BURKBURNETT, Texas, Nov. 10.—An appropriate program has been arranged for Armistice Day celebration to take place Sunday morning at the high school auditorium. Each of the Sunday schools will march in a body to the auditorium immediately after Sunday school has been dismissed.

The program which follows assembly at the auditorium will consist of silent prayer from 11 a. m. to 11:05 a. m. invocation, music, prayer and address by Rev. L. E. Finney, pastor of the First Baptist church. After the address the benediction will be said by Dr. Ford of the Presbyterian church.

Rev. L. E. Finney spent several months with the boys in France and his address will be one of interest to all and will be appropriate for the season. It is one of the main features of the celebration.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—The world war will end this morning at six o'clock, Washington time, 11 o'clock Paris time. The armistice was signed by the German representatives at midnight. This announcement was made by the State Department at 2:50 o'clock this morning. The armistice was made verbally by an official of the state department in this form: "The armistice will come into effect at 11 o'clock this morning, Paris time, and hostilities will cease at 11 o'clock this morning, Paris time."

DENVER ROAD TO CONDUCT TRAVELING POULTRY SCHOOL IN FEBRUARY

M. B. Oates, agricultural agent for the Fort Worth and Denver railroad, announced Saturday that complete arrangements had been made to hold a one-day poultry school at all points on the Denver and Wichita Valley railroads during the month of February, 1924. A specially equipped car, carrying the demonstrations and exhibits, which are of an educational nature, is being fitted up by the Denver for the tour to begin in February. Mr. Oates has just returned from College Station, where arrangements were completed. Two poultry experts and a publicity director from the A. and M. College, with Mr. Oates, will accompany the demonstration car on the educational tour. The demonstrations will be furnished by the A. and M. College. Although the exact itinerary has not been determined by Mr. Oates, the car will make a one-day stop at each town on the Denver and Wichita Valley railroads. A poultry school will be held in the community during the morning and the car will be open to visitors in the afternoon. The poultry specialists and Mr. Oates will be present to explain all exhibits. The poultry school promises to be one of the most complete ever held in Texas, Mr. Oates declared.

