (AP)—Nearly 3000 persons gathered in Morehouse parish, most of whom have admitted they were members of the Ku Klux Klan, were to face Judge Fred B. Odum today on misdemeanor charges in connection with hooded mob operations in this vicinity.

Some of the cases to be tried today are those of W. Skiptwith, Marvin Pickett, Cud Pickett, Sam Eldridge and Sam Cox, who were charged with carrying fire arms on the premises of another; Laurie Caldwell, charged with carrying a dangerous weapon; Captain Skiptwith, charged with conspiracy to leave his place of business; Captain Skiptwith, Marvin and Cud Pickett, charged with conspiracy to leave their homes and Calhoun, conspiring to compel a person to leave his home.

The charges set for trial beginning Wednesday and the charges involved are: W. Kirkpatrick and Dr. B. McKoin, former mayor of Mer Rouge, assault with a dangerous weapon; Kirkpatrick and McKoin, conspiring to compel a person to leave his place; Captain Skiptwith, charged with conspiracy to leave his place of business; Captain Skiptwith and Stevens, conspiring to compel a person to leave an automobile.

The last named charge is the only one of the charges which relate directly to the Daniel-Richard kidnapping.

ASHES OF BONAR LAW IN WESTMINSTER ABBEY

The ceremony was presided over by a distinguished company of nearly 2000 persons representing all who are prominent and important in the life of the nation. The members of the royal family, several hundred men from the houses of parliament, the premiers of the four dominions beyond the seas, and chiefs of the army, navy, judiciary and civil service.

BELIEVE REVISED OFFER WILL APPEAL TO FORD

Bill Will Be Ready For Presentation When Congress Convenes.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5. (AP)—Duties of a new proposal for disposition of the Muscle Shoals project contemplating a duplication of the Gorgas steam plant, recently sold to the Alabama Power Company, and its inclusion in the properties presented to President Coolidge today by Chairman Madden of the house appropriations committee.

Under the plan outlined the government would build or authorize to be built a new plant at Dams 15, 16 and 17, located about 15 miles southwest of Gorgas. A new power transmission line from the plant to Muscle Shoals proper also would be authorized.

The Illinois representative pressed the belief that a revised offer based on these proposals could be obtained from Henry Ford.

"One of the first acts of congress should be to clean up this Muscle Shoals proposition," said Mr. Madden at his conference. "If we can make the southern states more productive through the manufacture of nitrates for fertilizer and the production of power, it is much to the riches and prosperity of the whole United States."

Representative Madden said that the plan would be heard and the Muscle Shoals section had convinced him that private interests could through an additional expenditure of approximately \$10,000,000, build there "the greatest power plant in the world."

The sale of the Gorgas plant to the Alabama Power Company, recently brought from Henry Ford to the state, which included the Muscle Shoals project, the Alabama Power Company will be approved by the War Department. Secretary Weeks announced today, after Ford's department had given its approval with reference to a renewal of the contract.

The terms of the contract renewed will continue to be revokable and in all respects similar to those agreements previously made by the war department.

In connection with reported efforts of Ford advocates to have the government construct on the Warrenton river a duplicate of the Gorgas plant, it was said today at the war department that congress alone has the power to authorize the building of such a plant and that the war department is without funds to finance such a project.

A vote upon one of the 22 articles of impeachment after presentation of evidence would make possible a brief session if the executive were found guilty, it was explained.

"We are here to try Governor Walton and to pass anti-klan legislation," one senator said today. "The quicker we conclude the trial and pass this legislation the quicker we will complete our duty. Of course if Governor Walton is not guilty any of the charges all testimony will have to be heard and the trial necessarily will be long drawn out."

If testimony is taken on all of the charges, it was pointed out, the trial probably will be continued for more than a month.

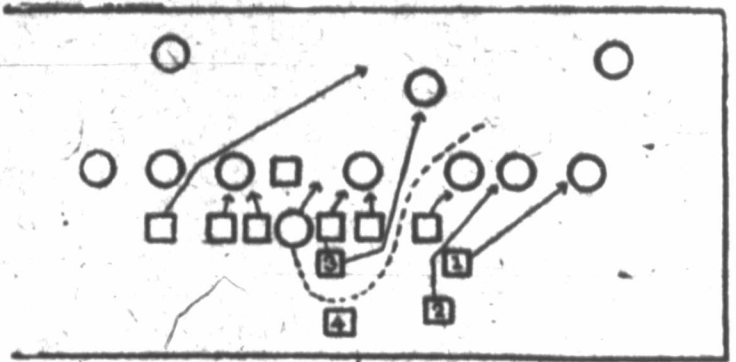