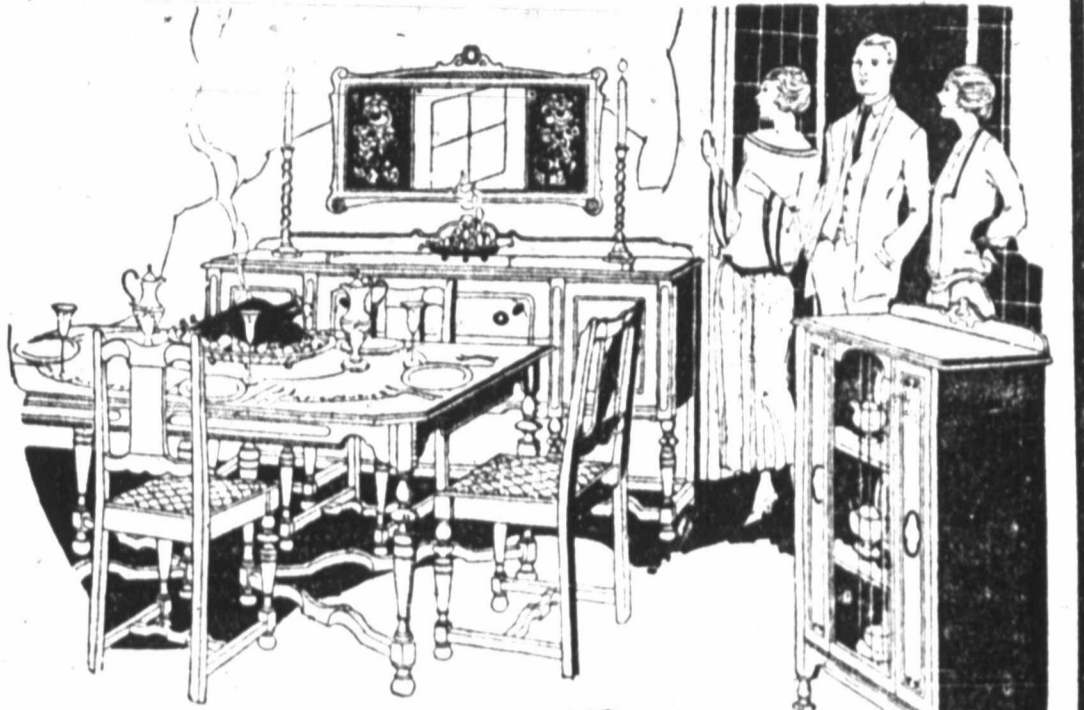

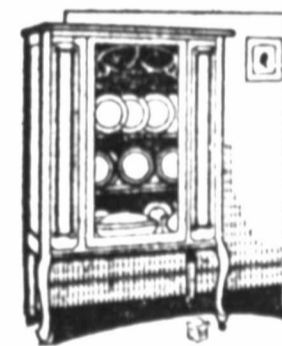

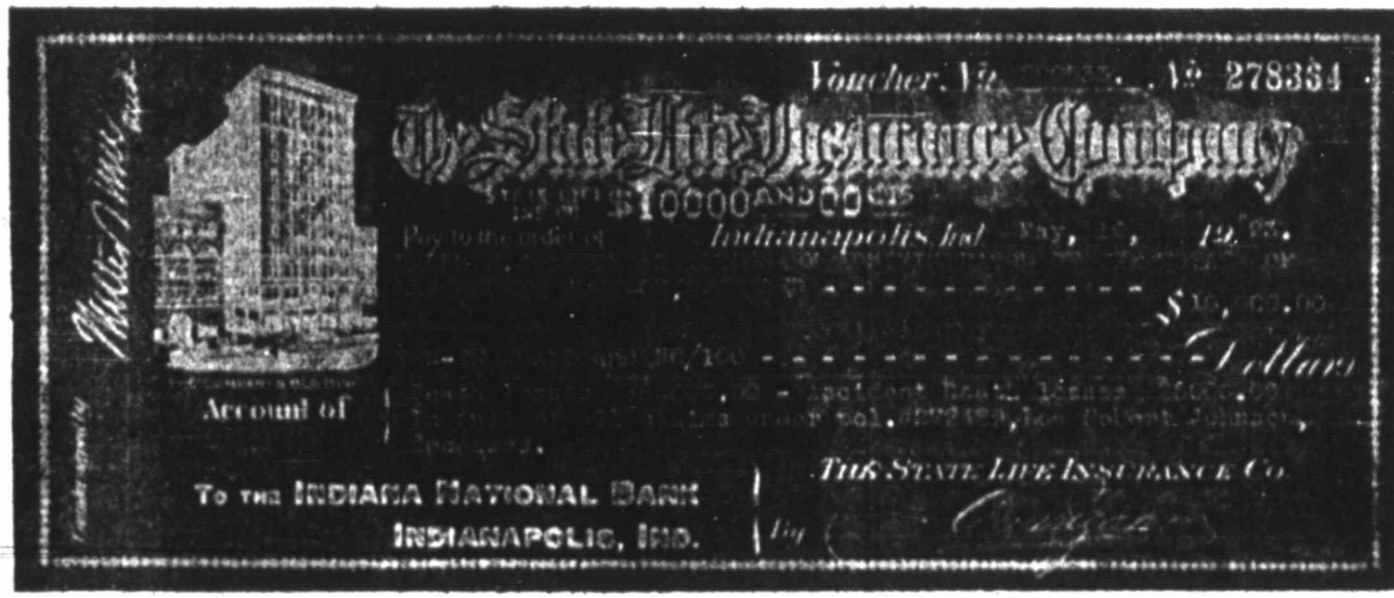

Drop Kick and a Safety Tell Story of Crimson Eleven's 5 to 0 Victory Over Princeton Tigers

PRINCETON, N. J., Nov. 10. (AP)—John Harvard today snatched a 5 to 0 victory from the Tiger's jaws in the first of the "big three" contests of 1929.

Princeton only once really threatened to score today, but it was in the first quarter when the Tiger for a time seemed to have the edge and which Harvard promptly blocked.

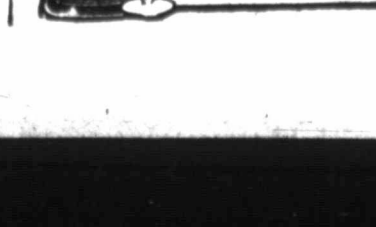

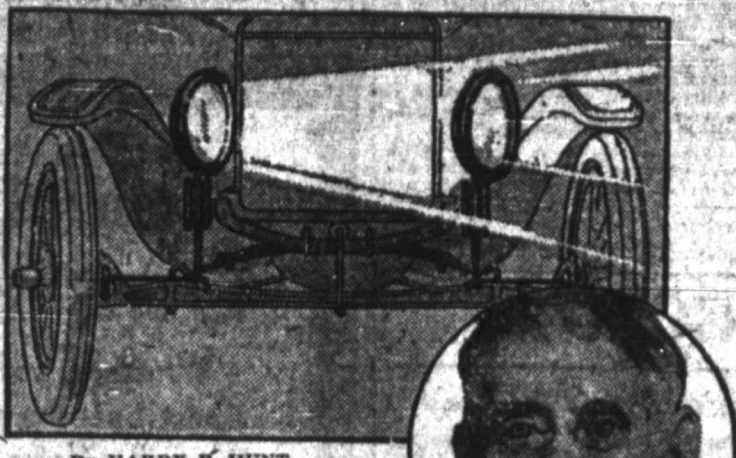

Because that is the only normal or logical way by which one can obtain the good that is offered.

Our bodies are nourished by food that we accept—acceptance is necessary, for rejection means death.

We become educated by accepting instruction—rejection of instruction means ignorance.

Now, otherwise than by accepting spiritual nourishment, can the life of the soul be sustained?

Just as the sowing of the seed made from flour sustains the body, so the acceptance of Christ, who is the bread of life, can save the soul from death.

Just as the body will perish without food, so the soul will perish without Christ. The water of life is necessary, and Jesus is that water of life.

Acceptance is necessary. If one's will is to be left free, Christ cannot be forced upon one who does not want Him. The whole character of the spiritual world would be altered if one could be saved against his will.

Salvation is free and for all—Whoever will, let him take the water of life freely—but he must take it himself.

The acceptance of Christ is a reasonable requirement if one would become a beneficiary of His blood; acceptance is the beginning of the relationship between the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

At the time of the beginning of the world, the Father and the Son were in the world, and the Holy Spirit was not yet sent.
